

Among these press reports was the Associated Press. Remember, I led the marches for victory in 1970. We had a frightful time with the media. They would not report us in advance. It was the broadcast on 610 stations that brought the crowds there, 250 thousand on October 3, when President Nixon and Kissinger kept Vice-President Ky from arriving from Vietnam to be our speaker.

Now we are up on this satellite. The Fairness Doctrine has been repealed, and this Communications magazine has devoted three pages of its October issue to what I did in fighting the Federal Communications Commission and these liberals that were determined to kill our radio station. They gave a picture of the ship I put out on the Atlantic and they told the story in detail. I said they should abolish the FCC's Fairness Doctrine. I maintained that the government had no right to judge speech directly or indirectly.

This beautiful story ends by explaining that the Fairness Doctrine has been abolished and that the views of Carl McIntire have prevailed. Now may God grant that we will use this satellite, and I want 1000 radio stations besides. They did awful damage in contributing to our defeat in Vietnam. In the last two weeks of the recent election, Dukakis announced he was a liberal, reversing his previous posture. The liberals so controlled the media that if they had had a little more time, they might have changed the vote of 54 percent to Bush and 46 percent to Dukakis. We simply have to expose them — these liberal church groups they promoted and protected — and we will do our best to do it if you people will give us the funds to get to the people. I want you to know that I relish this battle and let us do a good job now and get to these millions in these churches. The WCC claims that it has 75,913,020 members in the churches of this country. That can be changed, but it has to be done by giving the people the information which they are entitled to have in our free country. Will you help me to do my part in this required task, please?

Now we have the Christmas offering. I have all these orphans and poor church groups we have been helping. I have given bicycles, they are \$85 for one. I have given them all manner of aid in these third-world countries.

We have the International Council of Christian Churches; for 40 years we have been building it. God has done it. I am president of it, and now we need the funds God's people have. When the FBI in our country in its '86-'87 Report on Soviet Active Measures mentions by name the World Council of Churches and the National Council of Churches and we can put a full-page ad in the *Wall Street Journal* for \$67,000 and get two million copies in the newsstands across the nation we, you, all of us, have an obligation to get to the American people and turn this tide in these churches.

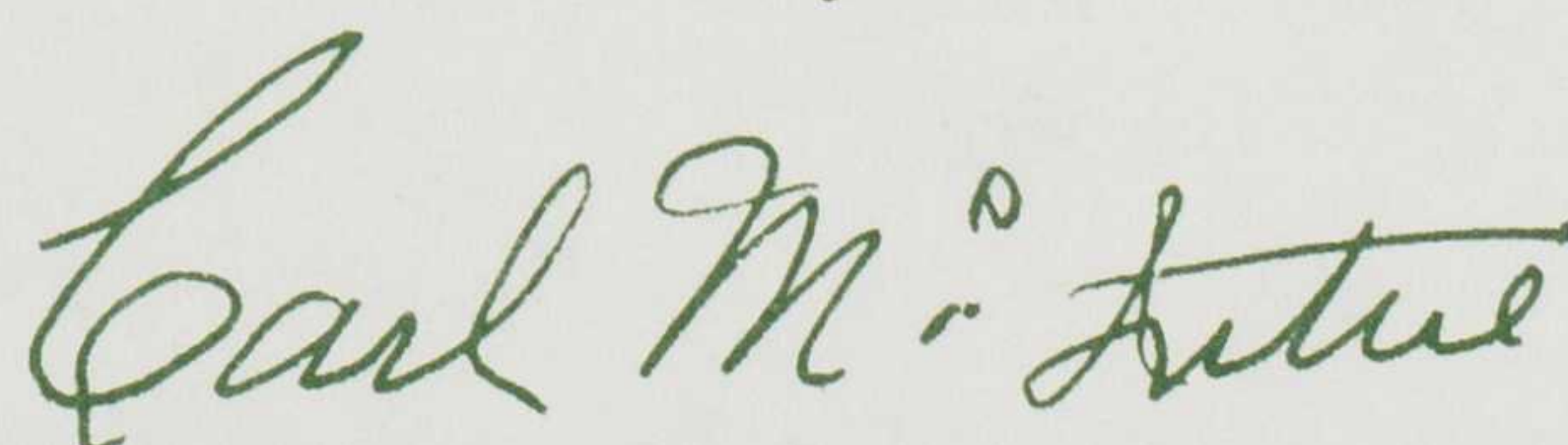
This is the request that you unburden your heart and soul this Christmas. Please send us your gifts for the broadcast and for the ICCC.
