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## ►► What Kind of a University Is Brown?

►► WHAT KIND of a University is the Brown of today? The testing of a University is relatively simple, for there are well-known touchstones that can be used: Who teaches at the University? Whom do they teach? What are the library resources? What is the intellectual atmosphere of the institution? What are its traditional ideals?

Let me first use the touchstone of Faculty, a test that is equally valid for 13th Century Oxford or 20th Century Brown. From Manning on, Brown has emphasized the importance of great teaching. In this regard the University has put first things first. For nearly two centuries a primary objective has been the assembling of a Faculty of able men who have attained eminence in their varied fields of knowledge. The respect with which this professorial staff is now held by sister institutions of higher learning from coast to coast gives us worthy pride. We do not claim that our Faculty is the best in the land—there is no *best* Faculty—but we do know that a staff of such distinction is rarely found in a University of Brown's size. Brown is one of the few Colleges, therefore, in which undergraduates can come in close contact with such superb minds, for Brown is small enough for such intimacy just as she is large enough to sustain quality in the Faculty. This opportunity for high intellectual adventure is indeed one of the elements of greatness in Brown University.

► BUT TEACHING IS NOT the sole responsibility of a 20th Century Faculty. Unlike an 18th Century college, a university today explores the unknown. It should pioneer on the frontiers of learning, and in this regard Brown has also won distinction. In fields as widely divergent as American Literature and Colonial History on the one hand and Electrolytic Phenomena and Mathematics on the other, the Brown Faculty has gained recognition and honor. Brown is a home fit for the scholar, whether his interest be letters or science. A glance at a few of the titles of recently published books indicates the academic breadth of teacher-authors at Brown:

"Art, the Critics and You." "Economics and the Problems of Labor." "Philosophy as a Science." "Nathaniel Hawthorne: a Biography." "The Theory of Flight." "Early Cartography of the Pacific."

*"I'M TIRED of hearing Brown men talk about how good their college is," said a stranger. "What is it that makes Brown as great as its alumni think it is?" For answer we turned to the Vice-President of the University, long one of our most popular and obliging contributors.*



"Upstage, Downstage." "The Economics of International Trade." "The American Imagination at Work." "Some American Contributions to the Art of Navigation." "Edmund Spenser and the Faerie Queene." "Town Meeting Country." "A Textbook of Biochemistry." "Lighting Design." "Eli Terry, Clockmaker of Connecticut." "A Scientist's Approach to Religion." "General Physiology." "Alexander the Great." "American Woodcuts and Engravings, 1670-1800." "Something of a Hero." "Religion in Russia." "Underwater Explosions." "The Political Theory of the Huguenots of the Dispersion." "The United Nations: Its Record and Achievement." "The Chief End of Book Madness." "Beauty and Parting." "Handbook of Elementary Physics." "Some Reflections on the Book Arts in Early Mexico." (More were to be added, but the editor cried, "Enough!")

Scores of monographs, articles, and scientific papers attest the intellectual vigor of the Brown Faculty. Little wonder that a University of Brown's size ranks so high in—"American Men of Science." In a recently published study of notable scientific scholars, "Scientists Starred," the Brown Faculty, when matched against the faculties of nearly 2000 institutions of higher learning in America, is classed among the first 20. It is likewise not surprising that the men who have studied at Brown—those who hold her Bachelor's or Doctor's degrees—have an equally enviable position in this exclusive assemblage of scientific personnel.

The recent record of Brown in Applied Mathematics illustrates the lively spirit of the Brown Faculty in scientific studies. In 1941 Brown saw the great need in this country for graduate study in

Applied Mathematics and it organized a curriculum which was the first of its kind in America. For many reasons Europe had led the world in this field. In the days of Newton mathematics usually meant applied mathematics, but in later years the emphasis was less on *applied* mathematics and more and more on *pure* mathematics. In this country it was Brown that started the pendulum back. The program at Brown was on the graduate level, following the recommendations of an Evaluating Committee headed by the President of the American Mathematical Society. The strength of the Mathematics Department, the publication on College Hill of the *Mathematical Review*, the superb mathematics library—all these influences, together with the zeal for investigation and research, have made Brown in recent years pre-eminent in this field in America. In both teaching and research Brown tests well.

► THERE ARE SEVERAL TRADITIONS which have contributed toward Brown's success in assembling and holding a superior Faculty. It is a Brown tradition that there should be academic freedom on College Hill. It is a Brown tradition that standards must be high and work must be thorough. It is a Brown tradition that a member of a University Faculty should have an opportunity to teach advanced courses and do research. (The University therefore gives more than lip-service to the belief of President Andrews that "a Professor who does not go far beyond . . . , who is not original, enterprising, aggressive, deep, however brilliant he may be, cannot teach even the ordinary truth relating to his department so triumphantly as one who has made wider and more exhaustive attainments.") It is a Brown tradition that both scholars and undergraduates should have access to a Library of distinction.

The Brown Library, once hidden in the hills of nearby Massachusetts until the storms of the Revolutionary War had subsided, has now grown until it is the largest for any college its size in the world. Included in the University Library are 700,000 volumes (not counting government documents); a Lincoln Collection which ranks with the nation's best; the Harris Collection of American poetry and plays—largest of its kind in existence; and a mathematics library which is one of the finest in the world.

In addition the University welcomes scholars from around the globe to its great collection of Americana, the John Carter Brown Library. The historian Frederick Jackson Turner described the volumes in this Library as "the aristocracy of American history, the eldest settlers and the first born of the noble lineage of books that preserves that priceless record of the first three centuries of America." It is a Brown policy not just to enshrine these great documents but to encourage their study and investigation. All Brown men therefore are proud when the librarian of this great collection is awarded honorary degrees by Yale and Michigan not only for his own extensive writings but also for his aid to scores of others in the world of scholarship. And now in 1948 another unique collection—this of books printed before 1500—comes under Brown direction through the transfer to the University of the Annmary Brown Library. When the touchstone of library resources is applied, this University is found to be of remarkably high quality.

► BUT THERE IS ANOTHER TRADITION which is responsible to a large degree for the greatness of Brown today, and that is the exceedingly high calibre of the Brown undergraduate. There is no touchstone more important than this one. A great Faculty and a great student body are interdependent; without one you do not have the other. Moreover, it is axiomatic that strength in the student body today means strength in the alumni body tomorrow.

The overwhelming success of Brown's admission program during the past two decades has brought the University a prestige which is commensurate with its

history. It has the regard of the principals and headmasters of America's secondary schools. The glorious success of the program of seeking the best-qualified wherever they may be found placed Brown with the top ranking institutions of higher learning as far as student personnel is concerned. Before the eight Presidents could effect an Ivy Group in football there had to be a mutual respect among admission officers of these colleges for their student selections. It should be a source of great satisfaction to every alumnus that Brown's number of first choices, as expressed on the College Board applications, quadrupled since 1940, and that no other institution can show such a rise. Brown now stands fifth on this first choice list, and the first four are institutions larger than Brown.

Brown men may take pride in a national championship for dinghy racing, for track laurels in the Olympic, for a football team that brings home the bacon, for a bright show by Brownbrokers,—yes, for a thousand different features which are all a part of life on College Hill. But when the true tests are applied to a University, when the touchstones are used to examine Faculty, students, Library, atmosphere and traditional ideals, then is the time when Brown men can praise themselves, for, as trustees of a noble heritage, they have supported a succession of governing bodies and administrations which have never lost sight of the chief purpose of a University. They have recognized that first and foremost a University is a place of the mind. ◀

## Before the Game ◀

▶▶ GOING TO NEW HAVEN for the Yale game Sept. 25 this fall? If you are, the Brown Club there has some plans which will interest you. In addition to its annual Friday night smoker at the Taft Hotel the New Haven alumni are sponsoring a gala rally the day of the game for all Brunonians and their parties. Lunch is involved.

In addition to the alumni, their families, and friends, undergraduates from Providence will join the throng, although the game takes place before the official opening of College. As a part of the Freshman Week program, busses are being hired to transport the Freshman Class to New Haven.

The Yale Soccer Field will be the scene of the pre-game rally at 12:30 o'clock, just an hour and a half before the Varsity game which starts the 1948 season. The soccer field is between the Bowl and the official parking field. R. E. Copeland '15, chairman of the New Haven Brown Club's special committee, describes arrangements as follows:

"There will be a rostrum with a loud speaker, with outstanding Brown alumni manning the microphone. There will be intermittent introductions of celebrities, interspersed with appropriate remarks by the microphone adepts, cheers, songs, the Brown Band, horse-play, and plenty of enthusiasm. Bring your own lunches if possible. Concessionaires will be prepared to serve hot dogs, hamburgers, soft drinks, etc., but it will be better to bring your own and participate in the popular custom of eating a box lunch in the beautiful setting on a fall afternoon while you're

chit-chatting with 'long time no see' old pals. We think this will be a Brown Day at New Haven."

Friday night, Sept. 24, will see the customary Brown gathering at the Taft Hotel, a tradition of many years' standing, always a good evening with speakers from the Hill and football movies and comment. Coach Engle will probably be on hand to talk about the 1948 team, since he has come to feel that this smoker at the Taft has talisman qualities (Brown has won five of the last eight Yale games). Clarence W. Miller '12, President of the Brown Club, and Secretary John Braman '40 are making the arrangements.

The Club season was off to a flying start Sept. 11 when a beach party and wiener roast was arranged at Bob Dugan's summer home in East Haven. The affair was planned not only as a get-together for the members and prospective members but also as a sendoff to undergraduates from the area before their departure to College. The fathers of the boys were also invited. ◀

## ▶ Another Kickoff

▶▶ Brown men will be watching Connecticut in October, where the alumni of that State lead off with their campaign operation in support of the Housing and Development Program. Starting ahead of the rest of the country, the Connecticut men will make their localized move under the new plan, which will be followed elsewhere later.

The Housing Campaign is starting its second phase, as the University seeks another \$3,000,000 for residential purposes to attain the total objective. The general alumni campaign will be undertaken as heretofore by regional area and local organizations, with emphasis on personal interviews. For the solicitation of some 14,000 Brown men the campaign corps has been re-enlisted and strengthened.

It is planned to conduct a series of intensive campaigns, region by region. This method will reduce the period during which the volunteers will be expected to be active. It will provide a maximum of assistance from the various members of the University staff. And it will concentrate attention upon the campaign in each given area.

"The campaign in the Connecticut Region will be of great interest to all," says National Chairman Claude R. Branch '07. "Much will depend on the Connecticut response, and we are counting on the organization there to make great headway as the campaign gains momentum for the second time. Although the area around Greenwich has been assigned to New York City, there are about 825 Brown men to be approached in the region assigned to Connecticut. We ask wholehearted support from them because it will have more than local significance. It will point up the whole enterprise.

"The splendid objective survey made by Arthur B. Homer '17 and his Student Housing Board has fortified our convictions as to the vital importance of proceeding with buildings necessary to make Brown a residential College of the character we seek. Brown has, we believe, everything which such a college needs except the housing facilities."

► EDWIN H. TULLER '35 is Regional Chairman for Connecticut, and he has made the following responsible for their areas: Bridgeport—Edmund L. Eveleth '32; Hartford—Cyrus G. Flanders '18; New Haven—Benjamin A. Chase II '38; Norwich—Allyn L. Brown, Jr., '37; Willimantic—Howard D. Corkum '17. Robert O. Loosley, Secretary of the University, and others from College Hill will support the effort in the field during the progress of the Connecticut campaign, just as they have been active in preparation for it.

More than halfway to its final objective, the Housing and Development Campaign thus reopens. The goal of this national drive for funds will be another \$3,000,000 for construction of residential facilities

(the Quadrangle), in addition to the \$3,000,000 already raised in the first phase. In the over-all program the University plans to build living quarters for about 750 men, including 17 fraternity units to accommodate a total of 450 and other dormitory units to accommodate another 300.

Last June the Corporation approved plans for the erection of the \$1,000,000 Refectory, on the northeast corner of the Quadrangle site (on the southwest corner of George and Thayer Sts., across from Hege-man Hall). Ground for this will be broken after the first of the year. Money already in hand will finance this part of the program.

All eyes are now on Connecticut. ◀

### Alumni Fund Raises \$34,500

► AFTER A SHORT CAMPAIGN for money for the general uses of the University, the Brown Alumni Fund closed its 1948 books June 30 with the receipt of gifts totaling \$34,554.17 from 2007 alumni. Nearly 700 of the the gifts and \$8,900 came in during June. Included in the total is \$794.82 in income from the Alumni Endowment of the Brown Alumni Fund, which was increased during the past year by 10 gifts totalling \$180. In addition, the Class of 1892 Fund yielded \$256.42 for Alumni Fund total.

In expressing appreciation to the alumni and his co-workers, Thomas F. Black '19, Chairman of the Alumni Fund Trustees and their campaign organization, said the results of the campaign effort were above expectation. No alumni were solicited who had commitments on Jan. 1 to give to the Housing and Development Campaign, and the appeal was not as intensively pushed in view of the limited time available. It was the first Alumni Fund appeal since 1946, since the Housing and Development Campaign was given a clear field in 1947. ◀

## Where Does a College Live? ◀ ◀

►► TIME BRINGS CHANGES in point of view. Since our housing program was launched there have been important developments which accentuate its need and which give added point to the entire program.

There has long been a drift in the direction of public education. This is not an occurrence to which independent institutions should object, although there occasionally are manifestations of emerging policies which are not wise and which must be resisted even when the general trend is sound.

The more public education advances the more essential it is that privately endowed institutions should be strong in order to meet the competition. They should strengthen themselves also to show how important is the contribution of a genuinely independent college to a free society. It has long been recognized that independent institutions are, while

competitive, a real protection to the academic integrity of public supported colleges.

Since the war many State Legislatures have taken action expanding State support of education and reducing local control. There are also important moves for Federal support and Federal influence in public education. Centralization tends to induce uniformity; but the mind of man is infinitely diverse, and there is need for many forms, kinds, and shapes of education. It is our responsibility to see that the liberal education which our Charter promoted not only survives in the new environment, but advances in power and influence.

The situation of endowed colleges is now somewhat analogous to that of academies when public high schools became universal. Many private schools had to retire from the field; on the other hand, those which had distinctive programs and adequate resources became not weaker, but very much stronger.

There will always be people who insist upon a genuine liberal education and who want the services of strong independent colleges. Those which are to survive as truly independent must diversify their constituencies and draw from wider and wider areas. Again the history of private preparatory schools is instructive. That was the course which the successful academies pursued in analogous circumstances.

*WHERE does a College live? We don't mean that sentimental business about living in the hearts of its alumni; this is a matter of housing, of a student body in residence. The article by President Wriston answers the question as to what extent Brown is and will be a residential College—and why. His text was originally part of a memorandum which he wrote for the Student Housing Board, which we asked permission to print.*

◀ BROWN HAS ALREADY RUN a pilot operation in accentuating residential character at Pembroke. Geographical diversification has made steady advances. The percentage of students in residence has increased from 44% in 1936 to 68% now; it is expected to be still higher next year—perhaps 70%. That has put Pembroke in such a strong position that the recent establishment of a new college for women in Rhode Island, the decision of the State College to offer the Bachelor of Arts degree, and the prospective establishment of junior colleges have not altered the rhythm of its program. Indeed, Pembroke's position is so favorable that it could still grow despite the new competitive elements.

One aspect of Pembroke's experience is instructive in relation to the size of the housing program for the College. When the effort to build a new dormitory was launched, the plan was to house 65 girls. Not so much the increasing size of Pembroke as its growing residential character led to building Andrews Hall for 249. Even with room for this number, instead of being able to retire small dormitories as had been anticipated, we are keeping all in operation—and have added some new ones. This indicates that the proposal for 750 accommodations in the Quadrangle is not excessive; it may well prove an underestimate. If, with 2000 undergraduates men, we average 70% in residence, we shall not be able to retire small, old, inadequate dormitories, unless in the future years other residential units are added.

I am fully convinced that as public education is expanded (particularly if the recommendations of the President's Commission on Higher Education are adopted) we shall have to look forward to a time when 80% of the students are in residence at Brown. We have a tendency to think of a very high percentage of residential students as something new in the College. To a considerable extent it is, in reality, a return to an earlier day, for 70% of the students were housed on the campus at the opening of this century. (And 77% of the entering schoolboy Freshmen this fall requested rooms.)

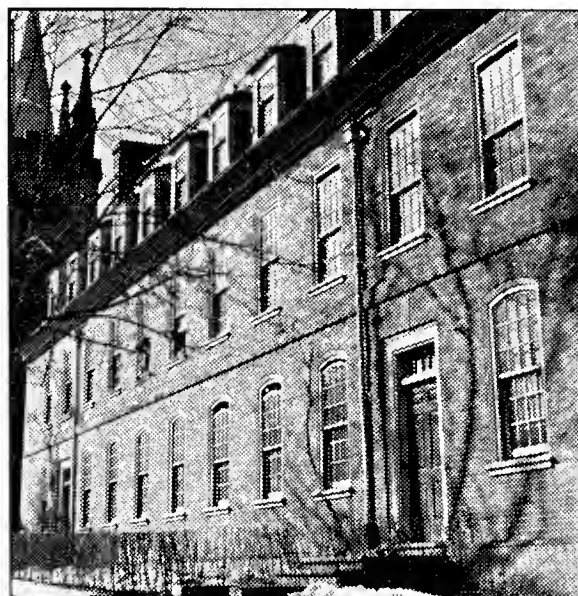
▶ OUR GEOGRAPHICAL DISTRIBUTION has varied over the years. There have been times in our history when a high percentage of our students came from outside Rhode Island and other times when the local character was heavily emphasized. In periods of depression or when the matter was not given specific and vigorous attention the tendency to be local was strong. In recent years the College has made headway in geographical diversification, but by no means enough. Vigorous measures are being taken still further to broaden Brown's geographical distribution. At the same time we are raising scholastic standards, which will attract people who set a high value upon quality in education. To attain stability for this improved competitive position we must bring our housing up to a standard which will have a very strong appeal to people from a distance; this will be particularly important as public policies intensify competition.

The secondary function of the Housing and Development Campaign is intimately related to the first. The fraternity system at Brown, as elsewhere, has gone through an enormous alteration since its origin. After the fraternities acquired property the location of their houses within a crowded city proved increasingly adverse financially; while some chapters could survive, the system could not continue unless

subsidized. It became essential, therefore, to relieve the fraternities of the burden of debt and taxes.

As a group fraternity members are economically better off and their college preparation tends to be better than that of non-fraternity men; yet their scholastic record does not reflect these advantages. Having made the decision to continue the fraternity system, we face the absolute necessity of making the chapters a harmonious element in our educational program. Conditions of life markedly affect morals, manners, and interests. Better housing alone cannot achieve our educational goals, but it can make a vital contribution.

▶ DURING THE LAST DECADE before the war, progress had been made in giving Brown a more effective residential character. Warren House, George House, Horace Mann were added. Laboratories, classrooms, and offices were removed from Maxcy so that the building was wholly available for dormitory use. The meager dormitory facilities at the top of University Hall and in Prospect House were abandoned. In 1936, 52.4% of the students were in residence on the campus; in 1940, 62% lived in dormitories or fraternity houses. Just before the war, for the first

time in many years, all non-commuting students could be housed in college dormitories or fraternity houses.

As various steps toward housing all students were taken it was recognized that the accommodations, both new and old, fraternity houses and dormitories alike, were inadequate. The dormitories acquired by purchase in the years before the war were regarded as temporary. Neither in location, size, fabric, nor facilities did they meet proper standards. They were bought because sub-standard student residences constituted a far less evil than having students scattered around the town, wholly out of our zone of influence a good part of their college life. The purpose was to lay the foundations for a general housing plan to be

put in operation as soon as opportunity presented. New construction was known to be vital.

The fruits of much of that effort have now been lost because of the necessary changes in habits of student life during and after the war. This year only 39% of our students are in College residences. The significance of this temporary figure lies in the fact that the advantages of a residential college, which the undergraduates had come to recognize by the time the war broke out, are not known to the present student body.

► DORMITORY LIFE has not been satisfactory to this generation of students. We have had to overcrowd our dormitories until they resembled barracks. Even those who lived on the campus did not find that their living quarters contributed a favorable educational environment. Hundreds have been scattered throughout the community beyond the scope of college influence and discipline. In other words, at the most

strategic moment for re-emphasizing the residential ideal it became necessary seriously to impair Brown's residential character.

The change in size of the College, fully justified on educational grounds, has sharply increased the necessity for new accommodations at the same moment that heightened competition has made better housing an urgent matter. Without new accommodations we cannot even return to our pre-war percentage in residence, because the increase in the size of the College from 1400 to 2000 was predicated upon new accommodations. Before the war we had 601 spaces in all our dormitories and 270 spaces in the fraternities, a total of 871 spaces. If we have a College of 2000 students and return to the pre-war norm of 60 per cent in residence, we must have 1200 spaces. There will, consequently, be a "normal" deficiency of 329 spaces unless we have new housing. In other words, we cannot stand still without going backward. ◀

## 19 Lettermen Boost Brown Stock ◀ ◀

►► The Pigskin Parade is on, and from all indications 1948 may go down in the records as one of the greatest years of the fall sport in its 79-year history. Reports from the grid training camps across the nation tell of a wealth of capable material, squads loaded with returning veterans and promising Sophomores, and enough potential All-Americans to keep the press agents busy from now until the day they have to take time out to file their income tax reports.

Here on College Hill, the outlook for the season is bright, but Head Coach Rip Engle, never one to be overly-optimistic, cautions that "we've got to be good to stay in the ball park." The Brown squad, numbering about 75, began practice on Sept. 2, little more than three weeks before it journeys to New Haven to face the Elis of Yale in a stiff season's opener. Then follows a tilt against talent-laden Princeton before the Bruins display their wares before the home folks against Rhode Island on Oct. 9. The remainder of the schedule includes Holy Cross, Connecticut, Rutgers, Western Reserve, Harvard and Colgate in that order.

The 1948 team will be attempting to better last year's record of four wins, four losses and one tie. Missing this year will be center Lou Regine, quarterback Paul Gaffney, and practically the entire end squad, namely Paul Flick, Dick Pretat, George Boothby, Bill Schuster and Don Campbell. But 19 lettermen make the nucleus for a seasoned team. Promising Sophomores from last year's Freshman

eleven, that won five games and lost only to the Harvard yearlings, may give Rip the reserve strength he needs in certain positions, and, as Rip says, "if we can find capable replacements for the personnel lost through graduation, our team should compare favorably with last year's, which we considered a good team." At the end of the first week of practice, the squad was well advanced in condition and preparation.

► ENGLE IS WORKING with the same coaching staff that guided the Bruin grid fortunes last season. Gus Zitrides is back to handle the line, Jim Dunn the backs, Bob Priestley the ends, Joe McMullen the Junior Varsity, and Arnie Soloway and Ernie Savignano the Freshmen. In this respect, Brown has a certain advantage over four of its opponents, because Herman Hickman of Yale, Bill Osinski of Holy Cross, Mike Scarry of Western Reserve and Arthur Valpey of Harvard are all in their first year as head coaches.

Probably the brightest spot in the Providence pigskin picture is the big, rugged line which will represent the Bears this fall. Such hefty linemen as Don Colo (240), Bill McLellan (220), Gerry Walters (215), Bob Rougvie (200), Jerry DeAngelis (205) and Joe Condon (200) will give the Bruins plenty of weight up front. Add to this group such talented performers as Captain Norm Jacuele (180), Bill Hair (185), Dave Livingston (180), Tom Nicholas (190), Milt Hodosh (190), John Scott (180), and Bob Searles (190), and you have a very formidable forward wall. Two new faces, Frank Mahoney and Jack Thompson, may provide that offensive punch at end that the Bruins so sorely lacked last year. Mahoney is best known for his basketball ability (he scored 34 points against Rhode Island State in 1947; he was ineligible last season), while Thompson is a transfer from the Veterans College who tips the scale at 210 and stands six one.

The two centers, Scott and Condon, have been cited for special recognition by the coaching staff. Scotty is small but one of the most accomplished players on the squad, and Engle states that the West Orange, New Jersey lad has the best coordination and blocking technique among the linemen. He plays a

very aggressive game and scholastically is a potential Phi Beta Kappa student. Condon, who doubles as a place kicker, has improved to such an extent that Engle intends to make more use of his specialty. Last season he booted 18 conversions in 23 tries and one field goal.

► **THE STARTING BACKFIELD** has returned intact, featuring Ed Finn, Fred Kozak, Chuck Nelson and Arnie Green. Also back are Marty Gresh, Billy Houston, Joe and George Paterno, Loren Rodewig and

Roger Young. Finn rated tops last year as quarterback, passer and ballhandler and is pointing toward one of his best seasons. Eddie completed 35 passes in 89 attempts for 505 yards in 1947, and his best performance was against Connecticut when he hit 8 out of 11 for a .727 average and 172 yards. He also came into his own as ball carrier last year, as he showed his versatility on punt returns and quarterback sneaks.

Kozak, a triple-threat back from Fall River, Mass., weighing only 165 pounds, was the leading scorer a year ago. Freddie is termed more of a workhorse than a spectacular runner, and he is a consistent ground-gainer. (His longest run was against Colgate, measuring 61 yards.) Nelson made a name for himself in his Freshman year (1946) as the receiver of many of Ed Finn's aeriels. Last year he was plagued with injuries and did not reach peak form, but in spring practice he displayed his former skill once again. Green scales only 180, light for a fullback, but he works to advantage in Engle's quick-opening plays, making good use of his agility and aggressiveness.

A look at some of the opposing teams shows the Bruins will have their hands full on more than one occasion. Down in New Haven huge Herman Hickman, who formerly tutored the lines at Army which opened the holes for such stars as Glen Davis and Doc Blanchard, probably wishes he had a few of his Cadet linemen in the Yale forward wall this year. Herman has some of the best backs in the East available, but the line poses a different problem. In front of such stars as Levi Jackson, "The Ebony Express;" Tex Furse, the nation's most accurate passer last year; Jim Fuchs, former Chicago schoolboy sensation and more recently an Olympic shotputter; and Ferdinand "The Bull" Nadherny are only two veterans: Captain Bill Conway, a center, and Vic Frank, a guard and also a member of the Olympic team. Hickman refers to his line as "The Seven Dwarfs" because not one line candidate weighs 200 pounds, but the Blues should not be regarded lightly for size is not the only factor in football play today.

▶ THE EXPECTED SUCCESS of this October meeting can best be measured by the overwhelming success of the preliminary July meeting. The enthusiastic response to that meeting was beyond the most optimistic hopes of the small New York group who planned the get-together. In the first place, no complete address list of Brownbrokers alumni could be gathered in the short time available, but none-the-less, as the result of postcards hastily mailed more or less in the dark, some 70 people showed up from the classes of 1937 through 1948. # The Biggest of Brown Bears ◀ ◀

▶▶ BEARS DON'T COME any bigger than this. The Big Brown (Kodiak) stands nearly 12 feet tall, as undergraduates will soon realize when they see the animal presented to the University Oct. 15. It comes as a gift from the alumni of the Middle West, headed by Ronald M. Kimball '18 of Chicago.

The conqueror of the bear was Jack Durrell, noted big game hunter, former Vice-President of the National City Bank of New York. He tells his friend Kimball how it all happened:

"My guide and I located this huge bear early one morning in March, 1938, on Sitka Peninsula, some 10 miles up the valley back of our camp. Through our binoculars, we watched him fight and whip four other bears (Named Harvard, Yale, Princeton, and Dartmouth, no doubt, Kimball interrupts.) He chased the last one over the top of the range. On his way back to the valley several hours later, we intercepted him, and I tried to stop him while he was still some 300 yards above us. Knocked him down three separate times, but he got up each time and tried to get down to us and get even. My fourth shot, when he was much too close for comfort, blasted him off the ridge into an alder-filled gulch, and he was too badly crippled to climb back again.

"Neither my guide nor I relished the idea of going into the alders after him, but we finally screwed enough courage up. Stumbled onto him in a small creek, and finished him off as he was attempting to climb out and get at us. It took us the better part of the next two days and all kinds of amateur engineering to get his hide off while he was in the brook. The guide estimated his weight at 1600 pounds, his hide alone weighing 150 pounds a month later. This bear, a Big Brown (true name, but vulgarly known as a Kodiak) was a fighter in every sense of the word, and should be a credit to Brown University."

The presentation will take place Oct. 15, the night before the Holy Cross football game. The arrival of the bear will set off a great rally of undergraduates and alumni. ◀

## MATHEMATICS

► *What is Mathematics?* R. Courant and H. Robbins; Oxford University Press, 1941. Expository introduction to several branches of mathematics.

*Men of Mathematics.* Eric Temple Bell; Simon and Schuster, 1937. Biographical sketches of many great mathematicians of the past.

*Mathematical Snapshots.* Hugo Steinhaus; G. E. Stechert & Co., 1938. Photographs, drawings, and folding models of many objects of geometrical interest.

*Introduction to Logic and the Methodology of Deductive Sciences.* Alfred Tarski; Oxford University Press, 1941. A very lucid and readable introduction to con-

temporary mathematical logic, despite its formidable title.

*The Psychology of Invention in the Mathematical Field.* Jacques Hadamard; Princeton University Press, 1945. An analysis of the process of mathematical discovery.

## PHILOSOPHY

*Art and the Social Order.* D. W. Gottschalk; University of Chicago Press. A comprehensive and clearly written statement of the nature of art, aesthetic experience, and the role of art in society. The best recent work in this field.

*Existentialism.* Jean-Paul Sartre; Philosophical Library. A slim volume containing a popular lecture by Sartre on his much-discussed doctrine, and padded with notes of the discussion that followed its delivery. Sartre's remarks on Existentialism fail to do justice either to his view or to the ability he elsewhere manifests as a philosophical expositor. Nevertheless, this is the first publication in book form of Sartre's view in English.

*Man Against Myth.* Barrows Dunham; Little, Brown & Co. An expertly written attack on some prevailing social superstitions. Some of Dunham's arguments are overly doctrinaire, but as a whole the volume is provocative and superior as popular philosophy.

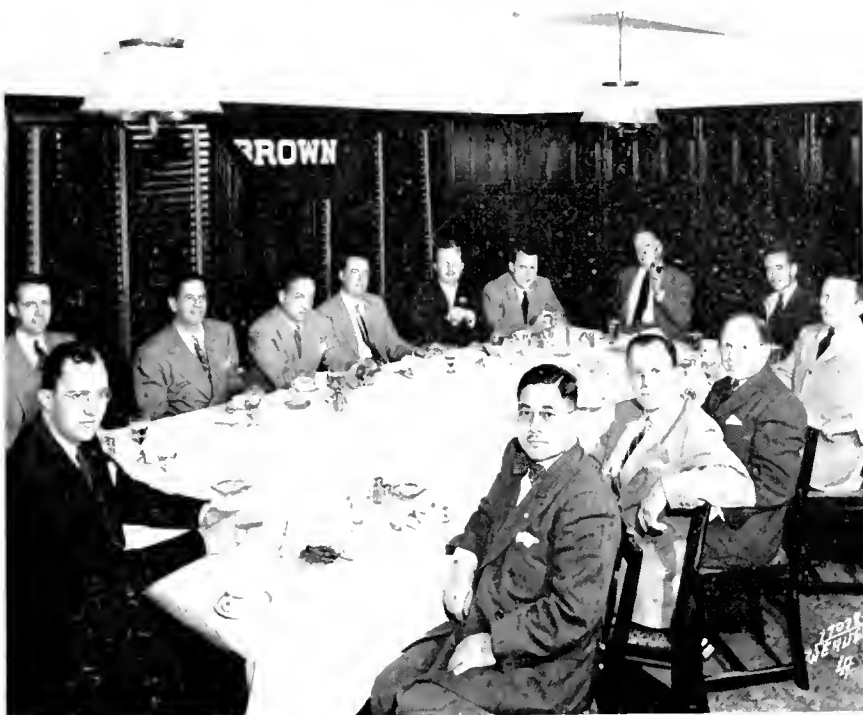

► AT PRINCETON Charlie Caldwell is being as quiet as ever and hopes to pull a few surprises when the Tigers open their schedule against Brown on Oct. 2 down in Nassauland. Such performers as George Sella, John Weber and Carl Leibert are still around, and the Tigers first undefeated Freshman team since 1934 should provide some valuable material.

The Rams from Rhode Island State are optimistic and hope to field their best team since before the war. Coach Bill Beck broke his back while skiing last winter and had to pass up spring practice, but he is once again ready to direct the club. Herb O'Rourke, a standout center, captains the team, and Chuck Varney, a hard-running 185-pound Sophomore halfback, is a newcomer of whom much is expected.

Bill Osmanski's return to Holy Cross was welcomed with cheers from the supporters of the Purple, but Bill himself admits that he can't accomplish any miracles in the first year. A native of Providence, Bill played seven years with the Chicago Bears where he learned the finer points of George Halas' version of the "T". The 32 Holy Cross lettermen, on the other hand, have used the single wing for the past three years, so the transition will not be easy.

Since J. O. Christian of Connecticut lost only two lettermen, his squad should be stronger. Big 200-pound Bill Moll captains the team and rips into the opposing line from the fullback position. Halfback Dick Guadino also bears watching.

Rutgers presents another squad that is loaded with talent. Coach Harvey Harman

talks about the loss of Billy Vigh, a fine defensive halfback who specialized in pass interceptions, and the fact that he lacks depth in the quarterback position; but he still has one of the best elvens in the East. Put such men as Frank Burns, Herman Hering and Buddy Hatchett in any lineup, and it spells trouble for the opposition.

► NOT TOO MUCH is known of Western Reserve University or its football team in this section of the country, but the contest Nov. 6 should be interesting nevertheless. The Red Cats from Cleveland, belong to the Mid-American Conference and play conference games against Western Michigan, Miami of Ohio, Butler, Ohio University and Cincinnati. Mike Scarry, another first year coach, has mainly a Sophomore and Junior team and will use the "T" exclusively. Two Negro boys, Nate and Lennie Corbin, are the speedsters in the backfield.

"East meets West" when Arthur Valpey introduces the Michigan style of play at Harvard this season. The Harvards should know the system fairly well by the time the Bears roll into Cambridge on Nov. 13, so Captain Norm Iacuele and his mates may have trouble avenging last year's 13-7 upset defeat. Captain Ken O'Donnell, Chip Gannon, Hal Moffie and Jim Kenary are an accomplished backfield quartet.

The season's finale on Thanksgiving Day brings another dangerous team to town. Coach Paul Bixler of Colgate has 16 lettermen and numerous promising Sophomores to build his team around. Word from Hamilton a year ago was that the best game of the week was when the Freshman eleven scrimmaged the Varsity on Wednesday afternoons and often came out on top. Gone are Frank Muehlheiser and Glen Treichler, but Sophomores Alan Egler and Armand Allaire may fill the gaps,

So there it is - a look at the 1948 Brown football schedule. It should be about as unpredictable as the recent major league baseball pennant races. But you'll find Rip Engle, his assistants, and the players taking each game as it comes along, and Nov. 26 is the time to do the second guessing on just how successful the season was for the Brown and White. ◀
