At the *Record* Board elections held on Tuesday, Ginnie Drake of Metcalf was named Editor-in-Chief, and Les Tanenbaum of Providence, Managing Editor of the staff for 1947-48. Other promotions are Gloria Bean, News Editor, and Mickey Rizzo, Circulation Manager. Marie Caporale will head the Business staff, with Helen Ross as Assistant Manager, and Eddie Lou Brownlee and Phyll Reynolds as Co-Advertising Managers.

Her new position as Editor-in-Chief climaxes an interesting career for Ginnie whose newspaper work stems back to the days when she worked on her high school paper in New Jersey. At Pembroke, she joined the *Record* staff as a reporter in her freshman year, and rapidly attained the posts of desk and news editors. This semester she was appointed to work as Managing Editor under Esther Hoffman, and new duties as Editor-in-Chief will begin next week.

Although plans for next year are still incomplete, Ginnie intends to keep the World Affairs and Brown Sport columns inaugurated this season. She would like to establish a system whereby the *Record* and Brown *Herald* staffs can exchange information but definitely does not favor a merger unless the two student bodies reach a complete co-educational basis.

On Tuesday afternoon at 5 o'clock Mr. Olsen will discuss and present the topic "Russia and World Peace" to Pembroke and Brown students in the Faunce House Theatre Lounge. On Wednesday at 5 o'clock in the Theatre Lounge a panel of local and international Brown and Pembroke students will present a discussion program on the "U.N. and World Peace." Faculty, Brown men and Pembroke students will be given opportunity.

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'Twelfth Night' to End S & B Season

Tomorrow evening, Sock and Buskin will bring an outstanding Shakespeare season to a successful close with—in my opinion—their best play to date, "Twelfth Night."

The main plot and various subplots are too complicated to explain here, but I strongly advise you to see how well Sock & Buskin has put them over. Most of the performances were excellent. The best among these were given by Milton Machlin, whose characterization as the happy drunkard, Sir Toby Belch, reached perfection, and Roy Fidler, as the feather-brained, spineless knight, Sir Andrew Aguecheek, who will certainly keep you laughing through the greater part of the play.

Two other fine performances were executed by Glenna Robinson whose impish manner stole many a scene, as the pert lady-in-waiting to the Countess Olivia and partner in mischief to Sir Toby, and Chuck Keilus, as the I-love-me-who-do-you-love Malvolio, Olivia's steward, who turned in the most polished portrayal of a difficult role. 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World News in Review

General George Marshall returned from the Moscow conference of Foreign Ministers disheartened by Russia's attitude toward a peace treaty for Germany and Austria. The Russian government desires a strong centralized state which our Secretary of State opposes on the basis that it would be a stepping stone for Communism.

The Anglo-American powers reiterated their belief that Germany must be made a decentralized, demilitarized country to prevent further aggression.

Foreign Minister Georges Bidault of France said in Paris that while no definite treaties were signed at Moscow, much was accomplished in the way of reaching an understanding between the principal powers.

All Russia celebrated May Day Thursday with the biggest ceremony since before the war. Pictures of Marshal Stalin and Lenin decorated all public buildings in the land.

The Southern states were hit again this week by a tornado which killed at least fifteen per-

sons and injured scores more and in addition caused inestimable damage.

An offer by the Northern Bell System of a \$2.50 raise for the striking telephone operators was expected to lead to a settlement of some sort in the month old nationwide strike. However, the American Telephone and Telegraph Company stood pat on its offer to place the wage demands of operators in the hands of an arbitration board.

Russia has declared her position on the Palestine problem by offering to attempt to place the Arab question on the agenda of the United Nations.

Former Vice-President Henry A. Wallace returned to this country from his European lecture tour this week to state that much of what he said had been misunderstood in the American press.

The trial of Mrs. Julia Greene for the daytime murder of Mrs. Virginia Boston in Pawtucket last November started Tuesday in Rhode Island's Superior Court before a crowded courtroom including Mrs. Greene's three young children.

Betty Montali is Pembroke's new S.G.A. president as a result of the election held yesterday. On April twenty-ninth, Tuesday, during S.G.A. chapel, Betty presented her platform along with three other candidates. Betty's platform consisted of seven points. Her first point deals with the institution of a community chest system at Pembroke. This means that there will be a single fundraising drive for charitable organizations.

Secondly, Betty advocates the opening of a lounge from ten o'clock until twelve-thirty for Pembroke students and their dates. The new president's third point concerns the improvement of chapel committees which will, in turn, bring about an improvement in the chapels themselves. The N.S.O. is Betty's fourth point. Betty plans to derive the maximum benefit possible out of this organization for Pembroke students. In connection with her fifth point, Betty plans to merge I.R.C., A.V.C., and Y.P.C.A. into one body. In this manner, a coordination of Brown and Pembroke organization would be brought about, and interest in I.R.C. would be stimulated. Stunt Night is Betty's sixth point. The S.G.A. president plans to reinstate this affair, and if necessary, under the sponsorship of S.G.A. itself. As a final point Betty advocates the extension of the Pembroke Soda Bar hours to the morning and early evening.

During her first semester at Pembroke, Betty, who comes from New London, Connecticut, was a candidate for Campus Queen and chairman for the Christmas Dance decorations in Miller Hall. The following semester Betty participated in Brownbrokers and was a member of the class basketball team, the A.A. board and Sock and Buskin. As a first semester soph Betty was a Brownie Board member, chairman of the Miller Hall Christmas dance and co-chairman of the Sophomore barn dance. Betty was a member of the I.R.C. board during her fourth semester, Miller Hall song leader, campus model, a Junior Prom usher, a member of class basketball and Brownbrokers, and the Embassy Dormitory leader. Last semester, Betty was a member of the I.R.C. board, co-chairman of the W.S.S.F. drive and a member of the marriage committee. This semester, Betty is a member of the I.R.C. board, all-college song leader, and a member of the Brownie board and club basketball. In addition, Betty was chairman of the Junior Prom.

May Dance to Be on May 10

Paul Piccirillo to Play; Park
Theme is Background

Following traditional May Day ceremonies on Saturday afternoon, May 10, the annual May Day dance will be held from 9 to 1 p. m. in Alumnae Hall.

Paul Piccirillo and his orchestra, currently playing at the Narragansett Hotel, will play for the formal affair that is open to all Pembroke students and their escorts as well as parents of the students. Both the main hall and the Crystal Room will be open for dancing.

Decorations will be based on a park theme with white picket fences and benches as well as flowers carrying out the pastel motif of white, pink, pale yellow and light green.

Highlights of the evening will be three request numbers played for the May Queen who will reign over the dance. During the intermission at eleven o'clock refreshments, consisting of cakes frosted with pastel colors matching the decorations theme and punch, will be served in the Commons Room and at a large table in the hallway.

Mel Abramson of Miller is general chairman of the dance.

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Would anyone who has a long-sleeved pastel or white long-sleeved gown, please notify Mardy Fox at Miller Hall immediately. Girls who cannot borrow dresses will be unable to be in the Queen's Court on May Day, so it is of vital importance that such dresses be found.

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The lack of interest and participation in student activities by Pembrokers in recent years has led to a belief by some that not enough responsibility for college organizations is being placed with the student body as a whole. This group feels that nominations for the various offices filled by all-college and class elections, instead of coming from S.G.A., should be made by the student body. S.G.A. has so little contact with the students as individuals, they say, that it is quite natural for Pembrokers to feel that their part in student government is of little consequence, that they are only one vote more or less among several hundred. The attitude has become, as a result of this thinking, one of "Why bother to attend elections. My vote won't make any difference."

It is obvious that these students, who feel that S.G.A. is removed from them, are unaware of the fact that all Board meetings are open to any Association members (this means all Pembrokers taking three or more courses) who wish to attend. You may go to make suggestions and also to nominate *your* candidate for any office for which nominations rest with the executive board. In addition, any eligible junior who so desires may present himself to the Board to be included with their nominations for S.G.A. president. These clauses, found in the "Constitution of the Student Government Association," would certainly mean individual student participation if students would take advantage of them.

The situation still remains, however, that we do not as a whole show an active interest. Is it because it's too much trouble, or because it would fill too many hours in our busy college lives? It seems to us that the answer lies in the fact that very few Pembrokers know about these clauses. This is where S.G.A. has fallen down. They have worked to give us the perfect machinery of self-government, but have not shown us how to use it. Every Pembroker should be made conscious of this chance to take a direct part in her college government and should be informed regularly as to where and when S.G.A. Board meetings are to be held. Announcement of the time, place, and issues to be discussed could be made on a special bulletin board in Lower Pembroke. A little more publicity like this might make a big difference in the spirit behind our Pembroke organizations.

His interest in what he calls "the adventure of life" and his understanding of student problems have inspired many of the undergraduate body in Brown and have won him a great many friends. The comfortable atmosphere which he maintains in his

office on the first floor of Faunce House has drawn many students to discuss various problems with him.

Born in Worcester, Doctor Washburn attended Harvard where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in 1900. He then attended the Episcopal Theological

School in Cambridge and graduated from there in 1903. Shortly after, he was ordained to the diaconate. On February 14, 1904, he was ordained as an Episcopal priest.

His first parishes were the Church of the Savior and Calvary Church of Providence. When the parishes were merged to become St. Martin's Church, Doctor Washburn was named rector. He resigned his post as rector of St. Martin's to become a lecturer in Italian at Brown in 1929. In 1935, he was made resident counselor of the University and in 1942, he became the first chaplain of Brown. Two honorary degrees have been conferred on Doctor Washburn by Brown, a Master of Arts in 1932 and Doctor of Divinity in 1942.

A man of broad interests, Doctor Washburn is a member of the Harvard Clubs of Boston and New York, the Providence Art Club, the Alliance Francaise, and the Mayflower Society. He believes that University life is the most satisfying and regrets leaving Brown very much. He likes people and enjoys talking to them. A crowd can always be found around him at teas and receptions because of his lively conversations and anecdotes. In his welcoming address to entering Brown men last fall, he stated that he liked spending four years at Harvard and the rest of his life at Brown.

Doctor Washburn's plans for his retirement are indefinite. On July 27, he will fly to Italy which he has visited many times. He will stay in Siena to study Italian and Latin with the canon of the cathedral, Monsignor Venanzio Savelli. He wishes also to travel to Spain and France. He sincerely hopes the day will never come when he walks along the Brown campus and does not know any of the students.

Doctor Washburn will speak in Pembroke Chapel for the last time on Thursday, May 15. At this religious chapel, the glee club will sing. Following his address, the staff of Pembroke College will give a small luncheon for him.
