Commencement Plans Change; "Off Key" Begins on Wednesday

Brownbrokers To Perform May 21-24

From May twenty-first to May twenty-fourth Brownbrokers will present their annual show in the Faunce House Theatre at eight-thirty p. m. "A musical in two acts and nine scenes, using fourteen songs, twenty-six letters of the alphabet, eight notes of the scale, and two unbottled spirits." "Off Key" offers a variety in singing and dancing. It typifies the Brown campus in scenery and costumes, and effects a balance between the men and the women in the cast so as to equally represent both Brown and Pembroke in the show. The three unities are almost entirely preserved in that the entire action of the musical comedy, except for one scene, takes place in twenty-four hours. "Off Key" takes place on the Brown campus during what you might call anyone's year at college. The theme of the show concerns the loss of the Brown Key. The scenic effects, the costumes and the characterizations all typify the campus, and except for the musical comedy take-offs and exaggerations, add to the realism which is predomi-

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World News in Review

With the Arab states abstaining in protest, the United Nations Assembly's Political Committee late Tuesday excluded the Big Five from membership on the Palestine inquiry commission. It then named 11 smaller countries as the U.N. group to investigate the Holy Land problems this summer.

A coalition of Republicans and Democrats rammed through the Senate, a history-making bill to check strikes and other union activities. The vote was 68 to 24, enough to override a presidential veto, if the lineup remains unchanged.

Premier Alcide De Gasperi of Italy resigned in a sudden showdown with Italian left-wing Socialists who issued an ultimatum threatening to leave the government if new rightist Cabinet ministers were appointed.

The United States made available \$100,000,000 to Mexico—half of it for immediate industrial development and the other half to help maintain the present value of Mexican money.

A tornado razed a trailer camp near Findlay, Ohio, Tuesday injuring 17 persons—three seriously—and destroying 42 of the wheeled residences.

Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower gave this formula for dealing with the Russians: "Firmness, patience, a sense of humor—and keep your powder dry." In reply to news conference questions the chief of staff said he still believes that the possibility of another war in the immediate future is remote.

Seniors to Be Given Diplomas On Campus

Meeting House Found Too Small For Candidates, Guests, and Parents

President Henry M. Wriston has announced that although the degrees will be conferred on graduating seniors of Brown University on June 16, 1947, as always in the historic First Baptist Meeting House on North Main Street, the diplomas will be presented on the Middle Campus of the university.

Inadequate Space

Because of the size of this year's graduating class, the majority of whom are veterans, the First Baptist Meeting House, built in 1775 "for the worship of Almighty God and for holding Commencements in," is not large enough to accommodate the 500 seniors, their parents, the corporation, faculty, candidates for honorary degrees and invited guests. The first Brown University Commencement in the Meeting House was held Sept. 7, 1776, and except for a few instances commencements have always been held there.

Commencement Suspended

During the Revolutionary War commencement exercises were suspended, in 1804 another church was used because it had an organ, and in 1832 exercises were held elsewhere because the Meeting House was undergoing repairs.

The breaking of the tradition of holding the entire Commencement exercises in the Meeting House has been approved by the entire Committee on Commencement, headed by Dean Samuel T. Arnold; by a Special Committee appointed to study the matter of

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Class Meetings

At a recent class meeting there were less than twenty of the members present. After discussing the matter, it was decided that there were too few there to transact the business at hand, and the meeting was adjourned without having accomplished anything. This is very unfair for those who made the effort to attend, and it holds up important class business until a sufficient number of the members can be cajoled into showing up. Time, especially at the present, is too valuable to waste in this manner.

However, there is a great deal to be said for those who did not come. This was the third meeting in one week for the same class, and there would have had to have been another one in a week's time even if it were not for the unsuccessful meeting. The business that had to be attended to could have all been transacted at one meeting.

This lack of organization has been becoming worse and worse. It is common to all of the classes. Why cannot there be regular class meetings at stated intervals so that everyone could plan to attend them? There would then be no excuse of, "I didn't see the notice," or, "I didn't know anything about it until the last minute, and I had already made arrangements to—."

Notices about class meetings should be large enough and conspicuous enough to be seen. A tiny sheet of paper in the midst of many other notices can easily be overlooked or covered up by another sign. Do not give people an excuse for not showing up; see that such notices "hit them in the eye." If it is a special meeting, post the notices enough in advance so that everyone will know about it and plan to come.

Quite a few people have classes during the noon hour on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. Others make plans for those times before notices of class meetings are posted, even when signs are put up in advance. If these meetings were held on Tuesdays from 12:00 to 12:30 no one could have an excuse for not attending, as everybody knows she has to plan on going to S.G.A. chapel at that time. If this plan were followed, attendance could really be made compulsory at class meetings by having the chapel monitors take the attendance. Then those who did not come could be given a chapel cut.

If everyone would come out for meetings, there would be much more democratic representation. Furthermore, more interest would be aroused in the class' affairs if everyone knew what was going on. When something important comes up that the whole class should discuss and act on, how many in the class know anything about it?

Commencement in 1948 and thereafter, and by the Advisory and Executive Committee of the Corporation.

Traditional March

There will, however, be the traditional march down College Hill, one of Providence's major annual events. Following the formation of the academic procession on the Brown campus, the group will march down the hill to the Meeting House, where a portion of the Commencement exercises are to be held. The exercises in the church will be broadcast to Sayles Hall, where the overflow crowd will assemble.

Following the addresses by the graduating seniors, the procession will march back up the hill to the Middle Campus where all degrees will be awarded.

The capacity of the Meeting House, 1250, would allow for only one guest ticket for each of the 500 Brown and Pembroke graduating seniors. If both parents were to be given tickets, the total of parents and graduating seniors would be 1500, more than the capacity of the church, and would not allow for the faculty, corporation and distinguished guests.

Members of the senior class asked the university to arrange some system whereby both parents could attend the awarding of their diplomas.

In a statement issued to the students Dean Arnold said, "Since the First Baptist Meeting House is of limited capacity and will hold only a portion of those desiring admission, the senior students at Brown University have asked that if possible arrangements be made whereby they have two or more tickets for the Commencement exercises on June 16th where their diplomas are awarded. The request has been carefully studied by the groups mentioned above and the procedure as outlined seems very satisfactory to the students."

A rostrum for the awarding of diplomas will be provided on the Middle Campus, as well as stands and seats for those taking part in or attending the exercises. The exercises on the campus will be concluded with a hymn and benediction.

In case of rain, however, the

exercises begun in the Meeting House will continue to conclusion, including the awarding of all degrees.

Mary Woolley Scholarship Given Catherine Patch

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Asadorian Starts Food Drive For European Countries

Here in America, it is difficult to realize the great suffering as a result of not enough food in foreign countries which are struggling back to some sort of normalcy after the war. Not everyone can go abroad and witness it and just a description from those who have seen it, still is inadequate to bring home the magnitude of the starvation.

The World Relatedness Commission of C.A., of which Betty Asadorian is chairman, is starting a drive today on campus for contributions toward food packages for hungry Europe which will be sent through CARE, the Cooperative for American Remittances to Europe, a purely non-profit organization made up of many members of the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Service. Through this organization, individuals may send money for standard food packages designating some specific person or organization as beneficiary or may send the contribution indicating that it is a general charitable contribution if he doesn't wish to name a beneficiary. In this case, CARE will select a needy individual to receive the package. If the package is not delivered within a reasonable length of time, the full purchase price will be refunded. Through this person-to-person method, one can feel as if he is helping individually instead of just contributing to a "middleman" organization.

Skippers Win First Place

On Sunday, May 4th Brown skippers Bud Morris and Rick Wilson sailed to their most impressive victory of the year winning first place in the Eastern Dinghy Championships and placing first in the New England "B" Eliminations thus assuring themselves a chance at the national championship. This match also decided the winner of the George Owen Trophy which the Bruin's now possess for the first time in its seven year history. In previous years it has been won by M.I.T., Harvard, Dartmouth and 3 times by the Coast Guard Academy. This year, Brown's exceptional skippers successfully defeated some of the best racing teams in the east—Harvard, M.I.T., Princeton, Yale, Navy, Coast Guard, Cornell, Pennsylvania, Dartmouth and Williams, to gain the honor.

In an attempt to win a second regional crown the Brown skippers traveled to the Charles River for the 7th annual New England Championship Regatta last weekend. It must have been an off day for the Bruin's however, as they went down to their first defeat of the season to finish in last place behind M.I.T., Boston U. and Yale. Navy in the meantime had won the Middle Atlantic Crown to become with Brown and M.I.T. one of the top three contenders for the Henry A. Morse Memorial Trophy and the national crown.

A "second string" Brown team of Dick Richardson and George Shepherd outscored Trinity, Boston College, Colby, Worcester Tech, Dartmouth and Amherst in a consolation regatta held on the Seekonk last weekend while the "first stringers" sailed the Charles.

Handford and Carrier Given New Positions

President Wriston has announced that Dr. George F. Carrier, a member of the Graduate Division of Applied Mathematics, has been promoted to associate professor of engineering for the two-year period, 1947-49, while Dr. S. Wing Handford has been promoted to associate professor of biology for the same period.

Professor Carrier has been at Brown since last year. He received his engineering degree from Cornell in 1939 and his doctorate from the same university in 1941. He was an instructor at Cornell from 1941 to 1944 and in the summer of 1942 was a member of the research group at the Pratt-Whitney Aircraft Corporation. For two years prior to coming to Brown Professor Carrier did research for Pratt-Whitney at Harvard. He is a member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers and the American Mathematical Society.

Professor Handford served in the navy from 1942 to 1945, when he was discharged with the rank of lieutenant commander. He was staff commander at the Fleet Air Forces at Quonset from 1945 to 1946. Professor Handford is a member of Sigma Xi and the Society for the Study of Development and Growth.
