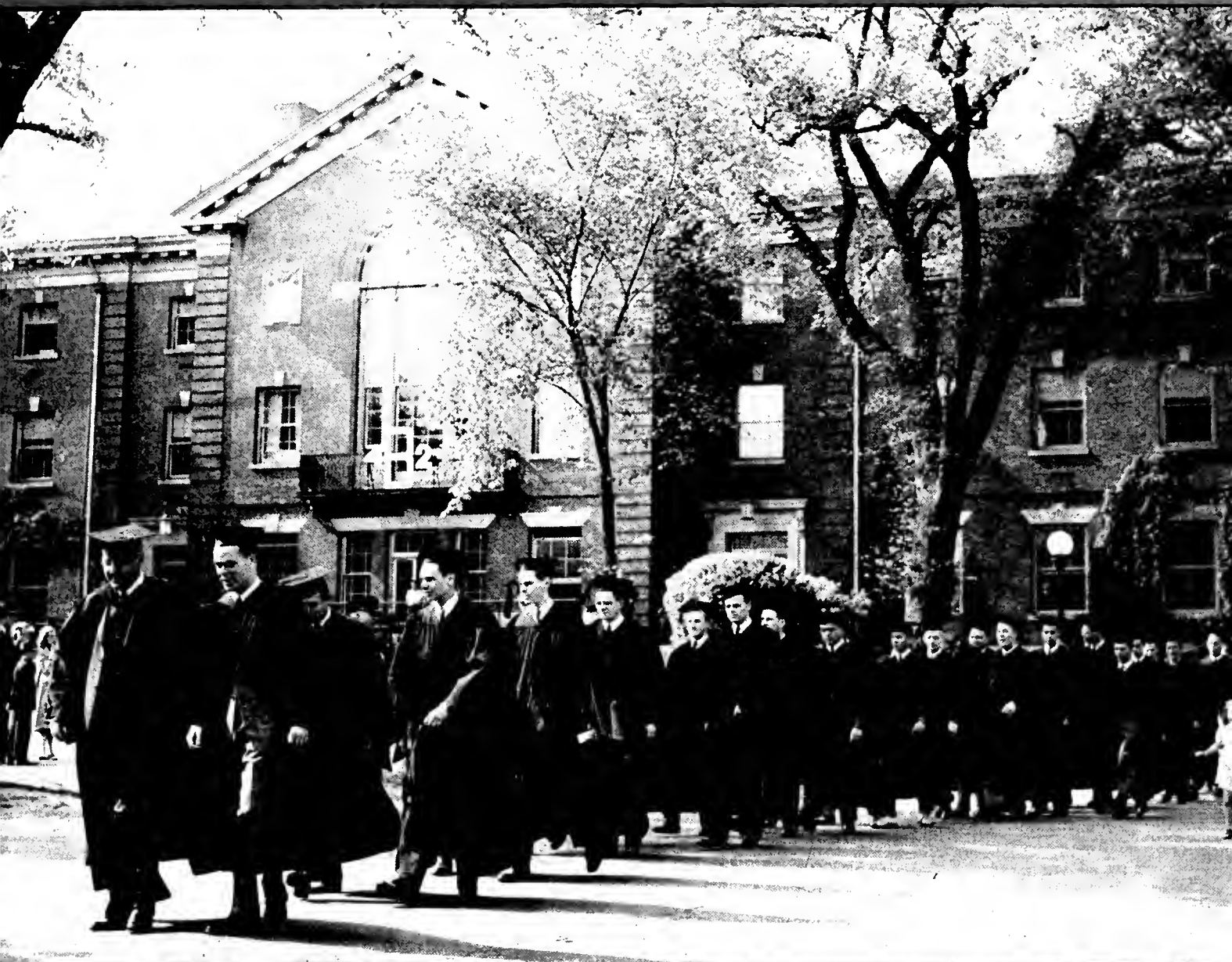


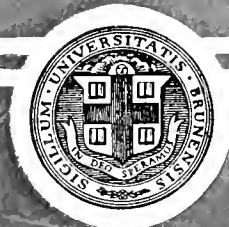
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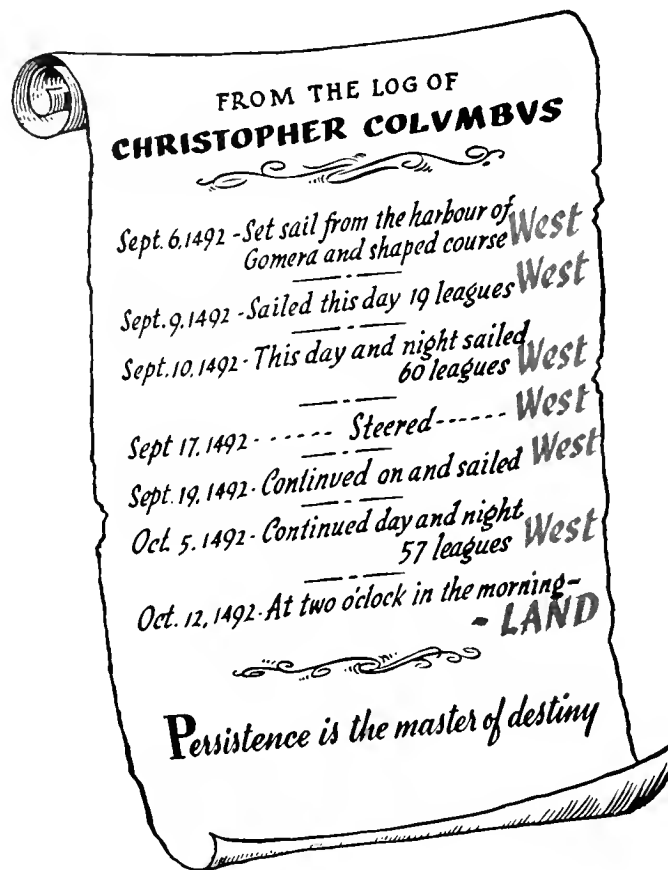

► ► Commencement on a War Basis



► ► THE war made a difference, but a Commencement habit 174 years old, as at Brown University, is persistent. And there were some 400 degrees to be awarded at the end of an accelerated course of study designed to equip men as warriors or civilians to serve "with usefulness and distinction." From the College 212 were entitled to Bachelor of Arts degrees, 39 Bachelor of Science in Engineering, 12 Bachelor of Science in Chemistry. As they marched down College Hill, they felt they had earned their Commencement as thoroughly as any class before them.

And so they had had their Class Day rites under the elms, had held a small dance Class Night, heard an inspiring Baccalaureate, and now were on their way to the Meeting House for their diplomas. The bands were playing the beloved pomps of the Commencement march, the sheriff put on his show of being ready to quell disturbance (never did he seem more of an anachronism, relic of a simple day when a single man in top hat, full dress and sash could keep order in a world with a single frown and sword), and the alumni were there to form a guard of honor and welcome them to their company. They were pretty serious about it all.

It made a brave show of being a usual Commencement. It had its honorary degrees for three alumni and three other notables. It had its reunions for sentimentalists. It had robust words from the President and others.

► BUT it couldn't be a normal Commencement, of course. And no one expected it to be. In the first place, it was May 18 instead of mid-June and, under the war-spurred program, no summer's holiday lay ahead. The University will resume sessions on June 22 for the round-the-year schedule that will permit its students to complete their eight semesters in less than three years. The cap and gown were there, of course, but so too were the uniforms of the military services. Seniors were already officers in the Navy's R. O. T. C., the Air Corps, the land forces. The Selective

Service, which had permitted many to complete their academic preparation, awaited others. Eight degrees were granted *in absentia* to service men. The colors in the procession were borne by a guard from Brown's own Naval R. O. T. C. unit.

There was no student monopoly on military uniforms, for some alumni wore them, too. But most alumni in uniform were far from the campus—in Australia, in Iceland, in Egypt, in the Caribbean, in England, on the sea, in the air, and at posts and stations throughout the country. The procession of alumni was short this year by usual standards. Although there were hundreds in line as they passed and repassed University Hall, the younger classes were thin in numbers. And those who judge the length of the line by their station before the church or on Waterman St. knew how many could not "come back" in this war year.

The number of reunions and the attendance at them nevertheless surprised most observers, particularly when war responsibilities and the brand new gasoline restrictions conspired to keep so many Brunonians away. Instead of elaborate three-day gatherings, however, most classes limited themselves to a single modest meal, and a number of younger classes undertook no program. But these cherished associations seemed important and richer. Many joined in approving 1917's plan for a Victory Reunion at the first opportunity in the inscrutable future.

Reminders of the past were in evidence — reminders like the historic Manning Chair, in which President Wriston sat as he conferred the degrees; reminders like Commencement hymns that do not vary. But the concern was the war and its peace, causes to which the University had directed all appropriate talents long since.

As the *Providence Journal* remarked, Commencement orations by Seniors are usually "a dime a dozen". But Brown's spokesmen for the graduates made an unusually strong impression as they addressed the gathering in the Meeting House. (Few alumni heard them, for with the graduate students also receiving advanced degrees on the same occasion space was limited. Even alumni of 1893, seniors of many in the procession, could not gain admission.) Later in the day at the Alumni Meeting in Sayles Hall, the messages were retold and praised, and Norman Philip Ross's address on "Another Lost Generation," was reprinted in more than one newspaper of national standing.

► THE Alumni Meeting in Sayles Hall was one of the best in many years. Major interest centered in the talk of Quentin J. Reynolds '24, *Collier's* war correspondent returned from two years in France, England, Russia and Africa, who told how he had discovered the United States by going abroad. It was a moving, emotional recital of dramatic incidents that proved revealing.

"I came back three months ago to see this country which I had discovered in Europe," he said. "I came back thinking that we were at war with Japan and Germany." But after reading speeches by obstructionist Congressmen, after hearing insidious whispers of hatred by men trying to dis-

rupt national unity, he began to wonder if he hadn't been wrong. "I began to wonder," he said, "if after all we were not at war with Britain and the President of the United States." He attacked those who sulked behind the protecting armor of the Bill of Rights.

But on traveling throughout the country Reynolds found the people of our country were mad, "and an angry democracy has never been beaten. This is a people's war, and the people will either win or lose it. It's too important a war to be fought by generals. . . . We should thank the Japs for reminding us, too, that it is our war. We have a long way to go because we are amateurs in this business of murder. But out of the burning fires of war will emerge a new world in which free men can live without fear. It is for this we fight."

Stalin, he said, was the greatest realist of our times, and we should take council with him in working out that peace.

► **PRESIDENT WRISTON** told the alumni in a trenchant statement his conception of the postulates of peace after the war: world solidarity and the supremacy of spiritual realities. "As the nationhood of the United States could not endure half slave and half free," he said, "so the peace of the world cannot survive a division in the ideology between the state as master and the state as servant . . . between the individual as slave, and man as a son of God."

Anglo-American domination might start policing, he said, but it would deteriorate into tyranny. Policing must be recognized as "a transient and essentially undesirable device, for the world is not waiting to exchange masters, but to achieve freedom." "Liberty is more precious than order, which must ever be the servant, never the master of freedom. The central political problem of the world is continuously to expand the areas of self-government, as the central economic problem is to expand wealth. . . . But the world at war reveals that the standard of living is basically spiritual, not economic. War offers its stark and final proof that man does not live by bread alone. The world at peace must show that these lessons have been learned. The structure of the post-war world cannot be founded on power. It must be founded upon moral intangibles which control power."

► **BEFORE** announcing gifts to the University in excess of three-quarters of a million dollars, Vice-President James P. Adams spoke his appreciation and the meaning of the gifts in terms of faith.

"It is faith in the readiness of the University to face its problems and solve them, so far as possible, by its own foresight and planning; faith in the essential contribution which the University is making and can make to the war effort which so deeply concerns our people; and faith in the significant role which education—and, for our part, this University—must play in the larger future in a new world which we must help to build and sustain. We shall try to match this faith with wisdom and courage.

"It so happens that I have seen 24 classes at Brown—three of them still in their undergraduate years. These classes represent almost the entire group of Brown men who

because of their present age—will be called into the service of their country. And so I speak not only with official sanction but in a more intimate way, perhaps, for all those who were their teachers and friends here on this campus. I feel that nothing which I could say on this occasion can have more meaning than what I shall now say in conclusion to those who are or will be serving in the armed forces of the Nation. And even though the message which

I send will not reach many of them today and will not reach some of them at all, I speak it here now in your names and in the names of all who knew them at Brown:

"We salute you with reverence and with pride wherever you may be about the circle of the globe. We cherish for you an abiding faith in the justice of our country's cause. We pray that you may be sustained by an abundant courage as you face the grim perils of your duty. We pledge to you that we who are called upon to play the lesser part will try to make ourselves worthy of you and worthy of the things for which you now serve your country.

"This we pledge to you. Less than this, we know, is not enough."

► **A MODEL** presiding officer, Prof. Zechariah Chafee, Jr. '07 had wit and grace in presenting the speakers, added his own substantial thoughts on the world disease of international discord, on the protection of our freedoms. He and Governor J. Howard McGrath particularly had a merry exchange of pleasantries. In more serious mood, the Governor brought the greetings of the State and told how he had been impressed with "how little fear of the future was reflected in the faces of the young men who received degrees."

The meeting was opened by the President of the Associated Alumni, William P. Burnham '07 of Boston, a member of the 35-year class which had the amazing number of 55 back for reunion. His classmates greeted him with an

affectionate cheer and enlivened proceedings with similar salutes for each succeeding speaker. In addition to announcing the results of alumni elections, Mr. Burnham read a telegram of greeting from the Director of Alumni Relations, James L. Whitcomb, an officer in the Signal Corps. Earl M. Pearce found hearty response as he led anthems and hymns designed for the occasion.

Major disappointment of the day centered in the cancellation of the Varsity baseball game with Dartmouth, which was scheduled to revive the tradition of Commencement baseball. Alumni had seen a thriller on Saturday, however, when State College was beaten by a ninth inning rally, 3-2.

An innovation on the Commencement program was a dinner meeting of the Brown Engineering Association, held at the University Club. Among those who spoke were: Joseph H. Stannard, chairman; Prof. Leighton T. Bohl, representing the Division of Engineering; Robert W. Burgess of New York, President of the Association; E. E. Jackson of Brooklyn, Secretary; Coach J. Neil Stahley and W. Chesley Worthington, Acting Director of Alumni Relations. Prof. Arthur E. Watson was an honored guest at the head table.

The Appleton Club, reflecting the interests of alumni chemists and members of the Chemistry Faculty, held its annual dinner meeting at the Agawam Club early in the Commencement season. Prof. Robert F. Chambers was chairman.

Honorary Degree Citations

▶ ▶ Six honorary degrees, three of them to alumni of the University, were awarded at Brown's Commencement. All of the doctorate rank, they went to: Rabbi Louis I. Newman '13 of New York, one of the country's outstanding Jewish leaders, a liberal, author and educator; Prof. Arthur F. Buddington '12, chairman of the Department of Geology at Princeton; Quentin J. Reynolds '24, reporter and commentator on the war, an editor of *Collier's* magazine, and author of several books, products of his journalism; Simeon Strunsky, one-time editor-in-chief of the *New York Evening Post*, now a leading editorial writer on the *New York Times*; Hamilton Fish Armstrong, editor of *Foreign Affairs* review, author and leader in international relations; Vice Admiral Harry E. Yarnell, retired after a distinguished career in the Navy.

Phi Beta Kappa's Predecessor

▶ RECORD books of the Federal Alpha, predecessor of Phi Beta Kappa at Brown University, were placed on view for the 113th annual meeting of the Rhode Island Alpha of the latter society during the Commencement season. The older group, founded in 1797, has on its roster the signatures of many notables of the State's early history.

Election of officers resulted for the most part in the re-seating of incumbents: President—Dr. Alex M. Burgess; Vice-President—Arthur M. Allen; Secretary—Prof. William T. Hastings; Treasurer—Judge William M. Moss; Historian—Dr. Lawrence C. Wroth; Auditor—George L. Miner.

Prof. Joachim Wach of the Department of Biblical Literature and History of Religions was elected to honorary membership, while Frank O. Hough '24, novelist, was elected to alumni membership.

Acknowledging Benefactions to Brown ◀ ◀

▶ ▶ IN the first report since the entry of the United States into the war, Vice-President James P. Adams made his annual announcement at the Alumni Meeting on Commencement Day of gifts, grants and bequests to Brown. More than three-quarters of a million dollars, a notable increase in the funds provided from these sources in response to the University's greatly enlarged responsibilities, was reported.

▶ THIS year, in celebration of the Fiftieth Anniversary of the Founding of Pembroke College, its alumnae completed a five year campaign for \$125,000.00, of which \$100,000.00 is designed as a contribution to a new dormitory. With more than three-quarters of the living graduates participating, the Semicentennial Gift Committee announced that they had exceeded their goal and that the total amount raised was \$126,176.41.

▶ THE Alumni Fund, reporting a month earlier in its campaign than in other years, was substantially ahead of every previous campaign in Fund history at the corresponding date.

▶ LAST June, foreseeing the difficult financial situation in which the University would be placed, the Brown Corporation determined to seek an emergency fund available for current operations during the critical years. No campaign has been so far conducted, but gifts to the Stabilization Fund now amount to more than \$455,000.00, of which \$355,000.00 was received this year from a small group of generous friends and alumni.

▶ IN addition to gifts of money, the University has received interesting and significant collections and other gifts of property. Mr. R. Foster Reynolds, whose gift of the "Blenheim" tapestry was reported last year, has this year presented the University with the other large tapestry, the "Coriolanus", which hangs in the Corporation and Faculty Room, and a beautiful pair of eighteenth century Beauvais tapestries, "The Swing" and "The Dance", previously loaned to the University and hung in the rotunda of University Hall. These gifts were made in memory of Mr. Reynolds' aunt, Princesse Aymon de Faucigny Lucinge.

▶ PAUL R. BULLARD, class of 1897, has given to the University an important collection of unusual interest, consisting of political cartoons and caricatures of Napoleon. This collection, which can be seen at the John Hay Library, affords an interesting study of war propaganda and at many points parallels modern war cartoons. Mr. Leo Wallerstein has generously given to Brown a fine set of first edition Goya aquatints comprising the series known as "Los Desastres de La Guerra". This gift came to Brown through the interest of Mr. Wallerstein's son-in-law, Robert J. Sifton of the class of 1935.

▶ THE University is grateful to Mrs. Hope K. Powel for an addition to its property holdings adjoining the campus. Mrs. Powel has conveyed her property at the corner of George and Brown Streets to Brown for its future use.

Changes Approved ◀

The Charter Stands Amended

▶ ▶ BROWN University's final step to amend its 178-year-old charter was taken May 18 when a majority of the members of the Brown Corporation voted to accept the provisions of an act passed recently by the Rhode Island General Assembly. The act removes all denominational requirements for membership in the Board of Fellows and the Board of Trustees and all denominational limitations for members of the faculty.

The proposal for the removal of the denominational requirements was first approved by the Corporation on Feb. 20, passed by the General Assembly on April 24. The charter amendment became effective after a properly executed record of the vote of acceptance had been filed with the Secretary of State of Rhode Island.

For 162 years the Brown Charter, originally granted in 1764, stipulated that eight of the Board of Fellows, a senior group of 12 members, be "of the denomination called Baptists or Antipaedobaptists, and the rest of them indifferently of any or all denominations."

It further provided that 22 of the 36 trustees be Baptists, five Quakers, five Episcopahians and four Congregationalists. An amendment of the charter in 1926 provided for six additional trustees who might be named without regard to the creeds they support.

The present change was sought on the ground that in some instances it was difficult to find a sufficient number of well qualified candidates and that, many times, an otherwise highly qualified person, whose services would be of great value to the Corporation, was barred from consideration by denominational barriers.

Rev. Albert C. Thomas, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Providence, was elected to membership on the Board of Trustees, to fill one of three Baptist vacancies, under the old requirements of the Charter. Dr. Thomas, a graduate of Brown in 1908 received an honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1931. His father and grandfather, both missionaries in India, received Brown degrees in 1877 and 1847 respectively. His son, Robert, was awarded his A.B. from Brown in 1938.

No Alumni Trustees Elected

▶ ▶ ALTHOUGH five vacancies will exist in July among Alumni Trustees on the Brown Corporation, no successors were chosen in the pre-Commencement balloting. The tellers for the Associated Alumni reported that they were unable to certify any candidates from among those voted upon by the holders of Brown degrees since, under terms of alumni by-laws and Corporation agreement, 30 per cent of those qualified must cast their votes in order that the election be legal. This percentage was not reached, although three Baptist vacancies, one Episcopal and one Quaker vacancy were to be filled and a strong slate presented by the Advisory Council.

The election was the last held under the requirement that most candidates should be qualified under certain denominational groupings, since an amendment to the University Charter was accepted at Commencement time which removes such qualifications. The deficiency in the number of ballots prevented the certifying of successors to Claude R. Branch '07, Leon F. Payne '07, Ralph M. Palmer '10, Hugh W. MacNair '17, and Donald B. Snyder, who retired at the end of their six-year tenures.

There have been a number of years when the minimum of ballots was barely attained, but this is the first time that the election has gone by default. To meet the situation thus created, the Corporation last month voted to authorize the Associated Alumni to make two nominations to fill two vacancies to be submitted at the October meeting and these nominees, if elected, be seated at that meeting. The Alumni would otherwise have to wait a year.

A resolution was also passed authorizing the President to appoint a committee of three members of the Corporation to prepare, with representatives of the Associated Alumni, a new agreement between the two bodies which would govern the election of the 14 Alumni Trustees. It was suggested that two nominations be submitted to the Corporation each year by the alumni group, and the nominees would be elected for a seven-year term. In addition to the extra election this summer, it was proposed to elect two more candidates next spring. ◀

Absent Seniors ◀

▶ ▶ DEGREES *in absentia*, rarely granted at Brown, this May went to eight men serving in the armed forces of their country on the day their classmates marched down the Hill to get their diplomas in person. Among them was Ernest T. Savignano, Class President and football star, at the Officer Candidate School of the U. S. Marines at Quantico. He would have led the procession down the Hill. With him was Robert Priestley, who had been designated a marshal.

Others were John W. Case, son of former Governor Norman S. Case '08, in the field artillery; Stephen W. Pournaras, at the Army Air Corps meteorology school in Chicago; Charles W. Corcoran, Ralph A. Hirtz, Eugene C. Swift and Pardon E. Tillinghast, son of Frederick W. Tillinghast '02. Some of their classmates, already in uniform, too, were permitted to return to Providence for Commencement; among them: William Crooker, former Boston Brown Club Scholar, and George Richardson, son of Dean Roland G. D. Richardson, both at the M. I. T. meteorology school of the Army Air Corps; Harvey M. Spear, Marine officer.

Eighty-five per cent of the Brown Class of 1942 were graduated directly into some phase of the war effort, the News Bureau announced at Commencement time. The proportion compares with 15 per cent who entered the armed forces the previous June from the Class of 1941. Aviation, meteorology, the Marine Corps and other branches of the Army and Navy, technical and defense production jobs were some of the fields for the Seniors.

Out of a total Senior registration of 263, 40 were already members of the Naval Reserve and were to enter the Navy at once as ensigns. Of these some were classed as "V-7" or deck officers; others as engineering officers under the Bureau of Ordnance and the Bureau of Engineering; a third group as flying cadets; a fourth, of pre-medical students, volunteers for service as Naval Reserve Officers of the Medical Corps, to be commissioned after medical school study. Selective service was waiting for some, deferred in order to complete their college work; others were under orders to report for duty upon graduation.

The situation on jobs was unlike any in 25 years. Students were not looking for jobs— they had their opportunities, according to Dean William K. Selden, in charge of placement. "The demand for engineering graduates has jumped

tremendously," he said. "For each engineering, chemistry, mathematics or physics graduate, there are between three and four openings from which he may select the position which he prefers. The students in the Bachelor of Arts courses are largely anticipating a future in the armed forces."

"The University appreciates the spirit shown by the members of the Senior Class in the unusual days of the past year," Dean Samuel T. Arnold said. "They have evidenced a deep interest in preparing themselves for service in the armed forces of their country. We have faith that they will face their responsibilities with sincerity and with courage."

Of the Seniors, 15 left to enter military service during the first semester, 11 during the second.

The Baccalaureate Message

► "COMPANIONSHIP with the Ultimates" was the topic chosen for the 1942 Baccalaureate Sermon, which the pastor of the First Baptist Meeting House, Dr. Albert C. Thomas '08, delivered to the Brown Seniors on May 17. He cited them as: the human spirit, the concept of eternity, the value of an ideal, death, and the Supreme Ultimate, whom the Christian interprets through the person of Jesus.

"The world into which you are going," said Dr. Thomas, "will see to it that you do not forget the Ultimates." Their education at Brown had pointed them toward that goal. That supreme purpose "has been superbly voiced in the recent new legislative enactment which may become part of the Brown Charter."

"That change proceeds to say," he continued, "that it is intended to effect the purpose of the founders and the acknowledgment by the University of its special and perpetual indebtedness to the spiritual groups from which it sprang and with the purpose hereafter to continue to adhere to the basic ideals and principles common to them and similar institutions of religion. The security of religious ideals and principles, we are told, is dependent upon the character of the persons to whom the government of the University is committed—None of us knows yet what God

and man is. But your Alma Mater has geared her life to that Eternal Quest.

"You have been reminded all too frequently that yours is the class that came with the wind—the wind of the hurricane; and that you are the first class to be gone with the wind—the whirlwind of the earth's greatest conflict. Trained to be leaders in that world of present failures, you are not despairing. You will go steadily on in the path of duty wherever it may lead, because yours is the patriotic dream that sees beyond the years. Your eyes are on the Ultimates. They are your companions and they constitute your beckoning vision."

For the second successive year the traditional march down the Hill Sunday was abandoned because of the rain. The President's Reception in Faunce House Art Gallery was nevertheless well attended, at the conclusion of the Baccalaureate Service. In addition to President and Mrs. Wriston, the receiving line included: Vice-President and Mrs. James P. Adams, Dean and Mrs. Samuel T. Arnold, and Dean Margaret Shove Morriss. A Wartime Class Day

► CLASS Day, 1942, was stripped of some peacetime frivolities, but the Brown Seniors and their families and friends entered wholeheartedly into the traditional event that ends the social year on the campus. The exercises "Under the Elms" had their customary moments gay and solid, the latter more than usually earnest and seemingly more than usually heeded. The evening pleasures of Class Night were simpler, less ostentatious, but added up to "a good party," although the campus was not lantern hung, dancing was confined to Sayles Hall, and the company was largely confined to the college community. The midnight sing by the Seniors had an added poignancy this year.

In the afternoon President Wriston was stirring as he told the Seniors how their responsibilities would grow in the world. While he would not withdraw one whit of credit from General MacArthur, there is in the adulation from which he currently suffers a manifestation of that escapism which expects some one individual to perform the miracle while the rest of us stand and cheer." The college man could not afford to stay on the sidelines after his training for responsibility.

"The war will attempt to make it an end in itself, to demand the total conformity of our wills, our souls, our minds," Orator Richard R. Baxter of New York told his classmates. "But presumably our college education has meant something to us and has impressed us with the necessity of intellectual integrity and of a fierce determination to believe, to continue to believe in what we consider to be true. Let us not allow the war to stamp these out. In the absence of the Class President in military service, Vice-President William R. Potter commented upon the resoluteness of the Seniors who, after the early confusion occasioned by the war, came to the conclusion that the "clearer one of our immediate responsibilities was to complete our college career." J. Donald Foley was Class Historian, Walter J. Commander Poet, Henry F. Tingley, Jr., composer of the Class Song.

Joseph F. Lockett, Jr., President of the Undergraduate Athletic Council, announced the names of Seniors who had been awarded Varsity letters. A tea followed.

▶ ▶ "SORRY, NO GAS!"

It was a new phrase of regret but by all odds the most frequent as class chairmen sought to find out who was coming back for the reunions of 1942. Commencement gatherings, already circumscribed by the war, had an eleventh hour obstacle in the eastern gasoline restrictions.

Nevertheless, 34 of Brown University's classes held reunions during the Commencement season, some of them consisting of a single meal but all of them surprising in the response under the circumstances. 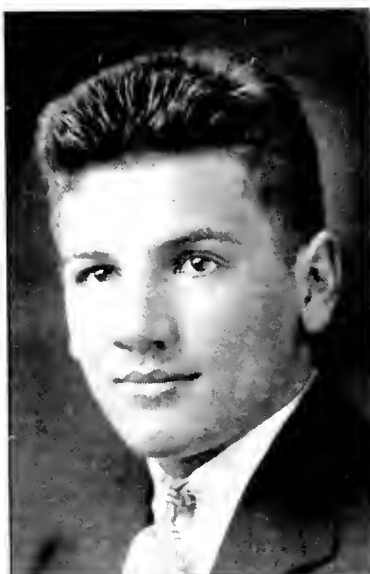
1917

► ► IN memory of the late Dr. Charles V. Chapin, whose public health work made him known throughout the world, the House of Delegates of Rhode Island Medical Society has voted that an oration in Dr. Chapin's name be given each year to the society's annual meeting. Those We Mourn

1894

► **GEORGE SHELDON ELLIS, Ph.B.**, retired insurance executive, born Allegany, N. Y., June 28, 1865, the son of William H. H. and Sally Janet (Witherell) Ellis; died suddenly in Portland, Me., April 27, 1942. On the night after his death, the Brown Club of Western Maine, at a meeting which he himself intended to take part in, characterized him as "one of our most active and best beloved members," and cited "his high character, loyal devotion, friendly helpfulness, and Christian citizenship."

"Pop" Ellis—everybody called him. A big, hearty man, his enthusiasms were his work, his family, his friends, his camera, and his university. His classmates long ago gave him the degree of Bachelor of Photography. He made a noteworthy record as Maine State manager of Phoenix Mutual Life Insurance Co. of Hartford. He had friends everywhere from Maine to Florida. Of Brown he was unusually fond, and he seldom missed an opportunity to return for Commencement, to attend meetings of the Advisory Council of the Associated Alumni, and of the Western Maine Brown Club, of which he had been president.

"I've often noted," he wrote a week before his death, "that the harder one has to work to get his college degree, the more likely he is to prize the privilege in all the later years. I had less than a hundred dollars as I entered Brown to cover three years; and I cleared off all the debt one year after graduation." A farmer boy, he was nearly 21 years old when he entered Colgate Academy. He spent a year at Colgate, then changing over from Madison University, before coming to Brown as a Sophomore. On the Hill he was hammer-thrower on the track team (he once set a New England Intercollegiate record), and was a member of Beta Theta Pi. In June, 1894, he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa. For two years he taught in the Providence evening schools.

Before going into life insurance work he was principal and superintendent of schools in Somerset, Ky., Roselle, N. J., Canajoharie and Whitehall, N. Y., and a student of philosophy, history, English at summer sessions at University of Tennessee, Cornell, and Columbia.

On July 12, 1895, he married Mary Olive Tetlow, daughter of John Tetlow '64. Mrs. Ellis survives, with three daughters, Mrs. E. H. Davis, Mrs. J. E. Ranks, and Dorothy Ellis '29, Pembroke College, and four grandchildren. Ellis was a member of Phoenix Lodge of Masons, Whitehall, N. Y., and honorary member of Maine Life Underwriters' Association.

1895

► **HENRY JOSEPH HOYE, A.B., M.D.**, surgeon and superintendent of the Rhode Island State Home and School, born Providence, July 18, 1873, the son of Patrick F. and Elizabeth (Brennan) Hoyer; died in Providence, April 26, 1942, after a short illness. An able surgeon, an active and friendly citizen, he had a wide acquaintanceship in Providence and Rhode Island.

From Brown he went to the Medical

School, the Johns Hopkins University, won his M.D. in 1899, was interne at Boston City Hospital, and studied abroad at the Universities of Leipzig, Vienna, Berlin and Prague. Commencing practice in Providence, he specialized in surgery. During his long and notable service he was visiting surgeon to Rhode Island Hospital, on the associate staffs of St. Joseph's and Homeopathic Hospitals, medical examiner for Selective Service, and visiting physician at Wallum Lake Sanatorium and St. Vincent de Paul Infant Asylum. He was a past president of Providence Medical Society, and was a member of Rhode Island Medical Society, American Medical Association, American College of Surgeons, New England Urological Society, and Johns Hopkins Surgical Society.

His first appointment as superintendent of the State Home and School became effective July 1, 1937. He was displaced in September, 1939, and reappointed last September.

On April 23, 1919, Dr. Hoyer married Abigail E. O'Sullivan, who survives, with a son, Henry J. Hoyer, Jr. '42, a daughter, Abigail E. Hoyer, student at Trinity College, Washington; a nephew, Paul S. Hoyer '36; and two brothers, Charles C. Hoyer, Westwood, Mass., and Francis Hoyer, Sherbrooke, Que. His fraternity was Zeta Psi.

1900

► **LEON ARVINE GOODALE**, who died in Worcester, Mass., Sept. 17, 1941, was Worcester's Water Commissioner and by Federal appointment co-ordinator on water supply for Central Massachusetts.

Born in West Boylston, Mass., March 1, 1876, the son of Aaron Goodale, 4th, and Nellie G. (Merriam) Goodale, he was a special student at Brown for the year 1896-97. Joining the staff of civil engineers with the Metropolitan Water Board, he worked on Wachusett Reservoir, was engineering superintendent of Kendall Reservoir, engineer in charge of the survey for the new Quinapoxet Water Supply (Worcester), and carried out other major projects. Since 1929 he had been Water Commissioner of Worcester.

He was a member of the American and New England Water Works Associations, Worcester Historical Society, Worcester Society of Civil Engineers, Past Master, Boylston Lodge of Masons, and an honorary member of the United Spanish War Veterans. He gave the historical address at West Boylston's centennial, and wrote articles on local history as well as on subjects dealing with water supply.

On Oct. 29, 1902, he married Miss Elsie M. Phelps, who survives, with three daughters and a son.

► **ARCHIBALD WALLACE DUNN, M.D.**, practising surgeon, born Sherman, Me., Feb. 25, 1883, the son of Robert and Edith C. (Perry) Dunn; died at Lenox Hill Hospital, New York, April 29, 1942, after a week's illness. He taught in Tsing Hua College, Peking, China, studied at Edinburgh, Scotland, and Budapest, Hungary,

and served in the First World War as captain, Medical Corps, U. S. A.

After three years at Brown, he spent a year at the Medical School, Bowdoin College, and then transferred to University of Pennsylvania Medical School, from which he was graduated in 1912. Having served his internship at Samaritan Hospital, Philadelphia, he commenced practice as physician and surgeon in Auburn, Me. Post graduate study abroad followed. He remained two years in China, completed his war service, and opened offices in New York, where he had practised surgery for the past 22 years.

On June 27, 1916, he married Miss Clara Brehm, who survives, with two sisters and three brothers. He was a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, and a member of St. Andrew's Society of New York, American Medical Association, and Psi Upsilon. A 32nd degree Mason, he was a charter member of the Peking Consistory.

► **THOMAS RUSSELL SYMMES, Sc.B.**, civil engineer, born Stoneham, Mass., Sept. 7, 1887, the son of Thomas R. and Emma (Duncan) Symmes; died at Lawrence Memorial Hospital, Medford, Mass., March 31, 1942. Since 1919 he had been a civil engineer with the Massachusetts Department of Public Works.

In college he was on the swimming squad in Freshman year, and belonged to the Civil Engineering Society and Phi Gamma Delta. From Brown he returned to Stoneham to go to work in the town's public works department. He enlisted in the U. S. Navy during the First World War, and was a member of the American Legion. He also held membership in King Cyrus Lodge of Masons, Stoneham, and in the Canopy Club.

A bachelor, he is survived by his mother, a sister, Miss Helene Symmes, and a brother, Albert L. Symmes.

In college Gardner Randall was quiet, easy going, friendly. He had a fine smile, and he was a good mixer whenever he felt in the mood. He and his dog were great companions on the campus. His decision to leave college to become an aviator was the result of considerable deliberation and discussion. This writer recalls two friendly talks with Gardner about it, the points of view splitting on the attitude toward a college degree.

On Oct. 14, 1938, Lt. Randall married Miss Lorraine Russell, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James A. Russell, in Norfolk, Va. Mrs. Randall survives, with a son, Gardner H. Randall. He also leaves his parents. An uncle is Lory T. Gardner '17. ◀ ◀

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Pembroke's Golden Year ◀ ◀

▶ ▶ PEMBROKE'S 50 years of service to the higher education of women was celebrated with solemnity, with jollity and with good fellowship as more than 1000 alumnae from near and far returned to the campus on May 15 and 16 to participate in the Semi-centennial observance. Nearly all of the 48 classes held official reunions and every class was represented by at least one member. Attendance at all events of the weekend greatly exceeded all expectations.

Sharing the spotlight in the celebration program were two moments—the academic convocation in the First Baptist Meeting House, when honorary degrees were conferred upon five distinguished women—two of them alumnae—and the announcement that the alumnae drive for \$125,000 had gone "over the top" by more than a thousand dollars.

Festivities started on Friday night as more than 300 graduates attended the annual meeting of the Alumnae Association in the Crystal Room of Alumnae Hall. Ollie A. Randall '12, President of the Association, conducted the business meeting at which a revision of by-laws of the Constitution was accepted.

During the evening four alumnae, distinguished in the field of education, participated in a panel discussion on "Education for Women in the Next Fifty Years." Weighing the pros and cons of future educational policies were Grace M. Sherwood '06, librarian of the State Library of Rhode Island, leader of the panel; Louise Schultz Boas '07, professor of English at Wheaton College, Norton, Mass.; Katharine Everett Gilbert '08, professor of philosophy at Duke University; and May Hall James '09, professor of social sciences at New Haven State Teachers College.

▶ In the historic Meeting House Saturday morning, national, state and city officials, Rhode Island educators, University Faculty and Corporation, members of the Rhode Island Society for the Collegiate Education of Women, and friends of the College joined alumnae and students to commemorate in solemn convocation Pembroke's half-century milestone.

After an academic procession the program opened with the singing of the National Anthem and the invocation delivered by Rev. Arthur L. Washburn, Chaplain of the University. Addresses were given by Dr. Rufus M. Jones, professor of philosophy emeritus of Haverford College and national chairman of the American Friends Service Committee for European Relief, President Wriston and Dean Morriss. The greetings of the state of Rhode Island were brought by Attorney General John H. Nolan.

Marking the first time that the University has awarded honorary degrees at a Pembroke event, President Wriston, on behalf of the Board of Fellows, conferred the following degrees:

Doctor of Music—Nadia Boulanger, eminent French composer, conductor and teacher.

Doctor of Letters—Margaret Bingham Stillwell '09, noted authority on incunabula and curator of the Annmary Brown Memorial.

Doctor of Letters—Katharine Everett Gilbert '08, professor of philosophy at Duke University.

Doctor of Science—Katharine Burr Blodgett, scientific research physicist with the General Electric Company and discoverer of the method for making glass invisible.

Doctor of Laws—Katharine Elizabeth McBride, dean of Radcliffe College and president-elect of Bryn Mawr College.

During the program "Gloria Patri" was sung by the Pembroke Glee Club under the direction of William Dinneen of the Brown Music Department, who presided at the organ at the convocation.

▶ NOONTIME found classes gathering for reunion luncheons, while degree recipients and other honored guests were entertained by the College at a luncheon in Metcalf Hall. Class reunions continued throughout the afternoon and the weekend was climaxed Saturday evening when nearly 800 attended the Fiftieth Anniversary supper on the campus. Originally planned for 400 in the auditorium of Alumnae Hall, the supper was served to 775 in the living rooms and dining rooms of Miller and Metcalf Halls, the Commons Room, Early American Room and the Student Dining Room in Alumnae Hall.

The after-dinner program, held in the auditorium, included short addresses by Miss Randall, Mary Emma Woolley '94, Bertha Clark Damon '05, Drusilla Flather Riley '17 and Jean C. Bauer '33. Dean Morriss served as toastmistress.

Anna Canada Swain '11, chairman of the semicentennial gift fund, prepared a novel dramatic announcement of the final result of the drive. Each class agent or representative appeared from behind the stage curtains and announced her class total. After each class and club had reported individually, the curtains were drawn to reveal the agents as a group assembled on the stage, the audience still uncertain as to the success of the campaign.

Then 10 members of the class of 1942 took their places, one by one, at the front of the stage, each carrying a placard on which there was a single digit, a dollar sign or a decimal point. Only when the last one had taken her place was the grand total—\$126,174—revealed. President Wriston accepted the gift on behalf of the University.

Under the direction of Amy Spencer Cappelli '25, a large group of alumnae, students and guests presented "Smilestones," the history of Pembroke in skits and music. The production was based on information obtained from old manuscripts and letters and from anecdotes and stories told by various alumnae. ◀ ◀

♦ ISABELLE SCOTT BOLLARD '09 of Montclair, N. J., who long had been active in civic and welfare work, died at the Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center on May 21, after a brief illness.

Mrs. Bollard, wife of Mr. Ralph H. Bollard, a partner in the investment banking firm of Dillon, Read & Co. of New York, was born in Jersey City. Later the family moved to Providence and she prepared for College at Hope High School.

As an undergraduate she was chairman of the first Sophomore Masque Committee, a member of the Executive Board of Komians, receiver of the trowel and Commencement Marshal in her junior year, and Senior Class President.

She had been a resident of Montclair for the last 17 years, and was an organizer and chairman of the Home Town Committee, a women's group formed there recently to maintain contact with Montclair men serving in the armed forces throughout the world. She was a former trustee of the Family Welfare Society and the Children's Home Association, both of Montclair.

Mrs. Bollard had served as a member of a committee that organized and operated the Women's Workroom, a unit providing remunerative employment for indigent women during the depression. She was an organizer and first chairman of the finance committee of the Montclair Maternal Health Association.

At her death, she was a member of the Advisory Committee on Pembroke College in Brown University, and created the fictitious character, Carrie Tower, that played an important part in the raising of a fund of \$125,000 for the college.

Mrs. Bollard was a member of the Cosmopolitan Club of New York and an active member of the Brown Alumnae Club of New York.

Surviving, besides her husband, are a son by a former marriage, Ensign John M. grane, U. S. N.; two step-daughters, Mrs. Bollard Roemer and Miss Katherine Bollard, both of Montclair, and a sister, Mrs. J. Morgan Holloway of Jersey City. ♦ ♦
