Sock and Buskin will present *Twelfth Night* on May 1st, 2nd, and 3rd. This will complete Brown University's ambitious Shakespearian season. The members of the dramatic society have done an excellent job already on *Romeo and Juliet*, *The Comedy of Errors*, and *The Merchant of Venice*.

Harvey Langee will take the part of Orsino, the Duke of Illyria. Viola will be performed by Adya Andreevsky and Sebastian by Robert Kerr. The other leading role, Olivia, will be taken by Phyllis Rosenthal.

Milton Machlin and Roy Fidler, as Sir Toby Belch and Sir Andrew Aguecheek respectively, should be excellent—and humorous—at "taking down" Charles Keilus (Malvolio).

There will be performances on Thursday, May 1st, Friday, May 2nd, and Saturday, May 3rd, at 8:30 P. M. *Twelfth Night* will also be given on Saturday, May 3rd, at 2:30 P. M. This afternoon performance is in the nature of an experiment. Afternoon shows were given before the war, and Sock and Buskin is interested in finding out whether they will still be as successful.

World News in Review

A possible "Big Steel" strike was averted this week when an agreement on a 15-cent-an-hour raise was reached by Labor leaders and management, leaving the groups to iron out the way in which the money would be paid. Labor asked for a straight 15 cent pay boost, while the business leaders agreed to an 11½ cent raise with the extra 3½ cents being paid on a holiday time basis.

The Senate voted to cooperate with President Truman in sending aid to Greece without, at the moment, any stipulation as to how the money would be used.

Eight British soldiers were killed near Tel Aviv in a train wreck caused by electrically-controlled mines supposedly laid by members of the Jewish underground terrorist group.

Two alleged terrorists committed suicide in their Palestine jail cells shortly before they were to have been hanged by order of the British government.

The assistant pastor of the

Catholic Church of the Immaculate Conception in New Orleans was brutally slashed while distributing communion Sunday by a twenty-three year old assailant who could give no reason for his actions.

The wreck of the crack Chicago to Miami train near Chicago resulted in the death of two persons and injury to a score of others.

A fire begun by the explosion of the French ship *Grand Camp* in the port of Texas City set off a series of explosions and fires which razed the Gulf port city, killed over four hundred people, and threatened the survivors with poison gas fumes.

Princess Elizabeth celebrated her 21st birthday April 21 by broadcasting from South Africa her pledge to dedicate her life to the service of the British empire. She exhorted the youth of Britain to aid her in keeping this pledge to restore her empire to the proud position it held in former centuries.

NATIONAL STUDENTS' ORGANIZATION

At a recent chapel, the Pembroke Student Body voted unanimously to join the National Students' Organization. It is therefore imperative, now that we have taken that step, that we give the N.S.O. our whole-hearted support. This, however, should seem only natural, since we, the students, are the only ones who will benefit by N.S.O. membership.

The program of activities adopted at the recent N.S.O. convention at Chicago is aimed specifically at aiding the needs and problems of American students. The activities are intended to center around two phases, the first being those activities which will enhance the welfare of students on college campuses all over the country. These will include such things as improvement of the currently inadequate methods of orientation of new students into the academic and social life of the campus, bringing more cultural life to the campus, and suggestions, through frequent conferences, for betterment of such things as student government systems, student publications, and employment information service. There will also be an attempt to study the various causes of the low academic standards of some colleges and universities which will be followed by action to raise the level. A commission, which will study the curricula of various colleges and universities in their relation to the needs of students, will also be set up. Another commission, this concerned with discrimination in educational opportunity, will investigate the existing discriminatory practices arising out of educational segregation and attempt to remedy them.

The second phase of activities includes those which will bring the American student into closer contact with the students and cultures of foreign countries. This will be accomplished through relief and rehabilitation work and international student exchange and travel.

Therefore, since the N.S.O. is an organization for the student, its success as an effective student organization depends wholly upon your response and continued support.

Brown Nine Wins Opener

The past two weeks have marked one of the most successful beginnings of spring sports in Bruin history. The weather seems to have provided the inspiration needed for victories in all phases of Brown sports.

The baseball team defeated Wesleyan by the decisive margin of 14-2 in their opened last week. The capable pitching of Captain Jim Bryan held the visitors to a mere six hits. This coupled with nine errors on Wesleyan's part and Brown's unusual hitting powers resulted in the one sided score. On Saturday afternoon the Bruin's met Lowell Textile who provided them with considerably greater opposition. The hotly contested battle ran into 11 innings with Brown using four pitchers. The decisive run in the 9-8 victory was the result of Joe Kern's perfectly executed bunt which scored Phil Lapides in the first half of the 11th after almost three and one-half hours of play.

The skippers on the Brown Yacht Club have also had an unusually successful start this spring, winning first honors in all their regattas to date. On Saturday afternoon they topped Tufts, Northeastern and Trinity in a quadrangle regatta, while on Sunday, in spite of cold and wet weather, they raced to their fourth straight victory to win over Yale, Amherst and Williams. The Bruin's have one more meet, a dual regatta with M.I.T. tomorrow, before the all important New England eliminations on Sunday. The ever powerful Engineers, who won last year's ICYRA dinghy championship and are unofficially rated top team for this season, will probably give Brown skippers Charles Ill, Bob Morris, and Rick Wilson their stiffest opposition to date in this decisive match.

Thirty-five states were represented and also a majority of the 250 odd colleges that are members of the AFCW. The theme of the conference was "Together we shall build for the future" and the idea was derived from something Mme. Chiang Kai Chek said, that "We live in the present. We dream of the future. But we learn eternal truths from the past."

Many outstanding personalities spoke to us during the meetings on subjects pertaining to their special field. Among the speakers were Miss Marie Hartwig, Executive Secretary of AFCW, who spoke on "Problems of the AFCW"; Miss Alfreda Mossdrop, Director of Physical Education at Vassar and Chairman of the National Section on Women's Athletics; Miss Christine White of Wheaton, chairman of the National Officials Rating Committee; Miss Ruth Elliott, Wellesley; Miss Mildred Howard, Mount Holyoke; Miss Betty Hicks, nationally known golf professional. Panel discussions, committee meetings, and business meetings were also conducted in which current problems were brought up and discussed. Students from various colleges took part in discussions on competition and its place in the AA and organization and function of the AA in universities, and women's colleges.

Miss Betty Hicks presented a wonderful golf demonstration on Saturday and the students of the Woman's College gave us a demonstration of the various sports

Dean Nancy Lewis Approves Liberal Dorm Rules Policy

Miss Nancy Lewis, Dean of Students comes from the farming country of Kentucky. Lexington, which is her home town, is far from a hill-billy town, for it is the center of the Blue Grass, and is famous for its blooded horses and beautiful stock farms, and as the home of the fabulous Kentucky Colonels.

In Lexington Miss Lewis went to the University of Kentucky, where she majored in math. Following her graduation she went north for the first time to Syracuse University where she "nearly froze to death." Here she taught math, and studied college personnel administration. Also she had charge of a dormitory, and was on the staff of the Dean of Women.

After receiving a Master's degree from her own University, Miss Lewis went to Greensboro, North Carolina to the Women's College, where she had charge of a dorm of 175 girls.

In 1943 Miss Lewis came to Pembroke as Social Director and Academic Advisor. Later she became Assistant Dean and, more recently, Dean of Students. Dean Lewis's policy has always been to aid students in governing themselves as she feels we can use all possible training in lead-

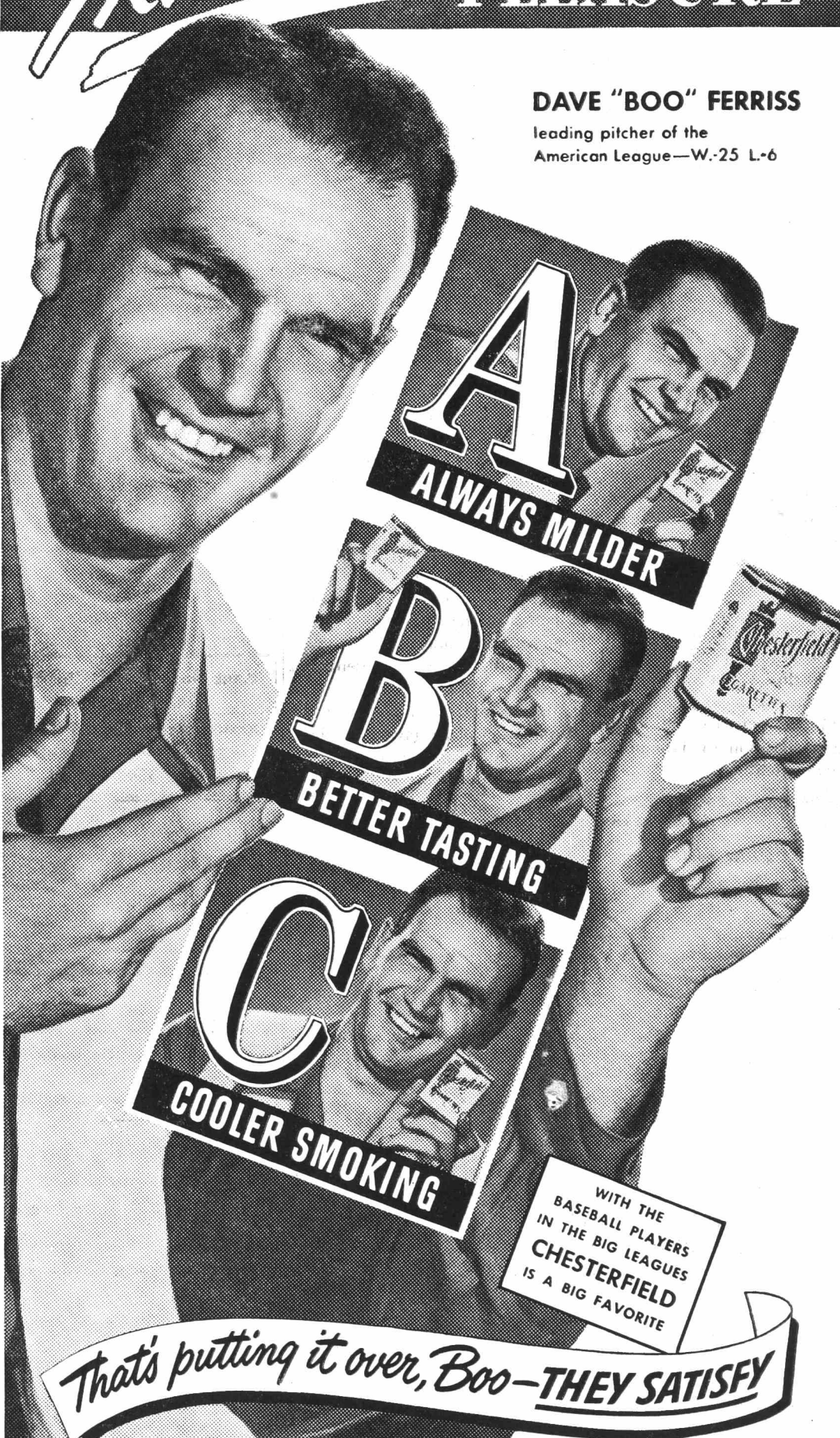
