Dr. Carl McIntire, Director and founder of the 20th Century Reformation Hour, has been Pastor of the congregation of the Bible Presbyterian Church of Collingswood, N. J., since 1934. He founded the **Christian Beacon**, a weekly religious newspaper, in February of 1936 to release religious news to the Christian world that other publications were suppressing.

He is Vice-President of the Independent Board for Presbyterian Foreign Missions, Chancellor of Shelton College in Cape Canaveral, Fla., President of Faith Theological Seminary, Elkins Park, Pa.

Dr. McIntire is founder and director of the Bible Conference at Cape May, N. J., (1963), and Cape Canaveral, Florida (1971), where the Gateway to

the Stars Christian Community is being developed.

In 1948, Dr. McIntire helped found the International Council of Christian Churches in Amsterdam, The Netherlands, was elected its first president, and has been re-elected ever since. This Council now consists of 202 denominations around the world.

A graduate of Park College, Parkville, Mo., Dr. McIntire attended Princeton Theological Seminary. He left that institution in 1929 when the break came on the issue of modernism and was graduated from Westminster Theological Seminary. Dr. and Mrs. McIntire have been blessed of the Lord with three fine Christian children and ten grandchildren.
