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► ► The Alumni Fund: an Explanation

► ► IT IS HARDLY NEWS at this date that the Brown Alumni Fund for 1945-1946 broke all previous records. But a report is called for, even though the current Housing and Development Campaign preoccupies and rightfully holds the full center of the stage.

As has been the custom, this January issue of the BROWN ALUMNI MONTHLY lists the 4852 contributors who made possible the 1946 gift to income at Brown of \$78,023.95. There are some interesting studies of class performance and other statistics which highlight the success. And, in thanking his workers and all who gave, Chairman George T. Metcalf '13 answers some questions which have been asked concerning the status of Alumni Fund during the period of the all-out drive for \$4,000,000 for housing and development.

First, to recapitulate the achievement of 1945-1946: The amount given surpassed the record of \$75,623.79 established the previous year. The margin would undoubtedly have been greater, had not the Alumni Fund cancelled the active solicitation originally planned for June. This month is normally a highly productive month, with the stimulus of the Commencement period and the final contacts with prospects by the class and regional agents. Such a "round-up" would have been confusing with the start of the Housing and Development Campaign at Commencement time and was abandoned. Some regular contributors were missing from the Alumni Fund roster in consequence. Nevertheless, the number of givers rose from 4754 in 1945 to 4852 in 1946. Other contributors limited the amount of their gifts substantially in anticipation of the call of the Housing drive, but, even so, the per capita gift rose slightly, from \$15.91 to \$16.08—a new record high. Forty-one classes gave more than \$1000. (The champion classes are listed elsewhere in this issue, in connection with the award of the Trustees Bowl to the Class of the Year, 1893.)

"All this accomplishment," said Chairman Metcalf in reviewing the campaign, "pleased us the more because the Alumni Fund 'pulled its punches' in the final period of the scheduled campaign as the University's greater project was laid before the alumni. We can be proud of our Alumni Fund achievement. We say thank-you to our loyal contributors, to 400 volunteers in our organization, and to all who helped make the past year a success."

► TWO FACTORS had stimulated the 1945-1946 Alumni Fund Campaign. One was President Wriston's allocation of the Fund to the service of the Brown Faculty, an important item in the University budget at a critical time. It was further assurance that the vital human assets of Brown would not be neglected during a period when the enlarged student body gave special prominence to material facilities.

Another factor which aided the Alumni Fund was Chairman Metcalf's bold plan, endorsed by the Fund Trustees and other workers, which called for not only a gift but a

pledge for a future gift. This "Pay-Plus-Pledge" plan proved attractive to many and increased the Fund total materially by bringing gifts in two or more installments. It is true that the scheme's full effectiveness was not realized since the Trustees acknowledged that most pledges had been made before the Housing and Development appeal was launched. Some pledges were written off in view of later and larger commitments to the \$4,000,000 fund. Nevertheless, experience proved the idea of the pay-and-pledge type of contribution was wholly valid.

The Alumni Endowment of the Brown Alumni Fund also grew during the past year, with the addition of \$1607, making a total of \$10,282 received in the short time since this adjunct of the regular Fund was established. It provides an attractive medium through which a gift to Brown's endowment can be made, just as the Alumni Fund proper provides a medium for giving to current income. It serves as a particularly appropriate custodian of a memorial gift, since the income is regularly allotted to the Alumni Fund and provides an annual gift in the name of the individual for whom it is set up. During 1945-1946 the Alumni Endowment, invested as a part of the general University portfolio, earned \$369. The sum was shared by a considerable number of classes. The Class of 1908 has been stressing the Endowment in its Alumni Fund Solicitation.

The Class of 1892 Fund also benefited the Alumni Fund to the extent of \$263.

THE FUTURE OF THE ALUMNI FUND

► ► WHAT OF the Brown Alumni Fund in the present year of such intense and heartening activity on behalf of the Housing and Development Fund? The Trustees of the Alumni Fund conferred early with Col. G. Edward Buxton '02, national chairman of the \$4,000,000 project, and it was agreed that it would be unwise and impolitic to have two campaigns on behalf of Brown conducted simultaneously. They would duplicate effort, confuse each appeal.

Hence, the Trustees of the Alumni Fund undertook to do no active soliciting this year. There will be no mail campaign of the traditional character, no follow-up by agents along class or regional lines. As Mr. Metcalf says in his letter on the inside front cover, "this Report is unique in that, while recording the Alumni Fund progress of last year, it does not pave the way for an immediate renewal of the same valid appeal." He further amplifies the Trustees' policy in the following statement: "While the Brown Housing and Development Campaign continues, there will be no general solicitation for the Brown Alumni Fund. This decision is in response to the majority opinion, which seems to be that alumni should not be requested to give to Brown for two different purposes in the same year.

"However, many alumni have expressed disappointment that there will be no Alumni Fund campaign for 1946-1947. To them I say: You can still give if you want to, for the Fund Office is still open, and the need for the gift

continues, though overshadowed by the greater urgency for building. But don't depend on us to send you an appeal. We shall not even send notices to regular givers on the anniversary of their contributions. We shall not observe old instructions to send reminders on certain dates. If, like myself, you intend to give to the Fund as usual, as well as to the Housing and Development Fund, you'll have to take the initiative and send in your contribution without any urging on our part. Such a gift may be sent to: Brown Alumni Fund, Brown University, Providence 12, R. I."

Apart from that unobtrusive hint, the Alumni Fund is not campaigning. The Housing and Development Fund has the clear field for its mighty purposes.

▶ THE ALUMNI FUND organization is being kept intact, however. Trustees are meeting regularly for planning. A special committee, headed by H. S. McLeod '16, is maintaining close contact with the central organization of the Housing campaign, to observe, record and study techniques and information. As had been said by many, the Alumni Fund of the future ought to benefit greatly from the experience of this greater effort on a different basis, just as, in its modest way, the Alumni Fund helped pave the ground

for the other. James W. Gurll '38, Executive Secretary of the Alumni Fund, is in charge of the New York office of the Housing campaign. Many Alumni Fund volunteers of past years are active in the other project.

The Alumni Fund is not leaving the field. As Col. Buxton pointed out, its function is different from that of the Housing and Development Fund. Whereas the latter is a single, extraordinary appeal for something durable ("additions to the permanent fabric of a greater Brown"), the Alumni Fund has provided each year "a new gift to income for the current needs of the University. Each year this money, like a dividend from a fund of loyalty, was immediately employed. Given gladly and spent well, it needed an annual renewing."

The time will come when its valid appeal will be restored. In the meantime the Alumni Fund directs your loyal thoughts "to the vital enterprise in which all our hopes are so enthusiastically united"—the Housing and Development Fund, now at the halfway mark.

The Big Campaign's Good News ◀ ◀

BULLETIN: Brown's Housing and Development Fund passed the halfway mark just before the New Year. On Jan. 7 the total was \$2,040,000.

▶▶ A YEAR-END SPURT for the Brown Housing and Development Fund brought heartening news for all Brunonians, and the halfway mark was very near on Christmas Day. Earlier that week a total of \$1,945,000 was reported by Col. G. Edward Buxton '02, national chairman, showing a gain of a quarter-million in less than a month since Thanksgiving. Three larger gifts were identified during that period as from the retired Chief Justice, Charles Evans Hughes '81; John Nicholas Brown, a member of the University Board of Fellows who took office in November as Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Air; and the family of the late Zechariah Chafee '80, first Alumni Trustee on the Brown Corporation and later a Fellow.

Mr. Hughes' gift of \$50,000 was accompanied by a magnificent letter in support of the University's educational destiny. It prompted editorial comment in various newspapers as the word of an alumnus bearing true witness for the cause of the liberal arts and sciences. Special significance was attached to Mr. Brown's contribution of \$50,000 because of the association of his family with the University since it received its name.

Arrangements for the \$40,000 gift as a memorial to Mr. Chafee were completed at a family dinner on Thanksgiving Day when it was decided to provide a library and lounge in Alpha Delta Phi quarters in one of the quadrangles in the program. Participants in the gift are the immediate descendants of Mr. Chafee: Prof. Zechariah Chafee Jr. '07 of the Harvard Law School, Henry S. Chafee '09 of Providence, Mrs. James L. Gamble of Brookline, Mass., John S. Chafee '18 of Portland, Me., Mrs. Thomas B. Card, Pembroke '24 of Barrington, R. I., and Dr. Francis H. Chafee '27 of Providence. All four of the brothers are members of Alpha Delta Phi, as was their father.

Special activities have given a lift to the campaign in various sections of the country, with dinners in key cities, a popular skit between the halves of the Thanksgiving Day football game at Brown Field, and a special "Town and Gown" evening in Providence on Dec. 3.

THE FIFTH PAMPHLET

▶ BECAUSE of the exceptional interest in Mr. Hughes' letter, editorial comment on it, and the letter by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., '97 in support of the campaign and its objectives, the University published them in pamphlet form and distributed them to the alumni during the recent holiday season. Entitled "Testament of Faith," the pamphlet was similar in format to earlier publications on "The Structure of the University," "The Size of Brown," "Educational Housing," and "The University College." It included a foreword by Dr. Bruce M. Bigelow, Vice-President, and an exhortation by Col. Buxton which reported on the campaign up to Dec. 16.

Writing "with esteem" to President Wriston, Chief Justice Hughes said he was moved to make his gift to the campaign "not only by natural loyalty of an alumnus but by conviction that the success of this undertaking is essential to fulfillment of Brown's educational mission." He spoke of the University's "rich tradition of freedom of thought and action and of affirmation of the concepts of

human dignity and tolerance." "Its devotion to the ideal of liberal education is grounded in belief that broad study of the liberal arts and sciences is the best preparation for discharging the duties of citizenship with wisdom and imagination," he said, adding: "Never has the need been more urgent for men and women with such capacity."

Acknowledging the heavy calls on liberal arts institutions of university rank in the postwar world, Mr. Hughes continued: "Brown has a corresponding duty to offer this educational opportunity to its appropriate share of those who are qualified by character, intellect, and scholastic attainment. It is equipped, by a strong faculty and the size and character of its library, laboratories, and other facilities, to admit a larger number of students than it had before the war. What now stands in the way is serious deficiency in the quantity and quality of living quarters. To supply accommodations of such character as will meet this need and at the same time contribute a sound educational influence will enable Brown to take its rightful and unique place in serving the country in the critical years to come." Mr. Hughes is honorary chairman of the Housing and Development Campaign.

THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THE GIFT

► HIS GIFT has a meaning beyond the generous and warm-hearted contribution, said an editorial in the *Providence Journal* Nov. 22: "It is a testament of faith in the purposes of Brown in the future by a man whose life was influenced within its walls in the past." The writer found Mr. Hughes confirmed in the truth of Brown's educational mission: "the teaching of the liberal arts and sciences in the broad and humanistic tradition of Western civilization." Quoting the Charter's dedication to "preserving in the Community a Succession of Men duly qualify'd for discharging the Offices of Life with usefulness & reputation," the editorial acclaimed the Chief Justice for providing in his own life evidence of the fulfillment of Brown's purposes.

The editorial concluded: "The buildings to arise from the fund will be inanimate brick, steel and plaster. But they will be testimony to the living creed that, despite the chances and changes in this uncertain world during critical years, the purposes of Brown remain true and faithful to its origins and heritage and that its way shall be the enrichment of the mind and of the spirit. . . . The sentiments of Chief Justice Hughes, as well as the evidence of his loyalty, should be an inspiration to every Brown alumnus."

At the request of the campaign organization, the *Journal* provided 2000 reprints of the editorial, enough for every worker in the drive. In his foreword to the pamphlet, Dr. Bigelow also remarked that the editorial, expressing a general and genuine conviction, "speaks for both faculty and students, who with grateful appreciation witness the encouraging support of Brown's educational mission." "We at Brown," said Dr. Bigelow, "salute the generations of alumni and the host of University friends whose moral support and benevolence attest their loyalty to an old University."

BEYOND ORDINARY LOYALTY

► THE LETTER from Mr. Rockefeller was reprinted in full in this magazine last summer. Referring to that letter and Mr. Hughes', Col. Buxton said in the pamphlet: "These two distinguished alumni have expressed their faith in the national destiny of our ancient college. . . . Both have furnished great leadership on the highest level of American life. They make it plain that their generous gifts to Brown are inspired by motives beyond the call of ordinary alumni loyalty." He cited other letters from alumni who

similarly "implemented their faith with very tangible action."

The campaign is in midstream, Col. Buxton pointed out. As he wrote on Dec. 16, the total was \$1,820,000 but was mounting daily. The chairman reminded the alumni that when \$2,250,000 had been reached, Mr. Rockefeller had pledged a further gift of \$250,000. "It is the critical hour," Col. Buxton said. "Now is the most timely period in which to rally our reserves. If every alumnus or friend who has not given will accept the fact that this is the moment of decision, your Committee does not doubt the outcome."

FOR MEMORIAL PURPOSE

► IN ADDITION to the library and lounge for Alpha Delta Phi in memory of Mr. Chafee, Col. Buxton announced other designations in mid-December: A donor who desires at present to remain anonymous has designated his gift of \$30,000 to the establishment of a family memorial in the new quarters of Theta Delta Chi. Theta Delta Chi's lounge room is the unit selected by the donor. Max L. Grant '12 is the benefactor of Pi Lambda Phi, with a reservation of a student's single room for memorial purposes.

Memorial donations had reached the total of \$171,000 at this point, the majority of them located in the fraternity sections, as follows: Alpha Delta Phi—lounge, library, double room, recreation room; Beta Theta Pi—lounge, private dining room; Delta Upsilon—library; Phi Kappa Psi—library; Pi Lambda Phi—single room; Theta Delta Chi—double room. In the freshman units two single rooms have been donated, and a single room in the Pembroke dormitory. Col. Buxton reiterated that plans for the new

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quadrangles call for similar facilities in all fraternity houses, whether individual donors specifically provide them or not.

Three hundred twenty names had been placed on the list of donors of \$500 or more. They will appear on a plaque to "remind students of future years that Brown was built through the generosity of past generations, and its needs are being met by the present generation." In his last 1946 bulletin to campaign workers throughout the nation, Col. Buxton said: "For six months we have fought side by side for an ancient banner and a greater usefulness for Brown beyond the present horizon. Brown has profited in intangible values, in greater alumni interest, and in renewed loyalties above the very substantial sums that have been pledged from incomes both great and small. Our organization of working alumni has gained in fellowship—a bond that comes from collective effort for the common good." He called for a blaze of year-end activity, which seemed to be forthcoming.

THE RHODE ISLAND PHASE

► **RHODE ISLAND** campaigners have met regularly under Col. Dwight T. Colley '18. His Rhode Island Alumni Division has been given a quota of \$300,000, 54% of which had been reached Dec. 16. New donations on that date added \$36,302 and brought the total to \$162,145. Colley reported excellent spirit in his corps of workers and a "determination to carry through until our part is achieved." One of their best speakers was Dr. Charles A. Kraus, emeritus professor of chemistry at Brown.

This country is sorely in need of many more "real universities," he said, in order to emphasize the importance of the campaign and the collateral intention to enlarge faculty salaries. "The accumulation of knowledge during

recent years has been enormous," he pointed out. "Its application to the welfare of humanity is likewise large. We cannot provide adequate training in the usual four-year college course to disseminate this knowledge. It must be done in post-graduate university training, yet for 130,000,000 people in the United States, we have only 25 real universities equipped to give this advanced instruction." Brown was one of the few institutions in the country, he said, which has progressed gradually over 50 years from collegiate to university status. He felt the country needed 100 such universities to meet increasing demands but such facilities "will never come from the States or the national government." They will come into being only on private initiative and be supported by such individuals "as you and I," he concluded.

In Quest of Community Backing ◀ ◀

▶▶ BROWN UNIVERSITY, well along on its \$4,000,000 Housing and Development Campaign, turned in early December to the community of Providence and the State of Rhode Island for aid in achieving its goal. Its appeal was based on the kinship existing between town and gown, the resulting values of which justify support from the public. The first bid for community-wide participation was made Dec. 3 when more than 400 persons representing industry, government, and the general public attended a University-sponsored dinner in the Narragansett Hotel.

Hitherto the campaign had been conducted among the alumni of Brown. On that foundation of giving, — \$1,740,000 at the time — the gifts from the larger source were solicited at a highly successful meeting. Col. G. Edward Buxton '02, national chairman of the drive, was the presiding officer, and the first speaker was Dr. Harvey N. Davis '01, President of Stevens Institute of Technology, who emphasized the importance of higher learning in the world today. His talk was both sentimental and sound: "All these things that our country is going to need so sorely in the years immediately ahead lie in the very heart of the field with which such a college as Brown is traditionally and vitally concerned. Brown undergraduates, developing emotionally, ethically, and intellectually, are going to be your employes tomorrow, your colleagues a little later on, and eventually your successors in the business and industry, the political and intellectual life of this city and this State. If you want your children and their children to live in the kind of a community and a world that you believe in, you would do well to be proud of this college that is in your midst. You would do well to strengthen it in every way possible."

THE LOAF'S LEAVEN

▶ THE PRINCIPAL SPEAKER, President Wriston, reminded the audience that the University is a part of the community — more than that, the leaven in the loaf. He likened Brown's influence upon its environment to that of the parable: "The size of the leaven was not important; essential was the vital principle within it. The leaven was not detectable after the loaf was baked; if it had remained intact, it would not have discharged its obligation. The leaven performed its function of enrichment so subtly, so gradually, so naturally that no observation could detect the progress of its labors from moment to moment."

This influence was initiated and spread by citizens of vision and faith who believed that an institution "to which the youth may freely resort for education . . . would be for the general advantage and honor of the government." Dr. Wriston said: "It was made possible by generosity, which raised incredible sums of money for those times to ensure its location in this community. The funds were donated under the leadership of men of public spirit and as a public enterprise. Whenever there is opportunity to found a college today, communities compete for it as they used to do, a recognition that generosity in this respect brings rich dividends commercially indeed, but even more culturally."

The first buildings were community enterprises, the President pointed out. ("Courage erected the largest buildings in the colony, not for commerce or manufacture but for the enlargement of the mind of man and for the glory of God.") The Charter guaranteed a future of spiritual liberality—a perpetual ideal, consonant with that of the community. ("In the nation's history this community and

this University have epitomized freedom of thought, speech, and action, tolerance in religion, the peaceful association of races, creeds, and nationalities.")

Brown, he said, had grown in influence by the devotion of scholars and teachers who gave their lives "to the service of youth and the glory of God." Lives in whom the seed of learning was planted have testified again and again to their work: Horace Mann ("He exerted an influence so profound and so widespread that it remains a heritage even to this day."); William L. Marcy ("more universally active in dealing with our diplomacy than any Secretary of State after John Quincy Adams"); John Hay ("he promulgated policies in international relations—the integrity of weak states and the open door—which have never been improved upon"). Charles Evans Hughes had said in 1914, "Brown's roots are here, but its leaves are for the healing of the nation."

IN PRAISE OF FAMOUS MEN

"These are but examples of men who came from other communities to this city, drawn by the attraction of a University whose principles and practices were liberal, whose outlook was catholic and hospitable. Having set their candles alight in student days at Brown, they carried them to the far reaches of the earth. They but demonstrate the perpetual miracle by which heedless, irresponsible youth become heroes in war, effective citizens in peace, generous in philanthropy, public spirited in thought, word, and deed." And President Wriston praised great teachers with the words of Kipling, the praise of famous men, men of little showing, whose "work continueth, greater than their knowing," men who "with the toil of their To-day bought for us To-morrow."

The President cited names from the company of teachers in Brown whom these words summon to mind: James Manning ("that universal genius about whose personality the college formed as crystals form themselves about a string"); William Giles Goddard ("he occupied not a chair but a whole settee, a man of broad and cultivated mind"); Francis Wayland ("his ideas of reform laid foundations which bore fruit in higher education throughout the United States"); William Gammell ("he knew intuitively the powerful relationship which the past bears to the present and the manner in which both are projected upon the screen of the future"); John Larkin Lincoln ("in the deepest sense a teacher of the humanities"); Albert Harkness, Nathaniel Davis, Elisha Benjamin Andrews, William Carey Poland, Walter Goodnow Everett, William Herbert Perry Faunce.

Dr. Wriston mentioned the names of none still alive—"not because there were giants in earlier days who have left no worthy successors, far from it." "The faculty of today is like the faculty of the older days," he continued. "To the world, scholars seem locked in their ivory towers, withdrawn from the realities of a harsh world. But when the scientists were mobilized for the atom bomb, both for fundamental research and for selection of personnel, the Brown faculty was drawn upon. When the great problem of rent control and the housing shortage needed a critical mind to deal with it in perceptive terms, it was a man from the Brown faculty who brought the most searching analysis. Whether in combat or in intelligence work, in military organization or civilian support, our faculty rendered vital service. If I were to list the activities of the scholars who now serve the University it would be found that they cover many fields, that the men come from all over the world

(perhaps it is not generally known that we have three Chinese upon our faculty) and that they have gone literally the world around in their missions of research, instruction, intelligence and combat.

"Serving Brown University in this great historical succession, I cannot speak with pride, but only with humble thanksgiving that I may work with scholars and teachers who maintain and ever enlarge a great tradition, and with students worthy of their forefathers, more industrious and sober (note the comparative), more alert and responsible."

THE COMMUNITY'S RESPONSIBILITY

► THE UNIVERSITY is part of the community, President Wriston stressed. "As your forebears established it," he said, "you now share responsibility for its future. I know that there are other loyalties. Many of you are graduates of other institutions; no one would seek to subtract one whit from the natural and warm loyalties that each should and does feel for his alma mater. But even though you spent four years in the shade of other elms, you have lived your lives, as many of your forefathers lived theirs, in this environment and about this University. It is a part of your inheritance.

"Some of you went neither to Brown nor yet to any other college. Nevertheless, you have drawn from the atmosphere of this academic community more than many

of those who attended college here and then removed for their life's work to the uttermost corners of the earth and who have been out of touch with the life and work of the University through force of varied circumstances. There are, consequently, no competing loyalties. Rather, there are profoundly important complementary loyalties, each contributing to the other.

"As the community and the University have lived and prospered together for nearly 200 years, may their crescents increase and their altar fires glow ever brighter. In appealing for dramatic support at a climactic moment in world history we ask for a renewal of faith, a rededication to great ideals, a re-enforcement of a great bulwark.

"What Brown meant in 1764 and what it means in 1946 are identical; as it was of vast importance for the world of the 18th century, it is also of critical importance for the 20th. The problems of tolerance are even more pressing now than in 1764. More acute than ever is the need for the spiritual, moral, and intellectual values which led to the establishment of Brown, which have informed its history and remain the inspiration of its future. In so far as man's capacity to create power and release energy has out-run his mastery of the moral forces by which alone energy can be wisely channelled, the University now has a place even more essential than it had earlier in American history.

"If now this community gives support commensurate with those initial gifts in the 18th century, this program will succeed beyond our fondest expectations."

GOVERNOR AND MAYOR ASSIST

Governor John O. Pastore, bringing "greetings and exhortation," asserted that "as Brown prospers, so do we in Rhode Island prosper." Accenting the need and worth of the program, he declared the fulfillment of the goal necessary to the community. "Your Governor comes here tonight to ask you to devote your energies to this program. We must not ask the alumni of Brown to undertake this work alone."

Mayor Dennis J. Roberts of Providence had a similar message, simply and eloquently stated: "Brown is part of the fabric of this typical New England community. Now it undertakes, under excellent leadership, to expand its facilities. Your fellow citizens are anxious to aid you in your enterprise because they appreciate what Brown has done for Providence, are grateful for what it stands for. It gives expression to American thoughts, trains for an American way of living. From the hill above us but not remote from us, we gain a succession of new citizens who bring distinction to our city. We assure Dr. Wriston and Brown that they won't be disappointed in the support from fellow townsmen."

Commencement Set for June 16

▶▶ ON YOUR CALENDAR, ring the dates of Friday, June 13, through Monday, June 16. That is Commencement Week-end at Brown in 1947. While plans are still in the formative stage, committees are hard at work.

The Commencement period will begin, as in 1946, with a Reunion of Reunions in Providence in which all classes will join before breaking up for individual projects over Saturday and Sunday. Conducted as a dinner in Marvel Gym in 1946, this all-Brown gathering will be repeated in one form or another, as the result of a virtually unanimous vote of the classes last June.

Indications are that more and more classes will use the campus as headquarters for their weekend reunion. Some are urging revival of old customs: costume parade, baseball, and the like. There is even talk of turning the Friday evening gathering into an informal clambake on Aldrich Field. The Alumni Office will welcome suggestions. In the meantime, save the dates.

▶▶ THERE'S a picture on this page of a man with a pipe. There's a twinkle in each eye, a smile lurking about the mouth, and a general look of alert competence and friendliness. The photo hardly needs a caption for purposes of identification, for every Brown man knows Wally Snell.

On Jan. 1, 1947, Wally stepped out of the office of Brown Athletic Director after having done a valiant, often heroic wartime hitch. He carried the load in one of the most difficult periods imaginable, helping Brown to continue an athletic program during the war when many a college was unable or hesitated to do so. He continued as

a scientist as head of the important department of Botany, in which capacity he now can devote to the full his great talents as a teacher and man of research.

The Colgate game program on Thanksgiving Day was dedicated to Dr. Snell. A feature was a fine appreciation by Barney Madden, Providence sports writer, a Holy Cross alumnus, who took as his theme the thankfulness all Brown men, athletes or not, and all Brown friends must cherish—"a deep-rooted sense of gratitude today for having had the gift of that priceless gentleman, Dr. Walter H. Snell, down through the years."

"Thanksgiving Day originally was one on which thanks were given for the harvest, and so it is today that any and all affiliated with Brown athletics, for they surely appreciate the harvest of friendship and good-will that has been gathered for Brown by Wally Snell, not only from the collegiate fields but from the press, the radio, and public as well. Wally Snell has been described by countless observers as 'a great guy.' Self-effacing, deferential, quick to help,

he has spread the gospel of Brown on such a fundamentally sound basis that during his three years as Athletic Director the University's reputation was enhanced immeasurably, her friends multiplied and her debtors—for favors graciously granted—made legion.

"By foresight, by shrewd planning, by countless manifestations of friendship, he sustained Brown athletics on their accustomed plane through the war years. By lending assistance and advice to other institutions, to service and school teams, assistance and advice so vital that in many instances the beneficiaries were thereby steered away from discouragement and debt. As an athlete he was a three-sports star, a big leaguer in baseball. He was, and still is, a 'big-leaguer' in every fine respect.

"Now he is stepping out, devoting his time and energies to his beloved botany, and Brown adherents are filled with regret, but he is leaving the sports world healthier and happier for his contributions."

► **DR. SNELL'S ASSOCIATION** with Brown athletics dates from his arrival at Brown with the Class of 1913. He was a football fullback, a basketball guard, and a baseball catcher, excelling in all sports but particularly on the diamond where he was captain and All-American catcher. But he also earned election to Cammorian Club, Phi Beta Kappa and Sigma Xi. After a tour in professional baseball, with the Boston Red Sox and elsewhere, he took his Ph.D. at Wisconsin and entered Government service as a Forest Pathologist. He joined the Brown Faculty in 1920 and a year later undertook coaching duties which saw him coach nearly 50 Brown teams in three sports. Having become Stephen T. Olney Professor of Botany and head of the department, he retired—so he thought—from Brown athletics in 1940. But when Thomas W. Taylor entered military service in January, 1943, Dr. Snell was drafted for the top athletic post. He had been secretary of the Athletic Council for many years and brought that background as well. He is expected to continue his affiliation with the Council.

The *Brown Herald* also had warm praise for Dr. Snell, citing his efforts to bring back minor sports and his accommodating spirit in setting aside student blocks of tickets for football and basketball.

Dr. Snell's eminence in his scientific field is reflected in his membership in various societies, his successful projects as consultant and research worker, and his dozens of publications, some of which carried government and State imprints. He has been president of the Audubon Society of R. I., the R. I. Botanical Club, and the Brown Chapter of Sigma Xi. The botanist in him must be elated at his relief from the harassing labors of the past four years in the athletic directorate. But Brown knows its debt to him for a sportsmanlike performance of great importance, winning out against great odds, and playing the game every minute. ◀

Councilor of the A.I.A.

► **HOMER N. SWEET '07** was elected a member of the Council or governing body of the American Institute of Accountants at its 59th annual meeting this fall. He had just completed a term as one of the two vice-presidents of the Institute, of which he became a member in 1915. He is a past president of the Massachusetts Society of Certified Public Accountants, a partner in Lybrand, Ross Bros. & Montgomery in Boston, and a Trustee of Brown. ◀

Arthur E. Marley '24, State Department Commander of the American Legion in Rhode Island, has been elected president of the United Veterans Council of the State.

►► **THE CLASS OF 1893**, which led all other Brown classes in the year of its 50th anniversary, showed last spring that it had not shot its bolt. Once again its performance in the Alumni Fund campaign entitled it to selection as the Class of the Year; it will receive the Trustees' Bowl at the 1947 Advisory Council meeting in February. All workers for the Alumni Fund congratulate Edward H. Weeks, agent, class officers and other members of 1893 for their fine work.

And that is not all. Some of the factors used in determining the winning class are based on improvement over previous showings, a fact which automatically encourages a poor class but penalizes a good one. (It's easier to better a weak performance than a fine one.) For that reason, the Trustees a few years back established a second award, the Champions Bowl, which would go to the class with the best record for consistent excellence. This second award also goes to 1893—the first time one class has earned both trophies.

Because it always does well, 1893 has faced a difficult task annually in bettering past results. Year after year it gets 100% participation by all members, something which is hard to improve upon. Yet it has been first twice, second once, third once, and fourth once in six years.

A close second to 1893 in competition for the Class of the Year was 1891, for which E. A. Barrows is head agent. Other classes in the select 10 were: 1938, 1888, 1887, 1911, 1910, 1926, 1916, and 1892—in the order named. The committee on awards (composed of Ray Buss '09, H. S. McLeod '16, and R. A. Hurley, Jr., '32) cited two of those classes particularly: 1938 and 1926, because of spectacular improvement. The former class, under A. G. Singen, climbed from 55th position to third, increasing its gift by \$572. and the participation of its members from 96 to 157. E. R. Austin '26 has seen his class pull up from the bottom of the list a few years ago to 21st a year ago and eighth in 1946. Both class campaigns were thorough, imaginative, and well organized, meeting with a good response in consequence.

The Class of 1907, first a year ago, slumped to 24th but had done so well in the past six years as to be named runner-

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up to 1893 in consistency. Three firsts and a ninth in six years have been the portion of 1907 under George Hurley.

Five factors were given top importance in deciding the over-all championship: 1—the percentage of contributors, based on the number of grads for whom good addresses are current; 2—the percentage of increase in this regard; 3—percentage of increase in dollar total; 4—per cent of quota; and 5—improvement in this regard.

Champions in each decade were cited as follows: 1888, 1893, 1901, 1911, 1926, 1938, and 1943. ► ► The Herald and Its Plans

► ► AMONG other campus activities currently in the state of resurrection from the effects of the war is the *Herald*, student newspaper of Brown since 1891. Slowly but certainly the *Herald* is assuming its former position as reporter of collegiate affairs and molders of campus opinion.

It was an arduous task, possibly similar to the struggles of the first *Herald* board 55 years ago, to recreate the publication and re-establish it to a rightful place in Brunonia's halls. From an unholy alliance with the *Pembroke Record* resorted to under stress of war-time necessity in 1943, the *Herald* has managed to unloose itself from the shackles of feminine direction and has asserted itself again and again as the spokesman for Brown men and Brown men's rights and responsibilities.

The *Herald* now pauses as a tri-weekly newspaper on the threshold of a daily. All the members of the staff are keenly anxious to make their *Herald* the standard by which other newspapers may judge themselves.

In its present limited capacities, the *Herald* is supporting the revival of minor sports in the interest of several hundred undergraduates who signified their approval in a well-received *Herald* poll; forums for the discussion of University problems as well as extra-curricular affairs are conducted; and adequate coverage is supplied to items connected with the veterans on campus, fraternity news, and reunions at the Old France.

Three returned combat veterans have been guiding the *Herald* on the path to its assumption of a daily status: Jack Levy '46, editor-in-chief; Adrian Becker '46, business manager; Bob Rocchio '47, managing editor. They would like to prove that Brown University with its present enrollment of 2700 men is worthy of a daily newspaper and all the advantages that may thereby accrue. There is every indication that the *Brown Daily Herald* will boast of a press wire containing the latest in national and international news for the readers' enlightenment.

What the *Herald* needs now is support. It has the willing hands and hearts. It merely requires the moral and financial help of those Brown men who believe that their school is deserving of a worthwhile, up-to-the-minute newspaper. The innovations arranged attest to the spirit of the staff members. Circulation among interested alumni will provide the means of carrying out these journalistic features.

The *Herald* is currently in the midst of such a subscription circulation campaign. Only three dollars (\$3.00) will entitle an alumnus to the *Brown Daily Herald* for a period beginning February 12, 1947, through June, 1947.

We'll Remember Sam ◀ ◀

▶ ▶ AFTER 21 SEASONS on the job, Sam Fletcher resigned his post as coach of Brown soccer Nov. 1, because of his business interests in Florida. He had been Brown's first and only coach in this sport. He left with an outstanding record, including a pair of champions and one undefeated team, and all Brown men wish him well, in gratitude for all he did through the years.

"Soccer is not a major sport, as sports are measured in this section," wrote Columnist Earl Lofquist '26 of the *Providence Journal*. "But soccer was Fletcher's game, and the game used him well. As a player of the game, he was one of the better men. Back in the days when crowned heads were more plentiful in Europe than they are now, he played before kings and heard the personal congratulations from at least one of them. He came to Providence to play and manage and promote professional soccer. He had some hours of triumph, some of disappointment. He stayed with the game."

"He always contended that soccer is the best of all games played outdoors. (He led his players to think so, too, incidentally.) He wanted to see soccer take a more important place in the American scheme of things, and knew how to get it there. The idea was to grab the boys when they were young and teach the generation coming up how to play the game. He took measures to see that soccer balls and other essential equipment should be made available to grade schoolers. The well-intentioned plot failed. 'Give a group of American boys a soccer ball, and the minute you turn your back on them they will line up in a T formation and start running plays through tackle or around the ends,' he explained."

▶ "SOCCER HAS BEEN good to Fletcher. He admits it freely. Of that which he received from soccer what Fletcher treasures most is the 21 seasons he spent coaching Brown men in the rudiments of the game. Soccer as played in our colleges lacks the glamour of football that stems from rugby. The players perform before stands that are empty, or nearly so. Neither the game nor the players hit large type. But those players work as hard, train as hard, try as hard as do the more publicized heroes. Fletcher liked working with them."

"Ask him to name the best Brown soccer club he ever coached, and he is sure to answer, 'The one I have now.' He does not measure teams in terms of games won and lost, though he likes to win, of course. It is the boys he thinks of. 'You work with a bunch of those lads and you get to liking them, and you discover that this particular team is the best you ever had.' 'Then,' he says, 'they are graduated or leave school for one reason or another, and you have a new group under you and you find that they are just as fine a collection of boys as the team that you had before.'"

"Through the years that Fletcher has been coaching, Brown soccer teams have won their fair share of games. Except for accidental transfers from foreign soil, he has had to build from the group up. The average American young man has no notion whatsoever of how to put his toe to the ball. Fletcher has been busy teaching the fundamentals. He was satisfied and happy doing that. Of his own volition he

is turning his back on the game which has determined the major direction of his life. He is taking the step reluctantly and only because there are too many miles between Clearwater, Fla., and Providence, R. I. Good luck, Sam. And hoot 'em laddie."

▶ FLETCHER'S LAST SEASON was a creditable one, although the team won three, lost four, and tied two. It scored 17 goals and yielded 17. The high spot was the Yale game, on the eve of which Fletcher confided his plan to retire. His boys played inspired soccer against one of the best college teams in the country this fall, with a tie as the result. His last game was a victory over Tufts 4-2. Another tie was the 1-1 stalemate with Harvard, although chances for victory were plentiful. The season ended with a 1-0 overtime thriller with M. I. T. as victim. Brown also beat Coast Guard, lost to Connecticut, Wesleyan, Worcester, and Springfield. The story all autumn was a strong defense, good team play, but no shooting ability in scoring spots. One sharpshooter like Novas,

the Costa Rican star on the 1945 team which lost only to Yale, would have made this 1946 club really hot.

But they had a lot of fun, and so did Sam Fletcher. He would have gone away really happy if only he had not missed that goal he nearly scored in scrimmage on the practice day right after the Yale game. Incidentally, he was still wearing the same pair of soccer shoes presented to him in 1926 when he coached his first season at Brown. They'll be a reminder of many happy afternoons on Aldrich Field. And so will the watch which the Providence Brown Club gave him a year ago on his 20th anniversary. His address is 412 North Madison Ave., Clearwater, Fla.

Fletcher left his charges in most capable hands, for Joe Kennaway, internationally known goalie, succeeded him Nov. 1. He was selected seven times as Scotland's goalkeeper in Britain's international series. He reached the heights with the Glasgow Celtic team in the first division of the Scottish League, played with the Canadian champions, Vickers, in 1944, and has starred in American soccer as well, currently in the National League. He was immediately popular on Aldrich Field. ◀

Rebuilding Basketball ◀ ◀

▶ ▶ THE BROWN BASKETBALL team had a going-away present of a victory for its new coach at holiday-time, and this triumph over M.I.T. showed that the quintet had come along a good bit from its shaky start. Connecticut, Harvard, and Dartmouth had beaten us previously. The 16 games ahead are notable in that the Bears will play "garden" basketball on three occasions, a departure from policy which has tended to limit play in the past to college gymnasium floors.

The man at the helm this winter is Wilber C. Ewbank who takes over the post so capably filled for four years by Rip Engle, whom he served during football as backfield coach. With football back on the pre-war basis, Engle is limiting his winter coaching to supervision of the Freshman basketball five. "Weeb" Ewbank came to College Hill with a fine reputation as a builder of precision teams. His past experience in the rugged midwestern league both at Miami (Ohio) University and at the Great Lakes Naval Training Station fitted him admirably for his work at Brown.

He had his problems to start with. Although he started his squad working nights in October, it was on a three-a-week basis only, and he could not give full time to his charges until the grid season bowed out. Some of his operatives were gridders, too. The necessity of drilling a new system of play made the early performances ragged.

▶ CONNECTICUT was much farther advanced in the inaugural game, scoring early and often to set up a 31-9 lead in 13 minutes, never to be threatened thereafter, although the Brunonians sank point for point the rest of the night. Brown stuck to a double pivot attack which was so slow in forming that the opponent had his defense in good shape always. Hesitant and uncertain, the Bruins passed faultily, too, and were definitely not at home in their new style. Brown's high scorer of the past three years, Woodie Grimshaw, sank only one field goal, kept out of his favorite shooting positions by the new system. Brown made only 13 goals, sinking 18 foul

shots of 34. Fourteen Bruins were used as Ewbank experimented with his talent. The score: Connecticut 65-44.

Even in defeat against Harvard (61-48), Brown looked a much-improved team later in the week, and the duelling was close until the visitors from Cambridge streaked from 11-10 to 21-12. Then the Bruins banged their way back into contention again only to slip back to 29-19. Midway in the half Harvard was coasting at 48-29 when Dutch Schultz, a pre-war letterman from Pawtucket with a good long shot, entered the game and paced a revival to hold what was narrowed to an eight-point

margin. In the final analysis it was control of the backboards which won, for Brown seldom had a chance to shoot a second time after a missed shot—and there were many such. Still, plays went according to plan with encouraging frequency and hinted that victories lie ahead.

The progress continued in Hanover where Brown left the floor at mid-game with a 19-17 lead. Weakness at the foul line was costly to the Bears, especially since it was a roughish contest with 40 personal fouls called. In winning 47-34, Dartmouth scored 19 out of 25 free throws while Brown converted only 8 out of 23.

Drills on defense bore fruit, for M.I.T. was held at bay, and Brown led 19-10, 32-15, 55-32, and finally 62-49. It was a very encouraging performance, for the offense also improved markedly. The attack under Ewbank doesn't put the burden on any one individual, and scoring was shared by 10 of the 14 players, although again a dangerous proportion of free throws were misses—12 out of 28.

▶ WITH A LARGE student body, the Athletic Office has had to introduce new methods of ticket distribution which call for getting the tickets several days ahead of time before the general sale to the public starts. A maximum of 1500 student tickets will be sold at any home game, leaving 500 for the public. Brown will go into the Boston Garden for the first time when it clashes with Boston College in January, B. C. having no adequate home floor. In addition, to accommodate the great public demand, Brown will go into the R. I. Auditorium in Providence to meet R. I. State and Providence College. Seven thousand is the capacity of that arena. Except for an occasional charity game, Brown has adhered to its policy of playing all home games in Marvel Gym and has turned down tempting offers to appear in various "gardens" elsewhere. For the two intra-State contests it would deny a chance to attend to all but a fraction of the student bodies.

More than 60 candidates answered Ewbank's call for practice. Seven of them were veterans of the fall sports: Grimshaw, Paul Flick, Preston Barry, Vin D'Angelo, Don Strobel, Walter Mahoney, and Dick Evans, the last a soccer player. Holdovers from last season include Grimshaw, Paul Nickel, Dave and Paul Zuber, Manny Costa, Paterno, and Bill Baker, the last handicapped by injury. In addition, some pre-war basketball men are back: Roy Swinger, Hal Miller, who played as a Freshman; Dutch Schultz, Jim Tyrrell, and Jack Wood, who already hold letters. Tyrrell, injured and out of December play, was named the most valuable player in the Robins Field AAF hoop tournament. Wood dates from Tippy Dye's 1942 team. Another to return is Bob Smith, a six-foot four performer from Palm Beach who once racked up 43 points for Brown. Another forward is Bob Friend from Stonington, Conn., who played Army basketball in Alaska. In the center spot Ewbank has given special attention to the football tackle, Paul Flick, giant West Virginian who won All-State honors as a schoolboy in Martinsburg. John Mustee of New York played for Wesleyan while a Navy student two years ago, and Mars Bishop is a former Brown Jayvee from Skokie, Ill. Among the guards is Ernest Corner, former All-

New England schoolboy from Pawtucket. Twelve boys are six feet tall or above.

Grimshaw has the unique distinction of being captain for the third year in a row but will graduate in February. The Brown supporters are hoping the squad will hit its stride, for the potential is high.

The Freshmen were also off to an inauspicious start against Connecticut, losing 56-37, but they came back to top the Harvard Junior Varsity 66-44. Patrick and Mahoney, forward and center respectively, have proven high scorers, the latter tallying 22 against Harvard. The Frosh and the Brown Jayvees played a thriller as a curtain-raiser to the M.I.T. Varsity, and the Junior Varsity edged their fellow Brunonians 62-60 in an overtime melodrama. Mahoney scored 12 baskets from the floor that night for a 26-point aggregate.

On the Waterfront ◀

▶▶ SIX WEEKS after practice started on Oct. 15 with a squad of 50, Coach Joe Watmough dared express the opinion that his 1946-47 Brown swimming team would be better than average. His optimism was borne out by victories in two of the first three meets, although plenty of trouble awaited him after the Christmas interval. The team shows strength in the sprints, distance races, and breaststroke.

Three holdovers from last year's varsity are available: Capt. Matt Holiday, a distance man who has been shifted to the backstroke to bolster a weakness in that event; Dick Briesmeister in the free styles; and Alan Willoughby backstroke. Although Phil Carson, the star of last winter's squad, continues in college, he did not report during the first semester. A wartime prisoner of the Germans, he carried a heavy burden in 1945-46 competition and is reluctant to take up the training grind again, although Coach Watmough offered to use him only in the

relays. This married vet holds the pool record in the 220 freestyle.

Four outstanding Bruins have returned from the service. One is the former New England intercollegiate champion in the 200-yard breaststroke and the 300-yard individual medley, Carl Paulson, the 1943 captain who won the NCAA indoor championship in the breaststroke double-century that year. He is undefeated in that specialty in three meets this year to date, and took two of three firsts in the 220 freestyle. Another big gun is Ralph Gossler, who swam as a Freshman for Brown in 1941 and holds the Colgate Hoyt pool record of 53 seconds for the 100 freestyle, a schoolboy performance in the Brown Interscholastics. He has five firsts and a second out of six possibles in this season's competition in the 50 and 100.

Bob Kesselring, a diver on the 1943 team, and John Lee, a sprinter from 1942, have also resumed their studies. Bill Irvine, a former varsity diver of considerable ability, is back on the Hill, too, but is a sideline observer. Newcomers of particular promise are Bob Pendleton of Barrington, R. I., who took the 440 against M.I.T.; and Adam Sobolewski, backstroke from Springfield who won his event at Storrs. ▶ TECH OPENED the season with a visit to Providence under its veteran coach, Gordon Smith, one-time Brown star. It was a meet which hinged on the final relay, for the score was tied 34-34 at that point. Gossler's times in the dashes were close to prewar form: 34 seconds and 55.4. Paulson's 2:39.8 in the 200-yard breaststroke was also impressive. Despite their double-victories and the medley relay points taken by Holiday, Laric, and Oxholm, Tech swept the dives and the backstroke, with a majority of seconds and thirds in other events. Consequently, the pressure was on Pendleton in the 440, for Tech could have taken the meet by running one-two in that event. Pendleton came through with a first, however, providing the basis for the victory at relay-time.

Against Yale, only Gossler and Paulson broke through for first places, and it was 58-17 for the Elis. Paulson did his 200 breaststroke in 2:33.8, while Gossler shaved his time in the 50 to 23.8. The former had to come from behind in the last lap. Brown's only second place was Gossler's in the 100.

Gossler set two pool records as Connecticut bowed at Storrs 46-29. In the 50 his 29.8 performance clipped 1.2 seconds from the posted mark, while his century was a full two seconds better than the previous 56.4.

In Freshman ranks there is a wealth of talent, as was shown by the strong duel with Yale. Milton Brier, former Moses Brown breastroker with national rating, copped his 100-yard event in 1:07.8; while Leeming won the 100 freestyle in 59.4. The Cubs' two relay groups—Schechter, Brier, and Bugbee; McKelvey, Griffiths, Fisher, and Leeming—took their points handily, too. Other leaders in the squad of 19, which survived the cut from the original 50, are O'Donnell, diver, and Syburg, backstroke.

Full Card for Track

▶ ELEVEN INDOOR engagements and eight in the open provide the heaviest track schedule for Brown in many a year. The 1947 season will start Jan. 25 when a selected contingent will compete in the West Point Relays, while the mile relay is entered in the Prout games in Boston on the same day. Robert Schleicher,

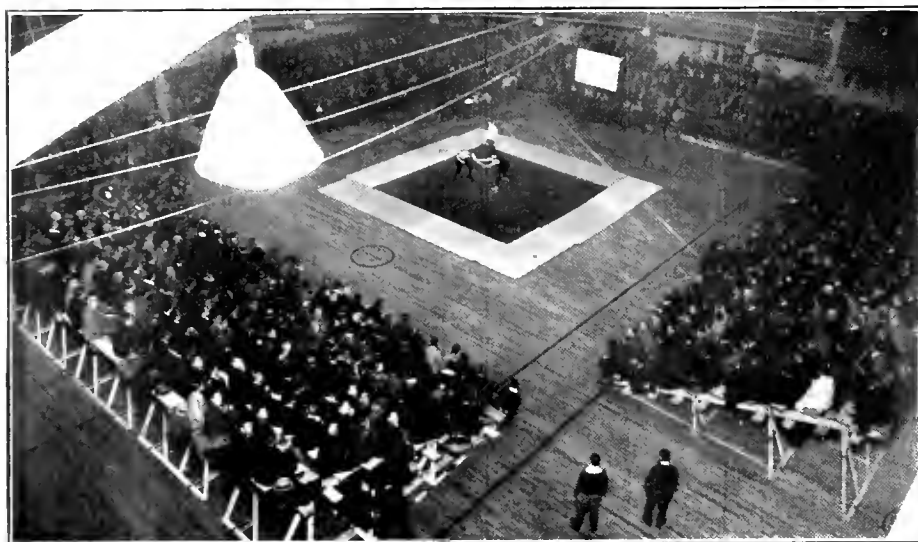
vaulter and high jumper, will be captain.

A preview of talent came on Dec. 15 when the Brown two-mile relay quartet whipped Harvard and Rhode Island in a practice meet at Cambridge. The Tobey twins, from Barrington, Royce Crummin, and Bud Black were the Bruin runners, Crummin turning in a 1:54 leg. But Coach Fuqua warned that the distances were actually only 860 yards instead of the regulation 880.

The Return of Wrestling ◀ ◀

▶▶ INTERCOLLEGIATE WRESTLING will return to the Brown sports schedule this winter, as the result of action by the Athletic Council. The board's deliberations in November and December also held out encouragement to the hope that hockey will be back a year hence. Tennis, continued informally during the war, will have its former status next spring, while golf is also due to return, at least by 1948.

Hockey receives added impetus through the construction of an outdoor rink on Aldrich Field, just to the north of the Marvel Gym, and a lively intramural season is being planned by Westcott E. S. Moulton, former Brown star who is assistant professor of physical education. He helped coach the Yale varsity last winter while on the faculty at New Haven. A number of Brown students, informally banded together without official recognition, are competing in a Rhode Island amateur league in games at the R. I. Auditorium, which will be Brown's home rink next year in intercollegiate scheduling. The irregulars, playing under the name of the Providence Clippers, had considerable success in a schedule of their own making last winter with several college and amateur teams.

Ralph G. Anderton, former Brown wrestling star, has accepted the coaching responsibilities in connection with the mat

revival for this winter. Thirty candidates reported to him for his first drill early in December, including several former Rhode Island schoolboy stars and Bill Eastham, formerly of Andover. No schedule of meets was ready for announcement at New Year's.

Anderton was a stellar contender as a member of Brown's undefeated New England champions of 1928-29, was captain and Yankee 135 pound title-holder the following year. He was Freshman coach at Brown in 1933-34 but has been particularly successful at East Providence High School where for 15 years he developed outstanding teams, including several championship outfits.

Anderton is well known in intercollegiate circles as an official and had been assigned to referee the Yale-Penn., Dartmouth-Cornell, and Yale-Harvard meets this year. He attended the N.E.I.W.A. meetings at Springfield in December, being named to a committee of four to plan the New England Intercollegiate.

Skippers ◀

▶▶ SAILING CONSISTENTLY WELL throughout the fall season, Brown University skippers were placed with the leaders in virtually every regatta as the yachting revival swept the College. It was a good autumn on the Seekonk at the Brown Boat Club, and the competition elsewhere broke records.

The feature regatta of the year was that of the Intercollegiate Yacht Racing Association for the sixth competition for the Erwin H. Schell trophy on the Charles River Basin at M. I. T. Twenty-seven colleges were contenders, and Brown took a second spot, behind Tufts. On Nov. 10 Brown qualified in its group when Charlie Ill took two firsts, a third, and three fourths in six starts, while Rick Wilson took two firsts, a second and three thirds. On Armistice Day Wilson was the leading skipper in his division, with two firsts, a second, and a third against a crack field in seven races. The final scores of the championship grouping: Tufts 137, Brown 126, Coast Guard 121, Boston University 118, Yale 118, the favored M. I. T. 115, Naval Academy 104, Northeastern 102, George Washington 85, Middlebury 77, Holy Cross 75, Trinity 68. Eliminated in the trials were: Dartmouth, New Hampshire, Amherst, Pennsylvania, Stevens, Cornell, Bowdoin, N. Y. State Maritime, Drexel, Michigan, Rhode Island, Princeton, Worcester, Boston College, and Harvard.

Brown was going well in the fifth annual Danmark Trophy regatta on the Thames at New London until the last race when it slipped to third place behind Yale and M.I.T. The finals: Yale 232, M.I.T. 230, Brown 223, Tufts 201, Cornell 191, Dartmouth 173, Northeastern 164, Coast Guard 161, Harvard 160, Michigan 150, Princeton 143, Trinity 125.

The Brunonians were runners-up to Tech in the 14th annual regatta at Cambridge as the home skippers retained possession of the Jack Wood trophy on Nov. 3. The two schools dominated the racing, for Engineers had four skippers and Brown two among the top six. The results: M. I. T. 198, Brown 161, Coast Guard Academy 128, Dartmouth 120. Brown scoring was: Wilson 51, Ill 42, Commodore Henshaw 38, Morris 30.

▶ BROWN WON one of three regattas on the Seekonk, capturing the big fall invitation event. Coulson of Yale was high point man with 56, but Wilson and Ill tied for second with 54, Wilson's feat being the more remarkable in that he fouled out of one race, otherwise getting a first, four seconds, a third, and a fourth. The totals: Brown 108, Coast Guard 101, M. I. T. 100, Yale 96, Northeastern 91, Harvard 79, Dartmouth 65, Trinity 62. In an earlier informal regatta Northeastern took eight out of ten firsts to run off with the laurels: Northeastern 86, Yale and Brown tied at 60, Trinity 50, Tufts and Worcester 49, New Hampshire 44, Holy Cross 29. Rhode Island defeated Brown 166 to 158 in a 10-boat duel at home on a day when the two best Bears were competing elsewhere. A sportsmanlike aspect was the lending of the fleet to the Rhode Islanders for practice and eliminations earlier.

Brown was third in the seventh annual Freshman championships of the ICYRA on Oct. 13. Team scores: Yale 162, Rhode

Island 156, Brown 136, M.I.T. 131, Boston College and Northeastern 123, Harvard 121, Princeton 120, Williams 115, Middlebury 87. Roberts led his division with 82 points, but Ill had a rare bad day with only 54. Non-qualifiers were from Tufts, Holy Cross, Bowdoin, Amherst, and Coast Guard.

There was good sport during the revival of the competition for the Zechariah Chafee trophy on the Seekonk, the annual award before the war in the Brown alumni-undergraduate regatta. The old-timers led 363 to 350; although the students took the first two races, the balance went to the alumni.

There was plenty of talent in the alumni line-up, with Len Romagna and Dick Field setting the pace. Other skippers and crews for the grads were: John Mason and Prescott Gustafson; Charlie Barber and Bob Allen; Alan Young and George Slade; the Gustafson twins, Clifford and Clifton; Charlie Philbrick and Rollin Whyte; Dick and Jerry Dunn.

Weather was unusually favorable all fall and allowed late racing in comfort.

A Luckless November ◀▶

►► BROWN SOUGHT IN VAIN for a varsity football victory in November, but no supporter of the Bear could deny that he had had his allotment of thrills. Games against Holy Cross and Colgate were literally dropped when Brown held the lead but they go down in the books as gallantly fought. It was a team which drove in vain to overcome its physical handicaps of injury, slowness, and inexperience. Surely, the football gods might have smiled a bit more generously on a game underdog, for two defeats and a tie might well have gone our way instead.

Scores not previously reported are: Brown 14, Boston University 14. Holy Cross 21, Brown 19. Yale 49, Brown 0. Harvard 28, Brown 0. Colgate 20, Brown 14. The triumph over Dartmouth prevented listing at the bottom of the Ivy Group.

When the personnel was available to man its forward passing attack, the Bear showed itself capable of two touchdowns as a game minimum. With Finn out of

the line-up on two occasions, the offense was without punch for all opponents knew our passes were keyed around him. At no time had we backs fast enough to run outside, and it was rugged line play, good quarterbacking, deception, willing blockers, and team precision which afforded our threat. The same slow foot and inexperience gave trouble on pass defense, with just enough lapses in every game to bring grief and the word is used in its honest, poignant sense.

► AFTER BEATING DARTMOUTH, the Brown coaches worried all week about a letdown against Boston University, but no one would listen. Two easy touchdowns and 14 points in the first quarter only fortified the Bruin overconfidence, one score registered on a Finn shovel pass to Dorsey at the climax of a 10-play, 60-yard advance and the other on a Finn-to-Dorsey forward. B. U. had the edge in the second quarter and scored in the third, but Brown was withstanding the pressure as the end of the game neared. Then two disastrous fumbles gave the Terriers their chance, and Zeno passed to Hatch for 72 yards in the final 40 seconds, enabling the tie that was a moral victory for B. U. The visitors had previously completed only three of 14 passes.

The following Saturday at Worcester it was Brown's turn to come from behind. Things looked dour with the Crusaders ahead 14-0 at the half, though we held once on the six-yard line. But the Bruins marched 85 yards, with Dorsey and Swingler running hard. Six plays later Nelson caught Finn's 40-yard pass and ran 18 more for the touchdown. Undismayed by the failure to convert, the Bear roared again. Regine recovered a fumbled kickoff, the backs moved on to the one-yard line, suffered a penalty but scored again on a Finn-Nelson aerial. And that spectacular comeback should have been the ball game, but again Brown fumbled, and for a third time Holy Cross passed to a touchdown, and victory, as time was running out. It was a heart-breaker to lose. The Bear earned plenty of credit in defeat.

► THE COACHES had a job on their hands to get the team "up" again after that one. And, to make matters worse, Finn reported an injury after dressing for the Yale game. With no more warning than that, Brown was without its star passer, play-caller, and ball-handler in the Engle T. The Bruins threw a scare at the outset, even so. Swingler made a brilliant runback of the opening kickoff for 56 yards, and a Piloto-Schuster pass netted 25 more. Then, on the Yale four, a weird, impromptu lateral resulted in a fumble. Brown was never in the game again, as Jackson had a field day. Brown made 10 first downs but could not piece them together.

Swingler was hurt on the second play of the Harvard game, and another threat was gone from the offense. Though Brown made 10 first downs to Harvard's nine, we got no nearer than the 27-yard line. The backfield, in addition to lapses on two vital passes, was slow in supporting the line on running plays, too, and it all added up to an unhappy afternoon, except for substitutes who paraded from the Harvard bench.

Colgate had a great psychological weapon in the Thanksgiving Day game, for it was Andy Kerr's farewell to football at Hamilton. But Brown looked to be overcoming it and seemed on the way to a triumph that would have been sweet. Finn was back at his best, and Shaughnessy was driving hard in Swingler's berth. Twice Brown took the lead, once on an 80-yard advance in the first half. During the intermission, Kerr asked his men for three touchdowns—and got them. The first tied the ball game, but Dorsey power plays and a pass, Finn to Campbell, set the stage for Shaughnessy's second score in the third

►► **POINTS AFTER TOUCHDOWN:** Several Brown players attracted the attention of those who picked annual All-This and All-That football teams. Capt. Jim Lalikos was named on the Associated Press All-Eastern second team at tackle, while Iacuele and Dorsey gained honorable mention at guard and back posts. On the All-New England eleven of the International News Service McClellan was spotted at first tackle, while Lalikos was on the second team and Swinger in the second backfield. Iacuele and two backs, Finn and Nelson, received honorable mention. Regine, center, and Grimshaw, end, were also noticed on various squads. Tom Dorsey was chosen to play for the East in the Shrine's New Year's Day game on the Pacific Coast. . . . Brown Field was jammed the Saturday after Thanksgiving Day when the University lent its facilities to the Mount Pleasant-Cranston schoolboy championship game, which was a beaut. . . . Providence College sent over a tough football team in November which defeated the Phi Gamma Delta outfit, champions of the Brown intramural league. . . . Jerry DeAngelis, Brown varsity guard, took part in two glider landings during the war—in Normandy and Holland. He played in the first American football game staged in the Olympic Stadium in Berlin. . . . The 20th anniversary of the famous Iron Men of Brown was duly celebrated with newspaper features and other ballyhoo. But for durability, Paul Gleeson, Brown sports publicist, pointed out that

the late Iron Joe Coulter took the prize. Coulter played every minute of every game in his four years, 1901, 1902, 1903, and 1904. Of the moderns, Nelson Munson averaged 58.8 minutes for the 10 games of 1929, and John McLaughry averaged 58.1 minutes in the nine games of 1937. . . . Myron Curtis '07, new President of the Brown Club of Cleveland, has promised to pick us an All-Brown team on an unusual but worthy basis, that of enthusiasm for the game, made up of boys who were keenest on playing. . . . Swimming Coach Joe Watmough thinks he has a solution for Brown's perennial handicap, the coffin shape of Colgate Hoyt Pool. Joe would like to put in a bulkhead which would square off the pool at the shallow end, reducing the length to 20 yards from 25 but avoiding the angles about which visiting swimmers particularly complain. The small section cut off would be used for beginners. . . . Not in 50 years of Brown-Dartmouth football has there been a tie game. The last deadlock was in 1896 when Everett Colby '97 was captain and John D. Rockefeller, Jr., '97 was manager. . . . Good weather and large crowds should have made the season a helpful one financially. ◀

Bates Dorm Bears His Name

► **THE NEWEST** dormitory at Bates College now bears the name of Dr. George Carroll Smith, Brown graduate in 1876 who did some of his undergraduate work at Bates. His will granted the college \$89,000 for dormitory purposes, just as it left another substantial sum to Brown for Scholarships.

Dr. Smith died in 1936 after a distinguished career in medicine. His European studies and practice specialized in chronic diseases and dietetics. His book, "What to Eat and Why," had wide recognition. ◀

period. Again the Bears were driving, only to have a characteristic fumble roll the game away. Colgate recovered, tied it up at 14-14, and then passed down the middle for a victory romp with two minutes to go. The crowd of 20,000 had seen a great contest, packed with excitement and good football. Again, though, a miscue had nullified all the courageous bids. Again we went home talking of what might have been.

Are there some fast backs coming up from the Freshmen, some defenders with football sense? We hope so, but we don't know. Again in 1947 it looks like a strong line and a backfield enigma. The Freshmen lost to Yale 27-0, to Andover 14-6, to Harvard 28-7. The lone opponent to go down in defeat was Nichols Junior College, beaten 7-6. The Jayvees trimmed Massachusetts Maritime 27-12 and then Holy Cross 25-21, after trailing 21-6 at the halt. Worcester Academy beat them with a strong eleven 13-0 and Yale was better 20-7.

Winning Football ◀

►► **HAS BROWN ANY RIGHT** to expect football teams which will go through their seasons undefeated? President Wriston talked to that point informally in an impromptu talk to the 1946 gridiron squad at the annual "Win, Lose or Draw" Dinner given in December by Senator Fred C. Broomhead '05.

"It all boils down to this," according to President Wriston: "Our football prospects at Brown are controlled by our determination to maintain certain standards and by the desire, repeatedly expressed by students and alumni, to play teams in the Ivy Group. We prefer this competition, though it makes it difficult to provide an attractive schedule of home games, even when we resort to the unwise and unhealthy expedient of lengthening our season beyond that of our principal rivals.

"We prefer this Ivy Group competition, partly because we have agreed to the same standards. With such opposing teams drawn from larger student bodies, however, the law of averages indicates that we shall not win with regularity. Against such opponents, it is not likely that we shall win often.

"Of course, you play to win, and you sometimes win when it is not in the cards for you to do so. It is the fascination of football and other sports that the will-to-win can bring victory against all likelihood. Seen in this light, our victories become the sweeter. Brown's Football Games in 1947

►► **TRADITIONAL** gridiron opposition is promised for Brown's 1947 football team in the schedule which Dr. Walter H. Snell announced as one of his last official acts as Director of Athletics in December. Seven of the nine games list rivals encountered during the past fall, while the University of Connecticut and Rutgers return to the schedule, the latter as Brown's Thanksgiving Day attraction in Providence on Nov. 27. Connecticut was last met in 1939, the year after the hurricane "blew out" the game booked for Brown Field in an unusual cancellation. Rutgers came to town in 1941 last.

Games away include four Ivy Group members—Harvard, Yale, Princeton, and Dartmouth—and Colgate. It will be the third time that Brown has journeyed to Hamilton to tangle with the Red Raiders, who have been customary jinx opponents on Turkey Day over the years in Providence. The schedule: Sept. 27—University of Connecticut. Oct. 4—Princeton. Oct. 11—Rhode Island State. Oct. 18—Dartmouth. Oct. 25—Colgate. Nov. 1—Holy Cross. Nov. 8—Yale. Nov. 15—Harvard. Nov. 27—Rutgers. ◀

Rev. Dr. M. Joseph Twomey is the interim pastor of the First Baptist Church in Yarmouth, Me., which looks forward this year to its 150th anniversary. The church is the one to which Dr. Twomey's brother-in-law, Rev. Dr. Albert H. Stanton '04, ministered until his death several months ago.

Daniel Champlin Chace, newspaperman, died in New York City Oct. 25, 1946. In 1915 he went to Washington to be editor of the news publication of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, then served the Washington Star as desk editor and assistant Sunday editor until his retirement in 1941. He also prepared weekly digests of editorial opinion for the United States News and taught journalism at George Washington University. Survivors are a sister, Mrs. Walter Ballou Jacobs of Providence; a son Edgar M. Chace of New York; and three daughters, Marion Chace of Washington, Olive Chace of New Haven, and Mrs. Marjorie Thompson of New York.

That fine paper, "The Present Task of the Humanities," which Dr. Waldo G. Leland read before the American Academy of Arts and Sciences last spring, has been reprinted in School and Society (Oct. 26). Dr. Leland, executive secretary of the American Council of Learned Societies, is one of the American national committee for UNESCO.

Samuel C. Lewis, a pioneer aviator and attorney for the grievance committee of the New York City Bar Association, died at his home in Peekskill, N. Y., Oct. 9, 1946. Mr. Lewis left Brown after his Freshman year to enroll in the flight-instruction course being given by Glenn Curtiss in San Diego. He soloed within a month and within a year had obtained International Pilot License 92. His friend Bleriot asked him if he would care to make the first parachute jump from a plane, but he declined. During the second Balkan War in 1913, the belligerents sent officers to France to study as wartime pilots. Mr. Lewis taught these men, probably the first war fliers in history, and did so with complete impartiality. He taught the Turks in the morning and their Balkan foes in the afternoon. Later he was instructor to the first group of French officers to fly in the First World War.

Although managing to complete studies for a degree at London University, he spent most of his time in this country and founded a company building Liberty airplane motors—the Witemann-Lewis Aircraft Co. He left the field in 1918 to attend New York Law School and was admitted to the New York Bar as partner of the late Gilbert E. Roe, well-known legal defender of liberal causes, who was at one time a law partner of the late Senator LaFollett.

Mrs. Lewis survives him, with a daughter Adaline, an UNRRA official in China, a brother Fred, and two sisters, Mrs. H. C.

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Luxembourg Cross to Bean

▶▶ IN RECOGNITION of his outstanding success as military governor of that country, Lt. Col. Stephen S. Bean '14 has been awarded the Luxembourg Croix de Guerre, at the command of the Grand Duchess. 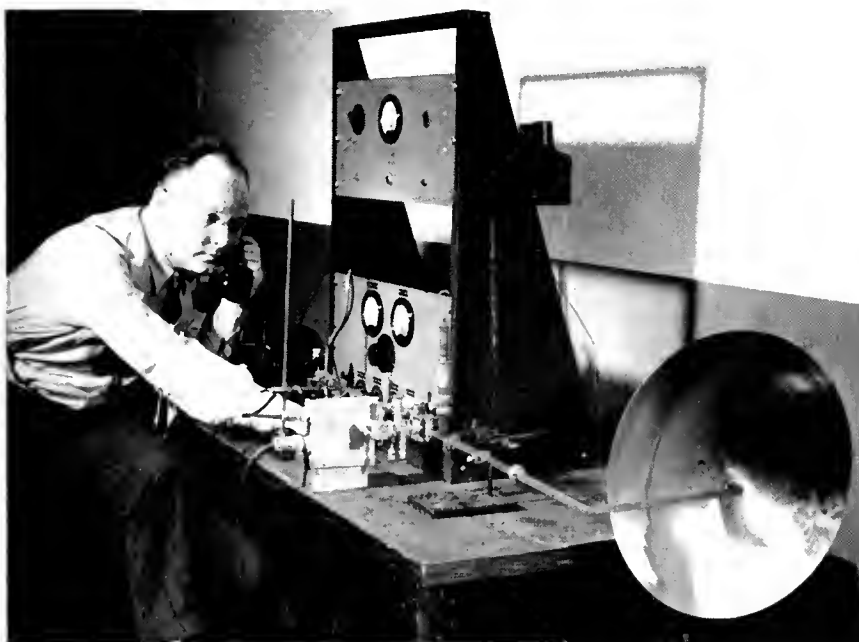

A FIRST IN RADIO



► ► DR. A. HARRY SHARBAUGH, JR., was one of the pair of General Electric Scientists who, for the first time in radio history, successfully completed operational tests with the highest amateur band ever allocated to "hams" in the ultra-high-frequency field—that of 21,900 megacycles. Dr. Sharbaugh received his Ph.D. at Brown in 1942, after holding a Metcalf Research fellowship and winning the Potter prize for outstanding work in chemical research.

It was Mrs. Sharbaugh who had the distinction of phrasing the first message over a two-way hook-up of the system in Schenectady. She telephoned to ask: "When are you coming home to dinner?"

She had phoned the laboratory from the Sharbaughs' suburban home. His associate, Robert L. Watters flashed the question along, for they were ready for the initial test at just that moment. Dr. Sharbaugh received the word on his portable equipment about 800 feet away at the WGY studio building. Although the answer was

given on a duplex phone and given to Mrs. Sharbaugh promptly, the record does not indicate its nature.

Being a little more than a centimeter long, the radio waves in the 21,900-megacycle band approach the region of optics. Thus they are more like light waves than the conventional radio waves, and the newly designed equipment, instead of having antennas, receives and transmits by means of parabolas or horns. A special metal radio tube delivers the power at milliwatt level, the waves being transmitted and received through a hollow, rectangular metal pipe, called a wave-guide. The particular circuit-arrangement, using one high-frequency tube, makes possible the use of the duplex phone and thereby eliminates the conventional switching during two-way communications.

Dr. Sharbaugh joined G-E in December, 1942. During the war he worked on radar counter-measures.
