World Affairs Week to Open On Saturday

Pembroke Grad Will Speak At Opening; Dr. Wriston is Honorary Chairman

Starting on Saturday during the week of March 8, the 10th annual World Affairs Week in Rhode Island will present many famous speakers to bring up-to-date information and ideas on world affairs to this state.

Our own Pembroke graduate, Mrs. Martha Sharp, will be one of the prominent speakers and will open the program on Saturday, March 8, at 12:30 in the Narragansett Hotel, speaking on "Europe's Future and World Unity." Mrs. Sharp with her husband, Reverend Waitstill Sharp, have been referred to as the "guardian Angels of European Children" and have a long record of service to thousands of refugee children in Europe.

Fisher to Speak at Alumnae

Among the other famous speakers, those who will speak at Brown or Pembroke will include Dr. Edgar J. Fisher, assistant director of the Institute of International Education who will speak on "Unesco and World Unity" at Alumnae Hall at 8:15 on Monday, March 10; Robert Peel, who will be under the auspices of the Marshall Wood lecture; and Judge Owen J. Roberts, former Justice of the Supreme Court, who will address a gathering in Sayles Hall on Thursday, March 13, at 8 p. m. on "How Goes the Peace—Toward World Unity?"

Those men who will speak around Providence during the week include Dr. Irwin M. Tobin of the State Department, division of international labor, social and health affairs; Dr. Carl Herman Voss, extension secretary and director of American Christian Palestine Committee; Dr. Seymour E. Harris, professor of economics at Harvard; and Gustav Stern of Czechoslovakia, a member of the United Nations Secretariat.

Discussions and lectures will be woven around the general theme "World Unity" with speakers touching on the critical problems created by the "New Japan" and world peace. World Affairs Week, with Brown's Dr. Henry Wriston as honorary chairman for the committee and Governor Pastore as active chairman, is held to promote broad public understanding of world problems facing the United States.

Song Contest Will Be Held

Skits, Costumes To Be Used; Plaque To Be Awarded

The Dormitory Song Contest will be held in Alumnae Hall on March 11, at 7:15 p. m. Many of the dorms have already completed their songs with staging, skits, and costumes included. World News in Review

Robert T. Bapst, school superintendent, ordered Buffalo's 98 public schools reopened today after leaders of 2500 striking teachers accepted the Mayor's offer of salary increases ranging from \$300 to \$625 annually for the 1947-48 school year.

The end of the week-old walk-out was announced shortly before midnight Tuesday after a session of the council of delegates, governing body of the Buffalo Federation of Teachers.

A force of 9000 British troops combed Tel Aviv and the Mea Shearim Orthodox Jewish quarter of Jerusalem today for Jewish underground leaders. Both communities are under martial law.

Twenty-two persons were dead and more than 50 injured from Saturday's series of explosions and subsequent searches. One of the dead was a 4-year-old girl, shot by a stray bullet warning against a curfew violator.

Peel to Speak On New Japan

Professor Bartlett Gives Psychology Lecture

On Wednesday, March 12, Robert Peel, Christian Monitor reporter and editorial writer, will speak on the "Challenge of the New Japan to World Unity," at the Metcalf Auditorium at 8:15. This is another in the Marshall Woods series of lectures.

Mr. Peel served as an Intelligence Officer in Australia, New Guinea and the Philippines during World War II. He also served on a special War Department assignment in Japan, where he was able to study intensively the political situation and become intimate with most of the Japanese leaders, including the imperial family. Since his return last June he has been on the staff of the Christian Science Monitor.

Born in England, Peel was educated both in England and the United States. He has spent some years on the English faculty at Harvard and later at Principia College, Illinois, and has contributed many articles to literary journals in this country, England, and Australia.

Last Monday, March 3, in Metcalf Auditorium, as part of this endowed lecture series, Professor Frederick C. Bartlett, Professor of Experimental Psychology at Cambridge University, lectured on "Intelligence as a Social Problem."

A member of the Royal Society, Professor Bartlett is editor of various foreign and American psychology journals and during the war he directed extensive psychological services for the British armed services.

Miss Sarah C. Henderson, Division Training Supervisor of the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company, will be in the City Girls' room at 3 p. m. Tuesday, March 11, to speak to girls interested in positions as service representatives. Two changes in the administrative staff of Pembroke College were announced today by Dean Margaret Shove Morriss.

Miss Eva A. Mooar, associate dean and director of admissions, has been named Dean of Admission, while Miss Nancy D. Lewis, assistant dean and social director, has been named Dean of Students. The changes become effective immediately.

Dean Mooar, who received her A.B. and M.A. degrees from Radcliffe, has been at Pembroke since 1927 when she was appointed director of admissions and personnel. She was named associate dean in 1944. A native of Boston, Mass., Dean Mooar is a member of the American Association of University Women and was president of the R. I. Branch for two years; the Western College Personnel Officers of which she was president for a year; the American College Personnel Association and Phi Beta Kappa. In 1925-26 Dean Mooar taught at Baika Jo Gakko, Osaka, Japan.

A native of Lexington, Ky., Dean Lewis came to Pembroke as social director in 1943. A year later she was appointed assistant dean. She received her A.B. and M.A. degrees from the University of Kentucky. Before coming to Pembroke she was counselor and social director for the Woman's College, University of North Carolina. Dean Lewis is a member of the National Association of Deans of Women, the American Association of University Women, and Phi Beta Kappa.

Freshman Handbook Nearing Completion

Copy for the freshman handbook is now in the final stages of compiling and revision, Marie Caporale, editor of the handbook has announced, and the handbook will be off the press in June for the incoming fall freshmen. This all-sophomore project is designed to aid new Pembroke students in adjusting to campus life and to Providence. Beside the usual articles of interest to out-of-state girls, "Where to shop," etc., features are being included for the girls already familiar with Providence, such as a Pembroke Dictionary of expressions popularly used on campus, but mystifying to the newcomer.

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RHODE ISLAND WORLD AFFAIRS WEEK

Pembroke is well aware that the world is not bounded by Thayer and Brown Streets; yet the interest of many students in international affairs is manifested by listening to an occasional news flash or to scanning headlines and capsule news summaries. Although five campus organizations, I.R.C., P.C.A., the Student Federalist group, A.V.C., and C.A. are devoted to particular aspects of current world affairs, these groups have actually reached only a segment of the student population at Brown and Pembroke.

Tomorrow marks the beginning of the Tenth Annual Rhode Island World Affairs Week and students should realize that this is not merely a local affair sponsored by civic organizations, but a true opportunity for enlightenment on global issues. World Affairs Week is dedicated to the promotion of broader public understanding of world problems, particularly those confronting the United States. Many nationally known authorities, including Justice Owen J. Roberts, Dr. Carl Hermann Voss of the Christian Palestine Committee, Martha Dickie Sharp, a Pembroke alumna, and Robert Peel of the *Christian Science Monitor*, will bring to Rhode Island first hand information and ideas on world affairs. Revolving around the central theme *World Unity*, lectures and discussions will dwell specifically upon problems created by the "New Japan," critical problems of European nations, and world peace. This educational program, of which Dr. Henry Wriston is honorary chairman, will bring outstanding speakers to this campus as well as to the wider community. At least four of the scheduled lectures open to the public will be held on this campus, and students would do well to attend these functions.

In previous editorials, the *Record* has expressed concern for the waning interest of students in the International Relations Club at Pembroke. And, realizing the important position which such an organization should occupy, the *Record* and S.G.A. have fostered the attempt to revitalize I.R.C. To Pembroke, Rhode Island World Affairs Week should not be a mere community event, but should be an impetus to active participation in I.R.C. and to better understanding of the vital problems of world affairs.

CA Sponsors Talks On Summer Work

Bruins Meet P.C. Tues. at Auditorium

Lose to Yale 51-40 in Dull Session Last Saturday

Last Saturday the Brown basketball team in a duel that was a decided anti-climax to the State upset bowed to a mediocre Yale quintet 51-40. Neither team was exceptional, even the scoring contest between the two 6 ft. 4 in. centers, the Eli's Lavelli and the Bruin's Moe Mahoney failed to materialize each tallying a mere 13 points.

While Brown was having a free Wednesday they played Wesleyan on Thursday night (with results not available for this issue), her two traditional rivals were battling it out at Kingston. Back in the hallowed halls of Rodman Gym the R. I. Rams revived their winning streak handing Providence College their worst setback of the season 101-53. After losing their last two games to Brown and Connecticut, R. I. was ripe for a victory, too much so for the Friars who simply disintegrated.

Whether this bodes ill or good for the Bruin's when they meet P.C. next Tuesday at the Auditorium is yet to be seen. At a first glance it would seem to be Brown's game after their decisive victory over State last week, but the defeat just suffered might be just the spur P.C. needs in their determination to "take" the Bruins. In their first meetings of the season State triumphed over both P.C. and Brown, the latter by a considerably bigger margin, while P.C. also defeated the Bears with little difficulty. Turn about was fair play on the return engagement when the Bruins surprised the Rams 79-60 and the Rams did likewise for the Friars 101-53. When these teams meet previous scores mean nothing. Anything can happen.

Dean to Announce Fellowship Winner

Rowena Bellows Rommel To Be Chapel Speaker

Formal announcement of the award of The Anne Crosby Emery Alumnae Fellowship will be made by Dean Morriss at the Fellowship Award Chapel, Thursday, March 13th. This fellowship is presented as an academic honor to a member of the graduating class of Pembroke College on the basis of scholarly ability, excellence and breadth of general character, and good health. It is not to be applied for but is awarded each year, if there is a candidate of sufficient excellence.

The purpose of the fellowship, maintained in honor of the second dean of Pembroke College in Brown University, is to stimulate the intellectual life of the undergraduate students. Founded by the Alumnae Association of Brown University in 1914, the fellowship provides a fund of ten thousand dollars to be used for a year of graduate study at any American university or college of acknowledged standing.

Dean Margaret S. Morriss Enters 25th Year Here

Goucher Graduate, She Holds Many Honors from the Educational World

Now in her twenty-fifth year at Pembroke College, Dean Morriss is, to the entering freshman, a gracious, white-haired woman who heads the chapel procession every Thursday. By the time the freshman becomes a senior, she has come to realize that the college owes its ever-increasing individuality and spirit to Dean Morriss, as well as its increasingly good standards.

The Dean came to us in 1923, with an impressive record of achievements. Not only had she disintegrated herself in educational matters, but she had done significant social service in the World War, and had published one book. At her alma mater, Goucher College, which she attended as a "city girl" Miss Morriss became a member of the Phi Beta Kappa society. Upon graduation she felt that she both needed and wanted further study in her field, so she went to Bryn Mawr to do graduate work in History. Having in the meantime studied for a year in England at the London School of Economics, Dean Morriss took her Ph.D. at Bryn Mawr in 1911.

The Dean now became a history instructor at Mt. Holyoke. By 1914, she had been appointed associate professor, and later she also held the position of Secretary to the Board of Admissions.

When the World War came along, Miss Morriss left Mt. Holyoke for a while to serve with the War-work Council of the Y. W. C. A. in France. From her headquarters in Paris, she traveled all over France to base hospitals of the U. S. Army, where she directed efforts to provide recreation for nurses.

In 1923, Mary E. Woolley, President of Mt. Holyoke, recommended Miss Morriss to President Faunce for the position of Dean of Pembroke College. As President Woolley was herself a graduate of Pembroke, the recommendation was a double honor.

Pembroke, when Dean Morriss first saw it, had only 350 students. Alumnae Hall was not yet built. The activity and spirit of the Alumnae Association, which raised \$150,000 for the building of Alumnae Hall, and \$100,000 for the new dormitory, testifies to the growth of the college during the Dean's administration. Her greatest hope for the future of Pembroke it that it may become more and more "a place to which girls interested in a liberal college education of a higher type will want

to come." She feels encouraged that the college will come up to her hope, because she thinks that Pembroke strengthened itself during the war by overcoming the many problems which faced it.

During her years here, Dean Morriss has received many honors from the educational world. She has been given an L.L.D. by Russell Sage College, by Mt. Holyoke College, and by R. I. State. In 1938 she received an L.H.D. from her Alma Mater, Goucher College. Her activities in educational circles have been varied, but chief among them was her service as president of the American Association of University Women from 1937 to 1941.

Newman Club Holds Retreat In Past Week

The annual Retreat for Catholic students at Brown conducted by the Newman Club ended Wednesday evening when the Rev. Edwin Favier, O.F.M. Cap., M.A. (Oxon.) addressed a group in Upper Manning Hall.

The four day Retreat opened Sunday when students received Communion in a body at St. Joseph's Church and then attended a Communion Breakfast at Brown, where Jack Cronin, football coach of LaSalle Academy, pointed out that leadership was of prime importance in overcoming many of life's difficulties. He cited the influence which Major Frank Cavanaugh wielded over the Boston College football squad on which Cronin played. Due essentially to Coach Cavanaugh's inspirational qualities, an underdog B. C. team, back in the '20's, scored one of the most spectacular upsets in gridiron history when it trounced the Haskell Indians, 33-7. Cronin named his college coach as "second only to Knute Rockne" as a pigskin field general.

Life Based on Service

Besides calling to the collegians to be good leaders, the LaSalle mentor also reminded his audience that happiness resulted from a "life based on service" and urged the students not only to consider salary terms when deciding on a career. "There are other compensating factors," declared the speaker, "among which is the satisfaction to be gained from working with youth." Cronin spoke with authority since he has been coach at LaSalle for twenty years.

The committee for the breakfast consisted of Ed Spires of Lawrence, Mass., and Claire Wilson of Newport. Bill Carroll, Newman Club president, acted as toastmaster.

On the following three mornings, Monday through Wednesday, Mass was said by Father Favier in Upper Manning. A five minute lecture after Mass each day was given.
