POLISH AMBASSADOR REGARDS INCREASED TRADE AS MAIN GOAL!

[Text] Forto Alegre, 4 Aug--Polish Ambassador Eugenius Ciurus has given an interview at the Rio Grande do Sul press association office. He said: Our foreign policy is in accordance with our internal policy. The government's efforts are aimed at the great task of supplying the people's ever-growing needs and at raising the people's living standards. We intend to increase purchases of consumer products and sell our own products, thereby establishing balanced trade with other nations regardless of ideology or form of government.

According to the ambassador, one of Poland's main goals is to increase its trade with Brazil, which has increased from \$15 million in 1968 to a total of \$100 million over the following years. He revealed that Poland is now in the midst of negotiations with the Brazilian authorities for the sale of fishing boats equipped for on-board processing of fish. A delegation of Polish technicians will come to Brazil to complete the deal.

At the present time, Poland supplies Brazil with large merchant ships, sulphur, coke, agricultural machinery (harvesters), and railway cars. It imports from Brazil coffee, cacao, iron ore (530,000 tons in 1970), soy beans and derivatives (flour, cake, and oil), and semiprocessed and unfinished articles. Trade with Rio Grande do Sul consists presently of enriched rice, hides, salted beef, acacia extract, soy meal, moorish wheat, and raw wool.

STATUS OF BRAZIL-TRINIDAD/TOBAGO FISHING ACCORD CITED

[Text] Brasilia, 3 Aug--The terms of a provisional fishing agreement which was signed here in July "are acceptable," the government of Trinidad and Tobago informed the Foreign Ministry here today, according to Brazilian Government sources. It is believed that the Brazilian Foreign Ministry will shortly announce the date for an exchange of notes which will immediately implement the new agreement.

Brazil claims a 200-mile territorial waters limit, and this is the first bilateral agreement of this kind that Brazil has entered into since place to less restrictions in effect. The agreement will allow Trinidad and Tobago to fish for shrimp north of Brazil until the season is over in October. Third-flag boats are eliminated from the agreement.

Delegations of the two countries will meet here next year to discuss the terms of a definite agreement, according to reports.
