WILLIAM WARNER HOPPIN.

An Honored Son of Brown.

The above is the name of a prominent lawyer of New York city, whose portrait and a sketch of whose life appears in the May number of the University Magazine.

Mr. Hoppin is the son of the late Governor Hoppin of Rhode Island. He graduated from Brown in the class of '61, of which he is perpetual president. At graduation he refused a commencement appointment, being at the time in the First Rhode Island Regiment under Colonel Burnside.

He graduated from the College of Physicians and Surgeons, New York, and served as a member of the surgical staff of the New York Hospital. During the battles of the Wilderness he did valuable service as assistant surgeon. Subsequently he graduated from the Columbia College Law School, so that he now holds degrees of A. M., M. D., LL.B.

He is prominent from his connection with various institutions.

He is a member of the New York Historical Society and a corresponding member of the Rhode Island Historical Society; a trustee of the College of Physicians and Surgeons and of the Union Theological Seminary; a governor of the New York Hospital and of the Woman's Hospital in the State of New York; a member of the University Club and of its Council; a life member of the New England Society and a member of "The Sons of the Revolution," and he was formerly President of the Young Men's Christian Association of New York, and was the first President of the Brown Alumni Association of New York. Mr. Hoppin is also at the head of a large dyeing and bleaching business and a member of the Century Club in New York and the Hope Club in Providence.

Since 1868 he has been engaged in the practice of law, chiefly in estates and wills. As a ready and pleasing speaker he is always heard with inter-

est at the social gathering or at any meeting of the various institutions with which he is connected.

A comparison of the above scores of the four leading college teams will undoubtedly be of interest to our readers. In the detail the result of the games played since April 19, it will be seen that Yale played 12 games, scoring 79 runs to 80 for her opponents, or an average of nearly 6 1-2 runs per game; Harvard has played 14 games, scoring 119 runs to 37 for her opponents, an average per game of 8 1-2 against 2; Princeton has played 6 games, scoring 40 runs to 24 for her opponents, an average of 6 2-3 to 4; Brown has played 12 games, scoring 128 runs to 37 for her opponents, an average of 10 3-4 to 3 1-2.

Nominated by Democrats.

The Democratic members-elect of the General Assembly, which is to be convened at Newport one week from today, met at the Democratic headquarters, in this city, Saturday, and organized. It was voted to place President E. B. Andrews of Brown University in nomination for Senator in opposition to Senator Nelson W. DR. LANGDON'S LECTURE.

No. 5 U. H. was well filled with attentive listeners Sunday afternoon when Dr. Langdon delivered his second lecture on "The Co-ordination of Moral Forces in the Ordering of Life." He designates moral forces as of two kinds, conservative and progressive. The French Revolution shows how disastrous the result of letting one force preponderate. It

is worth while noting that the conservative force is more in accordance with the genius of the Latin people and that those who are more progressive in this character are usually of the Teutonic people. For the moment, summing these qualities up, it is difficult to decide between them, but you are impressed at once with the absolute necessity of both. Applying it to political life, political parties are clearly these two forces embodied in groups of men, the one holding fast upon the past, the other reaching forward to the future. In religion, the speaker showed that the same principle applies, whether religion be dealt with by the intellect, in practical action, or in spiritual life.

Freshmen 8, Worcester Academy 4.

Yesterday afternoon the Freshmen went to Worcester and defeated the Academy team by a score of 8 to 4. The grounds were in poor condition and this accounts for some of the loose fielding. White pitched a great game, striking out nineteen men. Gregory pitched well for the Academy team, nine strike-outs being credited to him. Cooke and Gordon both caught well. The Freshmen got ten hits off Gregory, one being a fine two-bagger by Cooke. The Academy team made only two hits. Ludwig secured three of the singles of the Freshmen and also three of their runs. ports professional players.

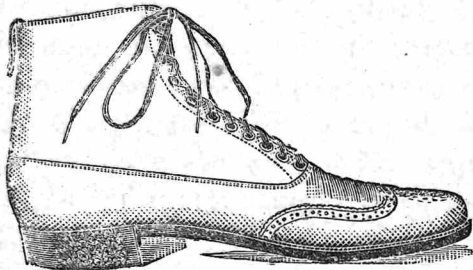
We would briefly urge as large a

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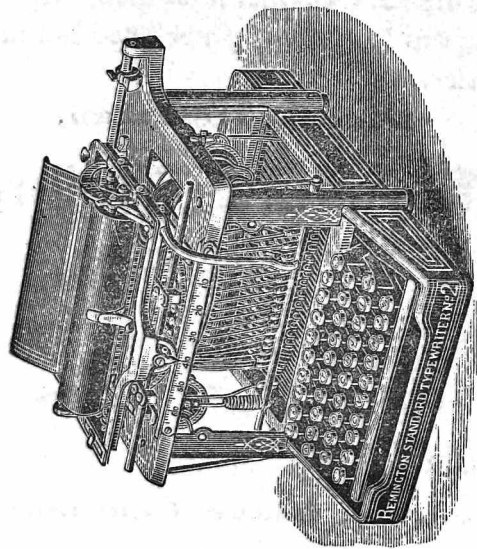
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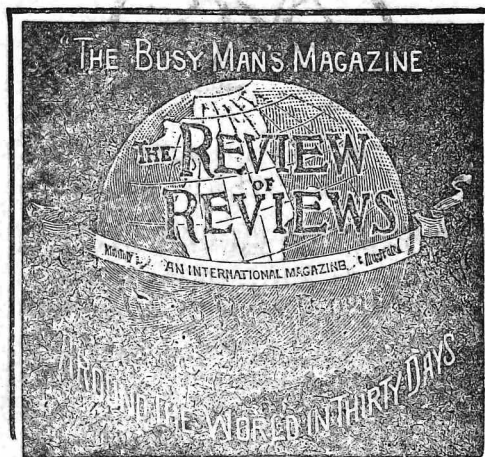
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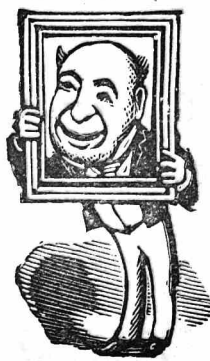
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
