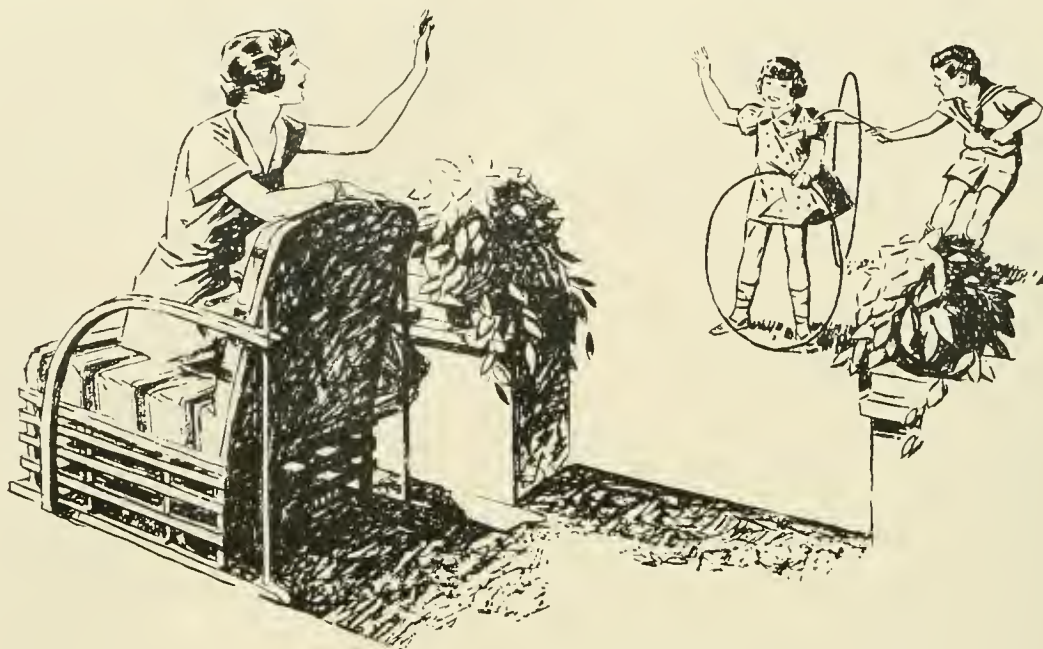

For Brown's 166th Commencement

RICH in its promise is the 166th Commencement, for which sons of Brown University will return on Friday, June 15. They will find prepared for them a program traditional in its general outline, sentiment, and interest. Following the innovation of last year, the plans for 1934 take into consideration in ample fashion the especial wishes of alumni.

More than ever the University hopes this year to see a widespread alumni participation in the well-rounded calendar of Commencement Week. Predominant in the minds of many will be the heartening associations that come with the class reunions, but the University feels more than ever that the alumni will find enjoyment in other events nearer to the campus, too. Some of the affairs have been adapted to meet expressed wishes of the reunion committees.

In particular it is hoped that more alumni will swell the Commencement procession. Last June the line was longer than ever, in spite of the financial year, and a larger enlistment is sought when the band strikes up the traditional march on Commencement Day, Monday, June 19. The President has appointed George Eddy Warren '89 as Chief Marshal, his Chief of Staff being Martin Smith Fanning '91.

Newton D. Baker of Cleveland, former Secretary of War; Governor Theodore Francis Green '87, and President Clarence Augustus Barbour '88 will be the speakers at the annual alumni meeting in the early afternoon of Commencement Day when the graduated class will be welcomed to the alumni ranks. Wallace R. Lane '99 of Chicago will be the presiding officer at this assembly.

FOR the second time Pembroke College will hold its own Alumnae meeting in Alumnae Hall, the speaker of the day being Miss Ollie Annette Randall '12. Further details

of this program will be found in the pages devoted to news of Pembroke. In point of time this meeting will coincide with that of the alumni in Sayles Hall and follows the successful experiment of last June when Miss Eva Le Gallienne had an enthusiastic hearing.

Again the Graduate School of the University will conduct its separate Convocation on the Saturday afternoon of the Commencement week-end. The guest of honor will be Dr. Frederick P. Keppel, president of the Carnegie Corporation of New York, who will give an address on "American Philanthropy and the Advancement of Learning." About 60 advanced degrees will be conferred at this time, when Dean Roland G. D. Richardson will present the

candidates to President Barbour. The chaplain will be Dr. W. Earl Ledden of the Mathewson Street Methodist Episcopal Church of Providence.

Dr. Keppel's visit will serve as a friendly reunion with his former chief, Mr. Baker, under whom he served during the World War as an assistant. Dr. Keppel, a Chevalier of the Legion of Honor, was dean of Columbia College for eight years, has been secretary of the American Association for International Conciliation, director of the foreign operations of the American Red Cross, commissioner for the United States International Chamber of Commerce, secretary of the Plan of New York Commission, and vice president of the American Federation of Arts.

His presence will appropriately recall Brown's co-operation with the Carnegie Corporation in the matter of the Community Art Project, which is largely sponsored by the Corporation, and other benefactions of the latter. Besides carrying on very important work of its own, the Corporation sponsors such institutions as the Carnegie Institution in Washington, the Carnegie Institute for Technology in

Pittsburgh, the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, and the Teachers' Insurance and Annuity Association.

A YEAR AGO many alumni expressed the wish that there might be a chance to meet and greet the speakers at the Alumni Meeting, the recipients of honorary degrees, and other distinguished guests of the University. To grant that request there was added to the Commencement program a graceful, informal reception on the Middle Campus. That event will have place on the list for 1934. Should weather be unfavorable, the Art Gallery of Faunce House will be available for this reception.

The usual formal President's Reception will be held in Alumnae Hall from 9 to 11 Monday night.

Faunce House and the Faculty Club will be open for the use of alumni during Commencement Week as usual, and again the University Club at 219 Benefit Street will keep open house for alumni on Commencement Day.

Marching down College Hill over the same route which all Brown graduating students have taken for more than one and one-half centuries, seniors and returning alumni will proceed to the First Baptist Church for Commencement exercises on Monday, June 18, at 11 o'clock. Approximately 350 seniors will receive their diplomas from President Clarence A. Barbour, who will be seated in the same chair used by all Brown University presidents at Commencement since 1769. Honorary degrees will be awarded to men of national distinction. Spokesmen for the graduating class at this time will be Harry Campbell Eatough, Charles Francis Eberstadt, and Harold Seidman.

THE assembly for the procession will be sounded at 9 o'clock, when the line will be formed on the Middle Campus. The orders for this formation prescribe the following succession of units and their marshals:

LAWRENCE LANPHER '23 has become director of Reunion Activities, according to announcement by President H. S. Chafce '09 of the Associated Alumni, and he will organize and aid members of reunion committees for 1935. His appointment, approved by President Barbour and Professor Theodore Collier of the Commencement Committee, fills the place made vacant by the resignation of Dr. H. C. Bumpus '84.

Although Mr. Lanpher was named too late to do much with reunions this year, he called the chairman of the reunion class committees of 1934 together in Faunce House one afternoon last month for the purpose of exchanging ideas on organizing and running reunions and of talking over possible methods of improving reunions in coming years. Dr. Bumpus, Henry C. Hart '01, and Eliot G. Parkhurst '06 were present as guests.

It is proposed, Mr. Lanpher told the group, to invite alumni to visit interesting places near the First Baptist Church while the Commencement exercises are going inside the church. The Providence Art Club, the University Club, the Rhode Island School of Design, and the Providence County Court House will hold open house for all Brown men; and there will be special exhibits at the Art Club and the School of Design.

Reunion chairmen are also asked to persuade all returning members of their classes to stay over for Monday, June 18, to join the Commencement procession. Commencement breakfasts are suggested for reunion classes, members going from them to the campus. The University Club will serve such breakfasts if the superintendent is notified in advance. Speakers from the University, motion pictures of campus scenes and of football games are also available; and the Alumni Office will assist any class to obtain them.

All reunion classes are cordially invited to begin their festivities by attending Class Night on the campus, Friday, June 15. Specific programs will be found in the class notes under the proper numerals.

ON Friday afternoon the focal center will be the Middle Campus at Brown where, after an orchestral concert at 1:30 P. M., the Class Day exercises will begin at 2 under the elms. The participants will include: Oscar Paul Hammer, first marshal of the class; Charles Francis Eberstadt,

class orator; John Thurston Balmer, Jr., class odist; George Callender Hogg, class poet; Edward Joseph Hickey, Jr., class historian; and President Barbour. The Senior Tea will follow in Faunce House Courtyard. Alumni are especially invited to the Class Night festivities and promenade concert on the Middle Campus, beginning at 8 P. M.

Other features of the Commencement Week will be the annual meeting of the Rhode Island Alpha of Phi Beta Kappa in University Hall at 9:30 A. M., Saturday; the annual meeting of the Alumnae Association in Alumnae Hall at 2 P. M.; the reception and garden party on Alumnae Hall campus at 4:30, followed by the alumnae procession and rally, the Senior initiation ceremony, the alumnae reunion supper, and the Komian plays.

Dr. Barbour will deliver his baccalaureate sermon in the historic First Meeting House of the Baptists of Providence, on Sunday afternoon at exercises beginning at 4:30, admission to this event being limited to ticket-holders. The concluding event of the Commencement will be the meeting of the Corporation at the Faculty Club on Tuesday morning, June 19.

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The Freshmen Went Downtown

ABOUT 125 members of the Freshman class had letters in their mail boxes from Dean Samuel T. Arnold the other morning. They read:

"Disturbances involving college students similar to the one which occurred in Providence on Monday night, May 14, 1934, are likely to lead to consequences far more serious than anticipated and are often of great annoyance to the public and to city authorities. They may bring discredit upon the University. A student who is guilty of an offense against law and order at such a time will be dismissed from Brown University. The presence and detention of an undergraduate in such a disturbance will result in disciplinary action."

It was all about a Freshman invasion of the center of Providence, far less serious than many in the past. Although upperclassmen had tried to sell the idea previously, it was not until the May night mentioned that the Freshmen (about one-third of the class) rang the chapel bell about 11 o'clock, assembled on the campus, and tried to sound enthusiastic as they ambled down Waterman Street hill. The itinerary including the Biltmore and Washington Street, it was not until the students met several police squad cars and a patrol wagon that anything very interesting happened to participants or spectators. Then five "ring-leaders" were selected from the crowd and taken to Central Station, no charges being lodged at first. Two police lieutenants told the other boys to go home, and they did.

Described as "a little celebration in honor of nothing in particular," the event didn't make Page One in the local newspapers, but the five Freshmen were suspended from the University. Placed on college discipline was a *Herald* newsgatherer who persisted in vain efforts to make police say what it was all about and was finally detained along with the five "ring-leaders."

Herald comment was: "Undue importance has been attached to Monday's demonstration. . . . The whole affair was good-natured enough . . . very little property was damaged. . . . However, rioting must be discouraged."

Of Brown and Brown Men

In Charge of the Prize Scholarships

COMMITTEES to administer Brown Club Prize Scholarships in Boston, New York, and Rhode Island have been named, charged with the task of selecting the worthiest candidates from the class of 1938, entering next year. Each scholarship is for \$500, to be awarded to a man resident or prepared in the club's region who "combines in the highest degree desirable qualities of character and personality, scholastic ability, capacity for leadership, and promise of future leadership."

The Boston scholarship will be bestowed by a committee composed of Professor Zechariah Chafee, Jr., '07, Judge Kenneth D. Johnson '19, Edward R. Place '24, James S. Allen '98, George S. Burgess '12, Henry K. Metcalf '02, and Claude R. Branch '07.

In New York the administering committee will be: Hunter S. Marston '08, William R. Dorman '92, Charles E. Hughes, Jr., '09, Thomas B. Appleget '17, Dennis F. O'Brien '98, Hugh W. MacNair '17, and Hoey Hennessey '21. The Providence committee was given in the last issue of the MONTHLY.

Although the Brown Club scholarships are awarded for the Freshman year only, subsequent scholarship aid is promised by the University to those recipients who maintain good academic records. Alumni aid in enlisting applicants for the awards is sought in the three centers, as it is in Chicago where the Lester K. Falk Scholarship is available under somewhat similar conditions.

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After 45 Years of Teaching

FRANK L. MORSE '86, principal of the Harrison Technical High School and a teacher in the Chicago public schools continuously since 1888, will retire this month. He started in the Chicago evening schools, went to West Division, now McKinley High School, to teach chemistry, served as principal of the Hayes and Burr schools, and took charge of Harrison Tech when it was opened in 1909. He has seen a great deal of youth, and he believes that the youth of today is all right.

"We hear so much about the boy and girl of today going to the dogs," the *Chicago Herald-Examiner* quoted him as saying. "It's nothing like it. Today's youngsters are different from their elders only in their way of expressing themselves. They are just as clean and wholesome as their parents and grandparents—and a finer type of individual than those who have gone before."

The Lester Falk Scholarship

BROWN UNIVERSITY students living in Chicago or within 100 miles of the city will be eligible next year to receive a scholarship from the income of a \$10,000 fund established by Mrs. M. L. Falk of 1242 Lake Shore Drive, Chicago, in memory of her son, the late Lester L. Falk of the class of 1906.

The award, to be known as the Lester L. Falk Scholarship, will be given to a member of any class at Brown University from Chicago and vicinity who, in the opinion of the university Committee on Scholarships, best "combines scholastic ability with good character, qualities of personality, and promise of future service to his fellow men," President Barbour says. The scholarship will be awarded annually but may be held by the same student during his four years in college.

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The 1907 Scholarship Winner

EDWARD A. TRACY, JR. '34, of Boston, received the Class of 1907 Scholarship at Brown University, given annually to the Senior who "combines in a high degree scholastic ability, athletic ability and character." The presentation was made at a recent chapel by George Hurley, president of the Class of 1907.

Carl H. Floren '35, of Brockton, a basketball player, was awarded the Michael J. Lynch Scholarship, established by Mrs. Mary T. Lynch in memory of her husband, Michael J. Lynch, of the class of 1904. Ambrose J. Murray '36, of Swansea, Mass., pitcher on the baseball team, received the Class of 1905 Scholarship.

Brunonia Plays the Game

WITH only baseball lingering on into the Commencement season, Brown sports teams enjoyed one of their most effective campaigns this year and turned in their togs in June with a satisfying margin of victory over defeat. Foremost on the record book were the achievements of Freshman track, varsity tennis, and varsity baseball, but most of the squads had bright performances upon which to look with pride, too.

Baseball, for the first time in recent schedules, witnessed Brunonians triumphant over Holy Cross, Harvard, Yale, and Rhode Island in four of the five major bookings. Providence College, with Blanche still master of Brown batters, set the Bear back twice, however, in poorly played contests. The scores in that sport through May were as follows: Brown 2, Culls 1 (exhibition); Brown 7, Northeastern 13; Brown 10, Lowell Textile 1; Brown 7, Holy Cross 6; Brown 3, Boston University 4; Brown 9, Colby 1; Brown 12, Connecticut State 3; Brown 9, Yale 2; Brown 3, New Hampshire 1; Brown 1, Tufts 3; Brown 4, Providence 9; Brown 11, Middlebury 1; Brown 8, Rhode Island 2; Brown 7, Harvard 2; Brown 0, Providence 7; Brown 1, Harvard 4; Brown 9, Boston University 3.

Strength in the pitching department and at bat were enough in most instances to offset uncertainty afield, and Humphries, Murray, and Neal all had proud victories on the mound. Henshaw and Appleyard were alternating at third to lead off the batting order, and O'Reilly and Slader were sharing right field. Elrod in center and Tracy at left complete the outfield, while the infield has Caito at short,

Brown at second (sometimes exchanging positions), Butler at first, and Captain Fowler usually behind the plate, with Kuhn in reserve.

Starting auspiciously, the Freshmen soon struck a losing streak that persisted through the last game. Defeated in the opener when they carried the Harvard Jayvees to the 12th inning only to lose 3-2, they came back behind no-hit, no-run twirling by Bob Dye and beat Bradford Durfee 6-0. Hitting hard they beat the Boston University Freshmen 17-8 and proceeded to lose their batting eye indefinitely, while the two-man pitching staff grew ineffective. The other scores were: Freshmen 6, Worcester Academy 14; Freshmen 1, Providence Freshmen 3; Freshmen 2, Holy Cross Freshmen 12; Freshmen 3, Providence Freshmen 10; Freshmen 0, Dean 10.

ALTHOUGH unable to win a single match in the intercollegiate league and left in the last place when the season ended, the Brown golfers nevertheless made a fair showing for the year, outplaying all their other opponents. Victims were Boston College, 6-3; Tufts, $3\frac{1}{2}$ - $2\frac{1}{2}$; Colby, 5-1; Boston University, 7-2; Amherst, 4-2; Providence College, 7-2. Against these six victories were eight defeats, at the hands of: Princeton 0-9; Penn, 1-8; Georgetown, 0-9; Yale, 0-9; Williams, $3\frac{1}{2}$ - $5\frac{1}{2}$; Dartmouth, 1-8; Harvard, 1-8; and Holy Cross, 1-8. Dear, Andrews, Salant, Easton, Taylor, Olney, Adam, Viger, and Edwards were Brown representatives in various meets.

Outstanding achievement in the lacrosse report was a Brown victory over the Boston Lacrosse Club, late in the season, when the Hub team, otherwise undefeated for the year, lost by a 10-8 score. Boston had previously beaten Harvard (which trounced Brown 14-3 in April) and Dartmouth. With George Merriam leading the attack, the Brunonians won from M. I. T., 5-2; Boston University, 11-0; Tufts, 13-7. Losing starts were against Yale, 2-8; New Hampshire, 8-10; and Springfield, 3-13. Injuries handicapped the Brown twelve in important matches. In their three engagements the Freshmen could score only one goal a game, while Harvard Freshmen were getting six, Springfield Freshmen four, and Tufts Freshmen four.

Varsity achievements in track, while far from inconsiderable, were almost overshadowed this year by the extraordinary performance of the Freshmen, who swept aside all opposition. The varsity recorded its first victory over New Hampshire after disposing of State College in the close meet that opened the season. At Durham, as against State, it was the last event that decided the meet, and Pierson's first in the discus clinched the 69-66 outcome. Winning the javelin, taking second in the vault and shot, and third in the discus, Captain Larry Brown led the scoring with 12 points, while Spinney in the 100, Nicholson in the 440, Rowell in the high jump, Danesi in the hammer, and Buonanno in the pole vault were the other first place men for the Brunonians. New Hampshire had beaten Brown four years in a row until Coach Powers' well-balanced squad took its measure by three points.

JOE BUONANNO stole the show from the meet when Columbia nosed Brown out in New York by a 70½-64½ score. Buonanno, football captain last fall, eloped on the day before the meet and married in secret Miss Helen L. Mitchell of Saylesville. The secret came out when, driving to New York, the couple had an automobile accident, and a garage repair man spread their confided story. On the second day of their honeymoon, Joe starred for Brown against Columbia, winning the pole vault, taking a second in the low hurdles and a third in the high ones. The meet was decided in the javelin, where Larry Brown's heave of 186 feet was not enough to take first, although it would have won the New England intercollegiates. Mayhew's two mile race was Brown's only first on the track, although Pierson, Rowell, Buonanno, and Brown took six firsts in field events.

The following week, with Buonanno disciplined for his wedding without administrative permission, with Spinney lame, and Lewis also out of competition, M. I. T. won an easy 92-43 encounter. Nicholson took the quarter, Brown the javelin, and Pierson two weight events, but the absent stars were missed. In the New England Intercollegiates, Brown's showing disappointed her supporters, for only six men qualified the first day and her final point total was only 10. Dick Pearce, Sophomore, who hadn't won a race all season, ran handsomely in a fast 880 and took a third. Burgess and Brown took third and fourth in the javelin respectively. The only champion from Brown was the reinstated Buonanno, who completed 10 years of school and college vaulting without finishing worse than first in any meet with the one exception of the I. C. A. A. A. A.—a remarkable record.

Five straight triumphs by the Freshmen held promise for strong recruits to next year's varsity. They took 11 out of 14 firsts against Dean, even without two stars, to win 95-31. They repeated against the State College Freshmen 96-39. For the first time in recent years they bested Worcester Academy 68-58, Holy Cross Freshmen 74½-51½, and New Hampshire Freshmen 95-31. First place winners were Rye, Tyrell, Widnall, Captain Rosner, Moss, Johnson, Brown, McConeghy, and Marcom. Rosner was defeated, indoors and out, only once in the distance runs ranging from the half to the two-mile. Johnson, kept from his specialty, the pole vault (an event in which his father was once champion), took firsts in the three weight events against Holy Cross. And Rye, who took no part in track in high school, started as a tyro and became the sprint star, earning the Kahler Trophy as the most improved man on the squad.

PACED by Captain Ray Chace, whose game has improved greatly, the tennis team ran up six straight triumphs and closed one of the best varsity campaigns in recent years with only two defeats in a dozen encounters. Under heavy fire in the number one position, Chace took several matches without dropping a game, but it was strength throughout the squad that pulled it through its engagements. The two defeats, from Harvard and Dartmouth, were complete, but each were top-rank outfits, the former undefeated. Setting down Boston College, Tufts, and Providence College without the loss of a match, the Brunonians then took the measure of Boston University 5-4, Colby 9-0, and M. I. T. 5-4. Wesleyan was beaten 5-4, Clark 8-1, and Springfield 6-3. Eddy also played a strong game as number two, followed

in the ranking by Greason, Malkowski, Farrar, Hart, Christopher, and Quattrochi. The team beat Williams to end the season.

The Freshmen, led by Jackson Skillings of Newton Centre, had a creditable season, beating St. George's 7-0, M. I. T. 1937 6-3, and Providence College 1937 5-4. They lost to the Harvard Freshmen 1-7 and to the fine Choate sextet 0-9. Exton, Skillings, Lineburgh, Scott, Kramer, and Cummings were the regulars.

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The Herald—Daily or Weekly?

UNLESS its circulation is materially increased, the *Brown Daily Herald* will be forced to become a weekly newspaper, according to a leaflet broadcast by editors and managers of the campus publication. Brown, the brochure points out, is the smallest college in the nation which maintains a daily newspaper, and the *Herald*, founded in 1886, has been a daily since 1891.

Advertisers, national and local, have spent money "because it has become a common belief that the *Herald* ranks among the ten best undergraduate publications in the country." Unless, however, circulation is materially increased, "we will continue to lose advertising because of inadequate net paid circulation."

While the plea is addressed at the student body, the *Herald* also hopes alumni will take advantage of a special subscription rate of two dollars, cut from five and available to all alumni who subscribe before September 25.

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Spring Day and the Mascot

TOO expensive and stringent library rules. Too many required courses. Too few courses from which to select. Too narrow an area from which to choose its students. The wrong kind of publicity. Too little effort to bring undergraduates "into contact with the most valuable things at Brown."

These things are the matter with Brown, according to Daniel N. Viger, semi-facetious Senior spokesman at the Spring Day exercises before the John Carter Brown Library. But he also had high praise for his Alma Mater, which was one of the most liberal in the East, he had determined. He unveiled as "mascot" a plaque showing the college infirmary full of suffering students. Viger's choice as speaker had been publicly attacked and defended in a vigorous controversy before the affair. A critic asked unkindly, "Who is Viger?"

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The Sphinx's 30th Anniversary

FRED B. PERKINS '19, principal speaker at the 30th annual banquet of the Sphinx Club, severely criticized the "New Deal in Intoxicating Liquors." With more than 50 alumni and undergraduates present at the dinner in the Faculty Club May 24, a dozen Juniors and Seniors were initiated and the following officers elected for next year: President, Prof. Campbell Bryce Beard, of the Department of Political Science; Vice President, Alfred H. Joslin '35, of Providence; Treasurer, Robert L. Eddy '35, of Providence; Steward, James G. Krause '36, of Lebanon, Pa.; Secretary, James G. France '36, of Kent, O.; Executive Committeeman, Paul C. Howard '35, of Rahway, N. J.

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Freshmen at Rhode Island State College, voting, declared Brown their favorite college "next to State."

Praise for the Glee Club

DR. W. LOUIS CHAPMAN, music critic for the *Providence Journal*, was an enthusiastic listener in the audience at the Glee Club's concert in Faunce Hall the night of May 24. The concert was announced as closing the club's 108th season. The next morning Dr. Chapman's highly complimentary review appeared, praising the varied program, which included Palestrina, Bach, negro spirituals, and sea songs, and its rendition. Prof. Arthur B. Hitchcock, director, was a piano soloist, while Ellsworth E. R. Wallace, baritone, was the featured singer.

Chemicals and a Fire

FIREMEN were called to the Brown campus on the night of May 21 when spontaneous combustion started a blaze in the brick storehouse adjoining Rogers Hall. The building, about 15 feet square and of fireproof construction, held chemicals for laboratory use, and when the firemen opened the metal doors, a burst of flame drove the men back. Dr. Charles A. Kraus, head of the chemistry department, advised the firemen and offered to send for special chemicals, but the blaze was shortly extinguished when the men donned gas masks to smother it with sand. The loss was not great, but as a spectacle it furnished high excitement.

For the Brown Man's Bookshelf

Winner of the Largest Prize

FIRST American to win the Atlantic Novel Prize of \$10,000, Samuel G. A. Rogers '15 should now receive for his writings the wide attention they have always merited. His novel, "Dusk at the Grove," was selected as the winning one among 1,340 manuscripts submitted in the contest, which is sponsored jointly by the Atlantic Monthly Press and Little, Brown & Company, which aims to "procure the most distinctive and interesting novel, and to make of it the story of the year." The publication date is announced as August 24.

Three previous novels by Prof. Rogers won critical esteem and built up a growing public following. Like those three, his new book relies on scenes with which he is familiar, and most of the action in "Dusk at the Grove" takes place at Newport, where Mr. Rogers was born. He is now an associate professor at the University of Wisconsin, specializing in contemporary French literature. His father is the Rev. Arthur Rogers, D.D. '86, and his father-in-law is Brown's Professor Henry B. Gardner.

The Atlantic prize is the largest award offered by any American publisher, with book rights alone involved, and the two other winners to date have been Mazo de la Roche, a Canadian, who wrote "Jalna," and Ann Ridge, an Englishwoman, author of "Peking Picnic."

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"Belly Fulla Straw"

FEW first novels are received with the critical respect and readers' enthusiasm as "Belly Fulla Straw," by David Corniel DeJong who came to do graduate work at Brown because "it sounded good." Story has published some of his shorter fiction, while his poetry has appeared in various magazines and anthologies.

A Dutchman by birth, Mr. DeJong grew up in the Middle West of America in rigid, narrow surroundings. Quite by accident he discovered literature, struggled through college quite out of sympathy with his instructors and environment, and began teaching. Then he began writing the language he had not heard a word of up to 1918. And now he seems established as a person to be reckoned with in American letters.

"Belly Fulla Straw" has much that has come out of Mr. DeJong's own life. It is

the firm, poignant story of a Dutch immigrant who finds life empty in America. The title, of course, refers to the bitter taunt that the author knew well as a young man, "Dutchman, Dutchman, belly fulla straw; Can't say nothin' but ja, ja, ja!"

A magazine feature story in the *Providence Sunday Journal* by Winfield T. Scott, also a Brown alumnus, tells amusingly of DeJong's boyhood in Friesland, where he was a ghost on a thoroughfare to the cemetery known as Cadaver Street. He and his chums delighted in dressing up in sheets to frighten the superstitious fishermen, who believed that street haunted.

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Dr. Dealey's Southwest Plan

DR. JAMES QUAYLE DEALEY '90, editor of the *Dallas News*, writing in the winter number of *Southwest Review* on "Social Survey of the Southwest" told succinctly of the survey of trends taken up by the Southwestern Social Science Association and the plan to issue the essential facts of the study "in several volumes in the course of the next few years." Texas will be the focus of the early part of the study, as Texas will celebrate in 1936 the centennial of the Texan Declaration of Independence.

"In 1936," Dr. Dealey wrote, "Texas will presumably be wideawake to plans for its future, and at the same time will be thronged with many thousands of tourists who will be eager to know more of the State and its social situations. The State will also have presented to it indications of the great future that lies before it, if only its leaders plan wisely for the next few years with the aim of making Texas and the whole Southwest the great empire region of the United States."

After outlining the general topics to be taken up for close study, Dr. Dealey went on:

"The Southwest is presumably to become the center of a blended culture peculiarly its own, being, as it is, the meeting point of many of the cultures that have had or do have influence within the United States. Careful studies will therefore be given to its literature, its fine arts, and its recreational features, and, broadly, to those factors that influence the development of the aesthetic sense in the individual or in social and civic life."

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On the Alphabet Soup

WILLIAM MACDONALD'S "The Menace of Recovery" (Macmillan, \$2.50) is the most sizzling attack which the New Deal has yet received," writes Lewis Gannett in the *New York Herald-Tribune*. "Mr. MacDonald, who in long years of teaching acquired that accent of bland and monumental authority which only American professors and the leader writers of the *London Times* and the *Paris Temps* command, learned in his later years as a radical editor of *The Nation* the rhetoric of denunciation. In the last 15 years, when he has been becomingly progressively more conservative, until today Mr. Ogden L. Mills appears by comparison as a howling Bolshevik. Mr. MacDonald has forgotten neither the art of invective nor the air of authority. His book is an impressive document."

Mr. MacDonald was George L. Littlefield Professor of History at Brown University from 1905 to 1917. Of the same book the *New York Times* said: "It is a competent marshaling of facts relevant to the progress of the New Deal . . . Mr. MacDonald has written a sober 'key' to the 'alphabet soup' of the 'Roosevelt Revolution.'"

BROWN ALUMNI MONTHLY

Professor Dana G. Munro '12 of Princeton is the author of "The United States and the Caribbean Area," recently published by the World Peace Foundation. It is described as "an academic defense of State Department policy."

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Prof. Zechariah Chafee, Jr., '07 has written an interesting, scholarly, and extremely useful 72-page introduction to the two-volume edition of the "Records of the Suffolk County Court (Mass.) 1671-1680." The introduction gives a background of legal procedure, thought, and point of view in early New England. The Colonial Society of Massachusetts has published the work in Boston.

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Bert Schwartz, whose writings we used to read in the *Brown Daily Herald*, confesses that he is doing detective stories for the pulp magazines. The March number of *World Man Hunters* carries one of his short tales under his pen name of Bert Stanley.

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Judge Kenneth D. Johnson '19 had the leading article in the March 3 issue of *Industry*, published weekly by the Associated Industries of Massachusetts. The subject was "Independence and Self Government."

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Horace S. Mazet '26, F.R.G.S., who will finish at the Columbia School of Journalism in June, writes: "My schedule calls for more or less work upon seven books, when I get time to do it. That, of course, is an almost impossible number to work on, collaborating, editing, compiling, etc., but I am going to do it just because. My most promising one is a juvenile adventure book." "Shark! Shark!" his collaborative work of last year, received an excellent press upon its publication last winter and *Esquire* has bought his narrative poem on air fighting called "Dive-Bomber."

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A new book by Richard W. Rowan '16 called "Spies and the Next War," is on the spring list of Robert M. McBride & Co., New York City.

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Albert Farnsworth '10, master in history at Worcester Academy, collaborated in writing "The Story of Worcester, Massachusetts," a book of 214 pages and "a permanent record of Worcester achievements from days of the Indians."

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Gentlemen of the Faculty

SPEAKER before the annual meeting of Delta Chapter of Phi Beta Kappa at Tufts College, Prof. S. Foster Damon, curator of the Harris Collection at Brown, described the building of a poem. He illustrated his point from his dramatic dialogue on Andrew Law, Brown 1775, one of America's first composers.

President Barbour was the chief speaker at the graduating exercises at the Training School for Nurses at the Butler Hospital in Providence. Charles H. Merriman '92, vice president, bestowed the diplomas in the absence of Lauriston H. Hazard '89, president, who is ill. Dr. Arthur H. Ruggles '29, honorary, is the superintendent of the Hospital.

W. Willis Turner, Brown instructor, has been awarded a fellowship for advanced research in the social sciences by the Brookings Institute. Although his research project will have to do with banking problems

in Southern New England in 1891-1933, Mr. Turner will take up residence in Washington for the year.

Dr. Aubrey H. Smith, who took a graduate degree at Brown in 1928, has been named an assistant in the Department of Mathematics, coming from Swarthmore to accept his new post. He took the place of Hugh J. Hamilton '33a, who resigned at the start of the second semester.

Mayo D. Hersey, divisional research director for the Vacuum Oil Company, appointed a lecturer in engineering this semester, has been delivering a series of talks on the science of lubrication each Friday night. He was formerly head of the friction and lubrication section of the United States Bureau of Standards.

Activities of the Brown Clubs

Chicago

THERE may be bigger affairs in years to come, but it is a safe bet that none of them will be better or more pleasantly remembered than the 60th anniversary dinner of the Brown University Club in Chicago at the Union League Club in that city. Friday, April 27. Seventy-five Brown men from Chicago and its suburbs met to hear President Barbour, United States Senator J. Hamilton Lewis, and to honor Frank L. Morse '86 for his 47 years of continuous service as a Chicago school teacher.

Mr. Morse received an embellished scroll, signed by Ralph M. Brown '25, president, and John Monk '24, secretary, with this citation: "Graduate of Brown University with the degrees of Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts; continuously active in the Chicago Public School System since 1887; for a quarter of a century Principal of Harrison Technical High School; inspirational teacher; valued friend; loyal alumnus; to all those qualities of mind and heart which have made so distinguished a career possible the Brown University Club of Chicago tonight pays tribute, and presents this scroll as a permanent record of its esteem and affection."

Mr. Morse, deeply moved by the presentation, as well as by the fine introduction Ralph Brown gave him, spoke of the early days of the Brown Club in Chicago when he served as secretary and later as president. He told of Brown men who had played prominent part in the development of Chicago's schools, and particularly of E. Benjamin Andrews '70, who went to

Chicago after leaving the presidency of Brown.

Wallace R. Lane '99, Alumni Trustee, was called upon by Ralph Brown to introduce Senator Lewis, an old friend of Mr. Lane. Senator Lewis was in rare form. He said that he was happy to cancel all engagements in Washington to speak before Brown men—and he showed it. He praised Brown for the kind of men she is turning out, and has turned out; he asked that every good Brown man stand behind the college professors now aiding President Roosevelt. If college men did not overcome the growing feeling against professors and the so-called "Brain Trust" in Washington, he felt that a death blow would be struck at national recovery.

The cheers for him at the end of his speech were the heartiest of hearty Brown cheers; and the vote, offered by Mr. Lane, that Senator Lewis be made an honorary member of the Club was carried unanimously. And the Senator said that it was the only unanimous vote he had ever received!

Then came President Barbour, who talked simply and encouragingly on the University and its progress. Dr. Barbour also announced the Lester L. Falk Scholarship, a substantial gift in memory of a sterling Brown man, and said that Mrs. Falk, mother of our fellow worker, had given the complete file of *The Stars and Stripes*, the A.E.F. newspaper, to the John Hay Library.

Behind the head table hung a huge banner bearing the inscription, "Brown University Club of Chicago, 1874-1934." With

the speakers and Messrs. Morse, Lane, and Ralph Brown at the table were the presidents of the Yale and Dartmouth Alumni Associations in Chicago. The publicity for the dinner, done under the direction of Morris F. Swaney '23, appeared in every newspaper in Chicago. It was a great piece of work, well done.

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Boston

FREDERICK W. MARVEL, dean of athletic directors, heard many deserved things said of him as director and Brown man at the first spring smoker of the Brown Club of Boston at the Copley Plaza, Friday evening, May 3. It was a glorious evening, as any local poet would put it, for Dr. Marvel, for Brown, and for the large crowd of Brown alumni and friends who sang and cheered over the radio under the direction of Linus Travers '27 and Edward Place '24, masters of ceremonies, and Roy W. We are here to rededicate this old institution to the welfare and the well-being of the people of Rhode Island." He also said that "there is no future for America unless her press continues courageous, intelligent, honest and free." The *Journal* expects to occupy the building sometime next month. The present building, familiar to all Brown men of the past 30 years, will be adapted for commercial purposes.

Those We Mourn

1880

Judge Samuel Hanson Ordway, member of the Board of Fellows of the University since 1917, pioneer in civil service reform in New York State and a former justice of the Supreme Court of New York died in New York City, April 19, 1934. He had been sick only a short time, and his death came as a shock to his friends and acquaintances in Providence, as well as in New York.

"Judge Ordway's death brings to a close a long career of devoted and distinguished public service," the *New York Times* said editorially. "He made it his business, in the words of Edmund Burke, 'to bring the dispositions that are lovely in private life into

the service and conduct of the Commonwealth.'" And the *Providence Journal*, quoting this statement, said: "To that fitting tribute the alumni of Brown University, and the University Corporation of which he was for so long a period a distinguished member can give their heartfelt assent."

Judge Ordway was born in New York City, June 8, 1860, the son of Aaron Lucius and Frances E. Hanson. Entering Brown from the University Grammar School, Providence, he quickly proved himself a brilliant student and at Commencement was valedictorian of his Class. He was elected to Phi Beta Kappa in Junior year. From Brown he went to Harvard Law School, receiving his A.M. as well as his LL.B. from Harvard in 1883. Admitted to the New York bar in 1884 he commenced practice with the law firm of Stickney & Shepard and in 1888 became a member of the firm under the new name of Stickney, Shepard and Ordway. In 1903 the name was changed to Spencer, Ordway & Wierum, and has so remained.

"Early in life," the *New York Herald-Tribune* said, "Mr. Ordway became interested in civil service reform, and during much of his most active career he was attorney for and president of the Civil Service Reform Association. He was vigilant in pointing out loopholes in the civil service law and of calling public attention to the jockeying of eligible lists and examinations. . . . In 1915, after scandals about the workings of the civil service laws had developed, Mr. Ordway was appointed by Governor Whitman to head the State Civil Service Commission. He remained on it for a year, quietly effecting reforms and eliminating subterfuges by which political leaders had been able to get their constituents on the public pay rolls regardless of their training or ability."

Judge Ordway resigned in January, 1917, to accept appointment as Justice of the Supreme Court of the State of New York. In 1901 he had served as Assistant District Attorney, New York County, to prosecute individuals accused in a Fire Department scandal of that year. In 1906 he was a member of the commission to revise the State tax laws, and in 1909 he was a member of Governor Hughes's Wall Street investigating commission. In 1918 he served on the United States District Board (Selective Service) and at the same time was Public Service Commissioner for the First District of New York. In 1921 he became chairman of the executive committee of the New York State Bar Association, a place which he held until recently. He was also acting president of the Association for the Protection of the Adirondacks. He became a Trustee of the University in 1913 and had a prominent part in revising the Charter of 1764. Presumably he wrote most of the majority report which was presented to the Corporation in 1925, and later adopted. In 1917 Brown conferred upon him the honorary degree of LL.D., President Faunce, his classmate and friend, citing him as "a college valedictorian who has nevertheless succeeded in life . . . steadily

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Judge Ordway was a member of the Citizens Union, the Century Club, the University Club of New York, the Harvard Club, and the Brown University Club in New York, and of the city, county and State bar associations. He became vice president of Rhode Island Alpha, Phi Beta Kappa, in 1931, and president at the 104th annual meeting held in June, 1933. He was the orator of Alpha in 1887. He was married May 30, 1894, to Miss Frances Hunt Throop, who died July 3, 1933. A granddaughter, Anne Hanson Ordway died three days before him. One son, Samuel H. Ordway, Jr., survives, and so does Judge Ordway's brother, Lucius P. Ordway '83 of St. Paul, Minn. In his will Judge Ordway left \$5,000 to the University "in grateful recognition of what it has done for me and others."

1881

Horace Ward Sheldon, M.D., brother of Rev. Dr. Charles M. Sheldon '83 and for many years well known in Northwestern Michigan as doctor and surgeon, died in Berkeley, Calif., March 12, 1934.

Born in Silver Creek, N. Y., July 26, 1854, the son of Stewart and Sarah (Ward) Sheldon, he prepared at the Yankton, S. D., High School, and after graduation from Brown entered Rush Medical College, Chicago, from which he received his M.D. degree in 1885. He won his A.M. at Brown in 1884. After two years of practice in Chicago, 1885-87, he went to Negaunee, Mich., as medical officer for the Cleveland Cliffs Iron Company. He also engaged in private practice; and for 30 years, or until he retired in 1927, he and Dr. J. H. Andrus, also a physician for the iron company, owned jointly and conducted the Negaunee Hospital. From 1922 to 1927 he was a director of the Negaunee State Bank. He removed with his family to Berkeley seven years ago.

In 1926 he accompanied his brother Charles on a visit to Palestine and took special interest in foreign architecture. He had a great love of children, of whose diseases he made intensive study. His brother has written: "He was the most unselfish man I have ever known, and more than once he saved my life during accidents on the rough Dakota ranch where we spent our boyhood together."

Dr. Sheldon was a member of Phi Beta Kappa, Negaunee Lodge of Masons, the Shrine Temple of Marquette, Mich., the American Medical Association, the City Commons Club and the Sciot's Club of Berkeley. He was married Feb. 1, 1905, to Miss Alma Frances Cole, who survives, with a son, H. W. Sheldon, Jr.; three sisters, Sarah P. Sheldon and Mrs. Myron Waterman, Kansas City, Kan., and Mrs. Oscar Dodd, Evanston, Ill., and his brother, Dr. Sheldon of Topeka.

1894

Rev. George Robinson Hazard, rector of Grace Episcopal Church, Manchester, N.H., since 1907 and one of the valued citizens of Manchester, died in Boston, April 24, 1934, after a long illness. His physical condition had led to his resignation as rector of Grace Church in 1932. A writer in the *Manchester Leader* said:

"By a graceful personality, an eagerness to help along every good work, and an affectionate regard for the helpless and distressed, whether in or out of his parish, he won the affection and respect of all who

knew him. Not alone, however, by the unselfish enthusiasm with which he gave himself to his work, but by the material gain to his parish, was his rectorship distinguished.

"During that quarter of a century two beautiful buildings—the Carpenter Memorial Parish House given by Mr. and Mrs. Josiah Carpenter in memory of their daughter, Georgia Carpenter Gerrish, and the Emily Smith Memorial Chapel—were constructed. The new organ . . . was installed: the church choir was remodelled and beautified, and the series of memorial windows along each aisle of the church were presented."

He inaugurated, too, the work for girls at the Barton House and carried it on until the Y. W. C. A. grew out of it.

Hazard was born in New York City in 1869, the son of Louis L. and Sarah (Congdon) Hazard. He entered Brown from Rogers High School, Newport, played on the Brown football eleven; and after graduation studied at the Johns Hopkins University and then at the Episcopal Theological School, Cambridge, Mass., where he received his B.D. in 1898. He won his A.M. at Brown on examination in 1896. While at Cambridge he was a student assistant at Grace Church, Providence. He became curate at St. George's Church, New York City, in 1898; vicar of St. Mark's, Southboro, Mass., in 1900; rector of the Church of the Holy Spirit, Mattapan, Mass., in 1905; and rector of Grace Church, Manchester, in 1907. He was married Jan. 27, 1920, to Frances Bartlett Manning, who survives, with a daughter, Miss Sarah Frances Hazard, and a son, Daniel M. Hazard. His fraternity was Psi Upsilon.

1895

The Alumni Office received word last month of the death in Welch, W. Va., on Nov. 12, 1933, of William Cowper Stratton. Death resulted from a stroke which caused his removal to the hospital at Welch early in August.

A mining engineer since 1896, he had been chief engineer of the United States Coal and Coke Company at Gary, W. Va., from 1921 to 1933, when he was appointed general superintendent of the company.

"Mr. Stratton was very prominent in local engineering circles," an acquaintance has written. "He was a member of the American Institute of Mining and Metallurgical Engineers, the Engineers' Society of Western Pennsylvania, and the American Iron and Steel Institute. At the time of his death he was president of the Board of Education of Adkin District of McDowell County, W. Va., and fraternally affiliated with McDowell Lodge, No. 112, A. F. & A. M.; Wyndham Chapter, Royal Arch Masons; Bluefield Commandery, Knights Templar; and Beni Kedam Temple, Ancient Order Nobles of the Mystic Shrine.

"Mr. Stratton was always very proud of his association with Brown University, continually recommending Brown to his friends and associates. His only living relative is his sister, Miss Anna R. Stratton, whose address is Gary, W. Va."

1903

William Benjamin Satterlee, whose death occurred in Pueblo, Colo., April 10, 1934, had been a rancher in Colorado since 1912. To the best of one's knowledge he had not been East after he pulled stakes about 23 years ago and went westward toward the great open spaces. He was born in Pough-

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keepsie, N. Y., Feb. 18, 1882, the son of George P. and Elizabeth M. (Colby) Satterlee, and his preparatory school was Riverview Military Academy.

At Brown he was one of the small but hardy band in the Class of 1903 taking mechanical engineering. He belonged to the Brown Yacht Club and was on the *Liber* board in Senior year. He was also a member of the Gym Ball Committee. After graduation he went with the American Bridge Company as engineer; and in 1907 left this company to become associated with the Eastern Steel Company. In 1910 he decided that the West was the place for him, and in 1912 he began ranching in earnest in Pueblo. He likewise lived and raised livestock in Keating, Wetmore, Bronquist and other towns of Colorado, and before the depression was president of the J. L. Livestock Company, with his headquar-

ters at Siloam and his home on Lees Ranch, Bronquist. He was married Jan. 1, 1907, to Miss Elizabeth Andrews Aldrich of Providence. Surviving him are his mother and a sister, Miss Florence C. Satterlee, of Pueblo, and a daughter, Miss Mary E. Satterlee of Tucson, Ariz. Satterlee was a member of Alpha Delta Phi.

1905

Major William Chace Hascall died in New Orleans, La., May 1, 1934, after an illness of three days. He had been living in New Orleans since the end of the World War, of which he was a veteran.

Born in Providence, Oct. 16, 1880, the son of Rev. William H. S. and Emma A. (Chace) Hascall, both of whom had long service as missionaries at Henzada, Burma, he prepared at Hebron Academy, Hebron, Me. He attended the United States Military Academy at West Point in 1899-1900, and his interest in military matters and the National Guard was an active one for the rest of his life. As an undergraduate at Brown he was on the varsity basketball squad, captain of his Class basketball team and an assistant in Lyman Gymnasium during his Senior year.

During his days on the Hill he was also a member of Troop B, Rhode Island Militia, with the rank of sergeant. After graduation he entered sales work with the Mitchell Fertilizer Company, Providence. He left this company in 1907 to go with H. M. Shaw, Dover, N. H., and he left Mr. Shaw to become a deputy collector with the U. S. Internal Revenue Service at Hartford, Conn. On his removal to Hartford he joined Company K, First Infantry, C.N.G., and in June, 1913, became captain of the company. He served with the regiment on the Mexican border in 1916. After the United States entered the World War he received a commission as Major of Infantry and served at Wadsworth, S. C., and other camps in this country until his honorable discharge in 1919. He went to New Orleans originally as judge advocate at Jackson Barracks.

Major Hascall resigned from the revenue service in 1913 to accept a position with Cheney Bros., silk manufacturers, South Manchester, Conn. After he left the Army he was in miscellaneous sales work for two years before he went to work for the Lane Cotton Mills Co., denim manufacturers. He was with this company at the time of his death. He was married Sept. 15, 1908, to Miss Ebba M. Wilson, of Terryville, Conn. His second wife was Mrs. Alma (Lehman) Colomb, who survives him, with two stepsons, Albert R. and Millard J. Colomb; two brothers, Dr. Theodore C. Hascall '05 of Riverside, R. I., and Charles S. Hascall '04 of Baldwin, L. I. His fraternity was Delta Tau Delta.

1907

Harry Wright Collins, teacher and musician, with the organ as his hobby, died at Memorial Hospital, Pawtucket, April 12, 1934, after a short illness. Last August he installed in the home of his mother, with whom he lived, a beautiful pipe organ for his personal study and enjoyment. He had dreamed of such a possession for many years, and all of us who knew him will regret that he could not have been spared longer to enjoy it.

Collins was born in Pawtucket, July 13, 1884, the son of Joseph W. and Eva Elizabeth (Buffum) Collins. He came to Brown from Pawtucket High School and most of

us recall him as a shy, quiet fellow who was a brilliant German student and who loved to play classic music on the piano. With popular stuff he would have little or nothing to do. He won Phi Beta Kappa in Junior year, and continued his studies in education and German after graduation with the Class, receiving his A.M. in 1910. Since that time he had been on the teaching staff at Technical, now Central High School, Providence. He did not attend Class reunions, and did not give any attention to requests for statistics about himself, with the result that few classmates knew anything of him or of his career. Between his school duties and his music work, however, he led a busy life. He served for eight years as organist of Central Falls Methodist Episcopal Church and for twenty years as organist of the Warren Methodist Church. He was an active member of Rhode Island Chapter, American Guild of Organists. He also belonged to Jenks Lodge of Masons, Pawtucket; Palestine Temple, Order of the Mystic Shrine, Providence; Pawtucket Council of Royal and Select Masters; Pawtucket Royal Arch Chapter, No. 4; and Holy Sepulchre Commandery, Knights Templar. Surviving him are his mother, a sister, Miss Elizabeth Collins, and a brother, Benjamin F. Collins, special student at Brown in 1903.

1909

The Secretary records with regret the death of Louis P. Willemin in Providence, May 16, 1934. An account of Willemin's career will appear in the July issue of the ALUMNI MONTHLY.

1929

Sinclair Ogden Marvin, member of the Brown basketball team in 1927-28, died at the Fox Memorial Hospital, Oneonta, N. Y., April 27, 1934, as a result of injuries received in a motor car accident an hour before. In Delhi, N. Y., his home town, where he was a leader in basketball and baseball, his loss was greatly mourned. "He was known to hundreds of basketball and baseball fans in this section of the State," said the *Delaware Express* of Delhi, "and was considered one of the best court players Delhi ever produced. He played guard and forward with the Delhi All Stars and for the past two years had caught and played in the outfield for the moguls. . . . He was one of the most popular young men in Delhi."

Born in Walton, N. Y., March 7, 1906, the son of Hector S. and Julia (Burgin) Marvin, he prepared at Delaware Academy, Delhi, where he was prominent in athletics. As an undergraduate on the Hill he was a member of the Freshman baseball squad in 1926, and was on the varsity basketball squad for three years. The *Liber* said aptly: "Sinc is that rare combination of earnestness and light-heartedness which always wins friendship. . . . The readiness of his odd and refreshing humor excludes him forever from the class of the boring intellectual." After graduation he returned to Delhi and went into the insurance business as junior partner of Bramley & Marvin. He also held a position in the Delaware National Bank, of which his father, who died in 1929, had been president. He was a member of Delhi Lodge of Masons, the Knights Templar of Cooperstown, the Second Presbyterian Church, and Phi Sigma Kappa. Surviving are his mother and two sisters, the Misses Priscilla and Leila Marvin. To them the Class extends its sincere sympathy.

Tompkins Square House for the aged in New York City was built on the apartment plan under Miss Randall's direction.
