#### LOCKERS

## Collections

#### ANNE S. K. BROWN MILITARY COLLECTION (Peter Harrington, Curator)

With over 30,000 books, 60,000 prints, 5,000 miniature soldiers, and numerous drawings, watercolors, photographs and manuscripts, this is one of the world's largest collections devoted to military history and iconography. Because of its international scope and great chronological breadth, the collection is also a valuable source for the study of social and cultural history, architecture, costume, world royalty and celebrations, and the development of printing and book illustration.

#### ANNMARY BROWN MEMORIAL COLLECTION (Catherine Denning, Curator)

The Annmary Brown Memorial Collection, which moved in 1990 from a separate building to the John Hay Library, contains one of the largest and most important collections of incunables (books printed through the year 1500) in the United States. Beginning with Gutenberg, the collection traces the development of printing as it spread across Europe in the second half of the fifteenth century. Many important classical, medieval and Renaissance authors are represented in this collection in early, often first, printed editions. Subjects range from religion and law to literature and music, with a particular strength in early scientific works.

In addition to incunables, the collection contains sizeable manuscript holdings relating to the American Revolutionary and Civil Wars, and to the 17th-century New England witchcraft phenomenon.

The Annmary Brown Memorial building, from which the Collection was transferred, exhibits European and American paintings from the 17th through the 20th centuries, as well as personal mementos of its founder, General Rush C. Hawkins, and the Brown family.

#### BROADSIDES COLLECTION (Rita H. Warnock, Curator)

The Broadside Collection contains over 42,000 items, the majority of which are printed on single sheets of paper. The subject scope of the Broadside Collection is quite varied, and it is a valuable source for the study of American political and social history, literature, music and theatre. Its special strengths are American verse, fine printing, history, and Rhode Island history.
