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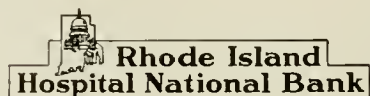

Brunonia Calls Her Sons



BROWN UNIVERSITY will graduate the Class of 1936 on the morning of Monday, June 15, and hundreds of alumni will return to do them honor and renew their own loyalty during the 168th Commencement of their Alma Mater in the Tercenitary year of Rhode Island and Providence Plantations.

Events on the campus are many and attractive, including the traditional Class Day, graduate school convocation, alumni luncheon with its array of notable speakers, and receptions. And reunions at many a seashore and country haven will afford their rich intimacies with old classmates.

Cordell Hull, secretary of state of the United States, and Prof. George H. Blakeslee of Clark University, Worcester, Mass., authority on international affairs, will be guest speakers at the annual meeting of the alumni on the afternoon of Commencement Day. Both speakers are closely linked with the international scene today. Mr. Hull is now making arrangements for the participation of the United States in the forthcoming Inter-American Conference at Buenos Aires, to be held for the advancement of better understanding and closer relationships between American nations. Prof. Blakeslee is internationally known for his work with commissions related to the peace treaties after the World War, and for his current studies of movements for international peace.

President Barbour also announced that Dr. Edwin A. Locke '96, chairman of the Department of Health and Athletics at Williams College, has been appointed presiding officer for the alumni meeting. Other speakers will include President Barbour '88 and Governor Theodore Francis Green '87, a member of the Board of Fellows. Hundreds of alumni from all parts of the country are expected to return for Commencement week-end.

The alumni meeting is scheduled for 1:30 P. M. on Commencement Day, following commencement exercises in the morning and a luncheon for invited guests and alumni in Faunce House. Arrangements are under way to broadcast the alumni meeting on a coast-to-coast network.

THE Chief Marshal for Brown University's 168th annual Commencement will be Dr. Robert Cushman Murphy '11 of New York, curator of oceanic birds for the American Museum of Natural History, and the Chief of Staff will be E. Tudor Gross '01 of Providence, president and treasurer of G. L. and H. J. Gross, Inc.

As Chief Marshal, Dr. Murphy will head the Commencement procession of University, state and city executives, honorary guests, alumni and members of the graduating class for the traditional march from the Middle Campus to the First Baptist Meeting House.

Dr. Murphy is the fourth appointee to the First Marshalship under the plan adopted by the University four years ago by which a prominent alumnus is honored each year by appointment to this honorary position. Last year the Chief Marshal was Clinton C. White '00 of Providence.

In consultation with the officers of the Associated Alumni, Mr. Gross will select the aids and marshals who will be in charge of the various sections of the Commencement procession, and as Chief of Staff will direct the formation of the procession and other details of the march.

Dr. Murphy, one of Brown University's most distinguished alumni in the field of science, has travelled to the Mediterranean, South America, and the Antarctic on various museum expeditions to gather data and specimens of rare birds. He is prominently identified with leading natural science societies of the world.

Mr. Gross has been in the real estate business for the past 35 years. He is a director of the Mechanics National Bank, a former president of the Providence Board of Trade, and has served as secretary of the Providence Real Estate Exchange. His class will celebrate its 35th reunion this year.

THE oldest known Class to hold reunion this year will be '79, according to statistics gathered by the Alumni Office. The Classes of '80 and '81 are close behind.

Dr. Walter L. Munro, secretary, has sent out notices to '79 that the Class will hold its 57th Reunion at the Anawan Club, Rehoboth, Saturday, June 13. There will be a luncheon at noon, and dinner in the early evening.

The Class of '80 will have supper at Laneway Farm, near Taunton, Saturday, June 13, dinner on Sunday, and then go to hear President Barbour give the baccalaureate address in the First Baptist Church. The Class will march in the Commencement procession and have lunch afterward on the campus. The members of '81 will meet Saturday in New Bedford, with Frank H. Gifford as host.

The Class of '96 will meet at 10 o'clock Saturday morning, June 13, in front of Faunce House to go by motor car to the Rhode Island Country Club, Nayatt, where the Rhode Island members of the class will be host at the 40th Reunion luncheon and dinner. All the men of '96 will take

part in the baccalaureate exercises, the Commencement procession, and the alumni luncheon and meeting on Commencement Day. The committee in charge is made up of Allison Stone, John S. Murdock, Frederick A. Jones, and William A. McAuslan, secretary.

THE Class of '11, observing its 25th anniversary, will hold its reunion at Narragansett Pier, June 13, 14, with H. Eddy Easton as chairman of the committee and Brenton G. Smith as his chief assistant.

The 10th Reunion of '26 will officially begin Saturday noon, June 13, at the Andrea, Misquamicut, R. I. The hotel, the committee says, is only 15 minutes run from Westerly, is convenient by car from other directions, and particularly accessible for anyone who chooses to come by train. The committee plans to meet all trains at Westerly station.

Warren Y. (Tony) Hull will come the farthest distance, having left his home in Seattle, Wash., several weeks ago for the long trek eastward. He is bringing his family and intends to spend a vacation with his parents and friends here before going back to the Pacific Coast. Horace Mazet expects to fly up from Quantico, Va., and many other well known members of the Class will be on hand. A room has been reserved at the Hotel Biltmore, Providence, to serve as headquarters for out-of-towners on Friday night.

William J. Gilbane and other Providence members of '33 are in charge of the Triennial, at which plans for the Fifth Reunion in 1938 will be considered. The Gloucester Country Club was first choice for the reunion on Saturday afternoon and evening, June 13.

Other reunion news appears under the Class Notes.

DR. ROSCOE POUND, dean of the faculty at Harvard Law School, will speak at the 11th annual Brown University Graduate School convocation June 13, Dean Roland G. D. Richardson of the Graduate School has announced. Dr. Pound is an honorary alumnus of Brown.

Recognized as one of the leading authorities on legal problems in the United States, Dr. Pound, whose topic will be "The Place of Higher Learning in American Life," will address candidates for master's and doctor's degrees in Sayles Hall at 3 o'clock. President Clarence A. Barbour, on

behalf of the University Board of Fellows, will award the advanced degrees at the conclusion of the exercises, at which Dean Richardson will preside.

An academic procession will precede the convocation, and will form on the front campus to march across the Middle Campus to Sayles Hall. Members of the corporation, administration, faculty, and guests, in addition to candidates for degrees, will be included in the procession.

Special seats will be reserved at the convocation for members of the Rhode Island Bar Association, Dean Richardson said. Dr. Pound's address will be broadcast.

Dr. Pound has been dean of the Harvard Law School faculty since 1916. Numerous legal and other learned societies, as well as universities and colleges in this country and Europe, have honored him for his work. A graduate of the University of Nebraska in 1888, he practiced law in that State until he joined the faculty of his alma mater in 1899. He later taught at Northwestern University and the University of Chicago, coming to the Harvard faculty in 1910.

He holds honorary degrees from 12 universities, was president of the American Association of Law Schools in 1911, chairman of the section of legal education of the American Bar Association in 1907, is a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and is a member of numerous other societies.

CORDELL HULL has been secretary of state since his appointment by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1932. In the past year he has been active in regulating bilateral trade agreements for breaking down international trade barriers in the hope of improving present economic conditions.

A native of Pickett County, Tenn., he was educated at National Normal University, Lebanon, O., and at Cumberland University Law School, where he received his B.L. degree in 1891. He was admitted to the Tennessee bar the same year.

Beginning his political career two years later, Mr. Hull was a member of the Tennessee House of Representatives until 1897. During the Spanish-American War he was

captain of the Fourth Regiment of the Tennessee Volunteer Infantry, and saw service in Cuba. He was a judge in the Fifth Judicial District from 1903 until 1907.

Mr. Hull's first official service with the national government was as a member of the House of Representatives from 1907 until 1921. From 1921 until 1924 he was chairman of the Democratic National Committee, and then returned to the House of Representatives until 1931. He was elected senator from Tennessee for the term 1931-37, but resigned when he became Secretary of State.

In 1933 Mr. Hull was chairman of the United States delegation to the International Conference in London, and chairman of the United States delegation to the Seventh International Conference of American States at Montevideo. The forthcoming Inter-American Conference at Buenos Aires is being called to consider problems related to continued peace in the Americas, inter-continental communication, educational co-operation, and trade relationships.

Within the past three years, Mr. Hull has received honorary degrees from Cumberland University, Notre Dame, George Washington University, the College of William and Mary, Rollins College, Williams, Pennsylvania Military College, the University of Wisconsin and the University of Michigan.

PROF. BLAKESLEE, president of the Board of Trustees of the World Peace Foundation, is particularly known for his international service after the World War. He prepared reports on German colonies in the Pacific for the American Commission to Negotiate Peace, Paris Conference, in 1918-1919; served as technical advisor to the American delegation at the Washington Disarmament Conference in 1921, and was a member of the executive committee of the Institute of Pacific Relations at Honolulu in 1925.

A graduate of Wesleyan University, Prof. Blakeslee received his M.A. degree from Harvard in 1900 and his Ph.D. in 1903, and later studied at the universities of Leipzig, Berlin, and at Oxford. He was awarded an honorary L.H.D. degree from Williams in 1930.

Prof. Blakeslee began teaching at Clark as an instructor in history in 1903, and is now professor of history and international relations. At various times between 1922 and 1927 he was leader of the Round Table of the Institute of Politics at Williams, lecturer at the Naval and War Colleges, special lecturer at Wesleyan, Harvard, and Johns Hopkins, and visiting Carnegie professor of international relations to universities in Australia, New Zealand and Japan.

Prof. Blakeslee served on the executive committee of the American delegation to the Honolulu Conference in 1927 and the Kyoto Conference in 1929. He is the organizer of Clark University's Conference on International Relations. From November, 1931, until February, 1932, he was an officer in the Department of State in the Division of Far Eastern Affairs.

Among Prof. Blakeslee's books are "The Recent Foreign Policy of the United States," and "The Pacific Area—An International Survey." He has edited numerous volumes on the international relations of China, Japan, and Latin America, and has written extensively for various learned publications and other magazines. He is a member of many learned societies in this country and Europe.

Dr. Locke, presiding officer at the alumni meeting, is prominent in medical circles in Massachusetts. After graduating from Brown in 1896, he received his M.A. degree from the university in 1897 and his M.D. from Harvard Medical School in 1901.

Before going to Williams last May to head the Department of Health and Athletics, he was chief of staff of the Boston Sanatorium, visiting physician to the Boston City Hospital, and clinical professor of Harvard Medical School. He is a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and a member of other learned and medical associations.

After graduating from Brown, the Chief Marshal, Dr. Murphy received his M.A. degree at Columbia University in 1918 and in 1925 he was awarded an honorary Sc.D. degree from the University of San Marcos in Lima, Peru.

Dr. Murphy began active service with the American Museum of Natural History in 1911, the year of his graduation from Brown, as curator of mammals and birds. In 1917 he became curator of the Department of Natural Science of the Brooklyn Museum, but returned to the Museum of Natural History in 1921 as associate curator of birds. Dr. Murphy has been curator of oceanic birds since 1927.

A joint expedition for the two museums was led by Dr. Murphy in 1912-13 into the South American tropics and Antarctic. During the next 15 years he directed expeditions to the coast of Peru, lower California and Mexico,



Ecuador and the Mediterranean for the Brooklyn Museum, the American Museum of Natural History, and the American Geographical Society.

Dr. Murphy's associations with various learned societies have included his serving as delegate to international meetings of the Pan-American Scientific Congress in Lima in 1924, to the International Ornithological Congress in Copenhagen, Denmark, in 1926, and to the British Association for the Advancement of Science in Oxford, England, in 1926.

He is a Fellow of the American Geographical Society, the New York Academy of Sciences, of which he is a former vice-president, and the American Ornithologists' Union. Dr. Murphy is also director and treasurer of the National Association of Audubon Societies, and a member of many other learned organizations. He has written three books on birds and has published numerous articles on bird life.

MR. GROSS will become Chief of Staff for a term of three years, after having served as an aide to the Chief Marshal for 25 years. He has been one of Brown's most active alumni since his graduation. He was a leader in organizing the present Associated Alumni and served as treasurer of the Associated Alumni for nearly 10 years. One of his sons, John M. Gross, was graduated from Brown in 1934 and another son, Charles E. Gross, is now in college as a member of the Class of 1939.

In his undergraduate days, Mr. Gross was class treasurer during his freshman year, and was elected to Phi Beta Kappa in his junior year. He won the New England Intercollegiate singles tennis championship as a senior, and was a member of the Cammarian Club as well as other student organizations and committees. He was first marshal for his class in the commencement procession in 1901, the year of his graduation, and served as chairman of his Class Day committee.

Intercollegiate Outing Clubs

A DELEGATION of three members of the Brown Outing Club attended the fifth annual conference of the Intercollegiate Outing Clubs Association at Grey Rocks Camp, Plymouth, N. H., last month. This is Brown's first year as a member.

The association offers opportunity for many outing trips and ski week-ends during the winter. The high point of the coming year will be the College Week to be held next September in the Adirondacks under the direction of the Union College Outing Club.

This year's conference was sponsored by Smith College. The program consisted of talks and discussion groups on the one hand, and a climb up Mt. Cardigan on Saturday afternoon, followed by a barn dance in the evening. There were over eighty delegates representing twenty-five colleges from all parts of the country. New plans were made at the conference to make intercollegiate winter sports of greater interest to a greater number of college students.

The Brown delegation was composed of Richard Messenger '37, president of the club; Gerald M. Richmond '36 and David Kenyon '37.

SOME 30 Brown alumni took part this year in the jubilee concerts of the 25th season of the University Glee Club of Providence, the last of which was given in Memorial Hall on April 17. Scores of other Brown men in the audience, "associate members," enjoyed the festival programs presented and in the special observances that attended the April concert.

Duc credit for the lively history of the club was given to its leader, Berrick Schloss of '04, in a foreword to the program notes on that occasion. 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A Future Decision

DR. ALEXANDER MEIKLEJOHN '93, speaking before the Commonwealth Club, San Francisco, May 1, expressed the belief, according to the Associated Press, that America would "have to decide this question of communism or capitalism some time within the next 25 years." He also insisted that teachers must have freedom of discussion and "must present all sides of such issues as communism versus capitalism." He added: "If the teacher is to teach freedom, he must be free. . . . If you suppress the teachers you have chosen the way of violence—you have departed from the fundamentals of American life—and the decision will be made in blood."

Claude R. Branch '09 is now a Fellow in Jurisprudence of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, having been chosen for this honor at the annual meeting of the Academy in Boston last month. Dean Roscoe Pound '19, honorary, is the new president.

"Although he mentioned no names," the *Herald Tribune* said, "he referred to instances in which the collecting instinct among specialists triumphed over strict maxims of professional honesty."

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Honored for Research

MAYO D. HERSEY of the Brown University faculty was given an award in Philadelphia last month at the annual medal day of the Franklin Institute. These are among the highest distinctions bestowed in American science and are prized by scientists, engineers, and inventors. Mr. Hersey's medal was awarded in recognition of his research into problems of lubrication.

THIRTY-SEVEN fellowships and scholarships have been awarded in the Graduate School of Brown University for 1936-37, Dean Roland G. D. Richardson of the Graduate School has announced.

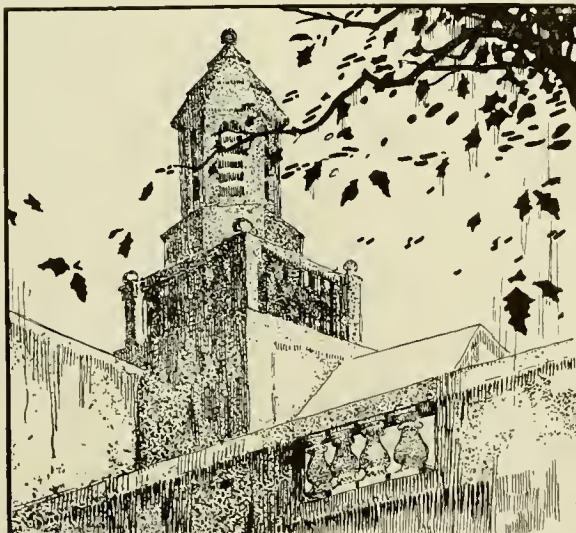

Gentlemen of the Faculty

Faculty Books

MORE than 30 members of the Brown University faculty, representing 15 different departments, are now at work writing books covering a wide range of subjects ranging from the habits of tiny water animals to a study of philosophical method, a survey by the University publicity office disclosed last month. Some of the books will be ready for the publishers soon. Others are to be completed this summer. Several are long-time projects which will require two or three years of continuous research before the texts are complete.

Virtually the entire departmental personnel in Greek and Latin Classics is at work on books. Four members of the Department of English are also writing. Brown's historians are busy with the new findings and analyses of the past, the economics staff is weighing current business problems, and the scientific departments are putting their contributions to human knowledge into print.

One of the best known textbook authors at Brown, Dr. Herbert E. Walter of the Department of Biology whose four texts have been used in 400 colleges and universities throughout the country, is at work on a new volume, "General Biology," which he is writing with Wesleyan University and Claremont College authors. Dr. Arthur M. Banta of the Department of Biology is at work on a book concerning cladocera, a marine animal.

In the Department of Botany, Prof. Walter H. Snell is making an exhaustive study of boletes, a type of mushroom, which has never been catalogued before. His book will be illustrated.

The Department of Economics has Prof. William Adams Brown, Jr., at work on his analysis of the gold standard, and Prof. Hugh B. Killough, who is now in Europe gathering material, writing a new book on special aspects of international trade. In the Department of Education, Dr. Gilbert E. Case is preparing to publish "Administration of Teacher Training."

Prof. James A. Hall of the Division of Engineering is collaborating with Harold S. Sizer '29 of Brown and Sharpe in preparing "Analytical Machine Design." Mayo D. Hersey, special lecturer and authority on lubrication, is writing a book on problems in this field.

A variety of books will be published soon with their authors members of the Department of English. Prof. S. Foster Damon, author of five books, including the recent successful biography of Amy Lowell, is now completing his "Collected Works of Thomas Holley Chivers," and also working on "The Meaning of Milton." Prof. George K. Anderson is preparing a textbook, Prof. Leicester Bradner is writing a history of Anglo-Latin poetry, and Prof. Howard B.

Grose is making a study of certain influences on English literary figures.

Prof. Hans Kurath and Prof. Detlev W. Schumann in the Department of German are writing historical and analytical books related to German literature and language.

Books under way by the faculty in the Department of Greek and Latin Classics include Prof. Benjamin C. Clough's volume on ancient biography, Prof. Russel M. Geer's history of Roman civilization, Prof. Herbert N. Couch's students' manual of Greek civilization, Prof. Charles A. Robinson, Jr.'s history of Alexander the Great and a new edition of Botsford's Hellenic history, and Dr. Rozelle P. Johnson's book on mediaeval painting.

Five authors are now at work in the Department of History. Prof. Robert H. George is making a study of relations between the Crown and Parliament during the Restoration. A book on "Development of the Canadian West" is being written by Prof. James B. Hedges. Prof. J. Barrett Botsford is just finishing a three-volume history text, Prof. Chester H. Kirby is writing "Social Europe in the Machine Age," and Prof. Jarvis M. Morse is at work on a historiography of British America in the 17th century.

Prof. Clinton H. Currier is revising his textbook in mathematics. Prof. Arlan R. Coolidge, chairman of the Department of Music, has already finished the first eight chapters of "Introduction to Music," which he will use at Brown.

A new book, "Foundations of Physics," written by Prof. Robert B. Lindsay, chairman of the Department of Physics, has just come off the press. Prof. Curt J. Ducasse, chairman of the Department of Philosophy, is writing "Philosophy and Philosophical Method," and Prof. Arthur E. Murphy is about to begin a book on philosophy.

In the Department of Psychology, Prof. Leonard Carmichael, chairman, who has already written extensively in his field, is

writing a new book on physiological psychology. Prof. Edmund B. Delabarre's new book will be on theoretical psychology.

Most of the members of the Department of Romance Languages and Literatures are current authors. Prof. Horatio Smith, chairman of the department, is finishing a book on great figures in French literature. Prof. William L. Fichter's writings are concerned with the Spanish dramatist, Lope de Vega, and those of Prof. Robert H. Williams with Spanish prose fiction of the 17th century. Prof. Edmund L. Loughnan and Prof. Alfonso de Salvo are just finishing books.

A "Best Story"

PRIZED as an accolade by the writing clan is Edward J. O'Brien's annual collection of "The Best Short Stories." The 1936 volume, published by Houghton Mifflin Company, includes "The Lone Pioneer," originally published in *Literary America*; its author is William E. Wilson of the Brown Faculty, whose fiction is to be seen regularly in American magazines, of both the literary and popular types.

"The Lone Pioneer" is the story of a marathon dancer who loses one girl and gets another, as told by a travelling salesman. Says Editor O'Brien in his Introduction: "The rich variety of American short story material to be found in regional happenings is only beginning to be tapped, and this story is an interesting and unusual piece of Americana. The characterization of the narrator through monologue is superb, and, though the story itself is a little sentimentalized and may be criticized unfavorably on that account, the author has the right to retort that the sentimentality is only part of his characterization of the narrator. There is a freshness in the point of view which is unusual and the implicit irony of the story is never unduly stressed."

REV. HENRY M. PENNIMAN will celebrate his 85th birthday, June 23, at his home in Berea, Ky. For 40 years he has been a leader in the religious life of Berea and Berea College. SOLON CHESTER KELLEY, retired banker and manufacturer, died at his home, 854 East Main Street, Stamford, Conn., May 4, 1936, after a long illness.

Professor Albert Knight Potter, roommate of Kelley in college, Ira Barrows '83, Charles D. Cooke '88, and Harvey Sheahan '17 were among the well known Brown men who attended the funeral.

Solon C. Kelley was born in Pawtucket, Aug. 5, 1856, the son of Daniel Aldrich and Elizabeth (Barber) Kelley. He prepared under private tutors and at the Providence High School, and after graduation went into the private banking business with Blair & Co., with which he was associated for nearly 30 years. Then he became treasurer of the Standard Screw Company, and held that office until the end of the World War when he retired.

He was a member of Woodway Country Club, Stamford, the Union League Club and the Brown University Club in New York, the Sons of the American Revolution, and Alpha Delta Phi. He was married Feb. 21, 1893, to Annie Brown Nixdorff; and their son, Solon C. Kelley, Jr., graduated from Brown in 1917. His second marriage took place Oct. 8, 1902, to E. D'Ouchy Holden. His third wife, Mrs. Margaret Scott Kelley, and Solon C. Kelley, Jr., survive. He was active and loyal as undergraduate and alumnus; in business he was far sighted (a trait he developed while at Brown), direct, and highly successful.

1891

WALTER ALLEN YOUNG, who died in Orlando, Fla., March 14, 1936, of pneumonia, had been retired since 1924. Since graduation from Brown he had been teacher, osteopath, hotel manager, and hotel credit man.

Born in Providence, Aug. 10, 1865, the son of Allen P. and Mary E. (Colwell) Young, he prepared at East Greenwich Academy. After receiving his Ph.B. from

Brown he became principal of Slatersville, R. I., Grammar School, where he remained until June, 1893. Then he returned to Providence as principal of Stowell's English and Classical School. REV. SMITH OWEN DEXTER, rector of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Boston and chaplain of Boston hospitals for the Episcopal Church, died at his home in Cambridge, Mass., May 2, 1936.

He took his A.B. degree at Harvard in 1898, and his B.D. at the Episcopal Theological School, Cambridge, in 1901.

ALBERT HENRY SHEFFIELD, contractor and manufacturer of building materials, died in Chicago, April 5, 1936, after a year's illness.

Born in Worcester, Mass., Dec. 8, 1876, the son of William and Margaret J. (Brocklehurst) Sheffield, he prepared at Worcester English High School, and as undergraduate at Brown was on the varsity track team and manager of the team in Senior year. After studying law for six months he went to work as cost man for the American Steel and Wire Company in Worcester.

In 1902 he became draughtsman and cost man for the G. H. Cutting Granite Company, Milford, Mass., and in 1905 joined the Milford Pink Granite Quarries in a similar capacity. After having been manager of Drew Daniels' Granite Works in Waterbury, Vt., for two years, he became a partner in the Standard Granite Company of Worcester and Milford. In 1913 he removed to Chicago, where he operated as a building estimator until the entrance of the United States into the World War.

He enlisted in June, 1917, went overseas with the 33rd Division, and served for 18 months as an officer in the 108th Engineers, Headquarters Staff. He took part in five major engagements and returned home in the spring of 1919 to receive his honorable discharge with the rank of Captain. He became secretary of the American Terra Cotta and Ceramic Company, Chicago, resigning that office to go to Kansas City to establish himself as contractor and manufacturer of building materials.

He was married June 16, 1903, to Miss Dora Claire Tosi, who died in April, 1935. He was author of pamphlets, brochures and articles on ceramic industries, and was a member of the Masons, the Odd Fellows, and Delta Upsilon.

1905

DR. JOHN JOSEPH HEALEY, physician and surgeon in Providence since 1909, died in Providence, May 4, 1936, after a short illness.

The son of the late Patrick F. and Bridget (Cuff) Healey, he prepared in the Providence schools and entered Brown from English High School. As undergraduate he intended to study law, but changed his mind to go to Harvard Medical School, from which he received the M.D. degree in 1909. While at Brown he was secretary of the Junior Week Committee and was a member of Phi Kappa.

He commenced practice in Providence and in recent years had been on the staff of St. Joseph's Hospital as assistant surgeon. During the World War he was a First Lieutenant, Medical Corps, on duty at the Base Hospital, Camp Dix, N. J. His only professional affiliation was with the Rhode Island Medical Society.

A bachelor, he is survived by a brother, James P. Healey, and a sister, Mrs. J. Austin McGreevey, both of Providence.

1907

DR. DAVID HIRST MILLS, resident physician and surgeon for the Delaware & Hudson Railroad Company and visiting surgeon to Fox Memorial Hospital, died in Oneonta, N. Y., April 15, 1936, of a septic sore throat. He had practised in Oneonta since October, 1913.

Born in Ashton, R. I., Oct. 17, 1885, the son of Charles H. and Mary (Hirst) Mills, he came to Brown from Cumberland High School and was an undergraduate for two years. His subject was mechanical engineering. But it did not appeal. He left Brown in 1905, worked for two years, and then entered Bellevue Hospital Medical College, from which he received his M.D. degree in 1911.

After serving as interne at Bellevue Hospital and as surgeon at the Seaside Hospital on Staten Island, he settled in Oneonta. At the entrance of the United States into the World War he volunteered with the Bellevue Hospital medical unit, but was not called. Then he enlisted in the Medical Corps, U. S. A., and saw duty at Fort Oglethorpe, Ga., Westhampton, Va., and Newport News.

In Oneonta he was known for his activity in civic affairs and "for the strength and honesty of his convictions." He served the city as physician and surgeon for the Police Department and as a member of the Police Commission. He was a charter member and a president of Oneonta Rotary Club, and a member of the Oneonta Club, St. James' Episcopal Church, Oneonta Post, American Legion, Oneonta Lodge of Elks, the Masons, Phi Alpha Sigma, national medical fraternity, and the New York State and Otsego County Medical Societies. He had also been a director of the Otsego County Tuberculosis and Public Health Association.

He was married Aug. 8, 1917, to Miss Ethel M. Rowe, who survives, with a brother, Dr. Arthur Mills of Pawtucket, and a sister, Mrs. James Stringfellow of Hopedale, Mass.

THE Alumni Office has confirmed the death in Alameda, Calif., May 7, 1935, of Herbert Ray Connor. Only a short time before his last illness he had been appointed City Clerk of Alameda.

He was born in Virginia City, Nevada, May 8, 1886, the son of Samuel B. and Virginia P. (Tilton) Connor. He came to Brown from Worcester Academy, won

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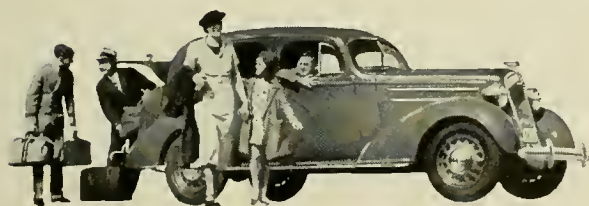


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
