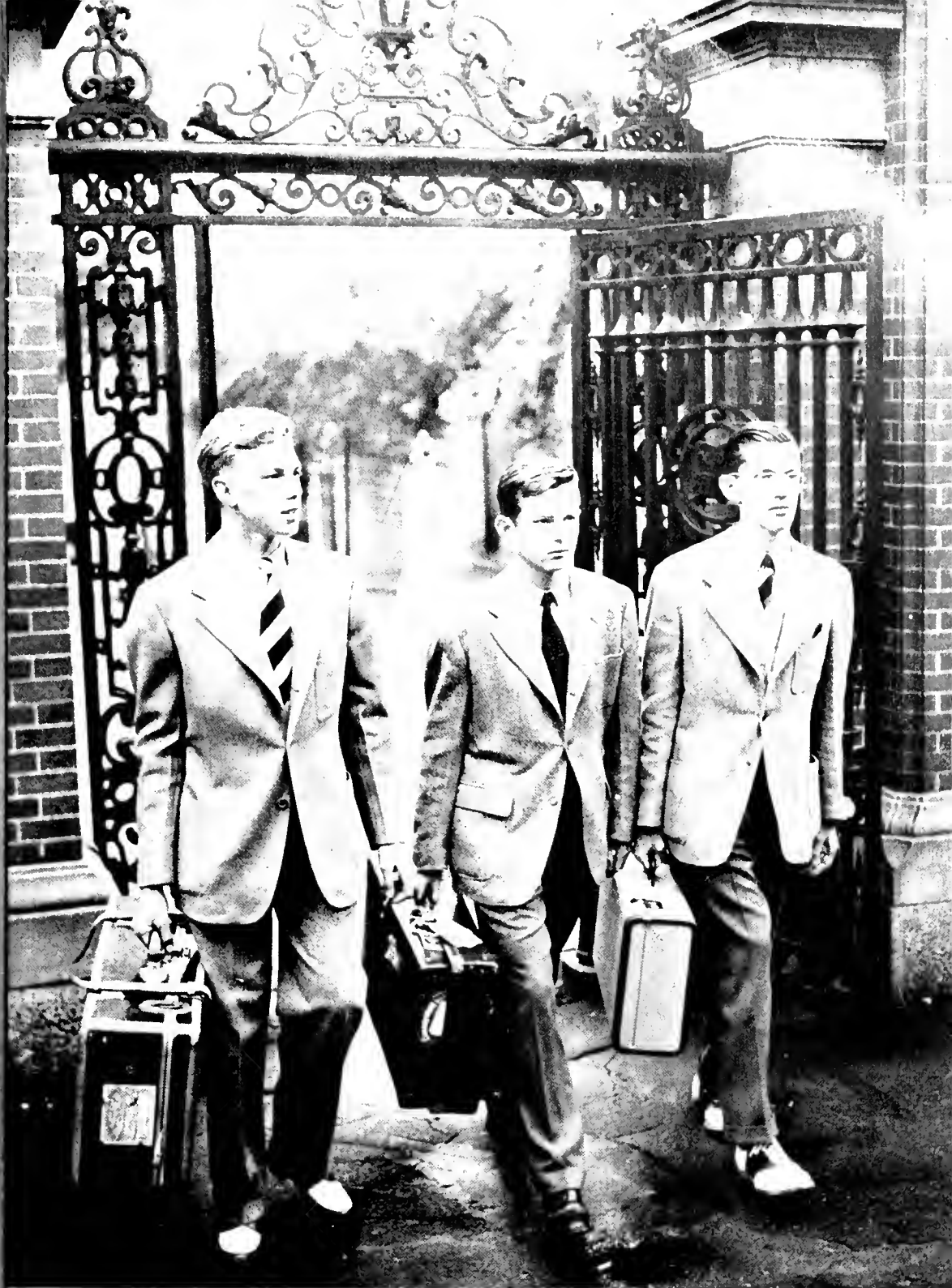

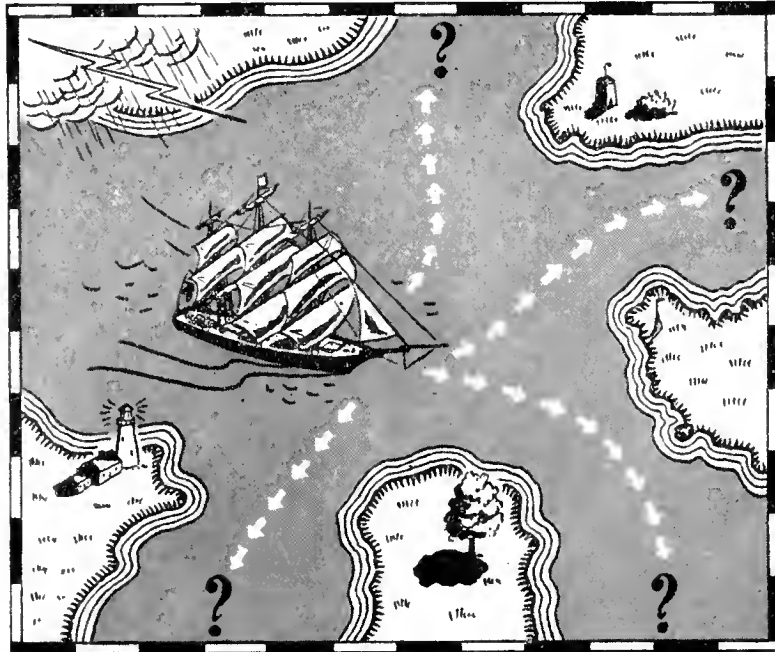

► ► What's Brown Like This Summer?

► FOR the first time in the history of Brown, its students are at work on the campus — hard at work, too — this summer in the first semester under the wartime program of acceleration. Morale, according to Dean Samuel T. Arnold, is excellent, and all indications point toward hard application and academic progress as justifying this experiment. Registered in a wide variety of war courses and enlisted in military reserves, the majority of the students were aiming at war service and preparing themselves for it as well as for normal civilian life afterwards.

Seven hundred students have returned to the campus for summer studies, including an estimated 90 per cent of the Senior Class. In addition 198 Freshmen have begun their life at Brown, with another 200 expected in the Fall to complete a class of normal proportions. Returned, too, are the University's loyal and hard-working Faculty, serving without extra pay in taking on this added responsibility. More than 30 of their number were on leave as military leaders or advisory specialists in the war effort.

Integrated into the college program, too, was a system of intensive physical training which has been likened to a mass calisthenic schedule for those not participating in regular sports. Meshed with the Navy's ideas of physical fitness, this work will get tougher as the season progresses. Intramurals are getting special emphasis, too.

THE REASON THEY'RE THERE

► THE campus has never looked lovelier, but, for all the minor frivolities that still mark college life the atmosphere is notably serious.

"We are deeply grateful for the steadiness of the undergraduates in making the transition from peace to war," President Wriston said in a message to Brown undergraduates enrolled for the summer. "As the war effort intensifies, it becomes clearer that every one must participate. Therefore, after searching self-appraisal, every student must answer the question, 'In what capacity can I render the most effective service?'"

"The armed forces need a steady flow of educated personnel. To this end, the Secretaries of War and of the Navy have issued a joint statement which first emphasizes that the country can no longer afford to have young men proceed with their education at the regular tempo, and second, urges those who are willing to put forth an intensive effort to continue in college. The Army and Navy will enlist such students who can qualify in reserve corps on inactive status.

"Those who conscientiously put their whole energies into their college work may feel assured they are performing their duty. The Brown curriculum provides training in required skills. The year-round program enables you to gain your degree in the shortest possible time and prepares you to render your best service to the nation."

THE PURPOSE OF SELECTION

► WITH this message went an admirable pamphlet, compiled by Dean Edwin M. J. Kretzmann, which described in detail the various opportunities in the reserve corps. It has had high praise from parents, secondary school officials and others, with numerous requests for extra copies. Ex-

plaining the opportunities for officer training in R.O.T.C. and specialized commissions in technical fields, it explained deferment from the Selective Service thus:

"The basic purpose of Selective Service is to allocate manpower. Allocation implies selection — selection for military service and selection for deferment — to maintain an adequate supply of trained, qualified, or skilled men necessary for the war effort and war production.

"Provision is made in the Selective Service Act for a continuous flow of educated and specially trained personnel. However, the student will not be given consideration for deferment on the grounds of being in training or preparation until at or near the end of the second academic year and then only if he can show evidence of continuing his training or preparation for fields necessary to the war production or war effort. It will be necessary for colleges and universities to provide evidence of continuous training and preparation until such preparation is completed."

"DRAFT DODGERS" UNWANTED

► IN the same vein, two excellent editorials in the *Brown Daily Herald* warned that the colleges were not refuges for "draft dodgers." Deferment could be justified, it said, only if the student were seriously preparing himself for leadership or skilled techniques.

This same realization seemed in part responsible for the fact that students were working harder than ever, as numerous observers asserted. They appreciated the opportunity to continue in college and were therefore making the most of it. Moreover, a poor academic performance would disqualify the individual from chances for leadership, would cut short the college career of reservists, would drop them at once into the ranks. Flunk and they were huck privates, plain gobs. A conflict and combination of motives were doubtless operating, but the result was agreed upon — it was a working semester, heat or no heat, summer distractions or no.

LOOK AT THE CAMPUS

► BUT, along with this, you had only to read the regular issues of the *Brown Daily Herald* to realize that in many a respect the University's first summer session was typical of normal semesters: Although outnumbered three to one, the Sophomores won the Flag Rush, thereby compelling the newcomers to wear their Freshman caps until July 17. The Glee Club was holding try-outs, and so were Sock and Buskin, the Band, and the Brown Network, the last adding a "radio bingo" to its campus programs with prizes from sponsoring merchants. Saturday night movies were being shown in Faunce House theatre, followed by a "vic dance" in the lobby, all free to holders of tax books. An innovation was the holding of a dance outdoors in the sunken courtyard of Faunce House.

All but two fraternities had been permitted to open their houses for the summer session, many with dining rooms in operation as usual. There had been some talk of fraternities pairing in order to maintain dining departments. Rushing rules were on the verge of agreement, and it appeared that Freshmen might be pledged in the last two weeks of the

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summer session. Under Interfraternity Governing Board sponsorship, a War Bond program was being pressed for regular purchases by fraternity members. First to pledge in this regard were Pi Lambda Phi and Psi Upsilon. A few informal dances had been held in July.

An early survey showed that 372 dormitory rooms were being occupied, with one or two of the smaller dormitories not open. To encourage dormitory occupancy, the University had offered a 30 per cent discount in its rental charges for the third semester of each sequence of three semesters in dorms.

GIRLS IN THE POOL!

► ONE of the most revolutionary experiments was one which permitted for the first time joint use of the Colgate Hoyt Pool by Pembroke and Brown students. Under the supervision of Coach Leo Barry, two weekly sessions were arranged for mixed bathing—Tuesday and Friday evenings between 7:30 and 9:30. Accepted without excitement, these pool parties were proving popular. Pembroke had the exclusive use of the pool Monday nights.

Handicapped by gasoline stringencies, the Brown Outing Reservation was being used for camping, fishing, boating, and swimming. Pembroke also had its Outing Camp open.

Alumni who have been lamenting the fact that the student body is so seldom assembled in one place at one time will be interested in the summer chapel. With college enrollment down to 900, it is once again possible to hold a single chapel service for all classes on the same day. Arranged by Vice-President James P. Adams and Chaplain Arthur L. Washburn, the noon services are simple religious ceremonies, with much emphasis on hymns.

One chapel assembly was utilized, too, for the taking of a poll of all students, to tabulate the number of eligibles who are already in the Army, Navy or Marines. Results of this were not yet available but were believed creditable.

A NEW ARMY RESERVE

► IN addition to the Naval R.O.T.C. and enlistment in Naval V-1, V-5, and V-7 categories, plans were also formulated this summer for the enlistment of Brown undergraduates in the Enlisted Reserve Corps of the Army. Three groups of 15 each were to be presented for the latter service in July according to intentions expressed then. Freshmen were not yet eligible, since the Navy has first call at Brown on Reserve material, and the R.O.T.C. is inoperative this semester.

Students in the A.E.R.C. will be required to take a qualifying educational examination not later than 24 months after the beginning of their first academic year. Those who pass will be granted an opportunity to continue their college courses in an inactive status. Those who fail to attain the prescribed, nationally-fixed level will leave for active duty in an enlisted status at the end of the second calendar year, provided they have no valid reason for deferment. Those who graduate will be given basic training work by the Army to qualify them for Officers' Candidate School, while some especially qualified may be recommended by the University to continue academic work beyond graduation.

The undergraduate body (take that any way you like) hasn't undressed as much as you might think. There are fraternity roof sunbaths, to be sure, and tennis is played in shorts and sneakers; but Brown has known summer heat in May and June on occasion. The Cammarian Club ordained that shirts and neckties should be worn to chapel, but otherwise dress is about what one might wear at camp.

There are informalities uncommon to other terms, of course. It is not unusual to see a professor holding a class outdoors on the grass in the shade. And much studying is done in the open air, with benches under the campus elms to encourage it. (Freshmen are denied access to the grass, however.)

WHEN THE FRESHMEN CAME

► FOR the incoming Freshman, special orientation was planned this summer but on a basis different from that of the usual Freshman Week of recent autumns. They arrived Friday, June 19, began a series of aptitude, physical, and placement tests, had a few social affairs as "mixers". Instead of the lecture schedules of other years, the Freshmen heard only two talks. Discussion groups furnished more personal, more pertinent information. Registration and orientation, under the guidance of the student's own counselor, seemed to work more smoothly and effectively. Of great assistance was a pamphlet of information prepared by Dean Bruce M. Bigelow and Admissions Officer Emery R. Walker, Jr.

First impression was that, despite unprecedented competition, the Admissions Office had selected a good entering class. Its difficulties had been enormous, one of them being a calendar difficulty. (Some Freshmen hadn't graduated from high school, didn't for a fortnight).

One story making the rounds is that two Massachusetts boys, destined for Brown, compelled their secondary school to change the date of its graduation. It had been set for the 19th, the day they were due in Providence. To accommo-

date them, the graduation was moved ahead to the 17th. We predict a brilliant future for those two boys, and we concur in their idea of the importance of things at Brown.

► *Jottings in passing.* First "pep rally" held in many years before a baseball game was scheduled by the Brown Key prior to the Brown-Harvard contest July 18. (P.S. It rained next day.) . . . Instead of Vigilance Committee raids to round up rule-breaking Freshmen, a V. C. Court is dealing with the culprits — and more successfully. . . . The game room of the Union is open one night a week free to students and their dates. . . . Bookstore stock keeps pace with summer needs. . . . Students participated in the city-wide air raid practice, following previously outlined instructions in a spirit of

co-operation commended by authorities. . . . Not only the University Administration but fraternity officers had the problem of getting screens for dormitories. They got the screens. . . . Summer practice for Varsity Football, first in Brown history, was called by Coach Stahley. . . . Freshman strength tests, given by the Navy in connection with the University's customary physical exams, showed an average 77 points higher than that of the usual Navy recruit. . . . Concerts from the porch of Faunce House have been a feature of campus evenings. WPA Orchestra, as well as Brown musical groups, offered the programs. . . . Students have been donating blood to the R. I. Hospital plasma bank. . . . Pembroke in some Brown classes ease the load on the Faculty by making it necessary to give only one lecture instead of two. . . . ► ► The Part the Faculty Plays

► ► WHEN a nation is at war its universities and colleges are necessarily called upon to play a disproportionately large share in wartime activities. Such a call is justified on the twin grounds that college men form a pre-selected pool of intelligent, young manpower and that college faculties are a large group of highly trained specialists whose brains are immediately available to the nation's war efforts.

Brown University's part in the war was from the first a highly active one. As the months pass, that part is becoming increasingly large. The student body is dividing itself, according to aptitude and ability, into two groups; one preparing for technical and the other for military service. The University faculty is undergoing even greater changes.

From the point of view of the News Bureau nearly every Faculty member is doing some job that relates specifically to the war. Some of these jobs are less spectacular than others — and some are so spectacular or important that they cannot be described. But the very numbers and diversity of tasks makes an exhaustive survey impossible here.

35 MEN OFF TO THE WAR

► THIRTY-FIVE men have left the University to do war work. The Army has taken 12, the Navy 12, and 11 are in advisory posts.

The first man to leave was James L. Whitcomb, director of Alumni Relations, Signal Corps reservist, who became a Second Lieutenant in the Army on Dec. 9, 1940. He was followed by H. Stuart Hughes, History instructor, who enlisted as a private and who is now a Second Lieutenant. Robert W. Kenny, Assistant Professor of English, a Field Artillery officer in the National Guard, is now a Major. Zenas R. Bliss, Professor of Engineering, is a Lieutenant Colonel following National Guard experience. Hartley C.

► FRANKLIN P. HUDDLE, a former instructor in the English Department of Brown University, took over duties as Director of the Brown News Bureau in May.

Huddle, who graduated from the University of Arizona in 1937 with a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree, received his Master's degree from Brown in 1939. A member of the Brown Sphinx Club, student-faculty discussion group, Huddle also holds membership in Pi Nu Alpha journalism fraternity and Hammer and Coffin, national publications fraternity. He was an assistant in the Brown English department from 1938 to 1940 and instructor from 1940 to 1942. Earlier this year he was on the reportorial staff of the *Providence Journal*.

Huddle is replacing Stanton P. Nickerson, who was granted a leave of absence by the University to serve as Lieutenant (j.g.) in the U. S. Naval Reserve. Mrs. Nelson B. Record, director of the Pembroke College News Bureau, served as acting director of the Brown bureau, through the Commencement season. ◀

Eckstrom, research instructor in Chemistry, and A. Joel Warren, Engineering instructor, are First Lieutenants.

Robert H. George, Professor of History, joined the Army in the spring as a Major in the Special Services branch. Edward W. Proctor went into the Ordnance department of the Army this summer, after having held the title of assistant in the Economics department only since his graduation from Brown in May. Other men in the Army include Robert L. Abbey, assistant in German, Lester W. J. Seifert, instructor in German, James A. Cox, investigator in Chemistry, and Robert D. Cooper, assistant in Philosophy.

Pembroke has also contributed to Army personnel. Mrs. Hobby, national commander of the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps, has appointed Dean Margaret Shove Morriss to serve as one of two advisors in the 1st Army Corps Area to assist in choosing officer-personnel for the women's branch of the Army. Miss Mary M. Foster, of the Physical Education division, is one of three chosen to direct such work in the W.A.A.C.

COMMISSIONED BY THE NAVY

► CARL BRIDENBAUGH, Professor of History, had the experience of leaving to enter the Navy as a Lieutenant (s.g.) just as the proof of his latest book, *Rebels and Gentlemen*, arrived from the publisher. William R. Benford, assistant Professor of Engineering, is also a Lieutenant (s.g.).

Lieutenants (j.g.) include Carl Pfaffman, instructor in Psychology; James W. Gurll, Executive Secretary of the Alumni Fund; Stanton P. Nickerson, Director of the News Bureau; Theodore W. Minah, manager of the dining room; Roland N. Harman and Edwin Lamont, instructors in English.

An additional number of faculty members have entered the Navy as midshipmen, or to prepare for some commission. These include Charles M. Kenyon, Edwin R. Casady, and Gordon Milne of the English department, and George Henderson of the Photographic laboratory.

ADVISORS IN WASHINGTON

► A CONSIDERABLE number of faculty members have left the University to do advisory work in Washington, D. C., or in military research posts. Max F. Roy, instructor in Chemistry, is with the National Defense Research Committee. Sinclair W. Armstrong, Assistant Professor of History, is in the office of the Co-ordinator of Information. James H. Shoemaker, Assistant Professor of Economics, is with the Board of Economic Warfare. Kenyon E. Poole, Assistant Professor of Economics, is with the Division of Tax Research of the U. S. Treasury Department. Clarence E. Glick, Assistant Professor of Political Science and Sociology, is in the Office of War Information.

Henry Lee Smith, Jr., instructor of English, is doing linguistics research on a combined Army-Navy project. Carroll E. Reed, German instructor, is engaged in war work at Washington.

Two research chemists, A. Spencer Lehman and James A. Barclay, are in the Naval Research Laboratory. Albert A. Bennett, Professor of Mathematics, is doing advisory work at the Aberdeen Proving Grounds. John P. Howe, Assistant Professor of Chemistry, left the University this summer to do war research.

THEY ARE ALSO GALLANT

▶ BUT a Brown University professor need not leave the campus to play an important role in the war. And even those who remain without a definite, direct war assignment are serving with a gallantry that deserves recognition. The Faculty, shy the 30-odd men summoned elsewhere by the war, is carrying on through the summer term without any extra pay and with many an extra load. In addition, there are these specific services to note in a survey of war work:

Members of the staffs of Mathematics and Engineering are joining with distinguished guest scholars to solve industrial problems in the critical ship and airplane production industries.

Certain courses that the University has been teaching in the past have taken on new significance and value in relation to the war. These include chemistry, mathematics, engineering, physics, biology, geology, economics and modern languages.

Besides teaching specific war courses the Physics department is initiating a graduate school of instruction and research in acoustics—with particular reference to submarine signaling.

100 COLLEGES USE IT

▶ MEMBERS of the Economics Department are planning a new edition of their combined publication, "Introduction to War Economics," already in use in 100 colleges, and doing research work on labor problems and taxation. The Psychology Department is doing war research for the Government in addition to regular research and teaching.

Members of the Chemistry Department are busy on problems of chemical technology, acting as consultants in industry and teaching war courses. In addition to its customary work the Engineering Division is acting as consultant in construction and production both for the Navy and for industry. The Department is also conducting a good-sized defense training school for engineers.

Expansions at GTAP

▶ A \$350,000 expansion for Greenfield Tap and Die last spring brought newspaper headlines for the Massachusetts corporation and interviews from President Donald G. Millar '19. The step, negotiated with Federal approval, is permitting GTD to increase its production of gage equipment, one of the bottle necks of defense industry. Hardly had this news grown cool when \$420,000 further Federal aid was announced to speed the production of taps.

A previous contract with the Government led to a \$1,000,000 addition to the gage plant, which was in production in less than eight months after ground was broken. Millar had the satisfaction of hearing his company praised in a Government war production radio program over Mutual.

Fleetest of Fleet ◀

The Bears, National Champions

▶ ▶ RESPLENDENT in Faunce House at Commencement time was a case displaying a handsome silver cup, not half so handsome as the victory it represented. It was the symbol of the national championship in dinghy racing, brought to Brown only a few days previous. It was a tribute, too, to an outstanding yachtsman, Leonard A. Romagna '42, Commodore of the Brown Yacht Club.

Romagna had represented Brown in few regattas this year, giving others the opportunity and experience of intercollegiate competition, and his duties as Brown Commodore and as chairman of the dinghy committee of the Intercollegiate Yacht Racing Association kept him busy otherwise, too. But he returned to the races with a vengeance in the competition for the Morse Trophy on May 9, as the following account (reprinted from *Yachting Magazine* for July) testifies:

▶ THE "experts" had the Morse Trophy all but delivered to Dartmouth when the sixth annual national dinghy championships of the Intercollegiate Y.R.A. opened under the colors of the Nautical Association of M.I.T. But they were in for a shock: When dusk settled over the Charles, 36 hours later, the burgee of the Brown University Yacht Club had been mastheaded.

It had been nailed there personally by Commodore Leonard A. Romagna in his final appearance as a Brown skipper. For his swan song, Romagna had turned in one of the superlative performances yet to be registered in the annals of American college dinghy racing. In 1940 and 1941 he captured individual honors in the Morse Trophy competition but the Brown team did not finish better than third on each occasion.

It was asking a lot to expect Lennie Romagna to turn the trick for a third year against a strong field, but he rose magnificently to the moment to become the first skipper to win the high point honors in the Morse event in three successive years. In 14 races against 13 good skippers, Romagna scored eight firsts, two seconds, a third, a fourth, and a pair of fifths. He tallied 181 points in leading his division, 17 more than the leading skipper of the other division and 38 more than the second man in his own division.

Those 181 points accounted for approximately three-fifths of the winning total of 313 points compiled by the Bears, as their commodore received able support from Bob Barningham, skipper, Rex Pulford and John Blake to win their first national championship.

▶ THE Morse Trophy is a gruelling competition. The Bears prevailed only after a struggle all the way to the home stretch. That battle was provided, not by Dartmouth, pre-race favorite which failed amazingly, nor by Harvard, which threatened early, but by a Tech team. In the midst of the championship, the Tech skippers actually overcame a deficit of 13 points to catch and pass Brown. Then after gaining a 7½-point lead, their gallant bid failed when Brown rallied to forge back into the van. It was not until Romagna won the second heat of the 14th race that the issue was settled. (Dartmouth's right to the favorite's role was founded in her victories in the Coast Guard Bowl, McMillan Cup, Brown Invitation, Jack Wood Trophy, Schell Trophy, and Owen Trophy regattas.)



COUNTRY'S BEST FOR THREE YEARS

Len Romagna, Commodore of the Brown University Yacht Club, took individual honors in the national dinghy championship for the third successive time, this time led his mates to a team championship, too.

The point totals were: Brown 313, M.I.T. 307½, Harvard 266, Dartmouth 254, Yale 230, Williams 222, Boston University 212, Coast Guard 206, Northeastern 206, Tufts 173, New Hampshire 159½, Penn 139, Haverford 118, Stevens Tech 86.

Romagna presided as president *pro tem* over the annual meeting of the I.C.Y.R.A. Hampton Thomas was named to the executive committee for next year.

Yachting illustrated the story of Brown's victory with pictures of Romagna and of a Seekonk River regatta. ◀◀

Wartime Sports ◀

▶▶ ALTHOUGH Brown was taking the cue this summer from the Navy's physical fitness program and giving every student three daily hours of athletics, the Varsity baseball team was carrying on a schedule with competition from "beyond the walls." Most games were with service teams, but Yale, Harvard, Dartmouth, Providence and Colgate were listed as intercollegiate rivals, four of them on a home-and-home basis.

New captain is T. Donald McKone, star centre fielder and leading hitter who prepped at Hotchkiss. The sport continues under the guidance of Eddie Eays '16, former Big Leaguer who succeeded John P. Kelleher this spring. Notable is the fact that Freshmen appeared in the Varsity lineup for the first time under new permissive regulations.

After two shutouts, one by Providence College, the other by the strong Newport Naval Training Station, the Bear took a couple of victories from Quonset Point Naval Air Station, 3-1, and the Hillsgrove Army Air Cobras, 14-4. A ninth-inning rally fell just short as the nine bowed to Colgate 4-3, and Newport took the second game 7-3. Al Skurnik became the first Freshman to play for the Varsity in nearly 20 years when he appeared at third base.

The main emphasis remained on intramurals, however, and one unusual sight was that of a hundred students loping up Thayer street from Thayer Field sports in the pre-bath conditioning. A regulation Navy obstacle course was in preparation, too.

Brown alumni have jumped into the breach to provide wartime competition for Varsity golfers and tennis players during the summer session. Athletic Director Thomas W. Taylor appealed to them when transportation difficulties precluded intercollegiate competition on an extensive basis.

Twelve of the golfing matches were listed with alumni at country clubs near Providence: two at Wannamoisett, two at Agawam, two at Metacomet, two at Pawtucket; two at Rhode Island Country Club; two at Warwick Neck. A match with Colgate was also scheduled in Providence.

Harold B. Tanner, '09, University Trustee and former Brown golf captain, was to arrange competition at Agawam, while Frederick C. Brooks, '18, was to organize the alumni team at Wannamoisett. Others who volunteered as alumni managers were:

Henry H. MacIntosh, '25, at Warwick; George E. Wilson, '21, at Pawtucket; Joseph Olney, Jr., '36, another former captain, at Rhode Island; Herbert Boss at Metacomet.

On the Seekonk river the Brown University Yacht Club was conducting the most intensive program of its existence, with an eight-week intra-mural schedule calling for sailing every day of the week. More interest than ever was reported by A. Chester Snow, '07, alumni advisor, although the intercollegiate program was in doubt because students would be short on gasoline and time for regatta trips. Sailing instruction is being provided, and feminine guests are permitted for social sailing on weekends. ◀◀

▶ Worthington to U. H.

▶▶ THERE are few Brown men who have ever shown more interest and skill in serving the University than the man whose appointment as Director of Alumni Relations and Supervisor of Public Information has just been announced.

It is 19 years since W. Chesley Worthington graduated. As an undergraduate he was editor of the *Brown Daily Herald* and one of the founders of the *Brown Jug*, a magazine whose sense of the humorous in later years finally led to its banishment. He is a member of Delta Upsilon and has served as a counselor of the fraternity.

Mr. Worthington went from Brown to Columbia's School of Journalism, graduating in 1925 after two years of such distinguished work that he won the highly coveted Pulitzer travelling fellowship in journalism. A year later he began his journalistic career by joining the news staff of the *Providence Journal*. His connection with that paper continued for 16 years and was terminated on July 3rd, 1942 when he resigned to become an administrative officer of Brown University.

Mr. Case told me that at a luncheon a few days ago he happened to sit next to one of Chet's colleagues on the *Journal*, Mrs. B. K. Hart. Mrs. Hart has followed her husband's extraordinary column, "The Sideshow" by a column of her own in the *Bulletin*. She told Mr. Case of how devoted Mr. Hart had been to Chet: of how he had watched Chet's development as reporter, as Wednesday Feature Page Editor, and finally as editor of the Sunday *Journal's* magazine section. She told him that Chet was a bear for work — not, she said, because he works in circles, for he is direct and efficient, but because he wants to get things done. "I was surprised when I first heard that Chet was leaving the *Journal*," she said. "But then I realized that, in spite of his fine record at the paper, his real interest, his major interest, was Brown."

This, I think, is true — and demonstrable. Mr. Worthington has served Brown in innumerable ways. You perhaps know him best as editor of the *Brown Alumni Monthly*, a post he has held ever since the *Monthly* was reorganized in 1930, and which, at the Directors' request, he will continue to hold. But he has also been a member of the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee of the Associated Alumni, a trustee of the Brown Alumni Fund and a member of the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee of the Associated Alumni, a trustee of the Brown Alumni Fund and a member of the Advisory Council. He has served on many alumni committees, notably those responsible for commencement arrangements, Brown plates and Alumni Day arrangements. He has been actively interested in the

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Friends of the Library and on its executive board. Since 1941 he has lectured in journalism in the Division of University Extension.

A year and a half ago, when James L. Whitcomb took leave of absence from the alumni office to go to active service as an Army reserve officer, Chet was the man the alumni and the University turned to to fill in on part time. He was already doing two or three men's work, but he took on the new assignment and, within the limits of his available time, did a fine job.

Of course this arrangement was only a make-shift. And when James W. Gurll, who had added to his duties as Secretary of the Brown Alumni Fund to help substantially in the Associated Alumni office, also went on leave of absence for military service, it was apparent something had to be done.

This is it. In making the announcement of Chet's appointment to this post, President Wriston said "Mr. Worthington has been appointed Director of Alumni Relations by joint action of the Executive Committee of the Associated Alumni and of the University. With the approval of the alumni, he will also assume responsibilities in connection with public relations as an administrative officer of the University. Specifically, he will serve as Supervisor of Public Information. In all his work he will be closely associated with the Secretary of the University."

Thus the job he is called upon to do is a new and certainly an important one. His task is to develop and execute the program of the Associated Alumni and to conduct the annual campaign of the Brown Alumni Fund for its trustees. He will also supervise the newly reorganized News Bureau, of which Franklin P. Huddle is Director, and which now handles all news releases for Brown, Pembroke and the Athletic Council.

This is a big job— but Chet Worthington is the man for it. He has displayed ability and energy; he has exhibited judgment and tact; he is a man of charm and of character. I am personally gratified by the action which the alumni and the University have taken. And now, Chet, it's up to you and good luck.

A Legislator's Accounting

▶ WHEN Robert E. Johnson '32 was campaigning for election to the New York State Senate from the 24th district (the Borough of Richmond and Rockland County), he promised, if elected, to render a report to the people at the close of each session of the Legislature.

A copy of that report, sent to the ALUMNI MONTHLY, makes interesting reading, describing the 60 measures he introduced, 20 of them getting the approval of both houses. In subject matter they ranged from deduction of hospital expenses from the State income tax computation to the Staten Island "free port," from the establishment of child care centres to help mothers in war work to free subway rides for service men and aviation courses in high schools. One bill looked toward the establishment of a tunnel from Brooklyn to Staten Island. Another related to his specialty as chairman of the Committee on Public Printing and Revision.

Bigelow to the Graduates

▶ ONE of Brown University's greatest assets is the popularity of Dr. Bruce M. Bigelow, Director of Admissions, among educators and students in American secondary schools. Added evidence of that fact was to be found in the Commencement season when he was asked to deliver a number of important graduation addresses in Middle West

schools. Three of them, by a curious set of circumstances, were given in the Cleveland area. Among his dates were: June 2 — Shaw High School, East Cleveland; June 3 — Shaker High School, Shaker Heights; June 4 — Chicago Latin School; June 10 — Milwaukee University School; June 11 — Cleveland Heights High School.

Six Good Paragraphs

(An Editorial in the *Boston Herald*)

▶ BROWN UNIVERSITY has given honorary degrees to a group more eminent than the retired Rear Admiral, the foreign correspondent, the rabbi, the scientist, the columnist and the magazine editor whom it selected this year, but in aptness, accuracy and incisiveness of characterization, the institution on the Providence hilltop outdid itself. Probably President Henry M. Wriston himself did the good job. The citations are worthy of President Eliot and President Lowell at their best, and they are so meritorious that we are re-publishing them in full on this page.

The fact that three of the six men, Messrs. Reynolds, Armstrong and Strunsky, are journalists is also notable. It seems to indicate that the committee which weeded out the preliminary list ascribes great importance just now to the education of the people and wished to dignify the "accelerators of public opinion."

Each of the trio well deserves academic commendation. Mr. Reynolds' "London Diary" awakened many of us to a livelier realization of what was taking place there and his magazine articles and dispatches have been excellent. Hamilton Fish Armstrong has made the magazine *'Foreign Affairs'* indispensable to the student of international events and his book, "Can America Stay Neutral?" which appeared in 1939, was a harbinger of our course. Mr. Strunsky, the citation of whom is probably the outstanding one, writes the daily and anonymous "Topics of the Times" for the *New York Times*, as well as editorials. He ranks so high among discerning newspapermen that they will be especially pleased by his Litt. D.

The Fabulous Spragues

▶ PROF. Z. CHAFEE, JR., '07 has published Dorris Pamphlet No. 4 under the title of "Weathering the Panic of '73," the story of the Sprague family of Rhode Island "and their fortune and, most particularly, of the part the author's grandfather, Zechariah Chafee, played as trustee of the Spragues' vast holdings after the crash."

William Sprague was Rhode Island's Civil War Governor; he and his family built up a huge industrial empire which went to smash in '73. The elder Chafee, as trustee, tried to save what he could of the wreck, and made a "capable although ultimately unsuccessful job" of it.

"To encompass the whole story of the Sprague family would take a large book — and what a book it would be!" wrote W. T. Scott '31 in the *Providence Journal*. "But Mr. Chafee's study of its last great days is a fetching item."

\$5000 for His "Night"

▶ "NARRAGANSETT NIGHT," the \$5000 prize novelette by William G. Schofield '31, appeared in the June *Redbook*. Already, it is said, arrangement has been made for its presentation in other form, under another and less effective title, we hear.

The magazine made another award to a Brunonian recently "for the college story most suitable for *Redbook* and for the right to reprint that story 'Love 'Em and Leave 'Em' by Victor Hillery. It originally appeared in the 1941 Prom Issue of *Sir Brown*."

▶ ▶ A Preliminary War Service Record

Although the names of more than 900 Brown alumni appear in the following service lists, the ALUMNI MONTHLY publishes it with the certainty that it is incomplete. Indeed, one important purpose in publishing such a war record is that fact that we thereby call attention to omissions. The Keeper of Graduate Records, Mrs. Dorothy Miller, will welcome additions to this list, as well as amendments, resulting from promotion, reassignment, etc. Mrs. Jeanne Ferguson also participated in the compilation.

We regret that we cannot publish more comprehensive information on the men here listed. It has been a bitter editorial problem to try to reconcile a desire to print more interesting, in some cases startling facts about the alumni in service with the very proper and stern restrictions on military information. In preparing the list for publication, we have endeavored to follow the specific instructions of the Office of Censorship in Washington, where the Assistant Director, Mr. N. R. Howard, considered our problem. For his counsel we are grateful.

In spite of the fact that this is a war where every citizen is serving, this roster includes only alumni in active military service. It does not include students in uniform on the campus in the Naval R.O.T.C. nor in any of the other Reserve categories. It does not include Faculty and alumni in high civilian posts in the war enterprise, research men, industrialists, laborers, Government officers, U.S.O., war bond or civilian defense personnel, State Guardsmen, or even Army and Navy officers not yet actually called into active duty. Much of that information has been assembled, and a monumental list it makes. But, for the moment, as of July 15, 1942, these are the alumni of Brown we know to be in active military service. We honor them:

Silver Star for Morhouse ◀ ◀

► ► STILL another distinction has come to Lt. Col. Charles H. Morhouse, M.C., Brown '25 and former member of the University Faculty. Medical officer on the famous transfer of General MacArthur from the Philippines to Australia, he has now been awarded the Silver Star for "gallantry in action" by the Commanding General in the Far East. Cited in the same general order was Brig. Gen. Harold H. George: "These officers on March 16 and March 17, 1942, while en route from the Philippine Islands to Australia, executed with marked skill and coolness a mission of major strategic importance and of the most hazardous nature in the face of greatly superior enemy forces."

Col. Morhouse, known to his contemporaries as "Ty" because he came from Ticonderoga, N. Y., is now attached to General MacArthur's staff as an aide-de-camp at general headquarters in the Southwest Pacific Area.

► WRITING June 5 to a friend on the campus, he said: "Letters written to me during the time I was on Bataan have begun to catch up to me, and I find that the little article I wrote on Camp John Hay was published in the MONTHLY. . . . It came at a good time from the publishing point of view for Baguio was one of the first, if not the first, target of the Jap air corps in the war. We learned early on the morning of Dec. 8 that Baguio had been bombed with the loss of the radio tower and part of the officers' mess hall. Since arriving here, we have heard rumors that some of the officers were being held prisoner at John Hay, which would be a break for them, for it is without doubt the most pleasant part of the Islands and the poor devils need some good breaks."

"In November I had a delightful day at Del Carmen on the Pampanga Sugar Estates with George E. Burnham of the class of 1907. He and his wife were most hospitable. Mr. Burnham is the manager of the Estate—or, rather, he was. During February I saw the Burnhams on Bataan in our rear area. They were living in a small native shack and drawing food, such as there was, from the Army QM. I expect that he and Mrs. Burnham were made

prisoners when Bataan fell—in all probability they were placed in a concentration camp near Manila with other interned Americans, but I cannot be sure of this. Mr. Burnham spoke particularly of his classmate, George Hurley.

"The one night I spent on Corregidor I learned that Conzelman was OK and as far as we can find out he was made a prisoner of war. (Clair McKinley Conzelman '21 left Brown before graduation in order to attend West Point and enter upon an Army career.)

"There is very little news that I can give out that will get by the lad with the stamp, but I expect you know that by good luck I was chosen to come out of Bataan on the famous boat trip and plane ride. I hope that some time in the future I can see you and tell you the story of a weird but happy voyage. I figured nothing could be worse than what I was up against, for I was on the front line, from January 24th, until we pulled out. They were good enough to give me time to pack a few clothes and some toilet articles before leaving.

► "I suppose by the time this arrives another graduation will have gone by. I wish I were able to come back but trust that you will give my best regards to all I knew and my best wishes to the Brown Chapter of Delta Upsilon. I regret exceedingly that one of my Brown degrees (he earned his Sc. M. in 1927 in addition to his Ph. B. in 1925) was burned in my Qrs. after a bombing. It cannot be replaced for W.H.P. Faunce signed it—one of the last he signed as a class.

"Australia has been grand to us. . . . I guess everyone is doing his or her share, and from what I have seen it will take lots of doing to wind this thing up and take it home.

"Delivery service has been rather bad out my way since Dec. 8th. Now that I am back where mail ships do get in once in a while I would like very much to hear all the news of the University and my old friends." (His official address is APO #501, c/o Postmaster, San Francisco.)

With a daughter the Colonel has never seen, Mrs. Morhouse is in Seattle with her father. ◀ ◀

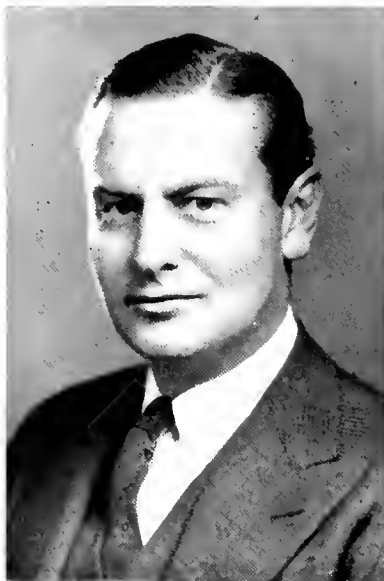

In a Hospital Unit

▶ WHEN the 48th Rhode Island Hospital Evacuation Unit goes into active service, as may happen at any time, it will have more than a little tinge of Brown. This is only one outfit in which Brunonian doctors are serving or ready to serve, but it has perhaps the highest concentration of alumni. A newspaper article last month said the unit was prepared to move at a moment's notice into a combat zone on foreign soil as part of the U. S. Army.

Chief of the unit's medical service is Dr. Herman A. Lawson '20, with a rank of Lieutenant Colonel. Ward officers include Dr. Robert G. Murphy '28, Captain, while Dr. Irving Beck '32 is chief of laboratory service with rank of Captain and Dr. Edward R. Squier '32, First Lieutenant, is dental surgeon.

On the surgical staff are assistant operating surgeons, commissioned Captains: Dr. John S. Dziob '30, Dr. Henry A. Campbell '32 and Dr. Walter S. Jones '26; chief of anesthesiologists — Dr. Edward G. Damarjian '32, Captain; surgical assistants — Dr. Hubert Holdsworth '36 and Dr. Milton Korb '31, First Lieutenants.

Dr. A. A. Barrows '98 and Dr. Bertram H. Buxton '04 were members of the committee on the preliminary organization of the unit.

A Reunion of Brown Teammates

▶ ▶ TRAINING the American Army the modern way is not unlike the procedure used in turning out championship football teams, Coach Wallace Wade says, '17, Duke University football coach who is now serving as a major in the Army.

"We give special training to the ends, the backs, the guards, tackles, and centres. Then we drill the team on working as a unit, every man doing his work to perfection and at the same time coordinating his effort with that of the other fellow," he said. "That's exactly the plan of training instituted at the Field Artillery Replacement Centre here at Fort Bragg. In the specialist regiment, some men are learning the duties of signalmen, others are studying to be motor or gun mechanics; others are clerks, or cooks, instrument, or radio men. Then there are the regiments of men being taught to serve in gun crews. Each man learns his own job well, and yet knows enough about the other fellow's to work with him efficiently."

Wade's commanding officer when he reported for duty with a signal training unit was Lt. Col. John C. Butner, Jr., '18, a Brown teammate in the first Rose Bowl game in 1916. In the last war they had joined up in the Army together as Cavalrymen, but their outfits were transferred to the Field Artillery. Col. Butner remained with the Regular Army. They had met again after several years, when Col. Butner attended a football game at Duke last fall. The Colonel has retained his interest in the sport, having been officer in charge of athletics in the Third Army, which occupied the area around Coblenz, Germany. After the war he played on numerous Army football teams, according to the PRO at Fort Bragg. ◀ ◀

"Amateur" at Alamein

► THE dateline was "Cairo, July 8" and the byline said "By Theodore A. Morde." It was another story of British exploits in desert tank fighting on the Egyptian front. But this one was different, as the "precede" on the story explained:

"Associated Press war correspondents in the Middle East, thinking they might be getting too professional to please their public, sent to the front Theodore A. Morde, a 30-year-old archaeologist and ethnologist, of New Bedford, Mass., who toured Spain during the civil war and later headed an expedition to Honduras."

That was how Morde, Brown, '39, came to drive up toward El Alamein, encountered Italian prisoners, spent the night with some South African ambulance men, interviewed some of the heroes of the war of the sands. The *New York Herald Tribune*, one of the many AP papers which carried Morde's story, headlined him as an "amateur" but displayed it prominently. ◀

▶ ▶ A QUESTION mark is the eloquent comment that follows the name of a dozen Brown alumni, several of them "missing in action," others interned or unheard from in occupied territory.

On May 12 the family of Lt. (jg) John J. Bookman '35 received a telegram that he was missing and lost in the Manila Bay Area, presumably a prisoner of war. He had been with the Asiatic Fleet, a Naval medical officer.

Lt. Col. Clair M. Conzelman '21, a Coast Artillery officer, was serving in the Philippines at the time of the surrender. Lt. Herbert W. Coone '34, in the Army Medical Corps, was serving on Bataan, May 12. His family received a letter from Lt. Col. Charles H. Morhouse '25, aide-de-camp to Gen. MacArthur, saying that he had seen Lt. Coone shortly before leaving the Philippines. In the same theatre Ensign Alexander A. R. Gorski '38 was reported missing after the capitulation of Manila Bay.

Other war victims in the Philippines were George E. Burnham '07, sugar plantations manager; Henry W. Corp '07, engineer and planter; and Charles H. Whitaker '33, vice-consul, reported interned at Manila, May 21.

▶ REPORTED missing in action since early in February is Harlow E. Johnson '38 of the Royal Canadian Air Force. In October, 1940, he enlisted in the RCAF, went overseas last fall, and was pilot navigator with a night bombing squadron when he set out for an attack on a German objective. His parents, and the Canadian authorities, too, hold out some hope that Johnson may have landed safely and fallen prisoner to the enemy.

Johnson, member of Phi Gamma Delta, entered Brown with '37, but did not receive his A.B. degree until June, 1938. He was studying law at the Law School, University of Virginia, when the war began. He came to college from Jamestown, N. Y., where he was born Oct. 18, 1915, the son of Archie M. and Florence (Engman) Johnson.

Shanghai Banker Milton M. Bates '22, who returned to his National City Bank

post last October, has not been heard from since Dec. 8 and is presumed to be interned. Since filing his last story to the *Providence Journal* from Hong Kong before its siege, Marc T. Greene '03, famous traveler and correspondent, has been able to send no further word of his fate. Also in the Orient is Henry D. Lane '80, whose son was on the faculty of Hokkaido Imperial University at Sapporo, Japan. The Alumni Office is endeavoring to reach him through the International Red Cross.

John Paul Dickson '29, long Berlin representative of the Mutual Broadcasting System, has been allowed by the Nazis to return to Lisbon in order to sail for home under the exchange arrangement between this country and the Axis. Dickson, whose good broadcasts from Germany brought him into disfavor with the officials there before the declaration of war, had been off the air for some time and had spent some time in Gestapo custody on one celebrated occasion. In December, however, he was interned with the other American journalists and broadcasters at Bad Nauheim. In Paris, Dr. Theodore C. Merrill '96 elected to remain after the occupation to continue on the staff of the American Hospital. No word has come from him since Cecil M. P. Cross '15, Secretary of the American Legation, returned about a year ago.

▶ ASIM ZIA JACOVA, a graduate student of Brown in 1928 and 1929, had become an important personage in Albania. Journalist and member of the Parliament in Tirana, he was last in America to direct the tour of King Zog's sisters a few years ago. There has been no news of him since the Italians invaded his country.

A mark of another sort appears beside the name of Charles L. Flick '22, composer and correspondent, whose long residence in Germany indoctrinated him with Nazism to the extent that he has been seen in Paris in German uniform and heard on broadcasts from Shanghai and Berlin attempting propaganda work. He did not attend the 10th reunion of his class in May.

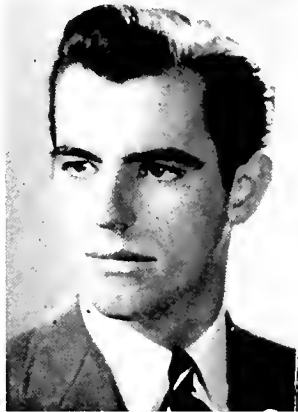

▶ I wish that speech could be read down in Congress," said Quentin Reynolds on Commencement Day, referring to the Senior Oration by Norman Ross '42 at the First Baptist Meeting House.

Senator Theodore Francis Green '87, member of the Brown Board of Fellows, apparently thought so, too. And so he inserted in the *Congressional Record* a copy of Ross's address, "Another Lost Generation?" "I trust," said the Senator, "that we of earlier generations will keep our ears and minds open for messages such as this from the rising generation." (Reynolds had said at the Sayles Hall meeting that "the Congressmen down there are so busy writing X's on their gas ration cards that they haven't time to listen to the voice of young America.")

Alumni of Brown also received printed copies of the Ross address, distributed from the office of the Secretary. The *New York Times* and *Providence Sunday Journal* had also printed it in full.

He Bought 180,000 Books

►► FOR 40 years George B. Utley has tried to live up to his idea of a good librarian—a lover of books who learns how to bring books and readers together. Now, after 22 years as librarian of the famed Newberry Library, Chicago, where he has in truth brought books and readers (from all over the world) together, he's retiring to do some reading, research, and collecting on his own hook. His retirement becomes effective in September.

"Utley has purchased more than 180,000 books in the last 22 years," said the *Chicago Tribune* interviewer, "but has had time to read almost none of them." Utley explained: "I regularly consulted more than 30 weekly and monthly magazines, plus innumerable newspapers. Lately we've been buying about 10,000 books a year, so this left no time to read them. Next fall I intend to start coming to the building as a reader rather than a librarian."

When Utley went to Chicago in 1920 he found that the Newberry Library was better known among scholars in this country and abroad than it was to Chicagoans. So he set about to correct this situation; and his attendance figures in recent years show that he has succeeded. "An increasing number of Chicagoans are using the library each year," said the *Chicago Daily News*, "and are finding it a 'gold mine' of source material, especially in the fields of American history, English and American literature and music." Then, too, the library has a collection of books on printing, built up to a large extent by Utley, which is considered among the best in the United States.

The Utleys will divide their time after September between Chicago and Pleasant Valley, Conn., their summer home. Utley himself will write, do research in American history, and follow his hobby of collecting books and material on Robert Louis Stevenson.

Random House put it out in June (Quent wrote it on a freighter coming home from Europe), and Lewis Gannett of the *New York Herald Tribune* called it "the story of Quentin Reynolds—the whiskey and brandy and vodka that he drank, the poker he played, the carbuncles he suffered, the steaks and the beans he ate, the money he won at roulette in Lisbon; how he lunched and dined with Winston Churchill; how he cursed the Russian censor, and how he didn't get his interview with Stalin" . . . and so on through all Quent's experiences in Russia, Libya, Malta, and points adjacent.

BROWN ALUMNI MONTHLY:

To the best of my knowledge, the BROWN ALUMNI MONTHLY has not recorded the death of Arthur S. Gaylord '02, which occurred June 27, 1939. My recollection is that the Necrology of 1939-40 carried a brief, fairly factual paragraph about him.

Gaylord, who went to Harvard Law School after leaving Brown, became an able lawyer and a helpful citizen. As a member of the law firm of Avery, Gaylord & Davenport, Holyoke, Mass., he made a substantial record in smoothing out financial tangles and in putting companies, small and large, back on their financial feet. He had real aptitude for this kind of work, and he enjoyed it even though the headaches were many and the money returns were not always adequate.

In South Hadley Falls, where he was born July 11, 1879, and in Holyoke, his adopted city, his services as citizens were varied, and quietly given. He belonged to Delta Tau Delta and the Connecticut Valley Brown Club. One of his last public appearances was at a Brown Club meeting in Springfield. He became seriously ill in 1932, when he was still physically strong and active. Mrs. Gaylord, I believe, is living in Holyoke.

Dr. Roland G. D. Richardson, Dean of the Graduate School and administrative head of the work in advanced instruction and research in mechanics, will continue in both capacities this summer. Mathematicians working on war problems include Prof. Clarence R. Adams, Prof. Willy Feller, Prof. Willy Prager and Prof. Jacob D. Tamarkin. Prof. Adams is also completing a project with Professor A. P. Morse of Berkeley, upon which they have been engaged for the last two years. Prof. Otto Neugebauer is giving a specialized war course in map-reading and Prof. Kaj L. Nielson, having completed a study of "Motion of the Spinning Shell" is leaving town to do research work for an aeronautical firm.

E S M D T FOR 450

► **PROF. FREDERICK N. TOMPKINS** of the Engineering Division is directing the Engineering, Science and Management Defense Training Courses with about 450 students.

In the Physics Department Harry E. Farnsworth is working with a group of graduate students on a war research project. Prof. Farnsworth also plans during the summer to complete four research papers, of which three are joint productions with his students. Prof. Robert B. Lindsay, Chairman of the Physics Department, is directing the acoustics study and preparing to read proof on his new elementary physics textbook. Prof. Lindsay delivered a report of Brown's work in acoustics to a symposium on war courses in American colleges, held at Penn State in June.

Prof. Carl W. Miller is doing research in color photography and completing a book on "Principles of Photographic Reproduction" which will appear in August. He is

also teaching a course in war photography with Prof. Smiley of the Astronomy Department. Prof. Sherwood Haynes is instructing at the MIT officers' school.

Two linguists - Prof. Bernard Bloch of the English Department and Dr. Robert A. Hall, Jr., of the Modern Languages Department—are studying languages that the war is bringing into prominence. Dr. Hall is also working on a history of the Italian language. Prof. Bloch, on leave from the University to prepare a grammar of Japanese, plans to return in the Fall to give a course in that language. Hall is similarly studying the variety of pidgin English used in the Melanesian Archipelago, north of Australia.

Prof. Robert P. Casey of the Biblical Literature department has added three courses in Russian to his regular schedule and Leo Pap, of Modern Languages, is teaching a course in Portuguese.

TAXES AND FINANCE

► **PROF. CHELCH C. BOSLAND**, chairman of the Economics department, is planning to study corporate taxation. He is also teaching a course in public finance with emphasis on war finance. Prof. Hugh B. Killough is acting as Special Industrial Consultant for the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and also on the U. S. Labor Supply Commission. He is also teaching defense courses this summer. Prof. William Adams Brown is working on foreign exchange problems of the Economic and Finance Section of the League of Nations, at Princeton, during the summer. He will return to Brown for the second semester. Prof. Brown is now completing work for the U. S. Treasury Department. Prof. Anthony Basch will be teaching at Columbia until August

15 after which he will be engaged in research at the University of California at Berkeley. He is currently engaged on basic economic problems of central and north-central Europe, as related to post-war settlement. Prof. Willard C. Beatty is teaching a course in war accounting.

Prof. Leland M. Goodrich of the Political Science department is teaching a course in "War and National Policy." Professor Detlev Schumann of the Modern Languages department, besides a German course with special war emphasis, is conducting two separate investigations of research problems. Dr. Henry B. Van Hoesen, John Hay Professor of Bibliography and head librarian, is supervising the organization and administration of the new Key Centre of War Information in addition to his regular duties. He is also conducting research into the problem of library cataloging.

Over at Pembroke Prof. Bessie H. Rudd is teaching first aid, recreation and physical fitness classes. Miss Mary L. Finch, social director at Pembroke, is directing U.S.O. work and also the Students' Emergency Committee work at that college. Miss Rudd and Miss Finch are also co-chairmen of the Air Raid Protection Organization.

CHEMISTS IN THE WAR

► In the Chemistry department Prof. Laurence S. Foster, in addition to teaching war courses is doing research on two rare elements, gallium and germanium. Prof. Norris W. Rakestraw, on leave, is busy with research work for the U. S. Navy at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institute. Other members of the staff will also be doing valuable research work and teaching war courses in addition to their regular work.

Prof. Alonzo Quinn, chairman of the Geology department, will be doing research work on "igneous and metamorphic rocks of the Winnepesaukee region" and conducting a search for mineral deposits in the Providence area. According to Professor Quinn the latter project might have definite military value. He is also Chief Air Raid Warden of the University and is teaching a map reading course. Dr. Richard Goldthwait, besides teaching his regular geology courses plus war courses in meteorology, and directing the Fire Protection division of the campus Civilian Defense Organization, will be completing publication of "Development of River Flood Plans in New Hampshire," under the sponsorship of the New Hampshire Highway Department, and conducting research on "Certain Aspects of the Mechanics of Glacier Motion," a project of the Geological Society of America. Dr. David H. Swann expects to be doing a research problem in mapping for the government in connection with the U. S. Geological Survey.

Prof. Israel J. Kapstein, in addition to his English courses, will be devoting time to writing publicity for the Providence Civilian Defense organization. Even in the Classics department research is related to the war. Dr. Charles J. Armstrong is investigating "Ancient Parallels of Modern War Problems."

Prof. Walter S. Hunter, chairman of the Psychology Department, is working for the Emergency Committee in Psychology of the National Research Council. He is also conducting an investigation of problems of learning.
