

is expected to select one to four families with whom their guest will live, to arrange for media coverage and public appearances and to provide between \$150 and \$400 to pay for internal transportation within the U.S. The visitor will pay for international travel and incidental expenses.

Operations Crossroads Africa . . . A private, non-profit organization, OCA has been sending college-age Americans to spend a summer working in Africa for the past fifteen years. Students live in a work camp, helping on community construction projects for six to seven weeks, then spend ten days in group travel. More recently, similar projects have been organized in several Caribbean countries. The dispatch of a highly-motivated young adult from your community to take part in the OCA summer camp program might be a good way to lay the foundation for a Sister City project with an African town, an area that calls for far more attention than it has been receiving to date from the Sister City program.

Youth for Understanding . . . In cooperation with the State Department's Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs, YFU provides for the exchange of students between the U.S., Europe, Africa, South America, Japan and the Philippines. Participants from abroad spend a year living with an American family and attending local high school with the host family furnishing room and board. U.S. students have a choice of living abroad for a year or just the summer months in this interfaith, interracial program. Basic cost for a year's stay: \$1350.

COSERV . . . This acronym stands for the National Council for Community Service to International Visitors. It is a nation-wide association of volunteers who provide hospitality services to foreign visitors on an organized basis in more than seventy of our larger cities. COSERV also acts as a clearing house for ideas and helpful information on the reception and entertainment of foreign visitors. Though not directly involved with the Sister City Program, the services and activities undertaken by COSERV's local chapters can be most instructive for your committee and you should write for their pamphlets and program materials as they cover the same hospitality hints and community services you should be expected to provide for guests from your Sister community.
