

the Union. They hate the Union. And they would cut its throat just as coldly as they lay off another thousand workers—if they could. But they would have to demoralize an awful lot of us before they would try that.

We can't organize the **companies** to carry out this program. But we **can** organize the people.

We can organize. We proved that with the first successful country-wide steel strike in 1946 and a few more after that, plus all kinds of wildcats, successful and unsuccessful.

Can't we organize for our **jobs**?

Can't we organize to **live**?

Sure, it will take some doing to get back to 150 million tons-a-year production. Actually, we'll have to produce much more than that because the people need it. But we can do it, and do it sooner than some people think.

In the meantime

In the process of organizing for the program of full steel production outlined here, let's organize for a local and national **moratorium** on mortgage foreclosures, car repossessions, tenant evictions and utility shut-offs. Let's demand the distribution of those mountains of surplus food the government has on hand (to keep food prices high, you know!). **Food is a right!**

The **moratorium** campaign will help the movement for jobs in the plants and steel to the people, too.

At the same time, the All-Peoples Congress will be organizing in the cities for the millions of low-rent apartments and the other construction programs the people need.

We can organize our towns and build a movement of steelworkers, unemployed, and city poor, unite **everybody** who does not support the steel barons, and get what the people need.
