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## VISITING DAY

*By W. H. P. Faunce,*

President of Brown University

On Visiting Day the Van Wickle Gates swing wide to a notable company of guests and the life inside the iron fence suffers a happy invasion by the life outside. A rural college has many attractions, but the city college has this distinct advantage—hundreds of men of light and leading live under its shadow and can be assembled any day in the year to give the college their experience and their counsel. In Providence these men assemble on the first Wednesday in March.

The rural college sometimes suffers from the jealousy or suppressed antagonism of the rural life around it—witness the strange attempts at Williamstown and South Hadley to impose heavy burdens of taxation on the colleges which have given the towns all the wealth they possess. But the city contains too many graduates of American colleges to allow any lasting opposition of town and gown. The gown without the town would become visionary and impractical; the town without the gown would become near-sighted and materialistic.

Where did the John Carter Brown Library come from? Out of the thriving commercial life of old Providence, when our ships were daily sailing round the world. Slater Hall and Sayles Hall came out of the smoky chimneys of Rhode Island mills; the Ladd Observatory came out of the merchandise of Providence. Rhode Island Hall was the gift of many citizens who lived within sight of our campus. The great Little-

field bequest came from one who sat each day at the foot of College Hill and organized some of the characteristic industries of the State. Rhode Island has been good to Brown.

It would hardly be becoming for me to speak of the reverse process—the permeation of the life of Rhode Island with the impulses that come from a university, and the leadership furnished by Brown graduates. There are other cities that are as successful in manufacture as Providence, where, nevertheless, no one of us would wish to live. In them men buy and sell and get gain and lose their souls. Such communities make goods but fail to make men. Where there is no love of art or music or literature, no scholars or writers or prophets—where there is no vision the people perish.

On Visiting Day we ask bankers, journalists, manufacturers, to tell us how to make learning lead into life. We ask preachers, artists, musicians, to tell us how to cultivate the inward eye. We ask lawyers and doctors and engineers to tell us whether they want from the college technical skill or liberal education. We ask men that have succeeded to tell us how to fit young Americans for leadership. What can Brown do more to be of service to the nation? Ideas are worth more than dollars. We surely need dollars in the present crisis, but even more we need suggestion, counsel, inspiration. We welcome the coming and speed the parting guests.

# THE MINISTER OF THE FUTURE

(From a newspaper report of a sermon at Hartford)

Masculinity must characterize the ministry of the coming day. . . . The church through the last generation has left its work mainly to the women. God bless them all. Had it not been for the great women of our homes and churches we would not have been half as fit as we are for the great tasks now awaiting us. But the glory of woman is her femininity, not her masculinity. . . .

Men have not been in the majority at the hours of worship; men have not been in the majority in the hours of prayer when the needs of the church and the community were taken to the throne of grace; men have not been the informed and driving force in evangelizing the homeland frontiers and the foreign lands. The church has been too largely of a feminine type. Men have not grasped the great fact that the greatest essentials to modern life are faith, righteousness, duty, love and truth. Thank God there is an awakening. More men are studying the Bible to-day than ever before in our history. This war is leading men to realize as never before that religion is a man's job. . . .

The ministry has not been held up before the splendid boys of our households as the mightiest sphere of usefulness open to man. The result of a church awake to the bigness of Christianity's task; awake to a world condition demanding a clean and redeemed manhood; a character fit for world service, will be a more masculine type of ministry. We want men in the ministry who, in business life, would make merchant princes and manufacturing giants.

The minister of the coming day must

have even a more thorough intellectual training than ever hitherto. There can be no short-cut in education for the ministry. Preparation for all kinds of professional and special activities is developing at an amazing pace. It must be true of the ministerial preparation. . . .

One thing is certain, there must be no reaction against the broadest thinking. There are signs of this tendency in some quarters. Certain schools have announced themselves as standing for reactionary theological preparation. Let no laymen be influenced by these cries of fear. Our hope is in more thinking, not less. It may even be that men will be compelled to think themselves through error to truth. At any rate they cannot stop thinking because they fear to think. A safe theology founded upon refusal to think will land the church in the scrap-heap of perished institutions. . . .

There are two fairly distinct types of minister, conforming to two somewhat distinct conceptions of religion. The one belongs to the priest type. . . . He lays great stress upon the church. To him the dignity and beauty of the service is everything. Every brick in the consecrated edifice is very sacred. Membership in the church is synonymous with title clear to mansions in the sky. The priestly type is found in every sect. The other belongs to the prophet type. To this man the world is tremendously alive with God. He is instinct with the spirit of the times in which he is living. Men are real. Conditions are real and must be taken as they are. . . .

The minister of the future must be the prophet clear of insight and foresight; strong in conviction concerning the plan and purpose of God for his day; determined that men shall hear what God has to say. . . .

The world is realizing now, as never before, that Christianity is not held in creeds, nor owned by doctrinaires, nor controlled by churches. The world knows now that a Christian must have true faith in Christ Jesus and worship in humility of spirit. It knows that he must be pure in his own life, in the office relationship, and on the trip to the big city, as well as in his own home. It knows that he must be honest and brotherly in the material he manufactures and the treatment he accords to those who depend upon him. It knows that he must recognize his stewardship of wealth. The minister of the future must live out where men are thus striving and trying

and speak as a brother and teacher and friend. . . .

With all his brusqueness and virility; with all his knowledge and outlook; with all his boldness and intrepidity, the minister of the days before us must be simple and childlike in his faith and dependence upon God. He must know how, and love above all else, to hide away in the secret place where God and he hold tryst. Isaiah was familiar with the altar in the temple. Jesus was familiar with the hidden places among the bushes by the brook. So the minister must be familiar with the secret place where time and flesh are transfigured by the holy God.

## PROFESSOR EVERETT ON MORAL VALUES

The young man reads the Horatian maxim, "Nonum prematur in annum," and thinks it a poetic exaggeration. But Professor Everett's book shows that the literary conscience has lost none of its insistence with the lapse of ages. In fact, he was ready more than nine years ago with a book that would have satisfied many readers—but not the literary conscience of its author. We may truthfully say that no year, nor month, in that long interval has gone by without leaving its impress on the book; it may be only a happier turn of phrase, an apter illustration, a more carefully guarded statement; or it may be a revision of judgment or even a change of attitude toward some larger aspect of the question. Thus the years that bring the philosophic mind—or, as in this case, strengthen it—have enriched the volume that we have at last received.

The book is in substance a treatise on ethics; in form it is a discussion of what lies at the basis of all our choices that determine conduct. It therefore treats of the deeper foundations of ethics; but this does not mean that it is ab-

stract, rather that it is practical. It is not indeed a "case-book" of conduct, but it is a careful survey of the whole field, first as regards theory, and then as regards values, man's relation toward them, and the still larger issues that spring from this relation. As every one knows, there are certain ways of approach to any subject that prove on trial to yield a very poor prospect of it, while others reveal its whole territory spread out before us. Professor Everett has found in the course of his many years' teaching that the approach by the path of values is one that most readily opens up the field of ethics.

The work is not written as a textbook, though it is well qualified to serve such a purpose. It is systematic, discussing first the scope and aim of ethics, then the various historic theories of value, next, more inclusively, the World of Values, and, lastly, values as they relate on the one hand to the individual and on the other to society. These chapters are followed by others on Duty and Conscience, Virtue as the Good-will, and Moral Law. In an important chapter

called *The Ethical Interpretation of Freedom*, the author discusses the two rival theories of free-will and determinism, and upholds the greater philosophical soundness and practical usefulness of the latter. The concluding chapter leads the subject of morality up to its contact with religion. For the student it would seem a natural course to take these chapters in order, but for the general reader the reverse order would almost seem preferable; at least he might pass over the six more philosophical chapters and make his plunge into the author's thought as it is given in the seventh chapter, "The World of Values." As a matter of fact, the reader is led on from one interest to another wherever he opens the book.

We cannot easily indicate in a brief review of the book its grace and mellowness of style, its lucidity of thought and expression, nor its happy balance between inclusion and exclusion, which is perhaps the latest to be attained among all the arts of the writer. Neither can we by a single extract give such a sample of the author's thought clothed with its characteristic expression as to do justice to either. The late William Winter named one of his books of poetry "My Witness," indicating that it was his testimony to the character of the world in which the Creator had placed him. What he denoted by this happy title is true of every genuine book in any form of literature. It certainly is true of the book before us. The world as Professor Everett has found it is one in which for untold eons chemical and mechanical forces reigned; then, but a little higher, though with infinite possibilities of advance, action on impulse developed; and lastly, with the introduction of mind, appeared a new and creative force, action by deliberate choice. Thus arose comparison, and with it a scale of values. It is to the existence of these values, and their hierarchy, and the importance to man

that he shall recognize in his conduct their vital differences, that the book bears witness. Let us listen as it speaks in the final paragraphs of the chapter on the World of Values, in which the arbiter of values is shown to be Reason.

"Finally, the choices by which the less is subordinated to the more inclusive value are the work of reason. Although impulse and desire are the dynamic of conduct, driving it forward unceasingly, they cannot provide the principle of organization. This must be given by reason. If it be urged that the work of reason is imperfect, the answer to such criticism is that it offers the best guidance we know. Although the path it indicates may not always be clear, to reject its guidance is to wander in an untracked wilderness. Happily reason is constantly gaining fresh insight, and when at a loss has the power of turning back again and again upon its course to discover the point at which it went astray.

"In the polity of the soul, then, we may picture reason as judge. It sits above the pressing throng of impulses and desires which, reckless of other interests, plead only their own special causes. As impartial arbiter it refuses to allow the lesser interests to prevail over the greater, or the greater wholly to override the lesser. Rebuking the elements of discord in the soul it seeks to secure an increasing harmony of interests and to establish ever more widely a true kingdom of values."

A full analytical table of contents and an ample index add greatly to the practical value of the book, to which also the publisher has given a form and substance appropriate to the dignity and importance of its subject matter and treatment.

## MIDWINTER BROWN REUNIONS

The annual alumni reunions this year have been purposely unpretentious, in keeping with the spirit of war-time simplicity.

### *Boston*

It was a simple buffet luncheon which was served to 175 of the Brown alumni of Boston and vicinity at the Copley Square Hotel, Feb. 5, in place of the usual and time honored dinner. But good fellowship was not absent, the President of the University was there and there was a fine sprinkling of military and naval uniforms among the company. The president of the evening was Nathan A. Tufts, 1900, district attorney of Middlesex County.

The chief guest was President Faunce. Of the members of the older classes present was J. D. Edgell, '64, of Gardner, who has attended 43 of these gatherings out of a possible 45.

Dr. John M. English, '70, of the Newton Theological Seminary was the chaplain of the evening. After the solemnities, "The Star Spangled Banner" was sung, under the leadership of "Charlie" Towne. The luncheon followed and then came speaking. President Tufts opened with a brief informal address and introduced President Faunce.

Dr. Faunce announced his topic: "What Is the American College Doing for the War, and What is the War Doing for the College?" For the first time since the Civil War, said Dr. Faunce, the colleges face reduced numbers of students and deficits in their treasuries. The upsetting of the world has meant the setting up of some young men. It is astonishing how the partitions have been broken down between man and man. After the war we shall have a finer type of democracy in our country. There is coming to some of our young college men a strange new deepening in the inner life. There is coming a widening of horizons. Under the pressure of this war

we have returned to the horizon of our fathers and founders.

Other speakers were W. V. Kellen of Boston and Dr. E. H. Nichols of Harvard, who told of some deeply interesting experiences at the front in France, Charles H. Towne, who told of the Y. M. C. A. camp work at Camp Upton, Long Island; and Captain R. Holder Williams of Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry, fresh from the front.

The meeting opened with a business session at which the following officers were elected: President, Ralph B. Harris, '97; Vice Presidents, Frederick D. Ely, '59, George E. Horr, '74, Fred H. Williams, '77, Arthur B. Corthell, '81, and Edwin F. Greene, '01; Secretary, George B. Bullock, '05; Treasurer, William T. Pearson, '06; Executive Committee, Clarence H. Lingham, '97, Charles R. Adams, '80, Appleton P. Williams, '89, C. Douglas Mercer, '06, and F. Hartwell Greene, '14.

### *Washington*

There was an attendance of nearly 40 at the dinner of the Brown Alumni of Maryland and the District of Columbia, at the Cosmos Club in Washington, Feb. 6. Dr. Faunce was the guest of honor and principal speaker. Addresses were also delivered by Representative George B. Francis of New York, a member of the class of 1904; Professor J. Franklin Jameson of the Carnegie Institution of the War College; Capt. John M. Manly, formerly, like Dr. Jameson, a professor at Brown, and Theodore C. Merrill, '96.

The old board of officers was re-elected as follows: President, Arthur D. Call; Vice President, E. C. Burnett; Secretary and Treasurer, W. C. Carpenter, Executive Committee, Daniel C. Chace, Henry M. Barry and W. A. Slade.

### *New York*

At Delmonico's in New York city, on the evening of Feb. 7, 170 alumni gath-

ered to renew college friendships and hear President Faunce and the other speakers, who included Major W. W. Keen, '59, and Baron J. DeNeufire, a representative of the Bank of France, who spent a year and a half in the trenches early in the war. He said America need not be concerned if she is temporarily behind her gun and artillery programme; that the French will be able to supply the American divisions in France with guns for some time. He scoffed at Von Hindenburg's recent statement that the Germans will be in Paris in April.

### *Philadelphia*

At the Meridian club in Philadelphia on the evening of Feb. 8, Dean Randall gave the principal address before the Brown alumni gathered for their annual dinner. President Faunce, who was to have spoken, was detained by illness. The Dean spoke of Brown's part in the war and of its other activities. Richard M. Atwater, '65, of Chadd's Ford talked hopefully of the industrial situation. Other speakers were Major W. W. Keen, '59, W. C. Joslin, '76, of Media, H. P. Dormon, '96, and Charles Shinn of the Philadelphia bar, and Rev. P. J. Steinmetz of the Episcopal Academy, a graduate of Harvard. Jefferson Shiel, '82, presided.

### *Newport*

The annual Brown dinner at Newport was given at the Miantonomi Club, Feb.

11, with an attendance of 20, of whom 13 were Brown men. President Faunce was unable to be present and Dean Randall took his place, making a stirring speech on Brown's part in the war and the value of education in war time for the expression of ideals. The following officers were elected: President, William Paine Sheffield. Vice Presidents, Alan R. Wheeler, Harry F. Cook. Secretary-Treasurer, Alfred G. Langley. Executive Committee, the president and secretary-treasurer, ex officio; Rev. William L. Phillips, C. LeRoy Grinnell. Howard Langley.

The speakers, in addition to the Dean, were President Thurston, Colonel Joseph H. Willard, U. S. A., retired, and Captain Edward L. Beach. The interesting meeting closed with the singing of America.

### *Woonsocket*

The twenty-third annual meeting at Woonsocket was held on the evening of February 12 and was addressed by President Faunce, Colonel Archibald C. Matteson (Brunonia the Militant) and Professor Kendall K. Smith of Brown's Greek department (The Life and Service of Venizelos, Greek Patriot and Premier). Dr. Faunce spoke on Brown in the War, and what the war means to the world. The "Brunonic Bohemia" was informal as to dress and a continuous smoker and Bohemian lunch. Dr. F. E. Whitaker has been secretary for 22 years.

The Brown War Records Committee presents in this issue of the *Brown Alumni Monthly* the names of over seven hundred Brown alumni who are in active military service or in important war work. It should be noted that this record includes only those men who were alumni at the American declaration of war, and ends with the class of 1916. The records of the classes 1917 to 1921 inclusive are being compiled by the Dean of the University, and have already been published in this magazine.

It is not claimed that the records presented in the following pages are complete or, in every case, accurate. The constant transfer and movement of men in military service and the large number of names already on record has made the task increasingly difficult. For this reason, it has been necessary to disregard, as far as this publication is concerned, all information which was received after February 10, 1918.

It is requested that all additions and corrections to the present records be sent as promptly as possible to the Executive Secretary of the University. Such co-operation is necessary if the story of Brown's service to America is to be worthy of the achievement of her sons.

*In giving the address of a man in service, the following order has been observed: First, rank; second, regiment and branch of service; and third, station. Words have been abbreviated wherever possible;—the more uncommon of these abbreviations can be found indexed on a succeeding page. In instances where men are stationed in America, only the name of the fort or camp is given. The complete address may be obtained by consulting the locality index.*

*In case a branch of service follows the military rank, and another branch follows the regimental number, it will be understood that the first branch is the one in which the commission has been given, and the second designates the department to which the officer is attached.*

*All regiments numbering up to 100 are Regular Army, those from 100 through 199 are Militia Regiments, and those from 300 on, National Army. The letters, O. R. C., following the military rank, do not, therefore, always imply that the officer now belongs to the officers reserve corps. They signify only that the commission was first obtained in that corps.*

## BRUNONIANS FAR AND NEAR

### Faculty

President Faunce was the preacher at Phillips Academy, Andover, on Feb. 10, at both morning and vesper services. He gave the noonday Lenten talks at Grace Church, Providence, Feb. 18-22.

### Alumni

1860

Henry Joshua Spooner died at his home in Providence, Feb. 9, 1918, of pneumonia. He was born in this city, Aug. 6, 1839, the son of Joshua and Ann Crawford (Noyes) Spooner. He was educated in the Providence schools and entered Brown with the class of 1861, but completed his college course in three years. In the fall of 1860 he entered the Albany Law School, from which he received the degree of LL.B. in 1861. Returning to Providence, he entered the law office of Thurston and Ripley. In 1862 he enlisted in the Fourth Regiment, Rhode Island Volunteers and became successively Second and First Lieutenant and Adjutant. In the latter capacity he was present at the battle of South Mountain, and later participated in the siege of Petersburg and in various important battles. He was admitted to the bar in June, 1865, and in 1866 was elected justice and clerk of the Providence Court of Magistrates, holding the place till 1869. In 1875 he was elected to the House of Representatives from Providence and in 1879 and 1880 was chosen Speaker. In 1881 he succeeded Nelson W. Aldrich in Congress, being chosen at a special election. He was later re-elected and served till 1891. He was an aid on the Governor's staff, 1875-77, with rank of Colonel; commander of the Rhode Island Department, G. A. R., 1877, President of the Fourth Rhode Island Veteran Association, 1878, and President of the Soldiers' and Sailors' Historical Society of Rhode Island, 1903. In college he was a member of Theta Delta Chi.

1865

Rev. C. H. Spalding, D. D., reached his eightieth birthday on October first, 1917. On the morning of that day he addressed the Baptist Ministers' Meeting of Boston on "The Value of Eight Decades." In the evening the

Boston Baptist Social Union gave him an honorary greeting. He is Emeritus District Secretary for New England of the American Baptist Publication Society.

Rev. James Pierson Field died in St. Louis on the tenth of December. Most of his active years had been passed in the West, particularly in Missouri, where his name is revered, and his memory is precious. In failing health he made a great effort to attend the reunion of his class in June, 1915, the fiftieth. It was his first visit to the college since his graduation. His classmates gave him conspicuous honor, and will never forget his visit with them.

1881

By an unfortunate error we printed an item last month regarding our young friend, George F. Bean, Esq., of the class of 1881, under the head of "1851." The latter class was highly distinguished, but we feel that we have no right to put a burden of thirty additional years on Mr. Bean. With all possible celerity we herewith remove the burden and offer our public apologies to those we have already privately made.

1888

Dr. Frederic Earle Whitaker of Woonsocket and Providence has been appointed a Greek visitor at Brown University. Before practising law Dr. Whitaker taught in the Greek department at Brown and occupied the chair of Greek at Lehigh University, Bethlehem, Pa., and since admission to the bar he has made extensive investigations in old Greek law, some of which have appeared as articles in law and literary magazines in the United States and abroad.

1890

Frank A. Sayles, '90, has announced the engagement of his eldest daughter, Miss Mary Ames Sayles, to Neville Jay Booker of New York.

1893

Judge William LeBaron Putnam, for more than ten years United States judge of the First Circuit Court of Appeals, from Jan. 2, 1912, to Sept. 24, 1917, died on Feb. 5, at Portland, Me. He was graduated from Bowdoin in 1855 and Brown gave him the degree of LL.D. in 1893.

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., has an article in a

recent number of the Saturday Evening Post in which he urges the separation of essential principles from non-essential forms in the Church.

David L. Fultz and John A. Gammons are mentioned in connection with the presidency of the International Baseball League.

1902

Afterward he was for a period press agent of the Toy Theatre in Boston, and a member of a stock company in Northampton, Mass., and supported

Lou Tellegen in "The King of Nowhere." During the week of Nov. 4, last year, he had the leading role in "When the Bugle Calls," a patriotic playlet on recruiting, which was given by a cast composed of Brown men in connection with the regular vaudeville programme. Mr. Calder also played a few parts professionally. While with the Toy and Northampton companies and with Lou Tellegen, Adams T. Rice, '15, was with him as stage manager. He was well known in amateur theatricals in this city, being a prominent member of the Players' casts, and before that acted in Sock and Buskin productions at Browa. He was graduated from Brown in the class of 1911 and for a year studied at Harvard Law School. He was a member of the Theta Delta Chi Fraternity and also of the Pen and Pencil Club. He enlisted in the Brown Ambulance Unit last June, and soon after left for Allentown, Pa. His body was accompanied to Providence by a military escort. He is survived by his parents.

### A QUESTION IN ENGLISH

A learned reader of the Alumni Monthly objects to the English employed in an advertisement inserted on the inside cover of the magazine. He says: "When the writer speaks of 'ar-rears in payment which are now overdue' is he not somewhat tautological? Does not arrears mean things that are overdue?"

If the advertisement is carefully read it will be found that the writer says:

"We would especially urge the settlement of arrears in payments which are now overdue."

Let us examine this sentence analytically and with that freedom from animus that marks the true philosopher. We discover that the writer had in mind the desirability of a settlement of arrears; and that he went into particulars by the use of a phrase in apposition: "in payments which are now overdue."

There is, so far as we know, no objection to the phrase "the settlement of arrears," or to the appositive phrase that follows it. Nor do we understand that the use of terms in apposition con-

stitutes tautology. We read in the dictionary that "any or all of the appositive forms may be nouns, pronouns, or substantive clauses, and the one following serves generally to explain or amplify that which precedes."

If this does not satisfy our esteemed grammarian, we suggest either or both of the following explanations:

(a) Literature, sacred and profane, makes frequent use of tautology, and why shouldn't a humble advertisement writer accept so honored a precedent?

(b) If we granted, for the sake of argument, that the sentence in question is "somewhat tautological" we should still contend that arrears are "overdue" when a subscriber has forgotten his obligation to the business manager of the Monthly for a period of five or six years.

### NOTES OF THE MONTH

The Sock and Buskin will give two plays this year: Harkiss, a detective piece by E. S. Porter, '19, and "The Rising of the Moon," an Irish play by Lady Gregory.

Class day will be on May 27 this year.
