

to refugees for the purpose of facilitating their filing for asylum with the INS.

Additionally, attorney Hoffman asked that the judge re-examine his decision to bar testimony on international law from the courtroom. Carroll reiterated that no international law issues may be submitted as evidence during the trial.

Defendant Darlene Nicgorski of the School Sisters of Saint Francis, issued a statement on "conspiracy", the very thing for which the eleven are being tried. Among her comments:

"Conspiracy means 'breathing one with', 'being one with'...The conspiracy in which we are involved is really one of love with justice...a 'conspiracy' (that) is really the church fulfilling its mission to be for the poor and the oppressed, the marginalized, those not in the mainstream....Our religious activity is a threat to the government's political agenda and therefore it labels our activity as criminal."

Sanctuary defendants were cheered by news that the Northern California Conference of the United Church of Christ voted last Saturday to declare their Conference of congregations a Sanctuary, and that the National Convention of Reformed Hebrew Congregations had voted this week, by a 2 to 1 majority of 2800 delegates, to urge its 791 congregations to support the Sanctuary Movement.
