Hillel To Organize At Brown; Religious Embassy Date Set

C. A. Embassy Will Sponsor Discussions

The C.A. Religious Embassy will be held at Pembroke and Brown March 3, 4, and 5. The topic of the Embassy will be "What Do I Owe to God, to My Neighbor, and to Myself."

Mary McNulty, Pembroke chairman, has announced that the main speaker will be Mrs. John Magee of New Haven. Mrs. Magee's son was pilot officer John G. Magee, Jr., who wrote the sonnet "Highlight," and who was killed at the age of 19 in this last war. He was a member of the Royal Canadian Air Force.

She was a missionary in China for 18 years, and her husband is one of the chaplains at Yale.

Monday, March 3 at 8 P. M. in the Faunce House Art Gallery the Embassy will open with a Panel discussion on the topic "How to Live on Twenty-Four Hours a Day." The moderator will be Professor Arthur Lynch and the three speakers in the discussion will be Rabbi Jacob P. Rudin, Prentiss L. Pemberton, minister to Harvard students, and Father John J. Kenny, Director of Parochial Schools in Rhode Island. This first meeting will be in conjunction with Brown. The chairman at Brown is Richard Morris.

Tuesday, March 4, Mrs. Magee will speak in chapel and at 7 P. M. there will be discussion groups in each dorm, followed by a candlelight vesper service in Sayles Hall at 9 P. M. The discussions will be based on questions formed out of Mrs. Magee's talk in chapel.

Every morning at 6:50 there will be a Roman Catholic Mass, and on Monday and Tuesday at 7 P. M. there will be a Retreat Conference for Catholics in Upper Manning. At the same time discussions will be held for Jewish students in the Faunce House Theatre Lounge.

The Embassy will end Wednesday.
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The Record will hold a smoker this afternoon at 4:45 in the Commons Room, for all girls interested in working on any phase of the paper. Refreshments will be served. Present staff members are requested to attend.

On Monday, Feb. 24, Mr. Goodwin of Balfour's will be in the Commons Room from 12:00 noon on. Seniors are requested to bring the exact change for their rings. This amounts to \$13.60. Juniors may order rings at this time. A \$5.00 deposit is required.

Dorms Set Song Contest Date

On March 11 at 7:15 p. m. the Dorm Song Contest will be held in Alumnae Hall. City Girls are eligible this year for the first time. The songs must have original words set to any tune. Each group will be given six minutes in which to perform and any type of costume or skit may be employed. Songs will be judged on the basis of originality, presentation and spirit. Judges will be Prof. Coolidge of the Music Department, Miss Horton, Pembroke Recorder, and Professor Stewart of the English Department. First, second and third prizes will be presented. The winning group will receive a plaque with its name engraved upon it. The plaque is at present in Miller Hall, winner of last year's contest.

World News in Review

The State Department began a daily series of foreign language broadcasts to Russia Monday with a one hour program beginning and concluding with "Battle Hymn of the Republic." The purpose of the broadcasts is to give Russian listeners "a picture of America, to explain our various problems and to point out how we are trying to solve them."

Rear Admiral Richard E. Byrd flew over the South Pole Sunday and dropped the flag of the United Nations at the pole, dispatches from Little America announced.

The Senate Judiciary committee voted 9 to 1 for a proposed amendment to limit presidential tenure to two full terms of four years each.

Ray Robinson, world welterweight champion, was suspended 30 days and fined \$500 by the New York State Athletic Commission for his failure to report a \$25,000 bribe.

On Monday, February 17, the Hillel Foundation, a new organization at Brown, met for the first time at Faunce House West Lounge at the reception given for Rabbi Rosen, the leader of the group. Another meeting was held on Wednesday when, at the Faunce House Theatre Lounge Dr. Sachar, the national director of the foundation, addressed the group.

The activities of Hillel will in part be determined by the general membership at its organizational meeting on February 27. Tentative plans include a lecture series on Jewish culture as integrated with American culture, and classes in beginning and advanced Hebrew. A library committee will take charge of a book collection. The foundation has a lounge in Froebel Hall which will serve as the center of Hillel activities.

Rabbi Rosen and his wife have taken up permanent residence in Providence. Until his army discharge two months ago he was a chaplain in the Asiatic theatre and in the United States. The Rabbi is a graduate of Columbia University and the Elchanan Theological Seminary. He has occupied pulpits in New York and Georgia.

On Tuesday, March 4, Rabbi Rudin, who will speak in the university's Religious Embassy, will meet Jewish students from 7-9 P. M. for a discussion group. This will inaugurate the regular meeting of the organization, which will probably be held on Tuesday evenings. A Purim celebration is being planned to take place in the same week, and plans are under way for a celebration to mark the beginning of Passover early in April.

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In a recent editorial the *Record* made a strong denunciation of the student body for its inappreciative attitude toward the International Relations Club. Since then we have come to believe that perhaps more blame lies with the organization itself than was previously reported. Their meetings, although "interesting and informative" as we stated in our former treatise, have nevertheless been complete flops. We still claim that a major part of the blame rests with the students, but we also assert that a student body is always dormant until sufficiently aroused.

Investigation shows that an interest in current affairs does exist to some degree among Pembroke students. They flock in large numbers to meetings of the Student Federalist organization, the P.C.A., and the A.V.C. Interest in these three organizations, with three different purposes, yet all interested in current affairs in one way or another, leads us to believe that there is a place in the campus orbit for I.R.C. if the organization is presented to the students properly.

At Leader's Conference this past week the decline of I.R.C. was discussed. It was decided that the organization would not be dropped this semester since interest in its scope exists and needs only to be aroused. I.R.C. is now on probation. It is now up to the I.R.C. board to offer us meetings and discussions which will arouse more than a passive interest, to publicize them far enough in advance so that we may plan to attend them, and to publicize them widely enough so that they will attract the attention of the entire student body.

I.R.C. is a flourishing organization in many colleges throughout the country. It has been successful here at Pembroke in the past. By attending meetings of a similar vein in other organizations, we have shown that we are not as apathetic toward the current world scene as we seem to be. There is to be a regional meeting of Massachusetts and Rhode Island I.R.C. Clubs in New Haven in two weeks. At that meeting the Pembroke I.R.C. should discover what questions students at other colleges are discussing this semester. During the succeeding weeks these discussions will be offered to Pembroke.

I.R.C. has declined steadily because of lack of student support. Now the society has been given a semester's grace to prove itself. The student body is there, waiting to have its interest aroused. The responsibility is now in the hands of the I.R.C. board. It will be interesting to see how it will meet the challenge.

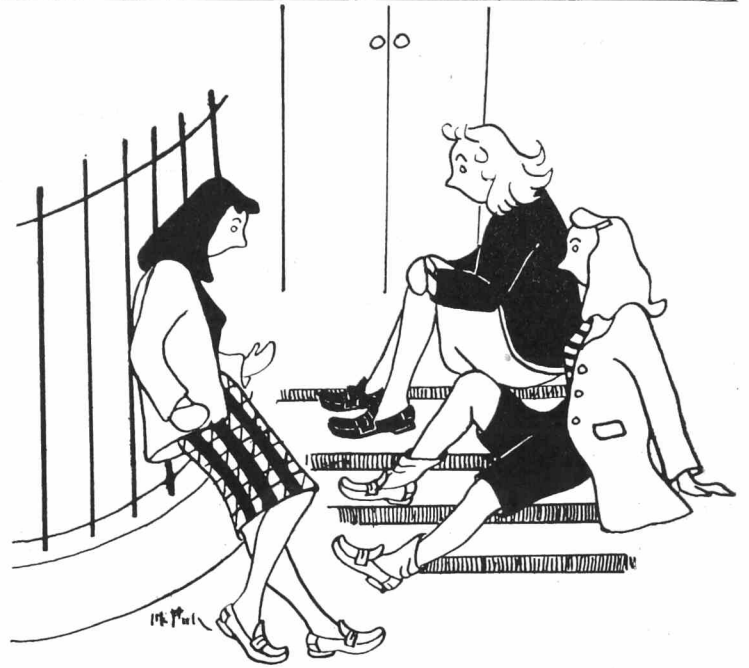

Students International Union

For the twenty-third successive year the Students International Union will hold a summer institute for young people who are interested in international affairs.

This program was organized for the purpose of promoting mutual understanding and service among the youth of different nationalities and for bringing together students of many countries for a deeper understanding of world problems.

This summer the Institute of World Affairs will be held at Salisbury, Connecticut, under the leadership of Dr. J. Martin Klotzsch, president of State Teachers College, Milwaukee, Dr. William Y. Elliott of Harvard University, Dr. Wing Tsit Chan of Dartmouth College, and other visiting specialists who will hold Round Tables on economics and politics during the term July 16-August 27, 1947.

One or two likely candidates will be chosen. The total for tuition and living expenses will be \$250. However, scholarships will be awarded to outstanding students, with potential power of leadership, which will make the cost to the individual \$100.

S.G.A. Notices

Placement Notice

Effective February 12, 1947, a new system for handling incoming calls for "baby-sitters" and the placement of students will be inaugurated. The decision to change the present system was made after considerable thought and with a desire to eliminate the telephone calls to the dormitories which are, undoubtedly, a nuisance to many students. It is the feeling of the Placement Office that the new system will give better service both to the students looking for work and to those families seeking help.

The new system will operate as follows:

1—All requests for "baby-sitters" will be posted on a bulletin board outside the Placement Office (opposite City Girls' Room, 2nd floor, Alumnae Hall). Those students interested in working should check the board for available calls and choose those which they would like to take. The call card should be removed from the bulletin board, signed, and then left in the Placement Office so that the family may be notified that the job is filled.

2—As a guide for handling incoming calls, a chart shall be posted each Monday for the current week on which students are asked to indicate which afternoons or evenings they will be available for assignments. In this way the Placement Office shall be able to determine the amount of encouragement which should be given prospective employers about filling their calls. If a family calls for a student at a time when none have indicated their availability, the call will be refused. The use of this chart will also mean that last-minute calls may be handled by giving the names of possible workers to the families to call themselves. However, signing the chart will not guarantee students a job at the time they specify. It is still the responsibility of the student to check the available jobs on the bulletin board.

As this revision in the placement procedure for "baby-sitters" has been made with the students' interests in mind, comments on the new system will be welcomed. The Placement Office shall be glad to answer the questions of any student regarding this new procedure.

At this point in the season when the team should be just reaching its stride, Coach Ewbank is facing the problem of reorganization. The loss of his three top scorers—ex-captain Woodie Grimshaw, who is now continuing his illustrious hoop career as a professional with the Providence Steam Rollers, and the Zuber brothers who have had to leave the squad because of academic difficulties—has been a serious one. In spite of these difficulties, the team has made a very good showing in both games this week. The addition of Frank Mahoney, Freshman star, to the varsity team has been a wise move; he turned in a fine performance in both games. Regulars Paul Flick and Ernie Corner with Bob Friend and Vin D'Angelo were the other starters.

Saturday night the Bruins lost a heartbreaker to Amherst. The game was nip and tuck from start to finish, ending in two over-times. Unfortunately, Brown's luck didn't hold, and they came out on the short end of a 64-60 score.

Wednesday night the Bears invaded Cambridge for a repeat performance with M.I.T., where they again defeated the Engineers—this time by a score of 57-46. Bob Smith was high scorer of the evening, totaling 14 points.

RISD Museum Holds Exhibit

Textile Panorama Will Continue Through Mar. 30

A large exhibition titled "Textile Panorama: Ancient and Modern" opened at the Museum of Art, Rhode Island School of Design, Wednesday, February 12. Owing to great interest which the show will undoubtedly have for local visitors, it will remain on view through March 30.

The modern section of the Exhibition features advance fashions in dress and decorating fabrics which were lent by leading manufacturers in America, Mexico, Guatemala, England, France, and Sweden. Included in these are a number of pieces of cloth interwoven with the new synthetic fibers as well as a small group illustrating their exclusive use.

In the ancient section are exhibited some of the rarest and most beautiful examples of early weaving known. Among the earliest to date are fragments of the cloth used to wrap bodies of the dead by the Christian Copts in Egypt. Near Eastern, Arabian and Byzantine, Persian and Turkish fabrics follow in vivid panorama.

Dominating the exhibition on either side of the Main Gallery are large panels of natural colored linen with brilliant crewel made in France in the time of Louis XIV and lent by French and

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Sally Ann Ruyter Wins Boston Globe Fellowship

Pembroke is One of Ten in New England Honored

Sally Ann Ruyter, Semester VIII, has been selected winner of one of the Boston Globe's ten \$1,000 World War II Memorial Fellowships. Not only is she the only Pembroke to claim this distinction, but she is also the only native Rhode Islander among the winners.

Winning a fellowship is nothing new or strange to Sally Ann, however. Throughout her high school and college years, the Globe winner was presented with numerous awards, scholarships, fellowships, and other scholastic honors. In high school she received the dramatic society's annual award toward future education, and at Pembroke she won the Elisha Benjamin Andrews scholarship for scholastic excellence during her sophomore and junior years. This does not end the fine record of her achievements, however. Sally Ann has been a member of the Dean's List ever since her fourth semester, and has been elected to Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Psi.

Sally Ann's award entitles her to a year of travel and study anywhere in the Western Hemisphere outside the continental United States. At one time, Sally Ann planned to study for a medical doctor's degree. At this point,
