FOOTBALL TEAM HOLDS LENGTHY PRACTICE FOR HOLY CROSS CONTEST

Game Scrimmage To-day Without Using Backs Who Will Play Next Saturday.

KICKING STRESSED

Fogarty's Injury Still Handicaps His Play; Few Changes Made in Regular Lineup.

Preparation for the Holy Cross game moved rapidly forward in the University football camp, Head Coach McLaughry keeping his entire squad on the jump for nearly three hours. After he had sent the backs to one field for drill in kicks and passes, he ordered a scrimmage on individual plays for the linemen and carried the ball himself through the holes that he ordered opened up.

There will be a game scrimmage for part of the squad to-day, but the backs who will be used Saturday will not participate, for the coaching staff has determined not to further weaken a ball-carrying squad which now numbers only a few reliable men.

The squad held its weekly blackboard drill last evening, the coaches explaining Holy Cross formations for more than an hour. The work of preparing a defence for the plays which the Crusaders will use Saturday will also start to-day and will continue in the form of dummy scrimmage for the remainder of the week.

Every lineman who was able to take part in the scrimmage yesterday took part in the drill on the offensive plays which the University team will use this week. Coach McLaughry said that he intends to have every able-bodied man on the squad ready

HOOVER LEADS SMITH IN UNIVERSITIES' POLL

1104 COLLEGES VOTING

Will Rogers' Anti-Bunk Campaign Receives One-Half of One Per Cent. of Vote.

According to a recent poll conducted by a prominent humorous magazine among college students, Herbert Hoover, Republican candidate for the President of the United States, received a two to one majority over the Democratic nominee, Governor Alfred E. Smith of New York.

Analysis of the vote showed that Hoover had the majority of votes in thirty-eight States and the District of Columbia, while Smith carried ten States, all of them in the South. In New York, his home State, the Democratic standard bearer made his best showing in the East, but trailed his opponent nine to five. The total votes in the Eastern States gave Hoover a three to one majority.

The balloting was held in connection with the college newspapers in 1104 institutions, voting boxes being placed at strategic points on the campus.

An attractive musical program arranged especially for this concert will include Brown songs, Holy Cross songs, well-known marches and light operatic selections, as well as several popular numbers.

Tickets for the dance and concert may be obtained in the Union Friday, between 9 and 1 o'clock, and also at the hall before the dance. The advance sale of tickets indicates that there will be a large crowd in attendance, including many people from out of town.

1932 SOCCER TEAM TO MEET DEAN ACADEMY IN CONTEST HERE TO-DAY

Ensign on Ineligibility List, But Eleven Looks For Another Win.

LINEUP ANNOUNCED

Third Game of Team to be Held on Aldrich Field at Three O'Clock.

In the fourth game of the season the 1932 soccer team will meet the Dean Academy eleven this afternoon at Aldrich Field. Although the Freshman team is handicapped by the ineligibility of D. H. Ensign, it is believed that the team will put up a good battle.

So far this season the team has won two games and lost one. The Durfee Textile team, which has not been defeated to date, was victorious over the 1932 team by the score of 4 to 1. The team's first win was over the Hope High School eleven to the tune of 6 to 1. The 1932 team also defeated the Bridgewater Normal team, 2 to 1.

Although the team is not as strong as last year's Freshman team, it has made a very good showing to date. The Durfee Textile team was especially strong, and included a nucleus of players who have played together for several years. Even with Ensign out of the game, optimism is running high on the squad. The game this afternoon will begin at three o'clock.

Mr. Gurney, Alumni Secretary, Urges Freshmen to Meet Their Advisers

Cards Distributed to All First-Year Men Except Those from Rhode Island.

According to an announcement received yesterday from the Alumni Office, 253 Freshmen have been assigned to advisers and each one of them is urged to make the direct acquaintance of his adviser without undue delay.

This Alumni Adviser system has been used in the University for the past few years and some excellent and worthwhile contacts between the first-year men and the alumni have resulted. The idea has the full sympathy and co-operation of the University authorities.

Only men coming from outside

the State of Rhode Island have been sent cards. Freshmen living in the State or near the border are not included, being considered as belonging in the so-called metropolitan district which has Providence as its center.

"The Herald has said editorially with truth," A. H. Gurney, Alumni Secretary, remarks, "that if the Alumni Adviser plan is to be a success this year, it depends entirely on the whole-hearted co-operation of the members of the Class of 1932. It is up to them entirely whether they reap the benefits that are thus placed at their disposal, or merely neglect them with that exasperating nonchalance which is so greatly affected by the first-year man."

PLANS FOR ARMISTICE SERVICES BEING MADE

Plans are being made by the officials of the University for the holding of Armistice Day exercises at Memorial Gate. The program is to be arranged in co-operation with the officials who have charge of the Armistice Day celebration in the city.

At the present time no definite arrangements have been made. Dr. W. H. P. Faunce, President of the University, expressed his desire to hold such services, his willingness to do all that he possibly can for the arranging of the plans.

UNIVERSITY DEBATING CANDIDATES TO TRY OUT

TO DEBATE DEC. 8

Affirmative to Meet Williams in Sayles; Negative Team to Journey to Yale.

Tryouts for the University Debating Team will start next week in preparation for the first triangular debate to be held with Yale and Williams on December 8.

The question under discussion will be "Resolved, That the Economic prosperity of the United States is unfavorable to its morals." The affirmative will meet Williams in Sayles Hall and the negative team will debate Yale at New Haven. This contest is one of the scheduled debates of the Eastern Intercollegiate Debating League, in which the University forensic team stood second last year.

The debates will be held under the new system of voting solely by the audience for the decision. Judges are done away with under this plan and two votes are taken by the audience. The first vote is taken before the debate and the other following the close of the contest. This places a great deal of importance upon the delivery of the debaters, allowing a wider field of appeal to the speaker.

UNDERGRADUATES MAY CUT CLASSES IN ORDER TO VOTE ON TUESDAY

Students on Strict Warning or C. D. Must Have Absences Excused by Dean.

POLICY CONTINUED

Cuts For Dartmouth Game to be Allowed in Same Manner As For Yale Game.

Special privileges in cutting will be given to all members of the University undergraduate body who are planning to go to their places of residence in order to vote at the presidential election on Tuesday. All students who report at the Dean's office and give sufficient reasons why they should be allowed excused cuts in order to vote, will be given these cuts within reason.

This applies primarily to students on college discipline or on strict warning. Yesterday afternoon, when interviewed by a Daily Herald reporter, Dean Otis E. Randall said "I believe that everyone of voting age should utilize his right of suffrage in the coming election. I will do everything in my power to enable students to take part in the election. I shall willingly go to the extreme limit in allowing men who can not afford to take the necessary cuts to go to their homes in order to vote." Dean Randall expressed his desire to see the undergraduates use their right of suffrage and said that all men coming to him and convincing him that they wished to be excused from classes for the purpose of casting their ballot, would be allowed this privilege.

DR. FAUNCE WILL SPEAK AT FRATERNITY REUNION

TO BE HONORED

Fitting Tribute Will be Paid at Club Dinner to be Held Next Tuesday.

Dr. W. H. P. Faunce will be the chief guest at the Founder's Day dinner of the New York Delta Upsilon Club to be given at the Waldorf-Astoria, New York, next Tuesday evening, election night. Among the other speakers to be present are included: the Rev. Dr. Nehemiah Boynton, Amherst; Dean Fraser Metzger of Rutgers University and Louis W. Stotesbury, former Adjutant General of New York State.

Special tribute will be paid to President Faunce at the meeting. The dinner program reads as follows: "On this occasion we shall give due honor to Dr. Faunce, our guest of honor, one of America's greatest men in the field of education, who with this college year retires after thirty years of distinguished service as President of Brown University."

After the dinner, which will be held in the grand ballroom of the hotel, a dance is to follow. Election returns will be announced throughout the evening.

ON CUTTING.

Again Dean Randall continues his policy of allowing cuts to those who need them in order that they may attend some important function. When it was announced early this fall that no classes would be suspended for the Yale game, there was a large amount of caustic comment on the campus. But when the undergraduates, especially those who realize the relative importance of football in relation to the University in general, looked more deeply into the matter they came to the conclusion that the decision was a fair one.

On Tuesday, students who are on college discipline or strict warning will be allowed to go home to vote, if such a leave does not necessitate an absurd number of cuts. Next Saturday, the same conditions will hold concerning the Dartmouth game.

This policy is equally fair to the undergraduate and the administration. It prevents the students from abusing the privilege given them by a suspension of classes, but it does allow those who really have a good reason to cut to do so without penalty in these cases. The Daily Herald is highly in accord with this policy which does not curb the freedom of the student nor open the University to abuse.

RESPECT TO THE SENIORS

Yesterday morning the time-honored custom, although neglected of late, was again put into effect when the Seniors marched out of chapel followed by the Juniors in an orderly procession. This former University custom was brought into effect yesterday at the request of President Faunce.

At least this amount of respect is due to the last-year men. The Freshmen, Sophomores, and Juniors all seemingly appear as important on the campus as the Seniors themselves. But because of their very standing as Seniors, we owe a certain amount of respect to the members of the Class of 1929.

President Faunce has always hated to see the passing of old and time-honored customs. Surely the student body can not find fault with a custom which not only inserts the quality of order-

liness in the exit from chapel but also is carried on at the request of the President and in due respect to the traditional dignity of the Seniors. The passing of the greetings between students has often been lamented. The passing of too much of the effortless but picturesque tradition of the University should not be allowed to continue.

The Daily Herald has always been heartily in accord with the enforcement or the re-establishment of such old customs which are in danger of disappearing from the campus and with them a certain amount of the color and more dramatic aspect of college life. Let us hope that in the future that the Juniors will await their turn to leave the chapel and allow the Seniors to go out first, for some better reason than that the members of the Class of 1930 are to hold some election after they are sure the Seniors are safely past the portals.

The profession as a whole is hanging its collective head, and, as the result of the past week's upsets, I'm going to pick DePauw to beat Army this Saturday, as well as Lehigh over Harvard, Manhattan over Boston College, South Dakota over Iowa, and so forth.

The only unbeaten team that will stay that way over this next week-end will be either New York University or Georgetown, and that only because they're playing each other and both can't lose. But, because the New York

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team so overwhelmingly laced Colgate, I'm picking Georgetown to win. I also think New Hampshire will beat Tufts.

What a day! And what explaining the experts will have to do! Out of twenty-eight games, nine of my predicted winners either tied or lost. And those that won came nowhere near approximating my scores.

Whether the Dartmouth or the Yale or the Penn debacle was the greatest upset of the day is a question. Probably the last named, but they were all surprises. Three of the four supposedly greatest teams in the East bowled over in one afternoon.

True, Dartmouth may lament the absence of its Special Delivery Marsters, but Harvard can point to the fact that its great Wallie Harper, perhaps the best defensive back in the game, saw not even a minute of service. Harvard had the drive, and, knowing that anything might happen if the Indians began heaving passes with abandon, they kept the ball all the time. French, hitherto considered more or less timid around the edges—a side-line runner—crashed through with the greatest game he ever played, and aided by Guarnaccia, a boy who never played football until he entered Harvard, broke the Dartmouth team into small pieces.

The Green, according to reports, suffered injuries that can't be mended until 1929. Marsters is out of the Yale game, and so, too, are Breithut, Booma, Swarthout, Jeremiah, Wolff, and several others. If Bart McDonough, Dick Black, Tex Cole, Ellie Armstrong, Hal Andres and a few others break their legs during this week, then Yale will have no chance of winning. The team having the greatest number of cripples always wins, according to Miller Huggins.

When the smoke cleared away, there remained about eleven teams in the country undefeated. Army is the predominant, but meeting Notre Dame, Nebraska, and Stanford is quite apt to come a cropper. I wouldn't be surprised to see Rockne's team beat the Army.

New York University with its high-scoring Ken Strong is next in line, but will be beaten by either Georgetown, Missouri, or Carnegie Tech. Other teams with clean records are Boston College, Georgetown, Carnegie Tech, West Virginia, Georgia Tech, Iowa, Illinois, Ohio State, and Nebraska.

My best guess of the day was on the Brown game, it being about the only contest I picked within a single touchdown. Colby surprised me by beating Bowdoin. Marquette managed to tie Holy Cross, Iowa dumped Minnesota, Penn. State

held Syracuse to a scoreless tie. Navy squeezed a win over Penn., Wesleyan tied Amherst, and Gettysburg spoiled Bucknell's long record. Purdue exceeded itself in whaling Chicago 40-0, Maine slaughtered Bates when they had no business doing so. Nebraska was held to a lone safety by Missouri, Colgate wilted utterly before N. Y. U., Middlebury was surprisingly strong against Norwich, and Princeton was very lucky indeed to win over Cornell with a three-point margin.

I did as well as could be expected on the following winners—Brown Boston College, Georgia, Illinois Ohio, West Virginia, Notre Dame Carnegie Tech, Columbia, and Georgia Tech, getting within at least ten points on those games.

Anybody that bets, hereafter, on the basis of whatever scores I may predict, is demented. But I'll be right in there next Saturday with a list of winners that you'll want to mortgage your house on.

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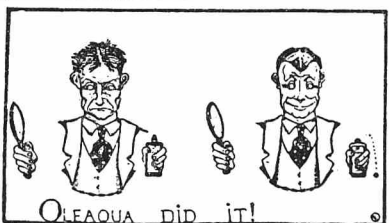
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
