



Dear Lou:

I have a feeling that this may arrive leaving a bit of a gap. I wrote letters to you, Cy and Dick, and one to LCDR Carlos Froes along with a magazine, and, of more importance, forwarded through you a letter from the mayor of Cape May to the mayor of Belem, thanking him for the medal, and extending an official invitation to visit Cape May as a guest of the City during his tour of the United States. All of this was sent, via APO New York, in January. As neither the Mayor nor I have received any indication that these were received, I guess the envelope must have gone astray.

I can only salvage part of it by sending copies of the letters to you and Cy, and to state that in my letter to Dick I thanked him for sending General Nogueira's letter and advising him that it was Joe Tyson who took care of the alligator skin. Joe is now in School in Monterey, California, about 1/3 finished his course.

I will write again to Carlos. Nothing, I fear, can be done about the letter to the Mayor until we are positive that that did not arrive; it will probably be too late, but I will at least see that his gesture is not ignored.

I am sending, separately, 3 plates for plaques left there - one for the Consulate, one for Mayor Maroje and one for Brigadier Cabral. I would appreciate very much you having the latter two delivered for me.

When we got home last time I had a few extremely pleasant letters awaiting me. Enclosed for your information is a copy of one by Mr. Covey T. Oliver, of State, to the Commandant of the Coast Guard, with the letter forwarding it to, not a person 'to whose command I belong', but who writes my fitness reports.

I am very appreciative of your action, which resulted in this.

I shall try to ensure that UNIMAK returns to Belem, as suggested by you and by Mr. Oliver, and also by Cy in his report, a copy of which has also reached me, forwarded through Coast Guard Headquarters. I am sending Cy a copy of the letter that accompanied that one.

Unfortunately, the presentation of the medal to the mayor did not get in the papers. First pushed out by local elections, then lost out while away being framed (the medal and the certificate). I am very sorry about this, but it was something I could not control.

Enclosed is a letter to Mayor Maroja from Mayor Gauvry, thanking him for the medal and inviting him to visit Cape May as a guest of the City when he visits the States.
