My dear Mr. President:

I thought you would like to know that I have summoned to Washington for a briefing with regard to the Dominican Republic situation Mr. Clark D. Anderson, Legal Attache in charge of our liaison operations at Mexico City, Mexico. I consider him to be a highly competent administrator, an inspiring leader and most effective in personal contacts and in handling sensitive assignments.

Mr. Anderson, who is 50 years of age, was born and reared in McGregor, Texas. He received the B.A. degree at the Southwest Texas State Teachers College in 1935 and taught and coached athletics at Fredericksburg, Texas, before entering the FBI in 1938. While serving in a clerical capacity at our headquarters, Mr. Anderson attended the Georgetown University Law School, where he received the LL.B. degree in 1941.

In September, 1941, Mr. Anderson was appointed a Special Agent. Following service in three southern field offices and at our headquarters, he was sent to Tegucigalpa, Honduras, in April, 1945, in a liaison capacity and, with the exception of a brief term at San Antonio, Texas, in 1947-48, he has filled foreign assignments ever since.


