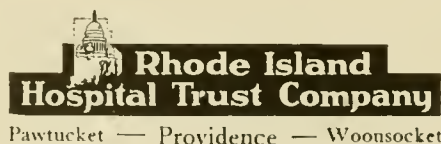

► ► Tho' Commencements Come in Threes

► ► OFTEN as Commencements come these days, there is nothing perfunctory about them. A new, appropriate drama replaces the old.

So it was with the Commencement of Feb. 27 when 92 Brunonians received their degrees in the First Baptist Meeting House in "exercises made sharply severe to the eye by military uniforms and sombre to the mind by the tone of the single address."

What would normally have been two separate ceremonies—the Baccalaureate Service and Graduation—were combined in one Sunday afternoon. Nor was graduation the sole concern of the weekend. It also included: the Senior dinner, the Advisory Council of the Associated Alumni, the commissioning of a flock of new Ensigns, the President's Reception, Freshman "Week", the arrival of Navy V-12 replacements, and the start of the new semester.

► BUT IT WAS a deeply impressive Commencement for all that. Thirty-four Brown men were present to receive their baccalaureate diplomas, while 12 degrees were awarded in absentia. Eighty-three men, including 64 who had not yet completed their undergraduate work, wore the uniforms of Naval Ensigns and stood at one point during the ceremony to hear word of their orders from Capt. Henry M. Briggs, USN, commanding the Naval unit at Brown. The non-graduate officers, together with 51 others ordered to Midshipmen's School to complete their studies, received certificates of their work at Brown. Also cited were 130 former members of the Class of 1944 who left college to enter the armed services; they, too, receive certificates "in recognition of academic achievement and patriotic devotion."

As always, it was a closely guarded secret whether the Board of Fellows had voted to confer honorary degrees on this occasion, and to whom. The large congregation was accordingly thrilled to hear two citations and watch the conferring of the honorary degrees of Doctor of Laws upon Lt. Gen. Alexander A. Vandegrift, commandant of the U. S. Marine Corps, and Winthrop W. Aldrich, president of the National War Fund, Inc., and chairman of the board of directors of the Chase National Bank.

The citations for honorary degrees were the following:

WINTHROP WILLIAMS ALDRICH LL.D.

"In the establishment of the National War Fund you were called upon to create a new philanthropic agency of unexpended proportions. It demanded the tact and firmness, the judicious temper and moral courage, the persistence and industry which effective participation in large affairs had developed. It required that massive integrity which had given you national influence in the restoration of public confidence in our banking system. It utilized to the full the humanitarian impulses you have so often exhibited in the management of hospitals, educational foundations, and international instrumentalities of good will. So great a task summoned all those reserves of energy and inspiration which constitute leadership. By the expenditure of time and effort without stint, by success in shaping policy, building an organization, harmonizing agencies, and uniting

the far flung communities of America, you have earned grateful recognition."

ALEXANDER ARCHER VANDEGRIFT LL.D.

"Some must have the boldness to choose professions with no apparent future, so that capable leadership may be available when the unexpected happens and the predictions of men, accounted wise, are proved wrong. Thus when the war to end war was won, and we were promised a lasting peace, you remained faithful to your appointed task, expecting little gratitude, and getting, perhaps, even less than you anticipated. Through long years of self-discipline you matured steadfastness of purpose, strength of character, clarity of mind, efficiency in action, and both eloquence and economy in expression. Then, when statesmanship failed and a terrible crisis came, the patience, courage, and fortitude so long nourished in obscurity shone like beacons in a dark hour of our history. For your distinguished achievements, which exemplify the finest qualities of the service you adorn, we delight to honor you."

► "WHAT STILL is needed is an appeal to God for spiritual resources to meet the demand of the hour, for reinforcement of the mind and heart and for refreshment of the reservoirs of courage and faith and love," President Wriston told the graduates in his inspiring baccalaureate address.

Quoting St. Paul's promise that "we are the children . . . and heirs of God," the President said: "If we enter upon that inheritance I hope you will feel moments of triumph and exaltation." The experience of Jesus in his last week on earth "is of a piece with the history of the world" and others at every ethical level have had the same experience of triumph followed by complete defeat and disaster. We have today, he said, "a sense that victory is not far away

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but we also have grave doubts that it will bring blessings. The closer victory comes, the more some dread its coming, fearing that triumph over the enemy will be the prelude to quarrels among the Allies."

But religion is not "an opiate" nor "an escape mechanism." It is a fortifying for adversity. "Christ did not dodge the questions of pain, sorrow, and suffering, nor the agony of fear or loneliness. Before they came with swords and which had appeared to fail him, overcame the principle of staves. He had won His battle. The principle of love, fear. His triumph was in achieving mastery of His own life and spirit. He would not escape the tribulations; but he escaped from the fear of them." He could have saved His life, "but it would have been lost for all time to mankind, and we should not gather to rejoice in His triumph and to seek victory in our own lives. The method of achieving triumph still must be the same." The inspiration of Christ, deriving from the season whose anniversary is approaching, will be with us in the tribulations of the world. "The best we can leave with you as you leave us is that you will be able to say with Him in all truth, 'I have overcome the world.'"

Sons of five Brown men were among the February graduates: John H. Pattee, son of Harry E. Pattee '06 of West Barrington; Russell T. White, son of Norman E. White '27 of Cranston; Robert B. Scott, son of Harold D. Scott '16 of Granville, N. Y.; Raymond L. Smith, Jr., son of Raymond L. Smith '14 of Pelham Manor, N. Y.; and Howard W. Young, son of George H. Young '23. Pattee and White, members of the Naval unit at Brown, were on hand to receive their degrees. The others received theirs in absentia: Scott and Young are Marines, Smith in the Army. ▶ FIVE ADVANCED degrees were awarded to candidates from the Graduate School, presented by Dean R. G. D. Richardson. Dean Morriss of Pembroke presented 40 candidates for A.B., who had exercised their prerogative of marching down the hill in spite of the threatening weather.

The complete procession formed in the basement of the Meeting House instead of on the campus, but the traditional elements were all present. Deputy Sheriff John J. McNealy, wearing top hat, full dress and a blue band for his sword, led the march into the church. E. Tudor Gross '01 was Chief Marshal, with Frederick A. Ballou '16, chief of staff, and J. Cunliffe Bullock '02 and Kent F. Matteson '28, aides. They were followed by President Wriston and Chaplain Washburn; Prof. Leighton T. Bohl '13, mace-bearer; Chancellor Henry D. Sharpe '94, Governor J. Howard McGrath, Acting Mayor William A. Cahir, a member of the Brown Corporation, marshaled by Prof. Charles A. Robinson and Prof. Charles H. Smiley.

Dr. Wriston's address, two prayers by the Chaplain, the singing of "The Star Spangled Banner" and Henry R. Palmer's Commencement hymn, "Mother Dear, Brunonia," and the awards of degrees and certificates constituted the entire program.

▶ AFTER DELIVERING his address, President Wriston seated himself in the historic Manning Chair and gave the diploma to each graduate. A spur-of-the-moment impulse added a moving touch to the drama of the afternoon when Dean Samuel T. Arnold '13 presented his son and namesake his certificate. Instead of giving young Arnold his certificate, the President handed the document to the father, who thus honored his own boy. Similarly, when Henry D. Sharpe, Jr., reached the platform, his certificate was carried down to the front row of the church, where the Chancellor put

the book in his son's hand. Both Arnold and Sharpe were commissioned from the ROTC unit before they had completed their academic work at Brown.

Candidates for honorary degrees were presented by Prof. Herbert N. Couch, while the hoods were conferred by Prof. William T. Hastings, Secretary of the Faculty. Although Mr. Aldrich's hood was placed over his head, as is customary, the Marine General received his draped over his arm, since other regalia may not cover the military uniform.

General Vandegrift, incidentally, made a particular hit with all at the Commencement. He brought no aide with him and made it a point to chat with all the Marines he saw, either at the hotel downtown or at the reception in Faunce House's new Gallery Lounge after the graduation. The reception was one of the best attended in some time, with graduates, their families, alumni, and others of the University community paying their respects to Mr. and Mrs. Wriston and Mr. and Mrs. Adams, in the receiving line.

The Senior Dinner, held in the Pine Room of Faunce House Feb. 24, was enlarged to include all the V-12 men who were leaving Brown at the end of the semester to take up new Navy duties elsewhere. With Dr. Bruce M. Bigelow as toastmaster, the speakers included: President Wriston, Chancellor Sharpe, Dean Arnold, Capt. Briggs, Chesley Worthington for the Associated Alumni, and Seniors Philip Teschner and George Kanouse. Joseph McManus presented certificates to the Senior letter-men on behalf of the Athletic Council. "Anchors Aweigh" takes on deeper significance when you hear it sung under such auspices.

"People were very prone to say before this war that youngsters of the present generation were soft and wouldn't live up to the things we thought they should do," Gen. Vandegrift said in an interview in Providence. "I feel very definitely that the war in Africa, Italy, the south and southwest Pacific, and in the air over Europe has shown that Americans are not soft and that they do not lack the will to win. Moreover, it is coupled with a readiness to die if it is necessary to die to win."

Housing at Brown ◀

The Advisory Council Approved Plans in the Course of a Substantial Meeting

▶▶ WITH ONLY A scattering of dissent, the Advisory Council of the Associated Alumni voted on Feb. 26 an expression of "confidence in the University's plans for better housing." The vote put the cap on a revealing discussion of the Corporation's proposal with regard to fraternity houses, in the course of which President Wriston told the alumni representatives that the University was considering plans for a fraternity quadrangle as one phase of a post-war program for the housing of Brown students on a "distinguished and attractive" plane.

As the BROWN ALUMNI MONTHLY went to press on March 11, seven of the fraternities on the Hill had voted to offer their chapter houses to the University in accordance with the Corporation proposal. One had rejected it. The seven acceptances of the proposal came from Alpha Delta Phi, Beta Theta Pi, Delta Tau Delta, Delta Upsilon, Kappa Sigma, Phi Kappa Psi, and Theta Delta Chi; Psi Upsilon was in opposition. Three other houses were known to have held meetings without arriving at a final decision, while no action had been taken by the other five, as far as this magazine learned. In the former group are Delta Phi, Phi Delta Theta, and Zeta Psi; in the latter, Delta Kappa Epsilon, Lambda Chi Alpha, Phi Gamma Delta, Sigma Chi, Sigma Nu. Phi Delta Theta was scheduled to hold another meeting March 22, while the Phi Gamma Delta date was set for March 21. Pi Lambda Phi, the other national fraternity on the Brown campus, has owned no real estate.

The discussion on fraternities, given a headline spot on the Advisory Council program, was "off the record," since the Council has met in closed session for a number of years. We refer to it here since the local press, although unrepresented in the meeting, printed a version of it the next morning.

▶ THE ADVISORY Council spent a profitable and concentrated day in hearing and talking about the University today and about projects in which alumni might take an active part. Nelson B. Jones '28 described the campus in 1944, telling of the valiant way in which extra-curricular activities persisted alongside of the military and academic. Dr. Bruce M. Bigelow '24, speaking of "Tomorrow's Alumni", described the make-up of the student body today and asked some questions about the future of Brown, too. Recalling the great increase in enrollment after the last war, he wondered if there would be great pressure on Brown to increase its student body when peace comes again. More accredited boys from Rhode Island would be knocking at our gates, but the University must retain its national character. Brown must be progressive, he warned, and could not rest on its prestige as the third oldest New England college. President Wriston talked off the record in a provocative set speech and contributed freely and frankly to other discussions. The inspirational climax came when Vice-President Adams roused the men to realize and accept their responsibilities in the re-shaping world.

An excellent series of reports in various provinces of alumni activity and thought were prepared and presented by committee chairmen: A. L. Philbrick '03, Carleton D. Morse '13, Sidney Clifford '15, H. Stanton Smith '21, Edward T. Richards '27, Alton C. Chick '19, and F. E. Schoeneweiss '20.

▶ FIVE ALUMNI TRUSTEE nominations were voted by the Advisory Council, which selected them from 10 submitted by the Executive Committee. The men chosen in this preliminary phase of the proceedings are: Jarvis Howard Alger '09 of Montreal, Que., vice-president and director of the Aluminum Company of Canada, Ltd., and the Aluminum Power Company, Ltd. Lt. Col. Marshall N. Fulton '20, chief of medical service, Valley Forge General Hospital, Phoenixville, Pa.; at present on leave from the Peter Bent Brigham Hospital in Boston as senior associate in medicine and the Harvard Medical School. C. Douglas Mercer '06 of Brookline, Mass., president of Willcox & Gibbs Sewing Machine Co., New York, and chairman of Willcox & Gibbs, Ltd., London, England. Donald Gordon Millar '19, Greenfield, Mass., president of the Greenfield Tap and Die Corporation. Ronald Macdonald Kimball '18 of Chicago, vice-president of the Continental Illinois National Bank and Trust Company.

Three men were also nominated for the Athletic Council vacancy to succeed Raymond L. Smith '14 of New York as one of the alumni representatives. Their names will be announced when they all agree to be candidates. So, too, with candidates in the various regions for the slate of candidates for Directors of the Associated Alumni.

Sixteen Brown Clubs were represented at the meeting, while most of the Directors and other officers of the Associated Alumni were on hand. By invitation, the Council included Alumni Fund Trustees, former officers of the association, directors of the BROWN ALUMNI MONTHLY, alumni presidents of Brown fraternities, and class secretaries. The Association of Class Secretaries was re-organized at a special meeting at the end of the day. ◀

Alta California

▶▶ NATHANIEL BLAISDELL '83 was elected president for the 46th year in succession at the Annual Dinner Meeting of the Brown Club of Alta California, held at the University Club, San Francisco, on Saturday evening, February 12, 1944. Mr. Blaisdell, in his report to the Club for the past year, told us of his trip to the East Coast, including Providence, last June (1943); and of attending the Commencement Exercises at Brown. He described how different that Commencement was from peacetime corresponding occasions. Mr. Blaisdell also told us the secret as to how he successfully prevailed upon the management of a certain hotel in Providence, during war times, to provide both a room and a menu for his Class Reunion, to which a few special guests were also invited. And we all wished we could have been there too, from the story of the gaiety and good fellowship of that occasion.

George F. Weston '78, brought to the meeting a great many pictures depicting the history of boating at Brown. These pictures included the first boat house, purchased in 1873, and on through to the present modern spacious boat house given to Brown by the Class of 1907, and dedicated at the Intercollegiate Dinghy Racing Association Regatta in 1938.

Mr. Weston was stroke of the crew of '78. They were 6-man crews in those days, the stroke position steering the shell by means of a foot-lever attachment. The many pictures shown included the crew of '74, who won every one of their races; the crew of '78; and one down to the Intercol-

legiate Regatta in 1936 at Bristol, R. I. and views of recent Dinghy racing events. These pictures were of great interest to all present.

Mr. Blaisdell then introduced the speaker of the evening, Dr. T. Harper Goodspeed, '09, who spoke to us on South America under World War Conditions. Dr. Goodspeed has recently returned to the University of California from a 17 months' trip to South America. During this trip he lectured there over 200 times. Dr. Goodspeed's Expedition brought back with them over 150,000 plant specimens from South America, which specimens will increase our scientific knowledge and also assist our nation's agriculture. Dr. Goodspeed told us of the different races and nationalities represented in the different countries of South America, of the results of the war on these countries. He also spoke of the natural wealth, mineral and agricultural, of the various countries, and of the part these countries would possibly take in the post war world.

Dr. Goodspeed, from his knowledge of and observations in South America, gained on previous trips as well as the last visit, is in favor of (1) establishing in our Government a non-political department, to be a permanent institution regardless of the party in power, to deal with South American questions, in order to give stability to our national policy with those countries; and (2) the formation of a definite program for our future plans for cooperation with South America, drawn up to eliminate axis policies already there. Dr. Goodspeed's address was most informative and interesting. It was a great privilege for those present to learn so much about conditions and developments as they are today in the South American countries.

▶ NEW ENGLAND Brown men with recollections of the good banquets for which the Boston Club is famous are saving the date of April 10, when the annual dinner will be held at the Sheraton. The bureau promises to be a counterpart of the War Service Advisory Bureau which gave 17,000 interviews to college men inquiring about military service opportunities.

▶ ▶ BROWN UNIVERSITY Varsity letters have been awarded posthumously to six former athletes whose undergraduate life was interrupted by the war before they had won letters for participation in various sports. The action, voted by the Athletic Council of the University, is announced by Professor Walter H. Snell '13, Acting Director of Athletics. Former Brown students so honored were: 2nd Lt. Joseph E. Hand, USA, son of Sgt. Bernard Hand, campus police officer; 2nd Lt. Henry A. Adams, USMCR, of Fall River, Mass.; Lt. (jg) Carl H. U. Davis, USNR, of Wilmington, Del.; Lt. William P. Erickson, USA, of Braintree, Mass.; Lt. Russell J. Hall, USA, of Bristol, Conn.; and 2nd Lt. James R. Rutherford, Jr., USA, of White Plains, N. Y.

Dr. Snell made the following statement in explanation of the action by the Athletic Council: "When these men left Brown University for service with the armed forces of the United States, we joined heartily in their hope of returning to the campus to resume undergraduate work. We now sorrow in the thought that they cannot return.

"They all exemplified the high promise of their generation at Brown in many important respects. It was their lot to find fulfillment of their mission in the sacrifice they have made for our victory.

"Beside this supreme contribution, some of their unachieved desires may seem small but we cannot help thinking of them. Among their interests on the Brown campus was athletics. Each man had already represented Brown in athletic contests, showing an exemplary spirit of sportsmanship, an eagerness to accept responsibility, and a sense of the relation of the individual to his team. Each so exalted those virtues in military duty that, although he had not yet won a varsity letter as a student, we

know he followed the best traditions of Brown athletics.

"It is the wish of the Athletic Council of Brown University to honor these men and the posthumous award of a varsity 'B' has been voted them. We hope that the families of these men will accept this award as a token of the large debt all of us owe them for the lives so gallantly offered to the cause of freedom."

How Two Doctors Are Fighting

► ► FIGHTING malaria, dread mosquito-borne disease of all armies, has been a full-time job for Lt. Col. Justin M. Andrews '23 in the Mediterranean area. Through his efforts and those of a small army of scientists and medical technicians, a relatively modest number of soldiers contracted malaria, while eight times as many civilians fell prey to it. It has long been dreaded as more deadly than bullets, leaving men fatigued and often unfit for combat.

Col. Andrews, for several years chief of the Division of Malaria Investigation for the Georgia State Health Department, is assistant malariologist on the staff of the Surgeon General in the North African theatre. To determine where malaria was most prevalent, thousands of blood smears were taken among the civilian population. He directed the draining of marshes, issued insect repellants, and distributed atabrine, dye equivalent of quinine.

In Sicily malaria provided 60 per cent of the disease cases, and there were 1500 more cases of malaria in the Seventh Army than battle casualties of all kinds.

► MAJ. F. A. SIMEONE '29, MC, USA, is reported to be taking a major part in the fight being made by the Medical Corps against gangrene infections among American soldiers in Italy. An authority on the subject of gangrene, Simeone is working all hours at a new field laboratory set up to develop a better serum to combat the infection, which is aggravated by the terrain and the mud in the fighting area. ◀ ◀

The Chaplain Picked a Lulu

►► "IN THE BOAT next to mine and among the first wave of Marines to land on the fire-riddled beach of Tarawa, was Lt. W. Wyeth Willard, USN Chaplain's Corps, of North Scituate, Mass." So began the Associated Press story by T/Sgt. Gene Ward of the Marines.

"It was nothing new to Chaplain Willard, veteran of the Guadalcanal campaign, who spent more time in the Solomons area than any other Navy chaplain. He was there with the Marines from start to finish and recently refused to return home when he became a victim of malaria. He told the other doctors, 'Malaria or no malaria, there's a campaign coming up, and I'll stick with the Marines . . .'"

"This was the campaign. He picked a lulu.

"Chaplain was aboard my transport. During the weeks at sea preceding the landing he preached a sermon every day, talked personally with close to 100 Marines each day, baptized 61.

"He is a graduate of Brown University, 1927, and of Princeton Seminary, 1931. He was for six years pastor of Emmanuel Baptist Church, in Newark. Mrs. Willard is at present supervising the running of two camps for children, Camp Good News and Camp Good Cheer, which Lt. Willard founded at Forestdale, Cape Cod."

This is not the first time newspapermen have been attracted by Chaplain Willard's work. A year ago the *New York Herald Tribune* published a photo showing him conducting a baptism for 18 Marines on Guadalcanal. He is the author of "Steeple Jim", published in 1929 and telling the life story of the mission figure with whom Willard worked while an undergraduate at Brown. ◀◀

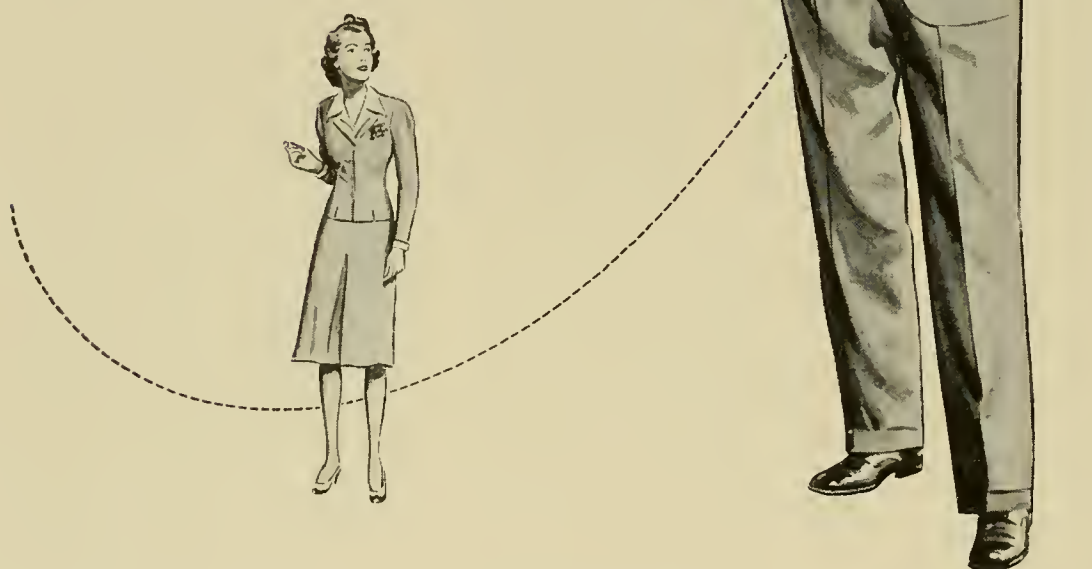

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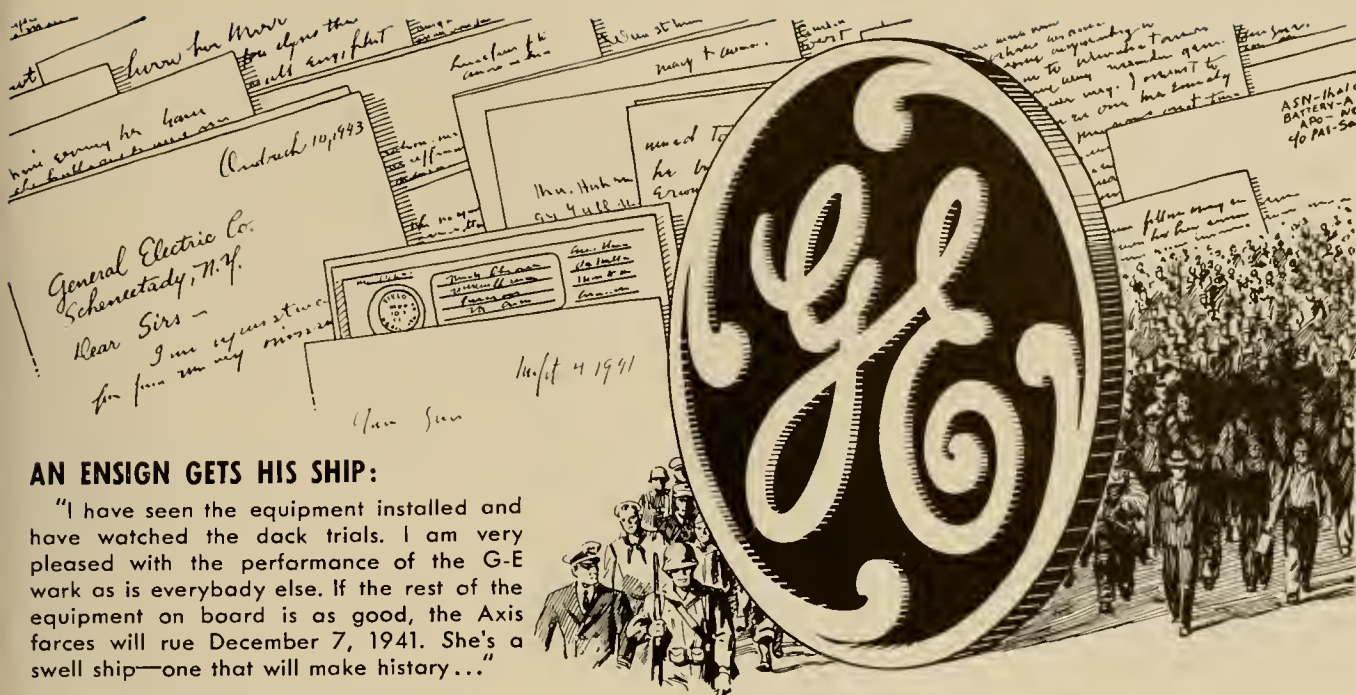

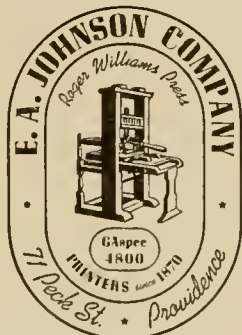
