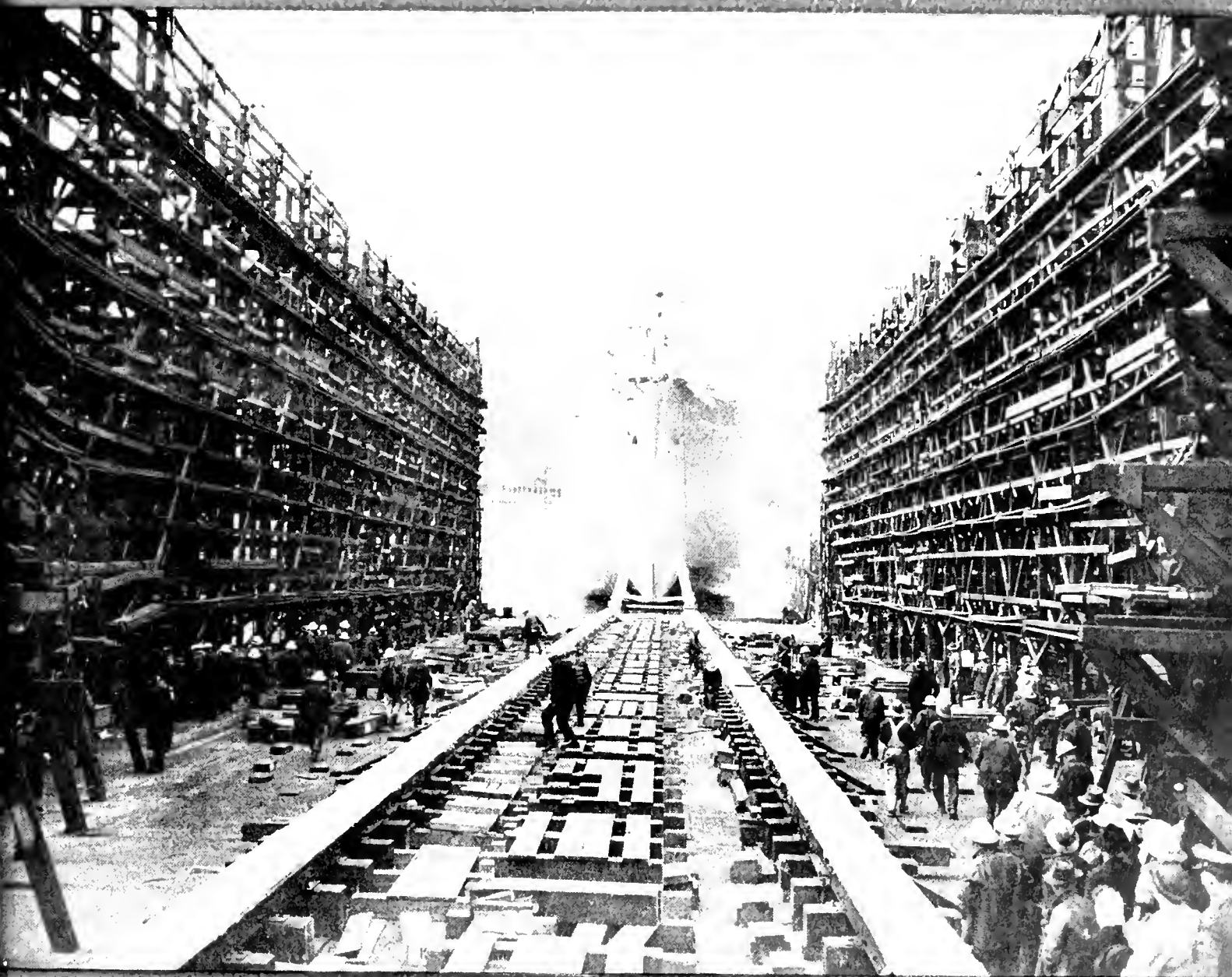

► ► The Good Ship "Brown Victory"

► ► "THE GOOD SHIP 'Brown Victory' went down the ways of the Oregon Shipbuilding yards today with a well-broken and dripping bottle of champagne swinging on a red, white and blue ribbon from her nose. The plates had been burned evenly, and she hit the water perfectly to float serenely out into the channel. There a couple of busybody tugs nuzzled up to her and pompously escorted her into the fitting docks where her trimmings will be added. These Victories are majestic-looking ships, even if they are freighters, and this one will bear her name proudly over the seven seas."

Ashley Greene '21 went back to his law office in the Public Service Building in Portland, Ore., Feb. 23 and dictated the description above. By now, the ship, outfitted, is off on its first war errand. It bears a number of substantial souvenirs from the University whose name it carries. Most prominent among them is the \$300 library for the crew, underwritten by the treasury of the Associated Alumni, towards which individual alumni subscriptions are now invited.

Far from the campus and the larger centers of Brown population, the launching was not witnessed by many Brunonians, but the event meant a great deal to the alumni in the Pacific Northwest. All in Oregon and Washington had been notified by Mr. Greene, an officer of the Oregon Brown Club, and the Alumni Office. Most of them responded cordially and sentimentally, although only a few actually represented Brown at the ways.

Mr. Greene brought greetings to the principals in the launching, the craftsmen and other builders, the special guests and the other spectators from President Wriston, the Corporation, Faculty, students and alumni of Brown University on the afternoon of the launching. He expressed "deep gratitude to the Oregon Shipbuilding Corporation, the Maritime Commission, and our government for this great honor conferred upon our beloved university."

► "BROWN STANDS for a faith based upon wisdom and understanding," he went on. "Founded by the Baptists, inspired with the liberalism of Rhode Island, the school retains that liberal spirit which reveres tradition but welcomes invention — a spirit which breeds sturdy loyalty, initiative, and respect for humanity, which is vital to democratic leadership. As symbols of that spirit, I am happy to present these pictures of Brown University, which, we hope, will serve as an inspiration for the crew of Brown Victory. This one shows University Hall, whose antiquity is attested by the fact that Rochambeau quartered his troops in it before we were a nation. This is a campus scene in wartime and in the background the braided elms and ivy-covered walls so dear to Brown men. Another shows the memorial gate erected in honor of Brown men who gave their lives in the last war. The fourth, a football scene, shows a Brown man, a future Nimitz or MacArthur, blocking a kick.

"The name of Brown is not strange to the sea," Mr. Greene pointed out, citing the shipbuilding tradition in the

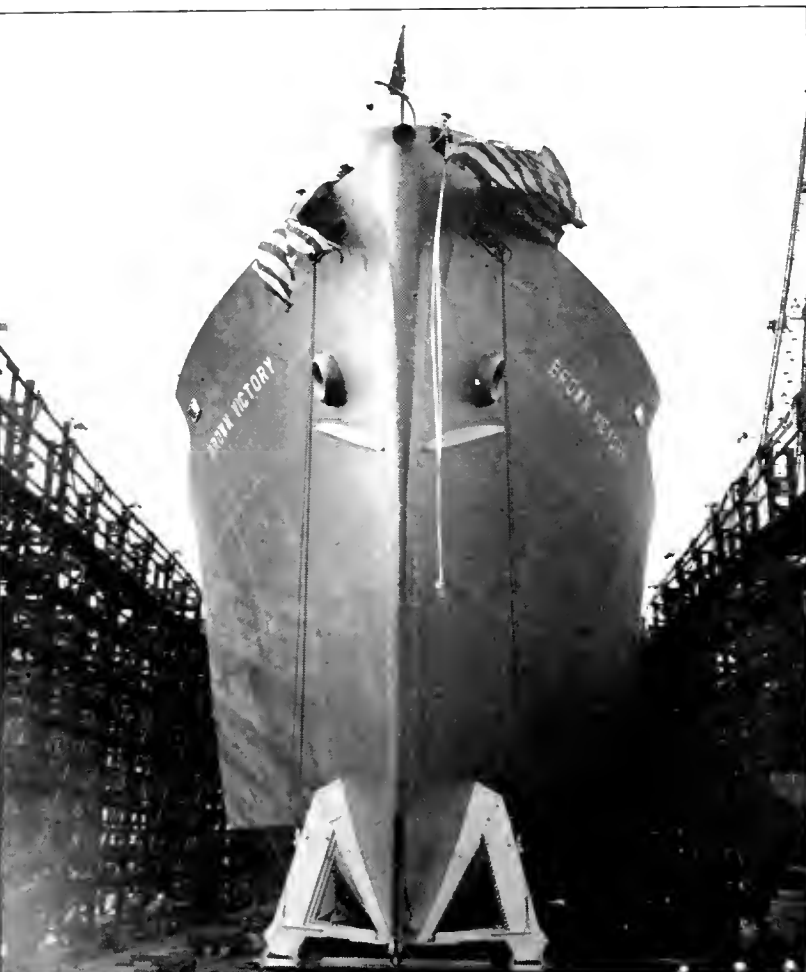

Brown family and their cargoes in world trade in the days when "you could really light your pipe from the smoking lamp." On the campus, in this tradition, Mr. Greene recalled he had been taught to sing "As we sail ever joyously under the sky, over the wild waves' fury."

"In all the wars of our country, Brown men have been found in the shipyards and at sea," the speaker continued. "One of them in the Northwest, Edward R. Smith '15, of Wiley & Smith, Portland, who is here today, helped build this ship. Another who is present, Miss Eleanor Bradley, a graduate (1935) of Pembroke College in Brown University, is secretary of the Shipbuilders Council of Portland. Another, Capt. Paul S. Crandall '19, is commander of the U.S.S. Oxford. Closely allied to shipping, Robert S. Macfarlane '20 directs the streams of Northern Pacific trains which bring cargoes for these ships from inland.

► "OUR UNIVERSITY itself is now one of the Navy's chief training schools for officers and technicians, and the shrill notes of the boatswain's pipe echo through these ancient halls where for 180 years, young men from all States in the Union, have been taught to love God and accept the responsibilities of leadership in our never-ending battle for freedom and democracy. These students who will sail the sea are Brown men, too, and are with us today in spirit, with cheers in their hearts, as Brown Victory goes down the ways. Needless to say, we who have been privileged to serve in the Army (Mr. Greene was returned to inactive duty as a Lt. Col. last November), also rejoice in sending a Brown Bear to fight for the Eagle. May this good ship and her

brave crew carry implements of war to our battlefronts until the present threat to freedom is utterly destroyed. Then we all may sing with the undergraduates: 'Brunonia's banners are waving, in triumph on the Hill; Brunonia's cohorts are cheering, for the Bear has made his kill.'"

Actual sponsor of the Brown Victory was Mrs. Norma Martinson, representing the administrative employees of the Oregon Shipbuilding Corporation. Following Mr. Greene's address, bouquets of American Beauty roses were presented to her and her attendants. Rev. Leslie V. Dunton of St. David's Episcopal Church of Portland pronounced the invocation. Shipwright Supt. Ray Hausmann then gave the signal for burning the trigger plates which held the ship to the ways. Within three minutes, she was gliding toward the Willamette river and hit the water at 18 knots.

► A CASE of about 50 books about Brown University, published by it, or by Brunonian authors was sent to Portland for inclusion in the ship's library. They included such varied items as Bronson's History of Brown, a Brown Song-book, Dr. Lawrence Wroth's "Early Cartography of the Pacific," President Wriston's "Challenge to Freedom" and "Strategy of Peace," "Student Life at Brown," publications on University Hall, Pembroke College, and several books from the Brown University Studies. The selection was made with the counsel of Dr. Henry B. Van Hoesen, Librarian. These books were in addition to the ship's general library toward which alumni contributions are solicited.

The S.S. Brown Victory is a fast armed cargo vessel, the 57th Victory type ship constructed for the Maritime Commission by Oregon Shipbuilding, according to Public Relations Officer Hal Babbitt. She is 455 feet long and has a deadweight tonnage of 10,600 tons. The Victory design is regarded by the Maritime Commission as an improvement on the old Liberty ships, speedier, with finer hull lines, and equipped with turbine-gear propulsion machinery of more than twice the horsepower of the reciprocating steam engine used in the Liberty. The Victory has a speed of more than 15 knots as against the 11 of the Liberty, made possible by the power plant of 6000 horsepower or more. The finer lines conform to its greater propulsion power. It is not an over-all welding job but is of rivet construction in certain parts of the main structure. It has three decks as against the Liberty's two, a beam of 62 feet as against 57, a somewhat longer hull, too.

Champion Classes ◀

►► A NEW CHAMPION has gained possession of the Trustees' Bowl of the Brown Alumni Fund on the basis of its performance during the 1943-1944 campaign. The honor goes to the Class of 1909 which thus celebrated its 35th anniversary. All compliments to Class Agent Raymond Buss and his classmates, whose numeral is the third to appear on the bowl. Retiring Fund Chairman A. L. Philbrick '03 presented the trophy to Mr. Buss during the Advisory Council session Feb. 24, while other 1909 men looked on proudly: Chauncey Wheeler, Herbert M. Sherwood, Henry S. Chafee, Dr. Moses L. Crossley, and Frederick M. Boyce.

The 1909 contributors beat off a determined challenge from Edward H. Weeks and 1893, who sought to repeat their 1943 triumph and ran a good second. Third place went to the newcomers of the class of 1942, for which the Navy's Bill Potter is team captain. The staunch 1907 class, which took the trophy in its first two years only to fall off last year, was back in the running again.

The committee on awards again rated the classes on five factors: 1—the per cent of living grads who gave; 2—the increase in the percentage of living grads who gave; 3—the percentage of increase in the amount of money given; 4—the proportionate share of the campaign total (a sort of ex post facto "quota" set-up which took into consideration the number of men in the class and the length of time out of college); and 5—the percentage of increase in this percentage of "quota." In the various categories, 1909 ranked 15th, 7th, 5th, 12th, and 2nd, respectively. With a point for each place, 1909 scored 41, the lowest and hence best record.

\$31,000 for Engineering ◀

► EXPANSION of the engineering laboratory facilities at Brown University will be furthered by a gift of \$30,000 from the Hammel-Dahl Company, Providence, manufacturers of automatic control equipment. The benefaction, prompted by recent co-operation between research workers at the University and the company, was announced by President Wriston of Brown at the 33rd annual dinner of Brown engineering alumni.

Announcement was made the same evening of a gift of \$1000 from Thomas F. Gilbane '33 and William J. Gilbane '33 "for additional engineering facilities." The brothers are associated in the Gilbane Building Company, with the former as president, and it was this company which built Brunonia, the President's House, Van Wickle Hall, and Andres House. "It is gratifying to my brother and me," wrote Thomas Gilbane, "that Brown University recognizes the value of ceaseless growth." The gift was made "with sentiments of happy recollections and with a clear understanding and appreciation of what Brown has done for us."

The gift made by Hammel-Dahl was "in appreciation of the many services and facilities made available to us by the University in the performance of our Government contracts during the year 1944 and particularly in appreciation of the courtesies shown to us by Prof. Leighton T. Bohl '13 of the Brown Division of Engineering." A second floor will be added to the Engineering Laboratory Building as the result.

The following building committee has been named by the University Corporation to plan and oversee the project: Prof. Bohl '13, chairman; President Wriston; Ward A. Davenport, superintendent of buildings and grounds at Brown; Donald G. Millar '19, Brown alumni trustee and president of the Greenfield Tap and Die Corporation; Alton C. Chick '19, former member of the engineering faculty, director of the Associated Alumni, and assistant vice-president and engineer of Manufacturers' Mutual Fire Insurance Company; and Bradford G. Woolley '29, vice-president of Hammel-Dahl.

► The Little Chapel

The Football Schedule for 1945

► AN EIGHT-GAME SCHEDULE is on the books for the 1945 Brown football varsity, according to Athletic Director Walter H. Snell's announcement in March. With one game still pending, there will be four games at home (Boston College, Holy Cross, Coast Guard Academy, and Colgate) and three away (Pennsylvania, Columbia, and Yale). Brown has not played Boston College in 28 years nor Penn in nine. The contest at New Haven will be the 50th between Brown and Yale, a rivalry dating from 1880. The date for the Colgate game follows the 1944 pattern when the engagement was for Saturday, rather than Thanksgiving Thursday. The reason: Navy regulations which prevent absence from duties for sufficient travel time in mid-week.

During extensive travels, he has visited most of the college campuses this side of the Mississippi River, studying student activities there. Since 1941 he has been treasurer of Brown's Committee on Dramatic Productions. Secretary for class agents of the Brown Alumni Fund, he also serves as treasurer of the Faculty Club and secretary of the Board of Management of the Brown Outing Reservation. He is a former member of the executive committee and officer of the Brown Club of Providence.

As manager of the Brown Union Mr. Jones operates Faunce House with its many facilities and services, formulates and presents a complete social and recreational program for the undergraduates. A large amount of Mr. Jones' efforts has been devoted to providing recreational diversions for military units stationed at Brown. He is considered one of the outstanding men in his field.

A large part of his work at Brown involves furthering faculty-student relationships; last term he inaugurated a weekly Coffee Hour program in the new Gallery-Lounge of Faunce House as an opportunity for faculty and students to gather and enjoy each other's company. Other ways in which Mr. Jones has improved relationships and consolidated military and civilian interests at Brown include the successful outdoor concerts of the last two summers, Sunday evening musical programs, special movie programs twice a week, student dances, and tournaments.

While an undergraduate, he participated in football, track, lacrosse, was vice-president of his class, and a member of the Cammarian Club. He is a member of the Phi Delta Theta fraternity. His Senior year, he was secretary-manager of the Brown Union on a part-time basis. ◀

"Those Americans Best Qualified"

▶ IN AGREEMENT as to the goals to be desired, the American Bankers' Association and the Secretary of the Treasury have carried before Congress their disagreement over certain aspects of the Bretton Woods program for world finance. Taking the Secretary to task for his resentment of criticism, the *New York Herald Tribune* said editorially in February that the A.B.A. recommendations were put forward by "men of the type of Professor John H. Williams of Harvard and Dr. W. Randolph Burgess, for many years economist at the New York Reserve Bank and noted authority on the money market." The newspaper predicted that if the Bretton Woods program fails, "it will not be because of crippling amendments but because of the insistence of the Treasury that a plan devised on its own initiative and presented to the nation as a *fait accompli* must be accepted without criticism by those Americans best qualified to understand it and judge its merits."

Professor Williams and Dr. Burgess, classmates at Brown in 1912, are both members of the University Board of Fellows. ◀

Inter-American Cooperation

▶ W. RANDOLPH BURGESS '12, vice-chairman of the board of the National City Bank of New York, is the chairman of the Board of Trustees of the newly organized Council for Inter-American Cooperation, Inc., a group formed "to mobilize the support of business, cultural, labor, and educational leaders of the nation in hemispheric cooperation." Wouldn't you be willing to give us the whole story on the episode which won him the award?

We will and gladly, quoting from the citation from the Chief of Naval Personnel: "The Bureau takes pleasure in forwarding the Navy and Marine Corps Medal and ribbon bar for your services set forth on the following occasion:

"For extremely heroic and courageous conduct while aiding in the rescue of one, and in attempting to save the life of another survivor of a crashed plane during the night of 3 April 1944. When a Navy scout bomber crashed into the water while attempting to land on the flight deck of a carrier, the plane sank as members of the crew cleared the wreckage. John Paul Sweeney, on seeing that both survivors were swimming, in obvious distress, with uninflated life jackets, immediately dived into the cold water and proceeded to the point where he had last sighted the pilot of the plane. Before aid could reach him, the pilot collapsed and disappeared below the surface. Unable to locate the sinking pilot, Sweeney swam around the ship to the opposite side where he assisted another volunteer swimmer in the rescue of the remaining survivor. John Paul Sweeney's courageous and instinctive actions performed at the peril of his own life were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

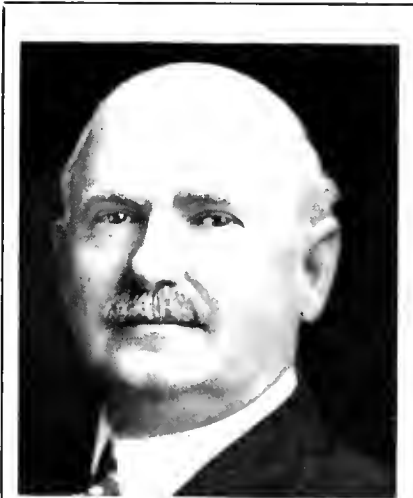

The Day When Freedom Returned

►► "THE GLORIOUS DAY of our delivery came at 9 p.m., Saturday, (Feb. 3), when our brave troops, only 650 in number, broke through the entire Jap army about Manila, and freed us," wrote William A. Weidman '12 to his brother, Robert A. Weidman, in Providence four days after getting out of Santo Tomas. "We are alive and well and in good spirits. The suffering has been great. . . . The average loss of weight for men was 51 pounds; for women 32 pounds." He himself dropped from 180 to 112 pounds. "When I take a bath and look down at my ribs like a corrugated washboard, I wonder if it is my body I'm washing."

He also said that the Japs broke open the Red Cross kits with food in them, ate what they liked, and destroyed the rest. "Food sent us by friends outside the camps was turned back. We were told we did not deserve any more because it was needed by Filipinos in the city." When Weidman was interned, he was credit manager of the Pacific Commercial Co., an importing firm. Since graduation, he's been in the Philippines as teacher and business man.

Your Secretary records with regret the death in Providence, Feb. 25, 1945, of Charles Aubrey Hagerty, and extends to his wife and family the sincere sympathy of the Class. Charlie had been seriously ill for nearly four years. He was a civil engineer in the office of the Providence City Engineer.

28 Days Later for Chobanian

► ALTHOUGH INJURED abdominally when his amphibious tractor was overturned by enemy shell fire and high swells in the initial assault on Saipan, Marine First Lieutenant Keran Melvyn Chobanian '45 continued in the campaign for 28 days until complications forced his hospitalization. He was returned to the States for hospitalization at Long Beach.

Flung into the water with such force that his life jacket was destroyed, he struggled for several minutes in the shell-swept waves on that Saipan D-Day. A life jacket drifted within reach. He grabbed it and saw it boldly marked "No. 13."

"It is certainly my lucky number," he said. "It kept me afloat for two hours, until I was picked up by a passing amphibious tractor."

Lieutenant Chobanian was taken to a hospital ship for treatment. "I didn't stay," he said. "There were many men more badly in need of space aboard that ship." He shipped into a boat, went ashore, rejoined his unit, and stayed with it.

► "IF THIS STUDY carried a dedication, it would stand in the name of the author's friend, Major Robert W. Kenny, 103d Field Artillery, USA, who for nearly two years has been an actor in the greatest of all Pacific adventures, concerning himself in many harsh and distant places with matters which, superficially, have little connection with his former duties as an assistant professor of English in Brown University." Dr. Lawrence C. Wroth, Librarian of the John Carter Brown Library, so wrote in the introduction to "The Early Cartography of the Pacific," reprinted for the library from the *Papers of the Bibliographical Society of America* and based on a recent exhibition of originals and some facsimiles in the JCB. It is a major work in the field of scholarship.

Continuing in his introduction, Dr. Wroth said: "Though by design hardly a word of the War has found its way into the ensuing narrative, there has been no moment in its writing in which Robert Kenny and his fellows in the South Pacific have been absent from the author's consciousness. Nor will they, or others of their indomitable sort, ever be out of the minds of those who read this account of the Pacific discoveries and their mapping."

Clifton Capwell is now a T 5 in Italy, with the Signal Intelligence Service.

Arthur Oppenheimer, Jr. '39 is at present with Machlin's unit, also.

Lt. Dion Taylor is in England now as a B-17 pilot with the Third Bombardment Division.

Just before Christmas, T. Sgt. Sheldon Silverman's parents received two cards from him in his prison camp believed to be near Belgrade. His address: Prisoner of War No. 3622, Stalag-Luft III (Stalag 4), Germany.

Tony Behr, an operator of training mechanism for the AAF at Gulfport, Miss., was a February visitor in the Alumni Office. He brought word of having seen F/O Tim O'Neil and 2nd Lt. Bob Clark '46, a navigator.

2nd Lt. Raymond W. Pickett, USAAC, has been posthumously awarded the Air Medal.

Ens. Prall Culviner reports from his mid-Pacific island that Jack Cokefair is on a minesweeper, Bud Grimes on an LSM, and that Joe Macioci is "an LCT Flotilla Engineer (his brother Poly Sci majors take note!) after having his LCT shot out from under him at Palau." He also ran into Ens. George Kanouse, who had spent 103 days in the hospital at Navy No. 128 but is back on a DE now. Prall's degree was awarded at Brown's February Commencement.

Prof. George Sykes '09 sent us word that six Brown '45 men had recently completed a course in Anatomy under him at Tufts College Medical School: Pfc. Bill King, John Leary, and Apprentice Seamen Richard Broggi, John Craig, Ed Fiorentino and Bernard Willett, Jr., the last four of whom attended Brown in the V-12 Unit.

1st Lt. Keram Chobanian, USMCR, wounded at Saipan and transferred to Hawaii, is now being treated at the Newport Naval Hospital.

2nd Lt. Lou De Angelis of the Marines dropped in to see his old friends in the Alumni Fund and Alumni Offices on Washington's Birthday, his stay at Quantico complete and his new orders reading Los Angeles. He remarked that Don Gardner, who had been with him as a DTD at Brown and then as a Marine at Parris Island, New River, and Quantico, would still be with him on the Coast. Other Brunonians on whom he reported at Quantico were Ted Shea, Vin Breglio, Jack Ross, and Doc Kilbourne.

Ens. Gus Avantaggio writes from the Pacific: "Although I've met many men from the old school out here, I doubt if you at home have heard how Brown and the Seekonk River combined to cause one of those queer twists of life. C. F. ("Bud") Abbott, having been commissioned from the NROTC at Brown, left Providence to begin the long trek out here. Upon arriving, he discovered that he had travelled half way across the world to go aboard the—you guessed it—USS Seekonk. Needless to say, it occasioned more than one smile among the Brown men out here."

Richard Whitcomb was commissioned an Ensign in the Naval Air Corps at Corpus Christi in February. Same for Richard Pretat at Pensacola.

After training at the Merchant Marine Academy, during which time he spent seven months at sea as an engineering cadet and made ports around the world, John Walsh was commissioned and has been on duty in the Pacific since last June.

1st Lt. Richard Boynton, who flew 29 missions in the ETO as navigator on a B 17, is now a member of the permanent party at the new Convalescent Hospital, Ft. Thomas, Ky.

1st Lt. Fred Brown has returned to the States after duty as a pilot with the "Flying Deuces" squadron of the First Marine Air Wing.

Capt Michael C. Gatto has been awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action in Belgium last September. A veteran of cam-

paigns in North Africa, Sicily, France, and Germany, he also wears the Combat Infantryman's Badge.

Henry Altenberg reports from New York that he is "rapidly dashing through medical studies at N.Y.U. College of Medicine," that he had seen Ens. Bill Pendleton '44, and heard from Friedl Lang '44, a medico private with the ATC in Memphis, and John Willmsen, T/4 with the 28th General Hospital in Belgium.

Joe Foley, deep in graduate zoology at Yale, came back to the campus in February, for the first time since last June. He told us in the Alumni Office that there was, as we suspected, a sizeable Brown colony among the graduate schools in New Haven. Five of them, he said, are in the medical school: Gabriel Saviano and Bill Walsh, both '44, and Paul Goldstein, Frank Horton, and Ed Phillips (although his friend Fred Easton is at Harvard) all '45. Only a few days later and we saw Horton back on the Hill.

Lt. Boyd Mason met Raymond Bernz, navigator on a B-29, at his P.O.E.

In a letter to Mr. Selden, Art Palmer reports that Milt Macklin has returned to their unit following a siege of malaria and that Bob Kerr, his former roommate, has also turned up in the Philippines and they are anxiously awaiting a reunion. He added: "The latest run-in with a former student occurred some three days ago, at which time I noticed a sweatshirt with that ever present Brown bear upon it. The wearer turned out to be Willard Parker '42, who was visiting someone here in our outfit. He is at present flying reconnaissance and cargo planes and does indeed seem to be enjoying his work. . . . Art Oppenheimer '39 happened to be in the mess hall at the time. . . ."

Also from the Philippines, Pvt. Arthur Feldman wrote the Newsletter in December: "I rather suppose I am the first Brunonian to 'return' and as such lay claim. Reports on the astonishing number of Nip planes shot out of the sky during those days are not bunk. The frustrated lads did their darndest to sink our ship—dive bombing, torpedo bombing, and even an attempt at suicide ramming. . . . what keeps me content is the dream of that Golden Day when I resume college life on the Hill."

1946

An injured leg is the report from Attilio Margarita of Patton's tanks, who apparently was put out of action during the push to the Rhine early in March. He had been all right when he wrote to his brother, Henry, on the campus March 1. Tillo received the Bronze Star for outstanding work in the capture of Metz. His outfit has apparently been in the thick of things, for he'd had only two days of leisure since August.

His sister wrote us recently that Ed Sherrill is now a T 3 with Gen. Patton's army.

Completed Careers

1886

► WILLIAM ALLAN DYER, A.B., A.M., leader in civic and welfare work and widely known as industrialist and merchant, died in Syracuse, N. Y., Oct. 21, 1944. Brown elected him an Alumni Trustee; Syracuse University gave him the honorary degree of A.M.; and Syracuse Post of the American Legion conferred upon him in 1942 its Good Citizenship Medal. After a thorough grounding in business methods in Boston, Providence, and Fall River, he went to Syracuse in 1903 to be Secretary-Treasurer of Smith Premier Typewriter Co. As Vice President and General Manager of that firm he introduced sales promotion ideas that were nationally copied. In 1912 he became part owner and general manager of Chappell-Dyer Co., retail dry goods, and two years later won election as President of the

New York State Retail Dry Goods Association. Director of the Syracuse Chamber of Commerce since 1914, he served four terms as its President, beginning in 1919. He headed the War Chest and Liberty Loan drives in Syracuse, brought about the establishment in that city of the first emergency army camp in 1917, and organized all business on a war basis. In the days of the NRA he organized Syracuse and Onondaga County, a real task. He arbitrated many labor disputes, and for years was official arbitrator of the Arbitration Society of America. The Syracuse Memorial Hospital and Medical Center is a monument to his efforts in raising \$2,500,000 for the hospital and its equipment. In this war he had been Chairman of Selective Service Board 463. He was National Commander of the Sons of Union Veterans, a life member of the Society of Mayflower Descendants, and a member of numerous civic and patriotic groups. His fraternity was Delta Kappa Epsilon.

Luther Francis, fighter pilot of a P-51, has been promoted to 1st Lt. in England.

Lt. Ed. Mullen, reported missing over Germany, has turned up safely as a prisoner of war. He was navigator on a B-17.

One of Senator Green's principal appointees to the Naval Academy from Rhode Island was John McTammany, now attending Midshipman's School. Alternates were J. Warren Lovell, also '46, now at Pre-Midshipman's School, and Seaman 2nd class George McNiff '47.

Ens. Bob Mareneck's marriage the Saturday before Christmas was a very Brunonian affair. Present at the ceremony in the Hotel Statler in Washington were Ensigns Bill Barrett, Nat Davis, and John Henderson; and Gil Hoover and Frank Mullin, then still members of the NROTC Unit here, since commissioned.

Ens. Hueston Hyde wrote us from New London, where he and his wife were living for a short while, "... in the course of my wanderings I have run into a good many Brown men in the sub service. It is the best in the Navy as far as I am concerned and I am pleased to see so many fellow Brown men in it."

In a letter to Mr. Anderson of the BCA, Ed Krise's father wrote: "We do not know whether or not the Germans moved the camp in which Ed is, but if they haven't, they are now completely cut off from the rest of Germany by the Russians, and we are anxiously awaiting word concerning these camps in Pomerania."

Pfc. Anthony Tapper was among the repatriates who arrived back in this country on the Gripsholm in February. Tapper had received a leg injury and was captured at Anzio, Feb. 18, 1944. He was hospitalized and was learning to walk with crutches when he found he was scheduled for repatriation.

James Whittle has completed training at the Navy Aerographers' School, Lakehurst, N. J.

Cpl. Arthur Ferris was awarded the Bronze Star and a citation for capturing seven German soldiers and an officer in France last November, while searching for a suitable location to set up a radio.

1947

Jonathan Sisson, who attended two semesters in the V-12 Unit and then entered Annapolis, stands first in his class of 1073 in mathematics, according to information sent from the Naval Academy to the principal of his former high school. There were comments on other studies and class rating, but "tops in math" is said to be the greatest achievement credited to a midshipman from Providence.

Philip Johnson has returned to this country after spending seven months in France with the American Field Service as an ambulance driver. His brother, Charles '46, is overseas with the Field Artillery, and they managed to meet occasionally.

Bob Rocchio, down from the Army hospital at Camp Devens, came to the campus last month to pay his respects to the new Vice-President, Bruce Bigelow.

It didn't take Stanley Potter, Jr., long to get into action. He was with the infantry during the drive to the Rhine, having finished his training at Camp Wheeler at Christmas time and stopping not long in England.

In alumni work he was energetic, helpful, and abounding in constructive ideas. He rewrote the original Constitution of the Associated Alumni to broaden its scope. He was the first advocate of regional officers, and a consistent supporter of closer contacts between Brown officials and the Brown Clubs. He had been President of the Brown Club of Syracuse, a Vice President of the Associated Alumni, and a Trustee of the Brown Alumni Fund. He took pride in Brown, as he took pride in the Syracuse Community Chest, of which he had been the guiding genius, and in his American heritage. Born Fall River, Mass., April 7, 1865, the son of David Hartwell and Mary E. (French) Dyer. Married Clara Tucker Spink, Nov. 18, 1890. Mrs. Dyer survives, with a son, Lt. Comdr. William Allan Dyer, Jr., '24, USNR, retired, and two grandchildren.

1886

► **STEPHEN WATERMAN, A.B., A.M.**, retired industrialist and architect, died suddenly at his summer home, Grouselands, St. Johnsbury, Vt., Oct. 2, 1944. During the Spanish-American War he was Captain, Co. E, First Rhode Island Volunteer Infantry, a rank he previously held in the State Militia and in the First Light Infantry. On graduation he went with Nicholson & Waterman Mfg. Co., of which he became President in 1887 and served until 1893. For many years he was an architect. Then he went into the Engineering Department, D. & W. Fuse Co., and later into a similar department of Franklin Machine Co. A faithful member of the Providence Art Club, he served as its superintendent, 1929-31. He was President of Waterman Land Co., a former officer of the old Narragansett Boat Club and of the Rhode Island Business Men's Association, and a member of the Military Order of Foreign Wars, of which he had been Commander, Naval and Military Order of the Spanish-American War, Providence Engineering Society, Army and Navy Club, Washington, D. C., the Brown Club of Washington, and Psi Upsilon. Born Providence, Oct. 10, 1863, the son of Stephen and Harriet (Bullock) Waterman. Married Gertrude Pope Whittier of Providence, June 12, 1900. Mrs. Waterman survives, with a daughter, Mrs. Vernon Gordon Taylor of Silver Springs, Md., and two sons, Stephen Waterman, Jr., '29 and Col. Paul Waterman '29, AAF.

1891

► **WALTER MILLS SAUNDERS**, consulting chemist and metallurgist and widely known for his studies of molding sand, died in Providence, Sept. 22, 1944. At Brown he took the select course, specializing in chemistry, studied elsewhere, and came back to the Hill in 1891 as instructor in chemistry. Resigning in 1897, he worked during the next four years as chemist for A. Carpenter & Sons Foundry Co., Providence. He became senior partner of Saunders & Franklin, commercial laboratory, and since 1928 had continued under his own name in association with his son, Walter M. Saunders, Jr. During the first World War he served on the Committee of Industrial Preparedness of the Naval Consulting Board. He was an original member of the Committee on Molding Sand Research, American Foundrymen's Association, and a charter member of Rhode Island Chapter, American Chemical Society. He was a former President of the New England Foundry-

men's Association, and a member of Associated Brass Founders of New England, Providence Engineering Society, the Camera Club, American Society for Testing Materials, and other technical groups. He was also a vestryman of the Church of the Messiah (Episcopal), of which his parents were among the founders. His hobby was photography; he found delight in showing his pictures of flower buds opening to garden clubs. Born Johnston, July 28, 1866, the son of Joseph H. and Sophronia (Waterman) Saunders. Married Florence Sutcliffe, Feb. 11, 1896. Mrs. Saunders survives, with the son named above, a daughter, and three grandchildren. Another son was the late Norman W. Saunders '24.

1896

► **ALFRED BERTRAND MEACHAM, A.B.**, retired investment banker, died in Manchester, Vt., Aug. 21, 1944. An Alumni Trustee of the University since 1939, he had been for 40 years one of Brown's strong, alert, and resourceful supporters in New York City. He was on the Board of Governors of the Brown University Club in New York, gave a great deal of time to the Brown Alumni Fund, and "was seldom absent from the Commencement procession down the Hill." He had also served as the New York Brown Club's President, and was a member of the Executive Committee, Civil Service Reform Association; Trustee and Treasurer, Economic and General Foundation; Trustee, West Side Savings Bank, and a director of several insurance companies. His fraternity was Delta Kappa Epsilon. After graduation he taught school for two years in Vermont, and then became assistant to the President, New York Post Graduate Medical School. In 1906 he joined the banking firm of Brown Brothers, Harriman & Co., and continued with it in executive capacity until retirement in 1942. Born North Scituate, Mass., Oct. 5, 1874, the son of the Rev. Cola De Rienzi and Electa Dustin (Grow) Meacham. He never married. His only immediate survivor is a brother, the Rev. C. W. Meacham of St. Petersburg, Fla.

Whittier as Proponent

► "BROWN UNIVERSITY cannot afford to hesitate much longer in a matter like this of simple justice."

John Greenleaf Whittier was writing to Richard M. Atwater '65, a member of the Brown Corporation from 1878 to 1922, and championing the cause of education for women. The letter, dated "8th Mo 10 1881" at Danvers, Mass., has come to the

Library of Brown University as the gift of Horace Paul Dormon '96 in fulfillment of Mr. Atwater's wishes. Whittier, himself a Brown Trustee from 1869 to 1892, told Atwater later in the same winter he saw "no reason to object to the publication of the letter as it stands." It follows:

Dear Friend,

Richard Atwater,

I hope the time is not far distant when Brown University will be open to women. The traditions of the noble old Institution are all in favor of broad liberality and equality of rights and privileges. The state of my health and the increasing weight of years may prevent me from taking an active part in the matter, but it would be a great satisfaction to give my voice in behalf of a measure which I feel certain would redound to the honor, and materially promote the prosperity, of the College. Brown University cannot afford to hesitate much longer in a matter like this of simple justice. No one who has felt the pulse of public opinion can doubt that the time has come when a liberal educational policy irrespective of sex, is not only a duty but a necessity.
