Dear Marshall: I still don't know when I'll get a chance to get to Manaus.

I didn't get back from Recife and Salvador until early Thursday morning
therefore missing the Manaus pouch.

I am enclosing the amended passport for Mrs. Blanchette and the new one
for Theresa. It is now valid until September 28, 1972. It may be extended
again to Gerald. The passport and Birth Certificate for Leon Morgan Reese,
Jr. are also enclosed.

I am sending along a thermofax copy of a telegram from Ambassador McClintock
addressed to you in case you may not have received it through commercial
channels.

I also received a telegram from Manaus from Michael A. Lebellet requesting
urgently that I reply to his letter of August 8. Since I never received
anything from him, I am completely in the dark about this. If you can
contact him I would appreciate it. I have no information whatsoever
regarding his address etc. Once I know what the problems is I can work on
finding a solution.

I have no other information regarding Amapex. I can't pursue that matter
further until the inquiring company furnishes me with one data.

We have received authorization from the Veterans Administration to continue
outpatient treatment for David Stowell. From the correspondence on file here
my impression is that he is no longer residing in Manaus. He formerly resided
at Rua São Luis, 500 (Adrianópolis), Manaus. Do you have any information to
give me on this.

I don't have a clue as to what the problem regarding the visa of Mr. Mendes
is. I'll send a copy of your letter to Peter Carrico in Brasília to see
what he can tell me.

Manaus does not have a physician qualified to give medical exams for students
going to the U.S. and according to anyone here's recollection it has never
had one. If Mr. Frota was previously examined for a student visa and has
returned for a period of less than 120 days he will not need to get another
one. If he entered the U.S. on a tourist visa and changed his status while
there he will need a medical examination which can be obtained in Belém or
Brasília. Every student who will remain in the U.S. more than 180 days must
have a medical examination prior to getting a visa.

1. Mr. Jose Carlos Camara Mendes a member of the firm Tropical Aquarium Ltda. Rua Silva Ramos 726, Manaus claims he needs to go to the U.S. on business. Paul H. Wackerbarth Consul to Brasilia, with what he thought would be the proper documents, but apparently the Consular Section there could not issue him a visa for some reason. Mr. Mendes says he left his passport and round trip airline tickets in the hands of the Consular Officer in Brasilia, but to date he has not heard from them. Is it possible for us to find out what else Mr. Mendes might need? He didn't seem to be very sure.

2. Mr. Roberto E. Nunes da Frota has a problem with his student visa. He has studied in the U.S. but came back to Manaus for a visit. He has an I-20 form signed by Pennsylvania State University, but needs to renew his student visa status. He is supposedly to report there on September 20th. Varig, so he says, has told him that he can get his Medical Exams here in Manaus. Varig told him that Dr. Wallace Ramos Oliveira is authorized to give these examinations in Manaus. Is this true? If so it would sure simplify matters for all. If Mr. Frota cannot take medical exams here where would he have to go? Can they still be given in Belem?

3. The directors of the new Television Station TV-Amazonas Channel 5 have asked my assistance in trying to get films of English language courses to be given on this TV programs. They say they know these courses have been made available in Brazil to other stations, and wish to know how they should proceed for themselves.
