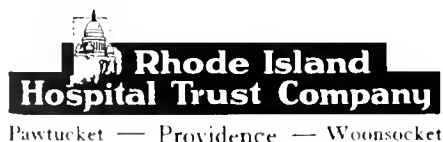

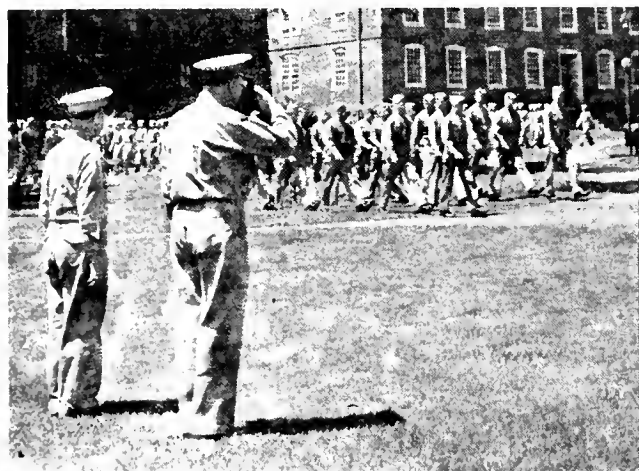

► ► Introducing the New Brown Men

► ► IF YOU HAVE a friend, Joe Blow, who has recently arrived at Brown, and if you wish to write him a letter, you would address it in one of three ways. If he is an Apprentice Seaman on active duty, the envelope might read:

J. D. Blow, A.S., U.S.N.R.
Caswell Hall, Room 37
Brown University
Providence 12, Rhode Island

If he is in the pre-meteorology program of the Army Air Force Technical Training Command, you would use an address like the following:

Pvt. Joseph Blow, Flight 6
Training Detachment
A.A.F.T.T.C. No. 12
Hope College
Brown University
Providence 12, Rhode Island

If he were a civilian student, or possible already in the armed forces but still on inactive service, you might simply write to:

Mr. Joseph Blow

One must know whether the student wears Navy blue, olive drab, or is still in tweeds (or dungarees). Regardless of what this well-dressed college Freshman is wearing, he is a Brown man. He studies in ancient Brunonian halls, saunters (or canters) on the campus walks under the braided branches of the elms, wonders whether or not Professor Blank is going to spring a surprise quiz, thinks about a date



for Saturday night, and sings Brown songs. Uniforms may change the boy's appearance, daily inspections may provide a greater incentive for neatness, military indoctrination may be responsible for the use of more "Sirs," but uniforms do not change personality and character. Joe Blow, at Brown, whether a civilian or in the Army or Navy, is still Joe Blow with all the distinctive markings that make him an individual.

A large Army group arrived late in May, the new civilian students started Freshman Week in late June, and the Navy trainees reported July first. To find room and board for all, and to counsel, examine, and register them was a colossal task for the administration and faculty. The total Navy group numbers over 600, the Army detachment around 400, and the civilians about 350.

About 45% of the Navy trainees had not previously enrolled at Brown and only a dozen of the Army group are former Brown Undergraduates. The Freshman entering as civilians number 156. For the first time since the early days of the University, more than half of the Brown student body is made up of new students. These boys are already learning to like Brown, and to like one another, regardless of their uniforms or titles—an indication of both the adaptability of youth and the strength of Brown traditions. We may also salute the officers of the University and the commanding officers of the Army and Navy units for their efforts in promoting *esprit de corps*.

► WE BELIEVE that Brown's policy on civilian admissions is sound. We are eager to admit as many qualified candidates as our facilities permit. During the past few months we have tried to remember the needs of the boy below dratt age. We also wished to counsel the youth who already was—or was soon to be—eighteen and who would not reach college until the war ended. It was estimated that Brown could

adequately care for around 150 Freshmen. Never before, therefore, was it quite so essential to keep an accurate daily count of prospective Freshmen, but never was it so difficult to determine the exact number who might enter.

Scores of boys applied to Brown, eager to secure their tickets of admission, but fully conscious of the likelihood that they would enter an Army Reception Center before they came through the Van Wickle gates. We issued these admission certificates to those who qualified, and boys have already written from camp expressing their appreciation for the University's interest. We, therefore, have today throughout the States—and soon over the globe—many boys who consider themselves to be Brown men of the future. It will be a happy year when they return from the fronts and climb College Hill.

It is also a University policy to permit any boy who has been accepted for admission to enter, even though his college days may be brief. Boys and school men appreciate this point of view. For sentimental and practical reasons the young man wishes to get started in college. If he does get a start, there is a better chance of his pursuing a college education when the war is over. The eighteen-year-old is also aware that his chances for Officer Candidate School and for the Army Specialized Training Program are somewhat enhanced by his acceptance for admission at a good college and even more so, by his matriculation.

We have already said goodbye to a few of our Freshmen. Two Milwaukee boys entered Brown as civilians and were here only a few hours when Navy V-12 orders caught up with them. Like many others, they expected to be called to active duty in November instead of in July and they, therefore, wished to gain as much college experience as possible before that time. Their orders may have been late but they were definite; one took a train back westward to the University of Wisconsin and the other was sent northward to Dartmouth. A few others—also not in the present count of 156—took their Army induction examinations after entering Brown, passed successfully and then returned to college to gather up their belongings and secure their refunds.

► IT IS RATHER surprising, and very gratifying, that we still have a geographical spread among civilian Freshmen in spite of the war. Naturally, it is not as wide as in peace time, but it is satisfactory. One city that I should mention again is Milwaukee for it is a strong Brown "base." Three schools—Milwaukee Country Day School, Milwaukee University School, and Shorewood High School—have in the past decade sent many a topnotch lad to Brown. One might wonder, therefore, why there is no Brown Club of Milwaukee. The fact is that the great majority of these young men entered during the past ten years, and although most of them have since settled in their home city, they are now serving their country in far-away places. Milwaukee, however, should have a Brown Club with alumni of youthful vigor when victory comes.

Approximately 70% of the civilian Freshmen hail from New England, and 30% from outside New England. Over many years Massachusetts has provided about 20% of the incoming class. "There she stands." Connecticut and New York are the other "steadies" for their percentages seem always to be around 7 and 15 respectively. Freshman classes usually have a third of their number from Rhode Island; in war time the increase is approximately 10%. War always seems to bring about a rise in the number of

Freshmen coming from public schools. Ordinarily at Brown it is a 50-50 proposition—a happy distribution—but now and figures show that about 70% are from public schools and 30% from private schools. Few high school graduates are now able to spend a transitional year in a preparatory school.

Another change brought about by war, and also affecting the school distribution, is the average age of our Freshmen. For many years before the war the average age was between 18 years and 6 months and 18 years and 10 months. Today, however, the average age of the July entrants is 17 years and 8 months. They seem young, but we must remember that war thrusts the responsibilities of manhood upon these lads while they are still in their teens. The boy whose mother still thinks the apron strings are attached, and the father who admonishes his son to take care in putting the car in the garage may soon read of their youngster piloting a Liberator worth a quarter of a million dollars, and being responsible for the lives of his boyish crew. We have great confidence in this younger generation which loves the music of Harry James and hates the policies of Tojo.

Eighteen young men in this July class are sons of Brown alumni. Their fathers are spread from the classes of 1898 to 1925. Four fathers were 1922 and two, 1924. (Makes me feel old.)

There are few changes of note in vocational preferences. It may be a bit significant that until the war about 10% of each Freshman class was headed for law whereas today the percentage is five. I am also wondering what is happening to the teaching profession. Only three civilian Freshmen listed this occupation as their first choice. Medicine, on the other hand, is popular with this class for 17% of the students are pre-meds.

► MY HAT GOES OFF to this civilian group. It is not easy to enter college in 1943 without a uniform. The glamor of youth naturally goes to the Army and Navy, and the civilian student has to be made of strong stuff in order to go to college at 17 and continue his studies seriously while

waiting patiently for Uncle Sam to tap him on the shoulder. This is true, regardless of the comradeship that exists on the campus between the military and civilian students.

Many boys feel that they "must get into it right away." In one college a brilliant boy, deferred in order to complete his scientific training, asked his draft board for immediate induction. He wanted to be in uniform. At Camp Devens, however, he scored so well in the General Classification Test that he was put into intelligence work, and the nature of his duties were such that he was kept in mufti. Disconsolately, he returned to see his friends, but all he could show them was an automatic pistol, a card stating he was a Private, and a pair of glasses (for his pocket, not his eyes) which he could show and say, "4-F," when some nice old lady asked him why he wasn't in the Army.

▶ **ALTHOUGH** the University officers did their best to make the civilian Freshmen comfortable and their orientation rapid, the Freshmen found their new Alma Mater to be a very busy old lady with too many children to feed, house and care for.

All of the fraternities offered their chapter houses to the University and leases are being negotiated. No fraternity was coerced to adopt the University plan, but all were given an opportunity. Alumni know the condition of fraternity houses at the close of a college year and can understand the problems of a University Housekeeper in putting them quickly in readiness for use as dormitories. Alumni can also understand what a Freshman meant when he saw one house before the Housekeeper's department got there first, and remarked, "I know now where the Shadow lives."

Rooms had to be numbered, personal belongings of boys now at war had to be stored, and an inventory had to be taken of each piece of furniture. The age-old question, "what do you do with a drunken sailor?" is easy compared to what do you do to a fraternity house to get it ready in one week to be used as a Freshman dormitory. And there were 16 chapter houses, most of them filled with old notes, records, books, beds, pictures, desks, clothing, golf clubs, skis, and almost anything you can think of, including the kitchen sink—which was usually out of order.

Ten houses are now in use as civilian dormitories, housing 200 undergraduates. They are: Alpha Delta Phi, Beta Theta Pi, Delta Phi, Delta Tau Delta, Lambda Chi Alpha, Phi Delta Theta, Phi Gamma Delta, Phi Kappa Psi, Sigma Nu, and Zeta Psi. Two houses will be used as civilian Dining Halls; they are: Delta Upsilon and Sigma Chi. Four houses, less easily adaptable for use as dormitories, are at present closed, but may be used later for whatever—the University sees fit: Delta Kappa Epsilon, Kappa Sigma, Psi Upsilon, and Theta Delta Chi.

It is the definite aim of the Administration to assist the fraternities during the war period. Alumni organizations, and the few undergraduate chapter members remaining on the campus, are fully aware of the serious situation that college fraternities are facing today, and are grateful for the University's policy. Alumni have been extremely co-operative. The fraternity system at Brown can be saved, but only by far-sighted planning and determined effort. Pledging of new members—civilian or Navy—will be permitted, but during the war the incentives for joining are less powerful than in days of peace. It was expected that many of the Navy transfers to the Brown V-12 program would be members of fraternities having chapters on the campus. Only one such boy was discovered, and thus another hope for the fraternities was smashed.

▶ **ALUMNI** MAY BE interested in a few more details concerning the service groups on the campus. The personnel of the Navy College Training Program, all now designated as V-12, comes from four different sources:

1. V-12. These students have been selected by the Navy for college training only recently. They come mostly from secondary schools and have undergone a rigid succession of screenings—mental tests, physical examinations, interviews, etc. A few have previously been on active duty and in combat with the fleet.

2. V-1. These students come almost entirely from junior and senior colleges; many are from civilian ranks at Brown. They joined the Navy as Freshmen or Sophomores before last March and were kept on inactive duty until their recent orders placed them at Brown in uniform and under military discipline.

3. V-7. These students joined the Navy as Juniors or Seniors, but, except for this difference, they have been and are now in exactly the same position as those who were in V-1. They should, of course, be an advanced academic group, and should soon have their commissions. Quite a number of these have been undergraduate civilians at Brown.

4. Naval ROTC. Brown is one of 27 American colleges and universities having Naval Reserve Officers' Training units. The Brown unit was started in 1940, and all of the

200 students now enrolled in it are regular Brown undergraduates.

The newcomers in the Navy College Training Program number about half the total V-12 enrollment. Forty colleges are represented, and the sailors come from 14 states, mostly New England, Middle Atlantic and Middle West. Seven of the Navy group are sons of alumni and several more have brothers and uncles who are Brown men. These legacies were happy when their Navy orders read "Brown."

The Navy eats in Faunce House Dining Rooms, they attend classes with civilians, they may participate in extra-scholastic activities such as the *Brown Herald*, Sock and Buskin, fraternities and athletics. Their day is a busy one for the program of studies is rigorous. Reveille comes at 0600, breakfast at 0700, classes, labs, or study hours most of the morning and early afternoon, physical training, recreation and athletics from 1630 to 1830, dinner at 1835, and lights out at 2230. (Incidentally, the entire University is now operating on a 24-hour clock, and many of us are still subtracting 12 from the afternoon and evening hours in order to find out what time it is.)

It would be redundant to say that the V-12 students have made a good impression on the campus. Indeed we cannot imagine College Hill without Navy uniforms, since before Pearl Harbor we have had a Department of Naval Science. The Commanding Officer is Captain Henry M. Briggs, USN, and to him and Dean William K. Selden, the liaison officer between the administration and the naval unit, go much of the credit for the smoothness with which the V-12 program got under way.

Other newcomers at the University are in the Army Air Force. (The so-called B unit began its studies last winter and will remain at Brown until September.) The C unit arrived in late May and is now singing Brown songs with the same gusto with which it sings and marches to the Army Air Force Song. This unit will be here for a 12-month program. The C unit soldiers come from 69 different colleges, and although each will debate with his roommates about the merits of his own institution, all agree that at least Brown is second best. The war does encourage a blending of loyalties. Three privates were housed together by accident, one from Harvard, one from Yale, and one from Princeton. No casualties are yet reported. Major Arthur B. Campbell, the Commanding Officer, and Professor Gilbert E. Case '25, liaison officer for the University, have our hearty praise for a splendid job of administration.

► BROWN MEN come and go, in peace and in war. The college on the Hill may have a different complexion. There is more Navy blue and Army khaki than ever before. There is more excitement—and yes, many more problems. Nevertheless, it is still the old college which has lived through every war in our nation's history and it is still a place where boys "work and play, get tired and rest, lay plans and dream of years to come." ◀ ◀

A Wriston Sampler ◀

An excerpt from President Wriston's new book, "Challenge to Freedom", due on the book stalls July 29. (Harper & Brothers, \$2.)

► ► THE MOMENT HAS COME for a great resurgence of faith in democracy and in its essential instrument, public opinion. Democracy is so vital that the ideal flourishes in very barren soil. Let us take two examples.

Russia could not become a democracy in one swift step from Czarism. The Russians could not compress into twenty years the long experience of the Anglo-Saxons from Magna Charta to Abraham Lincoln. But when the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics drew a new constitution, Stalin proudly boasted that it was "the only consistently democratic constitution in the world." We concentrated our attention upon the fact that its democratic principles were not put into full operation, overlooking the endorsement of democracy by the most successful totalitarian in the world. Whatever his practices, he recognized democracy as the ultimate ideal of government—a rare tribute, indeed.

No one who knows anything of modern China would think of calling it a mature democracy, but all report that the people are yearning for democracy; that is their ideal. T. V. Soong, China's Minister for Foreign Affairs, put the matter explicitly: "No Chinese patriot, however blinded by his devotion, will claim that China has fully realized her own democratic faith. . . . We had to try to develop in a few years from a medieval empire to a modern democracy against incessant intrigue and finally military attack of a Japan who wanted no democracy in Asia. But for all our mistakes and difficulties our democracy made us a unified nation."

Asked how his people could progress to the goal, Dr. Soong said: "If I could sum it up in a sentence I would say that what they want . . . is a revolutionary faith on your part—revolutionary faith in yourselves and in the possibilities of democracy and your democratic allies—faith enough to let yourselves and the other principal United Nations start now—realistically—to build the kind of democratic world that can stay democratic after this conflict is over."

Surely it is a paradox that the United States, which has most nearly achieved the democratic goal, appears the most discouraged about it. Should not Americans, to whom the institutions are available, have as much faith in their ideal as the Russians or the Chinese or our other distant Allies to whom the rich fruits of democracy are still unattainable?

► THE TIME IS RIPE for resurgence of faith in public opinion. The world is sick of the brutalities of power politics. The people are weary of the arrogance of bureaucracy. They are tired to death of the multiplication of pronouncements and orders and the confusions of documents and reports. The moment has come to reverse that trend, which has been bipartisan but foolish. The need is to recover our faith in the power of reason and in the ultimate significance of the individual.

The moment is not only opportune; there is no time to lose. For now we are fighting and the war cannot be won upon defeatist assumptions. If we cannot produce, we cannot win. If democracy will not work, victory is sterile. If individualism is dead, then courage is nothing but an excess of adrenalin in the blood stream, nothing but a physical

fact, and of no spiritual significance. If individualism is invalid, then life is really no more than meat, nor the body than raiment, and we had best yield up the struggle at once. But if we are going to win this war and the peace that follows, the defeatist trend of twenty years must be reversed.

We must go back to certain great, simple alternatives and make a conscious choice. Issues long evaded now come into sharp focus. The time is past for foggy methods of compromise; we have before us the fateful choice of life or death. This war is a war between reason and authority. It was almost lost by default, so that in France—that France which once was so close to us, that France which meant so much in the foundation and early life of this nation—reason was sold down the river for authority by the men of Vichy, with tragic consequences.

This war is a war between individualism and statism. It is a war between the American dream on the one hand and Hitler's system on the other. Statism makes the citizen a slave; individualism makes the state the servant of the citizen. It is a war between the ideal of justice and the ideal of force; however imperfectly we attain justice, that is, at least, our purpose. This is a war, to put it in a single phrase, between freedom and slavery.

Already there are evidences that the ineluctable quality of that alternative is grasped by the public mind. The law

to draft eighteen-year-olds was passed by sweeping majorities. The real decision was reached by the people before it was reached by either the President or the Congress, which is as it should be. It was a triumph of the common sense of the man in the street and not a triumph of authority—something Adolf Hitler will never be able to understand.

The right decision was made, but let us stop for a moment and ask who makes this demand upon youth. It lays an obligation unprecedented in our history. They are to go into the front lines. It was said with much candor by the Secretary of War and the Chief of Staff that the young men would be the combat troops because they have the necessary resiliency.

A GENERATION OF DOUBT

► **THE GENERATION** who makes this unique demand is the same one that has talked incessantly about security, safety first, isolation—all the gestures which look to escape from risk. It is a generation that accepted bureaucratic stagnation rather than endure the hazards of freedom. It is a generation that sought to run away from its responsibility; it defaulted its gold contract and cut the dollar; not content with that, it saddled its extravagances upon the future by piling debt upon debt until men began to doubt they would ever be paid. It is a generation who declared that never again would the blood of American boys be shed upon foreign soil, and now we have scattered expeditionary forces over the face of this globe in a number and on a scale that would have passed the imagination of mankind ten years ago.

It is a generation doubtful of its own children. It was fearful of their competition; it sought to keep them off the labor market, passing laws to deny them economic experience, accepting limitations upon apprenticeship imposed by private groups, erecting barriers to the trades and professions in ever-increasing number and ever-growing height, all in the name of "security." Then it asked the schools to establish courses in vocational guidance—a poor synthetic substitute for the only valid economic education there is, the life of experience.

Wholly inconsistent, though fearful of its children's competition, this generation showed itself doubtful of their capacity. It has made the work of the primary and the secondary schools easier and easier. It has gone so far that 150 school systems of America have prohibited the grade of failure because the children "cannot take it."

It is a generation doubtful of its children's courage. Among my possessions is a letter from a prominent newspaper editor asking me to prepare an article explaining why the youth of this generation did not believe in anything enough to fight for it! Is it because we have bred "soft" young men that they prefer the air forces and the Marine Corps; doubtless those are the places that put safety first!

Briefly, this has been a generation doubtful of its destiny, defeatist in its economics, escapist in its politics, sentimental in its humanitarianism. Now it asks eighteen-year-olds to accept the responsibilities it has shuffled off, to accept risk when it has talked security. Of course, this has to be done, but as we ask our children to take the supreme risk, surely we cannot do less than accept the hazard attendant upon freedom and stop babbling endlessly about security. In short, the consequence of defeatism and its attendant demand for escape into security is always to transfer the risk to the next generation, which fights the wars brought on by the sins of its elders. The new program should be framed in the light of that realization.

His Italian Prisoners at Atterbury

►► LT. COL. J. LINDLEY GAMMELL '16, commanding officer of the 1537th Service Unit, "which guards and administers the Internment Camp", was pictured in the June 25 issue of *The Camp Crier* of Camp Atterbury, Ind. The same issue published a photo of several hundred Italian prisoners of war attending outdoor mass, celebrated by Bishop John O'Hara, vicar ordinariate for Army and Navy Chaplains. He "expressed complete satisfaction with the prisoner of war setup in Atterbury."

The Colonel's biographer in *The Camp Crier* described him as a veteran field artillery officer of the Regular Army who was awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action in World War I, during which he took part in four major engagements. "Col. Gammell came here from Ohio State University where he was on the ROTC staff as professor of military science. He is a graduate of Brown University, the School of Fire at Ft. Sill, and the Command and General Staff School at Ft. Leavenworth. He also attended Oxford University in England, and was a newspaperman and football official for many years. For a time during the last war he served with the French army."

Reunion in Baton Rouge

▶ ▶ "WHEN clippings about the unusual reunion of seven Brown men in Africa reached us here, we were reminded of our own larger Southern reunion," Pfc. Leonard S. Sutton '44 from Baton Rouge wrote early this month. "Sixteen former Brunonians from far-flung Army posts met once again at another collegiate crossroads at Louisiana State University.

"The entire group swarmed into Baton Rouge June 29 to celebrate our meeting. Before long we had cornered the tables and, as we had done so many times in the past, renewed our memories of all that had gone by and looked forward to the days to come. It wasn't long before the strains of 'We Are Ever True to Brown' were ringing through the city and turning the heads of passers-by.

"The majority of the fellows are stationed at the Army Administration School Enlisted Branch No. 4, which has been set up at the University. Their program of study is devoted to instruction in the administrative and technical duties of a specialized clerk. Upon graduation the men will be assigned to larger headquarters units for personnel or orderly room work. The men include: Louis V. Jackvony, Jr., '44, Robert O. Case '44, Wm. Austin McCabe '43; Abraham Ehrenhaus, Thomas M. Walker, James J. Tyrell, Milton Machlin, Robert G. Kerr, and John A. Maloney, who entered in September '41; Robert J. A. Thacker and William J. Alpern, who came to Brown in '42.

"The remainder of the group, numbering five Brunonians, were recently graduated from Arkansas State College as administrative and technical clerks. Having earned the rating 'commando typists', we were sent to L. S. U. to await advanced classification in the Army Specialized Training Program. After assignment we will be transferred to other colleges to study specialized fields: engineering, languages, medicine."

The group has already been dispersed, we learn from other sources. ◀ ◀

▶ ▶ Who Is That Nazi?

▶ ▶ WHO is this Charles Flick-Steger?

The question is asked each time he is mentioned in the American magazines and newspapers, usually as a "graduate" of Brown University and always as a turncoat American serving the Nazis. The latest reference was in Louis P. Lochner's article, "Eight American Traitors," in *Look*, which was accompanied by a photograph of the fellow and this caption, "Composer, writer, Brown University graduate, now a German citizen and Nazi party member, he masterminds in China."

Lochner, describing the unbelievable experience of being in Paris in 1940 as the guest of the German — not the French — army on Bastille Day, wrote:

"As if to add to the unreality of it all, I encountered a man whom I had always considered an American. In the fashionable Hotel Scribe in downtown Paris I saw Charles Flick-Steger in the uniform of a German second lieutenant. He was clicking heels, vociferously shouting, 'Heil Hitler,' to the German officers who acted as our guides. He is now in charge of Axis propaganda in Japan-controlled China, probably working from Shanghai.

"I had met Charlie early in 1936 when he was dividing his time between composing music and writing feature stories for an American syndicate. He acquainted me with his opera 'Leo and Editra' which had just had its premier in Krefeld in the Rhineland.

"Apparently his musical genius did not impress itself favorably upon the Nazis. But they seemed to believe that this ingratiating intellectual, who once lived in Saylesville, R. I., and attended Brown University, might make a good radio propagandist. So he was accepted into the Nazi party, given an officer's commission, and admitted to full German citizenship prob-

ably about the time war began. When we met him in Paris he was doing so-called eye witness broadcasts from the German front."

▶ ACTUALLY, this "graduate" was at Brown for one year, as an infantry private in the S.A.T.C., a special student in 1918-1919. Born in Saylesville, R. I., and named Charles L. Flick, he was a graduate of Pawtucket High School. He went to Europe soon after the war, studied at the Berlin State Academy of Music in the master class from 1921 to 1924, and previously at the Vienna State Academy of Music in 1920. He had studied, too, in Boston, Brussels, and Munich.

Biographical sketches in various musical publications speak of him as composer of lieder, concert songs, compositions for violin and piano, a symphonic poem, a violin concerto, a string trio, two operas, an operetta (produced in Holland in 1924), arias, ballads, etc. An NBC broadcast for July 4, 1938 included a concert performed by the Bad Orb Symphony Orchestra in Bad Orb

with him as conductor. This was part of the "official White House program", carried coast to coast in this country, and including a new composition by Flick, "the inspiration for which came to him during a visit to Independence Hall in Philadelphia in 1936." In that year a new opera of his was broadcast over American radio stations from Germany.

Flick was Berlin correspondent of Universal Service beginning in 1930. Quentin Reynolds '24, in Berlin during some of that same period for the UP, says he was glad he never knew Flick had ever had anything to do with Brown. A writer in the *Saturday Evening Post* also said Flick was the most disagreeable Nazi he ever knew, which is quite an accolade. Flick married Aline Sanden in 1925, presumably a German. When he became a Nazi citizen and party member, the German propaganda mill made a fuss over him as the first American to renounce his citizenship and turn German.

Some months after the German occupation of France, Flick popped up in the Orient. *Newsweek* wrote on Feb. 17, 1942: "As yet unpublishized has been the recent use of Shanghai as a proving ground for German radio propaganda. The Nazis have inaugurated there a program in English called 'Mack and Bill', modelled after the Berlin programs of 'Fritz and Fred', 'Jimmy and Johnny', etc. First broadcast over a neutral station, it has since been shifted to the German station there. Participants in 'Mack and Bill' are Charles G. Flick, a former Rhode Islander, and a New York Chinese-American named Herbert Moy." Again on March 17, *Newsweek* "unmasked" him in a roundup of individuals who figure on Nazi or Fascist broadcasts aimed at the American listening public.

The second half of the hyphenated name Flick-Steger now employs in his mother's family name. His brother, a good Brown man and loyal American, served overseas with the AEF in the first World War, rising from Private to 2nd Lt. in the Field Artillery. Divisional manager for International Business Machine in Providence, New Haven, and latterly in St. Louis, he returned to active service in the United States Army with a commission as Major this year. ◀ ◀

In the Mail**Those Fund Pleas**

communications to an alumnus who intends to make a contribution. He can save us all that solicitation very simply. The point is that the Fund Office does not know of a man's intention to make a gift, if he does not tell anyone of that intention. In the case in question, we did not know that he was going to contribute until June 26, a week before the end of the campaign.

"The very first request for a contribution which he received was accompanied by a reply envelope, postage postpaid, in which he could easily have indicated his intention to contribute if he did not wish to send his gift at once. With his intention thus recorded, he would not have been solicited further. Many alumni like a reminder of a pledge at a date they indicate; such reminders are sent, of course. The campaign expense would be appreciably reduced if each contributor sent his gift early or made a pledge early. We recommend that thought to your correspondent.

"He was loyal enough not only to send his gift and also to show his interest in our campaign methods. We are very grateful to him. It was such loyalty that made the 1943 the extraordinary success it was.

"Incidentally, the Fund spent 45 cents—
not 75 or a dollar—in getting the contribution of this good Brown man. It included all expenses, not just the mailings. A prompt response would have saved nearly a quarter."

The "Central" Brown Men A Plaint and a Reply

Dear Sir:

I have nothing against the five gentlemen from Ohio whose names appeared on the Alumni ballot as candidates for Vice-President or Director from the Central Region. But this region is also supposed to include—according to the information on that ballot—the States of Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, Michigan, Indiana, Wisconsin, Illinois, Minnesota, Iowa, Missouri, Arkansas, Louisiana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, and Texas.

What about the balance of these States being represented? It is too bad such a large territory should be represented only by Ohio. There are too many from one small section.

I recommend that the Central Region be split three ways—East, West, and South.

► EDITOR'S NOTE: "Alumnus" is really six different gentlemen from Chicago, and the letter is a composite of their several comments as written on their ballots. Their criticism of the slate suggests that it would be helpful to explain the procedure of nominating regional officers in the Associated Alumni.

The quotes are from the By-Laws of the Associated Alumni (Article V, Section 2): "Prior to February of each year in which officers and Directors are to be elected, the Executive Committee, acting as a Nominating Committee, shall recommend to the Advisory Council candidates for nomination as follows . . . (c) At least two candidates for the office of each Regional Vice-President and for each Regional Director, unless the committee by unanimous vote recommends only one candidate in any

particular case. Such candidates shall be nominated from among those recommended to the Executive Committee by the Brown Clubs of the respective regions (the italics are ours) prior to the meeting of the Executive Committee at which the nominations are to be made, provided that if less than two such recommendations are made for each Vice-President and Director, the committee may make its own nominations.

"A plurality vote of the committee present at a meeting called for that purpose shall constitute a recommended nomination. Except in the cases of the Regional Vice-Presidents and Regional Directors, other nominations may be made from the floor at a meeting of the Advisory Council."

This year, as usual, the nominations for regional officers were solicited from the officers of all the Brown Clubs. In the Central Region no nominations were received except from Brown Clubs in Ohio. Since the autonomy of the regions is specified in this regard, and there were a sufficient number of Directors nominated, the Executive Committee could not name additional candidates, even for greater representation among other States in the region. In the case of the Vice-Presidential slate, the Executive Committee did not exercise its privilege of nominating a second candidate and by unanimous vote recommended only one candidate, the one whose nomination had been received. The latter procedure is

also in accord with the By-Laws, as noted above.

We suggest that the alumni who have a desire for wider geographical representation among regional candidates make sure that their clubs present nominations when those are solicited.

As for the increase in the number of regions, to permit the formation of three regions from the present territory of the Central Region, this should be sought through an amendment of the By-Laws.

Another means of spreading representation throughout the regions is provided in the following opportunity given to the Regional Vice-President: "He may in his discretion call an annual Conference of these Clubs or their officers (in his region) to consider ways and means of increasing the effectiveness of the organization and work of the Association in his District. He shall have power to appoint a Regional Secretary or other Regional Officers to assist him." The Associated Alumni had studied this extension of regional activity and had hoped to proceed with a series of regional conferences about the time America entered the war. Nothing further has yet been done about such a program. Under present travel restrictions, it is perhaps undesirable to act further. Perhaps, on the other hand, the appointment of additional regional officers becomes correspondingly important.

From the autumn of 1892 to the year 1926, Edward N. Robinson of the Class of 1896 was very closely identified with athletics at Brown University.

First, as an active undergraduate player in baseball and football, then, later, for a period of nearly 25 years, as head coach of the football team.

He never had available at his command a squad of more than 30, oftentimes, less, but year after year he turned out football teams playing very difficult schedules; and, unquestionably, over that time, year in and year out, he was the leading football coach among the smaller colleges of the country.

Recently, a group of Brown Alumni have secured a collection of books relating to athletics. Formerly, they belonged to the Boston Athletic Association and several other clubs and institutions; and, as Edward N. Robinson's efforts in behalf of athletics at Brown have never been suitably recognized, his friends desire to establish an athletic library to be named the Edward N. Robinson Collection of Books Relating to Athletics. Several hundred volumes will be available immediately, together with a modest sum with which to endow the gift.

However, the Alumni, generally, are requested to add to this collection anything in the form of books about athletics, which would be of interest, and they will be received with thanks. Among the items suggested are the following:

Old football and baseball rules; old football and baseball programs; pictures of some of the football and baseball groups, say previous to 1910 (identify them, if possible); and any other literature or material concerning athletics at Brown or elsewhere.

In closing this letter, the writer feels that our efforts may be of special interest to Brown Alumni who were in college from 1892 to at least 1930; and that the true memorial to Edward N. Robinson rests in the hearts and minds of the alumni who were fortunate enough to be associated with him and thus taught by him courage, fair-play, the meaning of discipline and the will to work with others.

She Bears His Name

► ONE of the growing fleet of Liberty ships launched in Maine shipyards is the John Holmes, named after John Holmes of the Class of 1796, one of Maine's first two United States Senators. Holmes, lawyer in Alfred, served in both branches of the Massachusetts Legislature and in the national House of Representatives as a Massachusetts man. After Maine was separated from Massachusetts he went to the Senate from Alfred for one whole term and part of a second term. As an American commissioner he helped divide the islands in Passamaquoddy Bay with New Brunswick, and was United States District Attorney when he died one hundred years ago this month, July 7, 1843. ◀

▶ ▶ ACCESS of three new members to the Brown University Athletic Council July 1 saw the attendant retirement of three others, including Chairman Clinton C. White '00, who "has been through every phase of athletic development in Brown and in addition has figured in a number of major projects in Brown athletics."

Writing of Mr. White's retirement as a Corporation member of the Council, Joe Nutter '24 in the *Providence Evening Bulletin* pointed out that he had been manager of varsity baseball as an undergraduate in an era where a manager's responsibilities were heavy. He made the schedule, planned the trips, and carrying much of the load today borne by coach or graduate manager of athletics. His most notable achievement, perhaps, was in heading the stadium committee which financed and built Brown Field.

The three-year term on the Council

which he has just completed was a lively one. On the agenda during that time were such events as the departure of an entire football coaching staff, the assembling of a new, the illness and later departure of the athletic director, the appointment of two acting directors, the onrush of the war with increasing restrictions on travel for players and spectators, schedule complications, summer terms, and military service. Even physical fitness programs and war gardens have entered the picture.

Mr. White left office with the praise of his colleagues and other followers of Brown athletics sweet on his ears. ► ► These Are Obstacles

► ► A COUPLE of months ago we ran as our cover a photo of some of the Brown students going over one of the obstacles in the "commando course" now set up on the lower campus, once known as Lincoln Field. We've been asked of what it consisted.

There are two courses, really, the other one indoors in the Lyman Gym, and occasionally the two are combined for an extra special workout. The indoor course is no gentle warm-up: It starts out with a 20-foot rope climb, is followed by 75 feet of tumbling on mats, an indoor adaption of the standard culvert through which the student has to crawl, a stair climb, and two laps on the gym's indoor track. Then, the boys perform a handwalk on parallel bars, take 10 strokes on the rowing machines, chin themselves several times, and romp another lap of the track before a hand-swing the length of a 100-foot ladder suspended from the ceiling. Five minutes is the minimum allowed.

Outdoors two laps of the field start proceedings. Then comes the hand-over-hand travel-bank, a frame ladder for hand-and-foot climbing, and a balance-beam. Up the embankment on a log-run, around the bewildered statue of Marcus Aurelius, and down another flight of log steps. The last stretch includes a seven-foot scaling wall, a five-foot vaulting fence, and through a three-lane culvert, which teaches the boy to stay down. Twice around is the course, and Chief Specialist Charles P. Catanese, USN, head of the physical fitness program at the University, varies it by having the students carry an occasional pack or pipe-gun. All the coaches have been assisting, and there is real coaching on style and technique.

Physical fitness of the Brown undergraduate, which improved 30% through the winter, continues to improve. Small wonder.

Where Private Schools Are Strong

► ► PRIVATE schools are a vital force for this country, the Very Rev. J. Hugh Diman, O.S.B., recently told a *New York World-Telegram* interviewer. Their chief advantage, he pointed out, "is the liberty they enjoy owing to their freedom from State control and, in such case, independence from the slightest touch of political influence. This freedom permits them to draw upon all the educational forces, spiritual, intellectual and material that help to mold complete manhood."

Their great weakness, he went on, "is that they have to depend upon his tuition charges for support. . . . But I have never ceased to hope that they might become schools for the rank and file of our people, with a fair sprinkling of the definitely rich and definitely poor on either side of this general average. This I am sure would be the best thing that could happen to American education."

Father Diman, graduate of Brown in '85, knows whereof he speaks. He was founder and headmaster of St. George's School, Middletown, and founder and headmaster of Portsmouth Priory School, of which he is now headmaster emeritus. An old St. George's boy said not long ago that he considered Fr. Diman one of the truly great headmasters of all time in this country.
