TO ALL BROWN ALUMNI:

THIS year marks the beginning of a new policy for the Brown Alumni Fund, which will be explained later in this letter.

Last year the Fund was larger than ever before, — more than \$75,000.00, but Brown Alumni as a whole, can and should do much better than this.

Will the time ever come, you ask, when the Fund won't say, "Thanks, but we expected MORE"? The answer is "probably no"; the reason is this:—

You may have been giving regularly up to the limit of your financial capacity, but many other Alumni have NOT been doing so. We, the trustees, have no means of segregating the "haves" from the "have nots", so we must assume theoretically that ALL alumni can give more, once they realize the need for it. No offense is meant to anyone and we feel that every alumnus will accept our appeal with the proper Brown spirit and "wear the cap if it fits".

Now it's one thing to ask for more money and it's another thing to get it. We propose, in the near future, not only to ask you for more money than you have ever given before, but also to **MAKE IT POSSIBLE** for you to give more money and at the same time to "feel no pain". This, we believe, will be brought about by our new policy which is as follows: —

1. We'll ask for a **PLEDGE** in addition to cash.
2. This pledge will be payable in one or more **INSTALLMENTS**.
3. Payments may be made at any time prior to June 30, 1946.
4. You will receive notices from the Fund Office when payments are due.

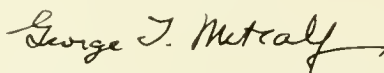
Why should this policy or plan raise more money for Brown than ever before without too much pain on your part? Let's assume that you have been giving \$25.00 CASH every January. It evidently didn't hurt too much, or you wouldn't have paid it all at once. Therefore, the assumption is that you can just as easily give an additional \$25.00 in April, or June, making a total contribution of \$50.00 over a period of 6 months.

"So", you ask, "my total contribution for this year should be **TWICE** as much as my **CASH PAYMENT** for last year?"

You guessed it the first time, mister. That's what we think and we make no apologies or reservations. It's up to you to decide if we're right in **YOUR** case.

You can send in your cash and pledge for 1946 now, if you wish, although this is **NOT** a formal appeal. The first general appeal for 1946 pledges will follow in the near future. Only the Alumni Fund will be making such an appeal between now and Commencement.

► ► A Challenge to the 1946 Alumni Fund

► ► THIS ISSUE of the BROWN ALUMNI MONTHLY is devoted largely to the Brown Alumni Fund. It contains the report of the 1945 campaign, which ended on a note of victory, for, even though we were still at war, the men of Brown helped sustain their University. This issue records the generosity of 4,752 individuals who contributed \$75,623.79 as a free gift to Brown in confirmation of an educational purpose that is valid "in peace or war." Another \$5,215. was given to the alumni Endowment. Brown acknowledges those gifts with deep gratitude, through more than 350 volunteer workers in the Fund corps.

But this issue also looks forward to a new campaign of the Brown Alumni Fund, its 33rd in a succession which has brought more than a million dollars to College Hill "in easy payments." This is the new appeal, the new challenge for 1946, given further importance by the fact that the general phase of the University's major drive to finance its extensive housing program will not begin until summer or fall. Between now and Commencement, the Alumni Fund has a clear field. (Contributions were running 28% ahead of last year, and the number of contributors was ahead by 37% in January.)

► A LITTLE SKETCHING of background is in order. Just how necessary it is, we realized the other day after looking at the 1944 Alumni Fund Report, published only a year ago. It was full of photos of uniformed men in training on the Hill, hints of war research behind closed doors (no outsider suspected that an atom bomb was on its way), assurance that Brown was doing its part well. With fewer than 700 men in the College then—250 of them civilians—"the campus isn't over-populated," we read. A lot has happened in a year, although one prophecy stands. (We'll return to that startling, eloquent statement.)

In the term soon to end, Brown University has had the largest undergraduate enrollment in its history, following upon the leanest semester in decades last summer. When the next semester starts—March 4, the trend will continue upwards in a fashion to break further records. There have been estimates as high as 1600 undergraduate men in the College and more than 700 at Pembroke. The Navy unit, which at one time this winter numbered 686, will be down to 400 at least, it is expected. Another 400 civilians now at Brown will continue their studies and be joined by upwards of 400 Brown men returning from military service to complete their college education. More than 750 veterans in all may be on the campus, for of 300 or 400 new students at least half will probably be just out of the armed forces.

The September College may be even bigger, perhaps 2000. It could be 10 times that if the Admission Office yielded to all the pressure brought upon it these days. It has been handling 1000 inquiries a week of late, and some well qualified boys must inevitably be turned away.

ATTEMPTING TO MAKE PROVISION

► ACCOMMODATIONS will be stretched to the limit to care for as many new students as possible, with top priority on admission going to boys who have previously been undergraduates at Brown, followed by those formerly accepted

for admission though without actual previous matriculation. Navy dormitories will probably be Hegeman, Caswell, and Maxcy, returning others to civilian use. In addition, two new dormitories will be available: Beverly House on lower George St., a recent acquisition; and Hopkins House, the former Arsdale on Waterman St.

Brown's obligation to veterans is acknowledged and honored, but the improvised housing to accommodate their sudden arrival has been expensive. There was no income from the makeshift dormitory set up on short notice in the Lyman Gym, for the University did not charge for the use of the double-decker bunks in the "Old Soldiers' Home." Other expenses were large, extemporizations to cope with the swift end of the war. It cost \$30,000 for the modest "tune-up" given the fraternity houses in reopening them, and the provision of extra dining halls last summer was no easy matter. The "full" College does not mean full coffers, for the added tuition and rentals finance only part of the costs of adjustment.

This does not purport to paint the whole picture of the University needs—only to suggest a few of the more striking or newer aspects of it. The Navy commitment has been large and impermanent, paid for on the basis of the Navy's definition of costs. In August President Wriston toted up a million dollars in contracts which were subject to cancellation on 30 days' notice. Much of the war research now terminated produced no profits but saved overhead expenses that would otherwise have been harsh. With the new term, more Faculty members return to the payroll, promotions for others take effect, more instructors are being added. Liberal education gains quality by the men who offer it.

FROM THE TREASURER'S REPORT

► WHAT DOES SOME of this mean in terms of University finance? From the fiscal point of view, Brown is a two-and one-half million-dollar business these years. Even with stringent economies, even with many urgencies postponed, the expenses amounted to \$2,604,832.09 for the year which ended (as did the Alumni Fund year) on June 30, 1945. The reports of the Treasurer and the Bursar covering that period show total income of \$2,436,628.21, or an operating deficit of \$168,203.88. Without the Alumni Fund it would have been \$254,143.28.

To balance the indebtedness, the University dipped into its Stabilization Fund, dipped liberally. This fund, created in anticipation of just such a critical period, was built up from gifts to Brown from a relatively few generous, loyal persons in recent years. Of the \$476,288.59 thus given, there remained in the fund last June 30 \$178,519.49.

The care and wisdom with which University endowment has been managed over the years is reflected in the fact that 4¼% was earned and distributed to all funds which constituted the general investments. This yield compares with 4.18% in 1943-44; 4.21% in 1942-43; 4.47% in 1941-42; 4.53% in 1940-41. Income from investments of all funds last year was \$540,691. In 1943-44 it had been \$520,088. Total of investment assets at book value as of June 30, 1945, was \$12,327,837.23. Book value of bonds and stocks was \$10,917,688 as compared with market value of \$12,204,261—market value exceeding book value by \$1,286,573, or 11.78%.

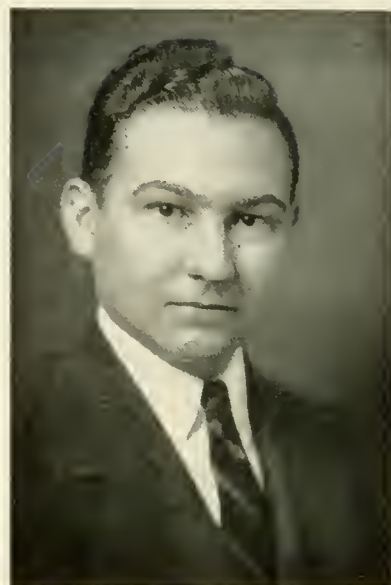
FACTORS IN THE DEFICIT

► CONTRIBUTING to the deficit of the year was the Division of Athletics, which finished the year in the red by \$27,565.39. The Division's accumulated deficit is \$118,219.74. The only sport which showed a net income during the year was football, where the profit was \$16,576.88. Annual deficits notwithstanding the University considered it important to keep its athletic program on an active basis throughout the war. The next athletic balance sheet should appear in a more favorable light inasmuch as 1945 football receipts ran considerably ahead of the budgeted expectation and basketball has been drawing sizeable crowds.

A brief resume of the Treasurer's Statement of Income and Expense shows that the total expense for the College, the Graduate School, and Pembroke College for educational and general purposes was \$1,789,316.44 in 1944-1945, as against an income for these purposes of \$1,741,810.76—a loss of \$47,505.68. Auxiliary enterprises and activities, which included residence halls, dining halls, Division of Athletics, Photographic Laboratory, Outing Reservation, and Yacht Club, showed an expense of \$644,171.39 as against an income of \$641,148.74—a loss of \$3,022.65. Other non-educational expenses; that is, for financial aid to students and annuities, totaled \$88,411.15 as against other non-educational income of \$53,668.71, a difference of \$34,742.44. There was transferred to principal and to reserves for research, contracts, rental properties, military credits, dining and residence halls, expenses totaling \$62,933.11.

An analysis of expense shows that administration cost \$200,775.04, departments of instruction \$570,908.06, libraries \$158,944.35, Division of University Extension \$13,672.60, Division of University Health \$32,429.65, Public Relations \$27,686.13, general expense \$176,032.42, operation and maintenance of educational plant \$308,959.50, and residence halls, \$171,313.65.

During the war years the University has had an operating deficit each year despite the efforts of the college officials to curtail expenses. The higher cost of living, of labor

and materials, does not spare institutions of higher education. In 1942 the Operating Deficit was \$14,996.58, in 1943 \$120.15, in 1944 \$60,373.72.

► THE WAR HAS BEEN COSTLY to Brown in a financial sense, and reconversion is an expensive process, too. As one University officer put it, "Instead of patching, postponing, and extemporizing, the need now is for straight replacement and rehabilitation of so much." Shortages of money, manpower, and material crippled old maintenance schedules. The Library and other elements in the educational plant must make headway again. Laboratory apparatus has suffered from the wear and tear of war use. "We could put every dollar of income justifiably into books, materials, and equipment," in President Wriston's opinion.

In other senses, too, rebuilding has begun. All science departments had a heavy access of students during the war. You can imagine the load on the Physics lab facilities with double normal enrollment. Two of every five students have been engineers in the last two years, compared with a prewar ratio of one in seven. But now, also, the liberal arts come out from under the shadow of the military. Nurtured mainly by Pembroke of late, they regain their rightful place.

► WE SPOKE OF PROPHECY. A statement, made a year ago in the Alumni Fund Report, still stands: "And it will be long—long even after the peace—before the University's services, so wholly and wholeheartedly committed to the war, return to normal . . . The plant (that's a more practical way to speak of 'hoary walls and ancient halls') has to be preserved, the faculty must not suffer. The demands of today must be met and those of tomorrow anticipated, for—great as has been her wartime service—Brown's most extraordinary opportunity awaits her. She is planning for it, preparing for it, and needs resources for it. All Brown men are united in a determination to be ready for that challenge."

In that spirit, Chairman George T. Metcalf '13 now sounds the appeal for the 1946 Alumni Fund.

From a National Point of View

► NATIONAL STATISTICS, compiled by Joseph E. Bell of Lafayette, showed that, of 121 colleges reporting on their 1944-1945 achievements, 82 topped all previous marks for the amount contributed and 79 reached their highest totals for contributors participating. The results of this survey are copyrighted by the American Alumni Council.

Where did Brown University stand in comparison with the others? In the percentage of alumni who made gifts—17th. (Pembroke was 6th.) In the number of contributors—17th again. In the amount contributed—22nd. In the size of the average gift—52nd.

The Brown Night in New York

► ► THE 78TH ANNUAL New York and New Jersey alumni dinner will be held in the Main Ballroom of the Hotel Roosevelt on the evening of Thursday, March 28, according to the report of Robert C. Litchfield '23, chairman of the general committee.

Ambitious plans now under way indicate that the program will have a unique and diversified appeal and every effort is being made by an enthusiastic committee to make this the largest turnout of Brown men ever assembled in New York City.

The accent this year is decidedly away from the conventional. With the idea that Brown men get together primarily to see and meet other Brown men, the program is calculated to produce a parade of Brown leaders in many fields of activity whose remarks in most instances will be brief and to the point. This will not be just another annual dinner; it is to be "Brown night in New York" and will begin with class reunions and cocktails in the foyer of the Ballroom and will continue until even the former denizens of Maxcy Hall are ready to say the last goodnight. A display advertisement elsewhere in this issue sets forth in some detail the arrangements made to date. These are subject to change, but the program when completed, is guaranteed to comprise the most effective and entertaining presentation of Brown men and Brown affairs ever staged in New York.

Brown today has a great story to tell. It will be told in New York, dramatically, by those who have figured in the events of the War just past, by those who stand pre-eminent in the public affairs of the day, and by those who will build the Brown of tomorrow.

President Wriston has signified his intention to be present and is expected to carry an important message from the University. Toastmaster "Bill" Brown '08 will keep things moving rapidly and will lend much to the occasion with his inimitable wit.

Although at this writing the date (March 28) seems a bit remote, interest in "Brown Night" among New York alumni is already mounting rapidly and it is evident that this affair will have the support of a goodly percentage of the 2,500 Brown men now located in the metropolitan area.

One of the First Funds

How Your Class Rated ◀ ◀

▶ ▶ It's 1907 AGAIN. For the third time in five years the Class has won the Trustees Bowl, with which the best Alumni Fund record is annually recognized.

The 1907 men, for whom George Hurley, Claude R. Branch, and William P. Burnham are agents, were on top the first two years the trophy was awarded. In 1943 Edward H. Weeks spurred his 1893 classmates on to take the prize as a feature of their 50th anniversary, and last year, under Raymond Buss, was the champion on its 25th anniversary. But now 1907 is back there in first place.

Not all the honors went its way. The 1944 winners, 1909, challenged throughout the campaign and came close to repeating but ended in second place. This class has been awarded the Champions' Bowl, which goes to the group which has the most consistently high record year in and year out. 'Ninety-three yields this cup to 1909 after winning it in 1944 when the Trustees for the first time rewarded a class which stays near the top and cannot make spectacular improvement over an already high standard. Improvement is a considerable factor in the fight for the Trustees Bowl.

New contenders for top honors this past year were 1930 in third place (up from 27th) and 1944 in fourth place (up from 53rd. Harold P. Carver takes the bow along with his classmates in 1930, while the 1944 showing is all the more remarkable in that it had no official Fund agents. So many of its members were in the armed services that it was not aggressively solicited, but the response speaks highly for its spirit, loyalty, and early understanding of the Alumni Fund idea.

Other classes in the top 10 were: 1900, 1905, 1943, 1898, 1910, and 1918. In addition, the awards committee (consisting of William A. Graham 16, Lewis S. Milner 02, and Richmond H. Sweet 26, cited the leading class in each Brown decade. These were: 1886, 1898, 1907, 1910, 1925, 1930, 1944.

Minah Goes to Yale

▶ THE RESIGNATION of Theodore W. Minah, manager of the Brown University Dining Rooms for five years, was announced Nov.

1 by Dr. Wriston. Lt. Comdr. Minah has been on leave of absence since May, 1942, when he entered the Navy as a Lt.(jg) and became Commissary Officer of the Naval Receiving Station, Boston, in charge of feeding 20,000 men.

Minah has begun work in the position of Assistant Director of the University Dining Halls at Yale, whose 14 units are located in each of the Colleges and in the Graduate and Divinity Schools. He was released from the Navy in November.

Eighteen months overseas in the European Theatre where he had charge of 10 widely scattered messes at Fleet Air Wing Seven, Mr. Minah received a commendation for this work. He is a graduate of the University of New Hampshire and of the Hotel Administration School at Cornell. ◀

▶ ▶ The Endowment Grows

▶ ▶ A JUNIOR PARTNER of the Alumni Fund is the Alumni Endowment, which during the past year added four-fold the number of names previously listed. Its total in January of 1946 was \$9,035.63 in the name of 157 individuals. This phase of the Alumni Fund makes it possible for one to give to capital in the same way the Alumni Fund encourages giving to current income, both to the benefit of Brown University.

The yearly united offering of the Alumni Fund from thousands of Brown men dwarfs the modest but satisfying start which the Endowment has made in three years time. And the annual campaign will continue to overshadow the capital fund indefinitely since there is no desire to detract from the importance of the current appeal.

Yet, the Alumni Endowment has its place. Just as the aggregate of individual gifts makes each Alumni Fund total impressive and effective, in the same way a bequest gains dignity and force, whatever

its size by being added to others. The modest legacy thus becomes more plausible.

By agreement with the University, the Alumni Endowment is set up as a permanent fund, to be held and administered by the University as a part of its general investment pool, getting the benefit of its fine management. (Last year University funds earned 4.25%.) The income which is properly attributable to the Alumni Endowment each year is added to the ordinary contributions for the current Alumni Fund. A bequest or gift to the Alumni Endowment thus earns its annual income and, added to the Alumni Fund, increases by that much the Alumni Fund's unrestricted gift to Brown.

The original thought was that the Alumni Endowment would principally attract bequests. But it was apparent that there were other incentives for gifts to the Alumni Endowment. Our very first gift came from a man who felt he was creating his own memorial. "Ordinarily I would feel that the principal of such a small gift should be made immediately available for expenditure for current needs. But I am making this addition to endowment for a sentimental objective, for the purpose of perpetuating my annual contribution to the Alumni Fund." Obviously, a person whose motive is to capitalize his customary annual gift cannot achieve such a purpose with too small a gift unless there are later additions. Members of the class of 1908 started on a program of this sort, in addition to gifts to the current campaign adding 112 names to the endowment roster last year.

The Trustees of the Brown Alumni Fund do not wish to lessen the vitality of the annual appeal, but the Alumni Endowment nevertheless makes a commended project within the Alumni Fund structure for the man who is thoughtful about the future as well as provident for the imperative present.

With \$5,215.61 added to the Alumni Endowment in 1944-1945, the total on June 30, 1945 was \$8,675.63. The income earned by the Endowment Fund during the fiscal year was \$234.81.

As was the case a year ago, when the first income from the Alumni Endowment was reported, the names of the donors or the persons memorialized appear in the regular roster of current givers with those of their classmates. The income is pro-rated for inclusion in class totals as well. ◀

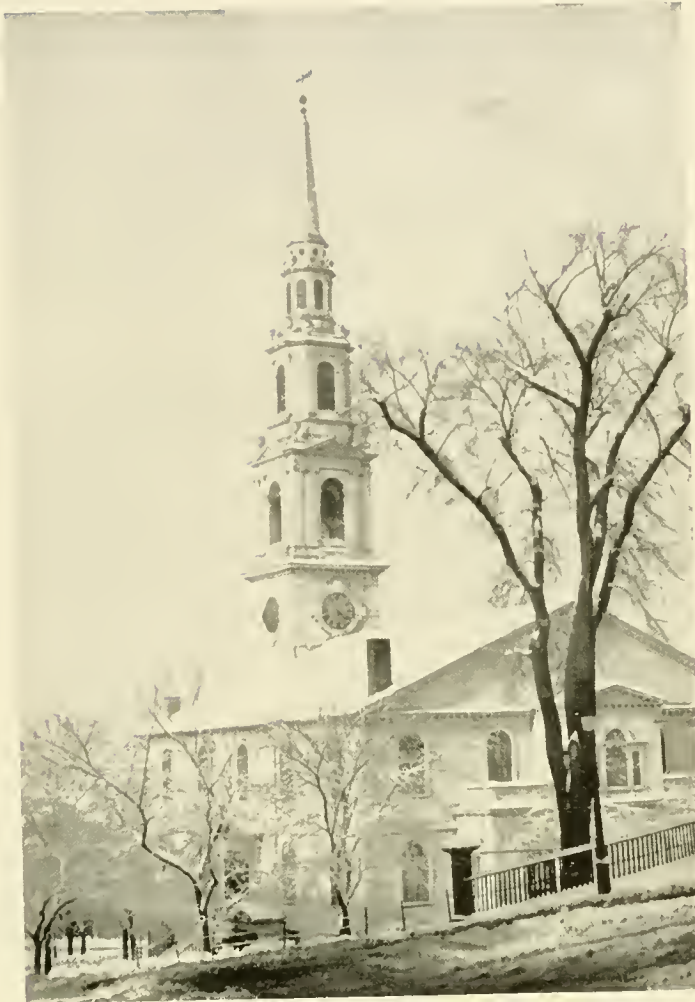
