H. E. SMITH ELECTED TO FOREIGN STUDY BOARD

IS NOW IN PARIS

Head of Romance Language Dept. is Member of Committee on Junior Year Abroad.

Professor Horatio Smith, head of the Department of Romance Languages at this University, and on leave of absence this semester for special study in Paris, has been elected a member of the committee on the Junior year abroad of the Institute of International Education. President William Allan Neilson of Smith College, Miss Dorothy W. Dennis of Wellesley and Professor Mary V. Young of Mount Holyoke are other members of the committee from New England.

The Junior year abroad, according to a statement by Miss Dennis, who has recently returned after a year in Paris, "is only for very good students who have a thorough grounding in French, and for them the result is a year of far greater interest, richness and cultural value than the ordinary year spent in the American college."

Six undergraduates from the University and Pembroke, respectively, are now at the University of Nancy, where they will remain until the first of next month when they will transfer to the University of Paris. BRIDGEWATER GAME WON BY 1932 SOCCER TEAM

SCORE IS 2 TO 1

Freshmen Come Up From Behind in Second Half to Defeat Normal School.

In a hard-fought, closely-contested game, the 1932 soccer team defeated the Bridgewater Normal aggregation by the score of two to one yesterday, at Aldrich Field. With the score one to nothing against them at the opening of the second half, the Freshmen rallied, scoring two goals in rapid succession.

The Freshmen were slow in getting started. As a result of this, the play for the major part of the first half was in yearling territory. Five minutes after the start, Shaw of Bridgewater, on a pass from Sweeny, drove the ball between the uprights. The Bridgewater team continued to force the attack until the close of the half, and were only prevented from scoring time and again by the sterling defence work of Stanley.

With the opening of the second half, the Freshmen showed a marked improvement in their style of play. They became the aggressors, and soon had control of the situation. Three minutes after the opening kick-off, Rasmussen, the star of the game, scored on a well-directed cross by Ensign. Five

William T. Tilden, 2nd, Tells Amusing Anecdotes to Large Chapel Gathering

Tennis Star's Experiences in England Prove Interesting to Undergraduates.

In his informal talk given at the voluntary chapel exercises held in Sayles Hall yesterday morning, Mr. William T. Tilden, 2nd, proved to be a most diverting and interesting speaker. He began by relating a few of the events which took place the first time he gained a berth on the United States Davis Cup Team.

"You know," he said, "when one first makes an international team, one is rather impressed by a feeling of his own importance. It was that way with me the year 'Billy' Johnston, 'Dick' Williams, 'Chuck' Garland, and myself were sent across to England to try to recover the Davis Cup. We were on the train to London and were discussing the best way to meet the great crowds which would

surely confront us at the station. "It was finally decided that 'Billy' Johnston, as ranking player of the United States that year, would leave the train first, followed by myself, Williams, and 'Chuck' Garland, with a half-dozen coaches, about eight bundles of tennis rackets, and nine trunks trailing behind. Well, we pulled into the station, and found on the platform — not a single person!" Applause from the students interrupted him, but after a minute or so he continued with his story.

"After recovering from our surprise, we decided to go right over to the Wimbledon Stadium for a little practice. By this time, however, the British Press had learned that the American tennis team had arrived in London, so that when we went out to play, the courts were entirely surrounded by correspondents and

1932 ELEVEN DEFEATED BY UNIVERSITY SCRUBS

WEAK ON DEFENSE

Freshman Line Easily Pierced by Warren and Cooke; Latter Scores Touchdown.

A spirited scrimmage between the 1932 football squad and an eleven from the University group was the chief feature of the yearling workout yesterday afternoon. The short but severe session was held under the floodlights after Coach McLaughry had dismissed all but his fourth string and ineligible players.

In the half hour of play it was very noticeable that the first-year men were considerably weaker on the defense than on the offense. The lone touchdown of the engagement was scored by the upperclass aggregation when it recovered a dropped forward pass and advanced down the field 50 yards on line thrusts and end runs that the Freshmen were unable to stop. Warren and Cooke in particular were hard to cope with and it was the latter who went over the line for the score. The light 1932 linemen were easily pushed out of the way and large openings made by the more

UNIVERSITY FOOTBALL TEAM IS CRIPPLED BY INJURIES IN SCRIMMAGE

Fogarty, Wentworth and Dietz Will Probably be Unable to Play Against Yale.

LOSSES WEAKEN TEAM

Dietz, C Team End, in Serious Condition After Receiving Kick on Head.

A wave of injuries, including the probable loss of Lincoln Fogarty, backfield ace, and W. A. Wentworth, B team guard for the Yale game, struck the University football squad as it scrimmaged for more than two hours yesterday.

Head Coach Tuss McLaughry described the afternoon's workout as the most disappointing of the season, declaring "They were the worst looking bunch of football players I ever saw."

With these conditions prevailing, the Bruins will invade New Haven Saturday morning for the thirty-fifth annual game with Yale.

Fogarty sustained a recurrence of a charleyhorse, which bothered him at the beginning of the season, yesterday when Edes tackled him at the end of an 18-yard run. He received immediate treatment from Dr. R. C. Bugbee, who would venture no prediction on whether the back who carried a kickoff 88 yards for a touchdown against Dayton would be able to

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ALUMNI ADVISORS

At present Dean Kenneth O. Mason is assigning members of the Class of 1932 to Alumni Advisers under the plan put into effect by the Associated Alumni three years ago. Under this plan, Freshmen who live outside of Rhode Island or at least twenty-five miles from College Hill are assigned to alumni living near the campus, or having their business addresses in the heart of the city.

This plan has come into effect as one of the means by which the first-year student may become properly oriented. Freshman mixers and Orientation lectures are but efforts of the same sort. The University is going to every extreme to help the member of the Class of 1932 find his place in the college and understand the environment he is in. It is very important that the undergraduate co-operate in this effort if it is to be successful.

During the past two years the Alumni Adviser plan worked with only partial success. In a great number of cases the Freshman did not even attempt to see his adviser, and in as many more, if the student was unable to see his adviser the first time he attempted to, he gave it up as a bad job and let it drop at that.

If the Alumni Adviser plan is to be a success this year, it depends entirely on the whole-hearted co-operation of the members of the Class of 1932. It is up to them entirely whether they reap the benefits that are thus placed at their disposal, or merely neglect them with that exasperating nonchalance which is so greatly affected by the first-year man.

BETTER PREPARATION

In an article appearing in yesterday's issue of the Daily Herald on the German University, the point is stressed that a more advanced type of work may be carried on because of the fine preparation in the "gymnasium." This difficulty of taking care of the poorly prepared student is thus done away with. However, it is one of the greatest difficulties with which the University is faced.

The problem of obtaining a uniformly good high school, or even preparatory school education, throughout the United States, is indeed a great one. In the rural dis-

tricts, the student is often handicapped by poor teachers; and in the city the student is again handicapped, not by poor teachers but by over-crowded classrooms.

The University spends much time and money combing over the applicants for entrance, in order to find which ones are fitted and which are not. The advice of some alumni or someone acquainted or connected with the University is now called into use. Despite these efforts, the statement that "There are many here who do not belong here" holds true.

With the present Honors Day in recognition of fine work by the student and the probable coming of an Honors School before many years, the good work of the student is encouraged. But for the student poorly prepared, the case remains almost hopeless.

The rest of the practice yesterday consisted of scrimmages for the A, B, and C combinations. In the A-B workout Hemmingway ran around his right end and through the secondary defense for 70 yards and a touchdown. The seventh point was added when Hemmingway and Gammino com-

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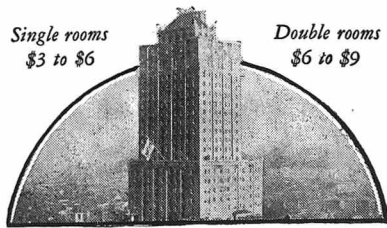
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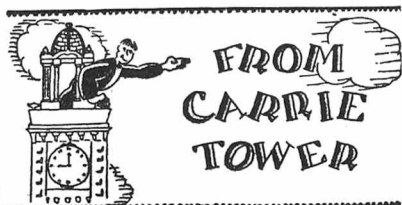
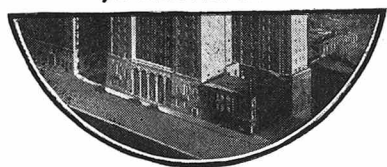
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All signs fail in wet weather.

Which statement serves as excuse or alibi, or whatever you want to call it, for my disastrous predictions of football games last Saturday.

I was particularly astray on the Brown game, which, in spite of the drizzle and a referee whose big feet ran five-yard penalties into six or seven yards each time, was the most exciting, in my opinion, since the 1926 Colgate game. My prediction was a mere 19-0 victory for McLaughry's boys, but, at the end of that wet afternoon I was very well satisfied with our modest 13-7 win.

The games I hit pretty well were victories for Army, Columbia, Dartmouth, Harvard, Holy Cross, Notre Dame, Penn, and Williams. But Colgate walloped West Virginia Poly—although the losers tallied the two touchdowns I had foreseen; N. Y. U. crashed through Fordham; Bucknell entirely turned the tables of Penn. State; Virginia held Princeton to a scoreless tie; John Hopkins refused to offer Syracuse the opposition expected; Boston University scored a surprising victory over Vermont and Georgia



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was hardly as strong against Yale as I'd predicted.

With three weeks behind it, the season has opened up a few possibilities for the greatest teams in the country, and among the Eastern pretenders must be counted in Brown, until we get toppled over by somebody—if ever. Here in the East, we find great teams in the Army, Boston College, Dartmouth, Georgetown, Lafayette, Penn. and Yale. Several of the prominent teams have been taking it on the end of the chin, notably Navy with three defeats in as many tries, Chicago with three defeats for its two teams; Colgate, Fordham, Michigan, Notre Dame (having lost to Wisconsin 24-6) Penn. State, Purdue, and Vanderbilt. Princeton we cannot judge as yet, for Virginia's great stand must have been only a fluke.

None of Brown's prospective enemies seem to have imposing records, with the exception of Dartmouth and Holy Cross. Even Dartmouth has been scored upon three times, which spells a weak defense. Allegheny scored once last Saturday on a forward and again after a march down the field. Al Marsters, while perhaps one of the greatest in an open field, is not the best defensive player in the game, and is particularly weak on forward passes over his territory.

Yale, with victories over Maine and Georgia, will be met this Saturday, and the problem is to stop Garvey and Loud. It seems impossible to stop Garvey. Holy Cross, having scored two less than one hundred points already, will provide strong opposition; while Tufts, with most of its great 1927 team back and unscored upon this season, may prove to be surprisingly strong. New Hampshire and Rhode Island will be very weak, but, Colgate, in spite of its opponents' 34 points, will be in trim by Thanksgiving to put up the best fight of the year.

Georgia Tech, Indiana, Nebraska, Ohio, and Wisconsin are the best among the distant teams.

One feature of the young season is the remarkable attendance at the Notre Dame-Navy game last Saturday. One team had been previously defeated by an overwhelming margin, and the other had already lost twice, yet 122,000 people turned out to establish an all-time record. They must like the game.

The B and D teams opened the scrimmage session and were on the field for more than an hour. The B eleven scored two touchdowns, one on a long run by C. A. Munroe, and the other on a pass from Flora to J. E. Munroe.

In another scrimmage which also lasted more than an hour, the A team scored four times. Fogarty scored the first touchdown on a line buck. Capt. Al Cornsweet registered the second and third scores on runs of 24 and 35 yards and the fourth was accounted for by Edwards, who received a pass from Flora, who took Fogarty's place.

press photographers. London, by the way, has about ten times as many newspapers as any American city, and every one of them sent special correspondents, ordinary reporters, and a corps of photographers. In view of the circumstances, we thought doubles would be safer, so 'Dick' Williams and 'Chuck' Garland, the regular doubles team, lined up on one side with Johnston and myself on the other. We won the toss, and decided to let them serve. Anxious to make a good showing, Williams, who held the service, tossed a ball up and let fly a terrific cannon-ball, which landed about eight feet past the service-line. Not greatly disturbed, since he had another chance to make it good, he whaled another. This one landed in the bottom of the net. He had to make sure of

the next one, so he lobbed it easily over the net to me. I swung, and I have never, before or since, made such a beautiful drive, in such perfect form. The only trouble was that I missed the ball by a foot!"

After more applause, Mr. Tilden recounted another incident which occurred the night before Colonel Lindbergh was due to arrive in Paris. A reception had been arranged, at which Miss Mary Gordon was to sing the "Star-Spangled Banner." She did not know the words, and neither did he, so Tilden volunteered to procure them for her. After spending most of the night trying to find somebody who knew them, he finally was able to get four stanzas written out by Jean Borotra, French tennis star. As Mr. Tilden was presenting the piece to Miss Gordon, she said, "O Bill, I've decided not to sing the 'Star-Spangled Banner.' I'm going to sing 'America,' instead, and nobody will know the difference!" Such is the reward of virtue.

Mr. Tilden told one more story, one about what he called the saddest incident of his entire tennis career. He was playing an exhibition match with Mr. Fred C. Baggs, veteran chop-stroke artist, and playing the most abominable tennis imaginable, according to him, when an old lady spectator said in a sharp voice, "Young man, can you tell me when Mr. Tilden is going to begin to play?"

At the close of his talk, Mr. Tilden was given an ovation such as few chapel speakers have ever received.
