Your survey will also help us convince the governors of the 50 states and state legislators to make limiting terms for Congress a priority issue in this Election Year.

So you see -- our strategy has been very carefully thought-out. But this survey is very expensive. And I still don't know where we will get the money to carry out this entire campaign.

It costs us about \$5.00 to send you this letter, process your survey, tabulate your answers, and to distribute the results to the news media and every elected official in the nation.

But there's much more we need to do if we're to be successful. We need to follow-up this survey with personal visits to members of Congress and state lawmakers to make sure they understand just how important this issue is to the American people.

And we plan to educate 50 million Americans about how Congress is abusing taxpayers and about the need for term limits by running ads on T.V. and radio, and in newspapers and magazines.

We will need to raise a budget of \$12,000,000 if we are going to be able to fully put this plan into effect.

I know that sounds like a lot of money. But don't forget -- we are taking on the U.S. Congress and the Washington Political Establishment. They have almost unlimited tax money and special interest money to fight us.

And Congress spends billions of dollars on 37,000 employees who handle many of the details of re-election.

With Congress's multi-billion dollar public relations and re-election machine, it's not easy to get the truth out to voters.

So I hope I can count on you to help. Will you include with your survey a contribution of \$10, \$15, or perhaps even \$25 to help us cover our expenses?

We can win only if there is a massive, organized outpouring of support for term limits across America, in every congressional district and every community.

I am very encouraged that public support for term limits is building. Voters in California passed a law which limits terms of their state legislators.

In Oklahoma, the voters limited the number of years that their own legislators can serve in the State House to twelve.

In Colorado, the people voted to limit both their state and their federal officials terms. This year term limits are on the ballot in 14
