Dear Mr. Gibbons:

The President has asked that I reply to your letter of June 16 concerning harassment of United States shrimp boats in waters now claimed by Brazil as part of its territorial seas.

The President is very concerned about Brazil's enforcement of its unilateral 200 mile claim, not only for its effect on fishing vessels operating off the coast of Brazil but also for its bearing on various other aspects of maritime law and our traditional position in support of the freedom of the seas. He has instructed the Department of State and other interested government bodies to examine our position urgently in light of this development and in preparation for an international meeting to be held next month in Geneva as a preliminary to the worldwide Law of the Sea Conference to be convened in 1973 under the auspices of the United Nations.

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We have expressed our concern both here and in Brasilia over the various incidents of harassment of U.S. flag fishing vessels by Brazilian Navy ships, particularly the reported shooting incident. In reply, the Brazilian Foreign Ministry has told our Ambassador in Brasilia that although captains of Brazilian vessels have asked the shrimpers to leave waters now claimed by Brazil, they deny that shots have been fired. To our knowledge, no U.S. vessels on loan to Brazil have been involved in harassment of the shrimp fleet.

As we look for ways to end our differences with Brazil, we must also be respectful of other interests which are related to the problem. One is the President's oceans policy, which we hope will lead to important international agreements involving the law of the sea at the 1973 conference. Another is the wide range of our security, foreign policy and economic concerns in the hemisphere. Courses of action which are available to us to solve the problem of harassment must take cognizance of the fact that these three interests--the industry, the law of the sea, and the hemisphere--must be served equally well.

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In this regard, we do not believe that the use of force, such as might be implied in the deployment of a Coast Guard cutter, would advance our interest of maintaining close and friendly relations with the nations of this hemisphere, nor would it serve our policy of pursuing an international agreement on coastal state jurisdication over fisheries.

We continue to maintain close contact with the Government of Brazil in an effort to avoid further incidents and to prepare the groundwork for more formal discussions with Brazil on this whole question. We hope that the problem can be resolved through negotiation without incident and without detriment to our basic position on the law of the sea.

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

Dear Mr. President:

I am sure you have been following the controversy between the Government of Brazil and the U.S. shrimp fleet regarding Brazil's recent action to enforce its territorial claim of a 200-mile limit. This action, of course, seriously affects the activities of the U.S. flag shrimp vessels operating in that area of the world.

American shrimp vessels, operating in international waters off the coast of Brazil, have been harassed by planes and gunboats of the Government of Brazil. The latest incident took place early this morning at which time a Brazilian gunboat fired on American shrimp vessels and ordered them to leave under the threat of being boarded. It is ironic to note that the same Brazilian gunboats that have been taking these actions are the ones which have been given to Brazil by our own Government.

I urge you to do everything possible to resolve this problem and request that you direct that a Coast Guard cutter be dispatched immediately to the disputed area to make sure that American vessels and American citizens receive the protection to which they are entitled.

My only desire is that the Brazilians stop harassing our U. S. fishing vessels so that they can legitimately fish in recognized international waters off the coast of Brazil.

I look forward to your early reply.
