ALL FOUR CLASSES TO MARCH IN PARADE FOR OPENING GAME TO-DAY

Undergraduates Will Assemble on Middle Campus at One O'clock.

BAND TO LEAD MARCH

Will Stage Manoeuvres During Half and Will Circle Field at Close of Game.

Assembling on the Middle Campus early this afternoon, undergraduates from all four classes will march to the Stadium preceded by the University Band in full strength.

Inaugurated last year, when the entire Freshman class joined in the procession with the band to the field, efforts are now being made to make this custom of marching to the first game of the season a permanent one. It is important that upperclassmen aid the movement in large numbers in order that their familiarity with the University songs may strengthen the efforts of the first-year men.

Rehearsal of the songs will be held on the middle campus at 1:00 p. m., after which the parade will form for the march to the stadium. Upon arrival at the field the undergraduates will take their places in the cheering section with the University Band stationed beneath the stands until their march onto the field just before the opening of the game.

Sixty-five members will take part in the first appearance of the band this year. In addition to the

1932 GRID TEAM HOLDS LONG WORKOUT IN RAIN

NO PRACTICE TO-DAY

Opening Contest Scheduled for Next Saturday with Moses Brown Eleven.

Practice in handling a wet ball was afforded the 1932 football squad yesterday afternoon when it worked out for two hours and a half in a light drizzle. A vigorous scrimmage was also held, that lasted the better part of an hour, for two complete elevens and substitutes.

Yesterday's session differed from those of previous days in that the players were introduced to two new features of the University system. First of all, the squad was divided for practice in the execution of placements from formation. About ten men are candidates for this department of the game, and most of them looked pretty good yesterday. Next, the two groups were given instruction in the kick-off formation that is used at the University. It is somewhat akin the famous "flying wedge" play and has proved

PRES. FAUNCE TO GIVE SERIES OF ADDRESSES

STUDENTS INVITED

Was Speaker Last Night at 50th Anniversary of Rhode Island School of Design.

During the course of the next month President W. H. P. Faunce is to be heard in public appearances on several occasions. He is scheduled to speak at the First Baptist Meeting House at the next four Sunday services. The subject of his first address, on Sunday, October 7, is to be "What Will Become of Their Dreams?" The students are invited to attend.

Last evening President Faunce delivered a short address at the Rhode Island School of Design, where the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of the institution was being observed. In his five-minute impromptu speech, President Faunce stressed the splendid work which the School has accomplished in combining art with industry. He also spoke of the close relationship which exists between the University and the School of Design, and the real need which the latter fills.

The exercises took place in Memorial Hall, at 8:15 o'clock, and were attended by many Providence and state notables. Other speakers were Huger Elliot, director of edu-

New Edition Names Nearly 1500 Prominent Scientists in Various Fields.

The latest edition of American Men of Science, edited by Dr. J. McKen Cattell, shows that the University stands well up among the leading twenty universities in the United States in its list of members of the Faculty eminent in science.

Thirty-eight individuals connected with Brown are named in the book. Twelve of them stand out as leaders in their particular fields. They are Dr. Albert D. Mead, Vice-President, and Prof. H. E. Walter in biology; Profs. John H. Appleton and Charles A. Kraus in chemistry; Profs. Raymond C. Archibald, Albert A. Bennett, Henry P. Manning,

GAME AT WORCESTER

Freshmen to Start Schedule on Next Wednesday with Hope High School.

Opening its season to-day, the University soccer team will play Clark University at Worcester. Members of the team who will make the trip are: Captain R. E. Arnold 1929, P. K. Bearce 1929, C. N. Williams 1931, G. H. Ingerson 1931, L. J. Dimond 1929, S. Carosella 1929, D. M. Cameron 1931, H. W. Hervey 1931, P. S. Knauer 1930, W. E. Schulz 1931, E. W. Roberts 1931, W. R. Gill 1931, W. S. Davidson 1931, A. B. Schweikart 1931, A. R. Walls 1931, L. G. McGinn 1931, E. J. O'Connor 1931, and S. O. Carleton 1929.

The line-up will probably be as follows: Carleton, goal; Connor and McGinn, fullbacks; Schweikart, Walls and Davidson, halfbacks; Capt. Arnold and Bearce will have the outside positions and Dimond and Ingerson the inside. Cameron will probably play center-forward, and with this line-up Coach Fletcher believes prospects of victory to be high. All are experienced players, and, everything considered, the team is much better than last year's, since it has already had four weeks of practice. Eighteen men will leave at noon to-day for

LONGEVITY OF COLLEGE ALUMNI TO BE STUDIED

The Alumni Office of the University has compiled records of graduates of classes from 1870 to 1905, inclusive, to be used in a study of the longevity of college graduates. A. H. Gurney, Alumni Secretary, said yesterday.

This study is being made for the Presidents' Committee of Fifty on College Hygiene, with Dr. Louis I. Dublin of New York as chief statistician. Besides Brown, it will include records of Harvard, Yale, Amherst, Cornell, Dartmouth, Wesleyan and Williams.

Last spring Dr. Dublin completed a study of the longevity of college athletes in which he showed that the Brown athletes had the best record in the group selected.

FOUR SQUADS TO PLAY

Capt. Cornsweet, Farber and Kevorkian Sole Veterans in First Line-up.

KICK-OFF AT 2:30

Team Holds First Practice on Stadium Gridiron in Last Session Before Game.

Eight players without 'Varsity football experience will be in the opening line-up this afternoon when the University football team faces the Worcester Polytechnic Institute eleven on Brown Field at 2:30 o'clock.

When the whistle for the kick-off blows three players of the 1926 "Iron Team" will be on the field and these will be the only veterans to see service during the opening period of the contest. Captain Al Cornsweet, one of the finest of Brown's plungers and defensive backs in recent years, heads the veteran trio. The others are Louis Farber and Ned Kevorkian, who with Cornsweet are beginning their third and last season.

The squad transferred its practice to the stadium gridiron yesterday, using the home field for the first time this season, and at the end of the practice, head coach Tuss McLaughry announced that he will use three and possibly four complete teams in the opening contest if the opposition offered by the Engineers is not too strenuous and

MANAGERS APPOINTED

Dramatic Society to Open Fall Season with Melodrama and Farce-Comedy.

Two one-act plays will be presented by the University Dramatic Society on October 16 and 17, according to an announcement made by E. L. Herrick 1929, President of the society. The plays will be "The Brink of Silence," by Esther E. Galbraith, a melodrama, and "Helena's Husband," by Philip Moler, a farce-comedy.

"The Brink of Silence" is being directed by Professor Ben Brown and Herrick and will include in its cast J. E. Cadden 1931, as Darton, H. B. Thorn 1930, as Cole, B. G. Romero 1928, as Macready, and E. B. Williams 1931, as Johnson. The play is one of an Arctic explorer who has through a misfortunate incident been cut off from his home life and is employed by a whale-oil company near the South Pole. His son, who has given up his father as dead, follows in his parent's footsteps and after reaching his goal stumbles on his father's post. The son does not recognize his father, who, living up to his intention of cutting himself off from the world, refuses to recognize the boy.

INCONSISTENCY

Considerable unfavorable criticism was directed last year against the Athletic Association Blanket Tax on the grounds that it provided admittance only to the unimportant contests and that special tickets for the majority of major games had to be purchased at high prices.

Officials of the Athletic Association listened to this criticism and, acting in an effective and constructive fashion, enlarged the inclusiveness of this year's season tickets so that they admit purchasers to all home games in all sports with the exception of hockey and swimming.

So far the reaction of the undergraduates to this improvement has been decidedly discouraging. With the inconsistency peculiar to student bodies, the sale of Blanket Taxes has been at a minimum.

This campus indifference is not only inconsistent with last year's criticism; it is also decidedly poor financial policy. The Blanket Tax as now constituted provides a considerable saving both for habitual followers of all University athletics, and for the more intermittent supporters.

It is certainly probable that the Athletic Association will not see fit to offer a similarly advantageous season ticket in future years if the support of this year's Blanket Tax is not emphatically increased.

WISHES FOR SUCCESS

With the inauguration of the 1928 football season this afternoon, the University eleven enters the gridiron as a decidedly unknown quantity. There is very little firm ground on which to base any sort of trustworthy predictions.

After the disastrous season of last year, coming at a time when all indications pointed towards success, we doubt if there is anyone who would care to issue any serious prophesy as to whether the team will rival the record of 1926 or of 1927.

But with all this uncertainty, there should be no corresponding uncertainty in the support of the undergraduates. There should be a continuation of last year's attitude, when in the face of continued setbacks and despite growing

criticism from the outside, the student body exhibited a practically unbroken front of loyalty.

And as for the team, the odds at least are in favor of an improved season. There is new material; there is no "Iron Men" record to live up to or down; there is certainly no overconfidence.

B. C. A. SUPPORT

With the start of the school year, the Brown Christian Association, acting the part of a valuable but undesirable parson, attempts to raise funds to continue its perilous existence. It is a tiresome and difficult job to extract money from undergraduates to support what may be called a Christian organization. Students dislike the idea of affiliating themselves in any manner, especially financial, with any religious organization.

Several years ago the Daily Herald advocated that the Brown Christian Association be made financially firm by adding a small extra tax to the semester bill. Nothing was done about the matter and the B. C. A. has managed to continue on a none too firm financial footing.

No one can doubt the benefit and few can criticize the work carried on by the association. The "Freshman Mixers," the Employment Bureau, and the "Freshman Bible" are all parts of the organization which would be missed on the campus if the B. C. A. should cease to exist.

The Brown Christian Association needs to be made financially sound in order to function with any degree of efficiency. If a small tax was added to the term bill it would assure the Association of a definite financial footing as a basis on which to arrange and develop its future program.

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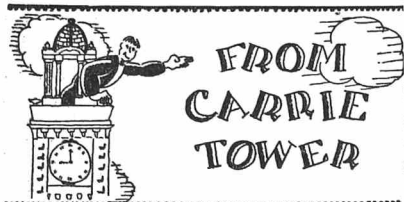
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All excited over the way I picked the winners last Saturday, here I am raring to go with today's predictions.

The one you're breathlessly waiting for is no doubt the one concerning the game in which will participate our own Brown team and an eleven or more from Worcester Tech. I couldn't find any trace of Worcester having played a game last week, and the institution isn't mentioned in the records I have available of last year's scores. Which rather leaves me up on a bough. However, taking the bit firmly between my teeth, I'll predict that Brown will win this game by at least—let's see—say, four or five touchdowns. As yet there doesn't appear to be a great deal of scoring punch in our team, the main hope, I believe, being found in a strong defense; and, even against an unknown like this Worcester place will send down, the Bears won't run up a terribly high score. A couple of touchdowns for Al Cornsweet, one for Bud Edwards or Marsan, another for either Flora or Fogarty, and perhaps one on a forward pass or fumble. Yes, any way from 28-0 to 35-0, allowing a few points less for possible missed points.

Dartmouth is host to Hobart, and I doubt if the Green duplicate its 46-0 win it made last season. Hobart held Syracuse pretty well last Saturday, and even scored a touchdown, and while Al Marsters may run wild again, I'll predict a more conservative count of 28-0 to 35-0, just like Brown's. It was gratifying, by the way, to learn that Captain Dick Black played a large part of the game, and I hope that means that the injured knee is well again and that he can play throughout the season.

Harvard and Yale open with easy games, and, as I've said before, it's difficult to hit on an exact score when the tally is so apt to be large. Maine will offer better opposition than Springfield, but, in spite of that, I'm inclined to believe that Yale, with a better offense than Harvard's, will run up a higher score, although neither game may be such a terrible runaway.

the teams used in the early part of the game play well together.

The squad had a long drill in handling a wet ball yesterday and will be somewhat prepared for a soaking gridiron this afternoon. The four teams which will probably see service this afternoon went through signal drills and the backs had practice in kicking and passing the slippery pigskin. Just before dismissing his team, Coach McLaughry had the A and B elevens practice kickoffs.

Four weeks of preliminary training will have their climax this afternoon, and from the results of today's game the Brown coaching staff will plan for the season which includes games with Yale, Dartmouth, Holy Cross and Colgate.

McLaughry has picked six Sophomores to start this afternoon's encounter, and the other two players without Varsity experience are Babcock and C. A. Munroe. Babcock, converted last week from a tackle to an end, was a transfer and ineligible last year, and Munroe injured his knee in practice before the season opened.

Wentworth, converted from tackle to a centre, was listed as a transfer last year and Fogarty was registered as a special student, but the remaining Sophomores, Gillies, Schein, Johnson and Marsan, won their 1931 numerals.

Sam Flora, promising Sophomore quarterback who received a broken nose in practice early in the week, followed the A team in its signal drill yesterday, but he will be held in reserve as alternate first-string quarterback and will probably see service in that capacity. McDonough, Chrast and Heller are practically the only men on the injured list who will not be able to participate in today's contest.

McLaughry announced yesterday that Harry Cornsweet, who has

successfully played at tackle and in the backfield, will play end on the B team in today's contest.

Like Brown, Worcester is playing its first game of the season today. With a team averaging only about 175 pounds, the visitors are reported to have concentrated on speed and deception to overcome the weight of the heavy Brown forwards.

an invaluable asset in the running back of punts.

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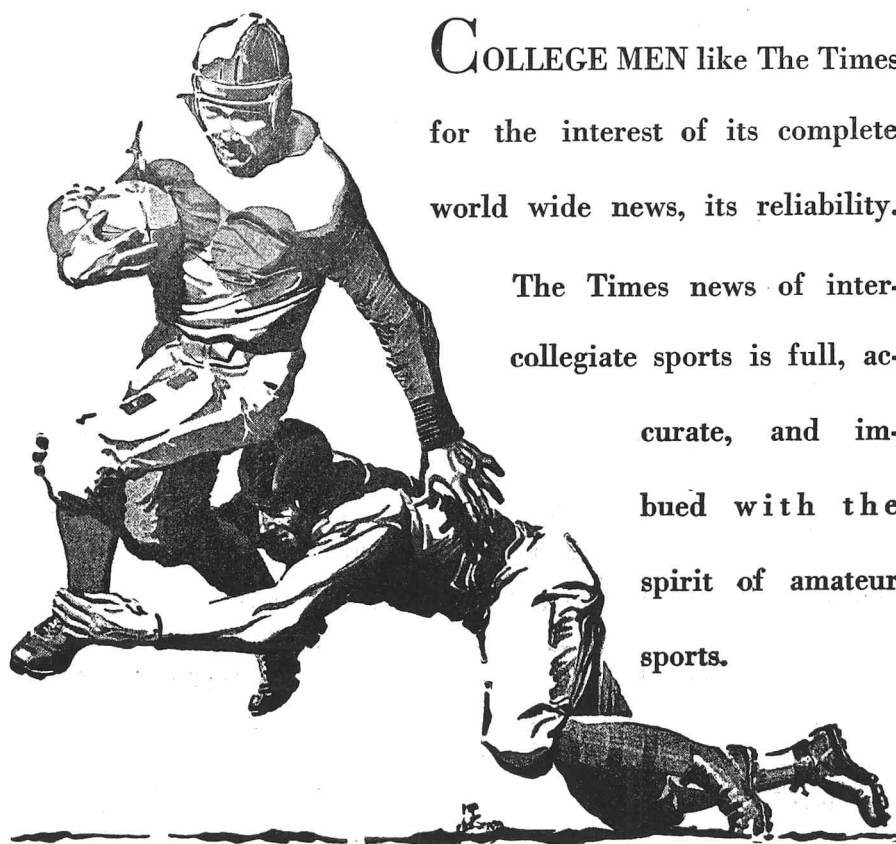
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RHODES SCHOLAR TO APPLY BEFORE OCT. 13

Rhode Island One of Thirty-Two States From Which Student Will Receive Honor.

According to an announcement issued by President Frank Aydelotte of Swarthmore College, American Secretary to the Rhodes Trustees, Rhode Island is again one of the 32 states which will pick Rhodes scholars for 1929.

The colleges and the universities from which the men will be selected are expected to have their representatives chosen by October 13. Students who wish to apply for the scholarship, or would like information should go to the office of the Dean of Freshmen not later than October 10. Election of scholars will be held December 8.

The Rhodes Scholarships were endowed through the generosity and profound interest which Cecil Rhodes had in the advancement of education. Hence, to further the ideals of this notable Englishman, the Rhodes Scholars are chosen on a basis which makes possible and assures the highest type of effort and research during the three years which the men spend at Oxford.

Literary and scholastic ability and attainments; qualities of manhood, truth, courage, devotion to duty, sympathy, kindness, unselfishness and fellowship; exhibition of moral force of character; physical vigor as shown by interest in outdoor sports or in other ways; all these factors are taken into consideration in the selection of students for the Rhodes Scholarship.

Candidates, in order to be eligible, must be male citizens of the United States and unmarried; must be not less than nineteen years of age nor more than twenty-five; and must have completed at least two years of college work. Also, candidates must apply either in the state in which they reside or in the state in which they have received their education.

To be the recipient of a Rhodes Scholarship is probably the greatest honor that can come to any student. It is a tribute to the versatile ability of a man, and is an indication of the trust which his college places in him.

Richard C. Gurney 1928, was chosen last year to represent the University and the state at Oxford. He is now a student at Christ Church College, and is pursuing his interest in English Literature. During his career at the University, Gurney participated in many activities, both athletic and non-athletic. He was winner of the 1907 class scholarship, and last spring was catcher for the baseball team.

INTRAMURAL RULES ARE REVISED BY DIRECTORS

Members of University and 1932 Squads Are Eligible After Certain Dates.

In order to make it possible for more men to participate in the intramural games, several important changes and additions have been made to the athletic contest regulations governing these sports. Heretofore men who were supposedly members of the University squads were unable to participate in the intramurals. Men who were unable to make the team, but still would enjoy the lesser meets, these rules will particularly benefit. The additions follow as given out by Professor L. E. Swain last night:

A member of any University or Freshman sport squad in season for the current year is ineligible. All men checked by the coach as members of the official squad after the final selection of men before the first game will be considered as members of the squad; a coach may check men at any time as members of his official squad. He may declare at his discretion non-official members of his squad from any branch of intramurals. Competition on any team makes a man an official member of that squad; this rule does not apply to golf.

Releases from official University and Freshman squads which will make a man for intramural competitions shall be subject to the following regulations:

a. Men on football, cross country or soccer squad must obtain release before October 21.

b. Men on basketball, hockey, winter track, wrestling or a swimming squad must obtain release before the beginning of the second semester. If, however, a man

is ineligible to compete in University or Freshman sports, during the second semester, he may obtain release from the official squad, thus making him eligible in all intramural sports, other than that from which he was dropped.

c. Men in spring track, baseball, lacrosse or tennis squads must obtain release from the official squad before the first of May.

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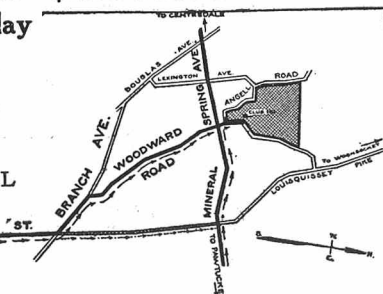
