THREE UNIVERSITY TEAMS WILL FACE OPPONENTS IN HOME CONTESTS TO-DAY

HARVARD MATMEN HERE

**Sextet Will Meet Holy Cross
In Attempt to Chalk Up
Its Sixth Victory.**

TRACK TEAM MEETS B. U.

**1932 Wrestlers, Swimmers and
Trackmen Also Compete in
Providence.**

In the feature home meet of the season, the undefeated University wrestlers will oppose the strong Harvard team in the new gymnasium at 8:30 p. m. to-night. Coach Herrick will keep the same lineup that defeated the M. I. T. wrestlers last Friday night.

Last year the Harvard team defeated the University men by the close score of 12 to 9 in the Hemingway Gymnasium at Cambridge. Five of this year's team wrestled in last season's match. They are I. E. Cardon 1929, R. G. Anderton 1930, D. E. Alper 1930, A. C. Cornsweet 1929, and Harry Cornsweet 1929. Of these men, only the Cornsweet brothers were winners. This year Harry will oppose Warner, who was defeated by his brother last year.

To date, the University matmen have been victorious over Yale, Springfield and M. I. T. Harvard has decisions over Tufts and M. I. T., but was defeated Saturday night in a close match.

Cardon, the University's en-

COLGATE COURT TEAM WINS FAST GAME, 29-22

LEADS THROUGHOUT

**R. O. Brown Stars on Offense
and Defense in Playing
Against Bollerman.**

Despite a spirited second-half rally that gave the crowd of 400 the best basketball thrill of the season, the University court team went down to defeat at the hands of the Colgate five, 29-22, last night in the Gymnasium. The winners were outscored in the final period, but their half-time advantage of 19-10 stood them in good stead, and they were able to withstand the belated rally of the home five.

Inability to convert innumerable foul shots into tallies and over-eagerness in the last ten minutes of play were the chief factors in the defeat of Coach McLaughry's combination. Only four successful throws were made from the foul mark, while at least a dozen or more went wild of their mark. The Maroon passers tired from the fast play near the end of the contest, but the home five failed to capitalize on the let-down by indecisive passing and random shots. The good size crowd was kept on edge by the many opportunities the University quintet had to tie up the score in the final portion of the contest.

After being clearly outplayed by the superior passers from Colgate

1932 BASKETBALL TEAM DEFEATED BY ROXBURY

SCORE IS 33-13

**Opponents Hand Freshman Second Straight Loss of Year
in Fast Contest.**

Roxbury Prep's strong basketball team had little trouble with the 1932 five yesterday afternoon in the Gymnasium and handed it its second defeat of the season, 33-13. The schoolboys lead throughout the contest except in the opening minutes of play, leading 19 to 9 at half time.

The yearlings started with a rush and scored three baskets before the Roxbury forwards found the range. Good cross-court passing on the part of Coach Snell's players and the strong five-man defense of the Freshmen were the outstanding features in the opening period. When the Cheshire team found that it could not penetrate the home five's defense it resorted to long shots from the center of the floor, making good on a surprising number of times.

REORGANIZATION

There are a number of extra-curricular activities connected with almost every University of 1,000 or more undergraduates. Not the least among these, as was the case with the University last year, is the orchestra. But during the present year the orchestra has entirely disappeared.

This process of disappearance was due to lack of interest on the part of those students who have some slight ability as musicians. Last year, the student body no larger, an orchestra was composed and was ranked as one of the best collegiate orchestras in this section of the country. The programs were so well received wherever the orchestra was presented that ambitious plans had been made for this year, including a trip through the Middle-West of some extent.

It is usually the case that a University activity fails because of lack of support by those students not directly interested. Many of the athletic teams need that kind of support. But the reason for the disbanding of the orchestra was that there were so few men of ability out for it that it was impossible to get together a combination of any promise. It seemed that the idea of an orchestra would have to be given up entirely.

However, an effort is being made for reorganization. On Friday night, a meeting will be held in the Union Auditorium. Wind and string instruments are both needed, with the emphasis being placed on wood-winds. If there is to be an orchestra this year, it is essential that every undergraduate of any ability and at all interested in playing in an orchestra, attend this meeting.

 larger than the one now in use.

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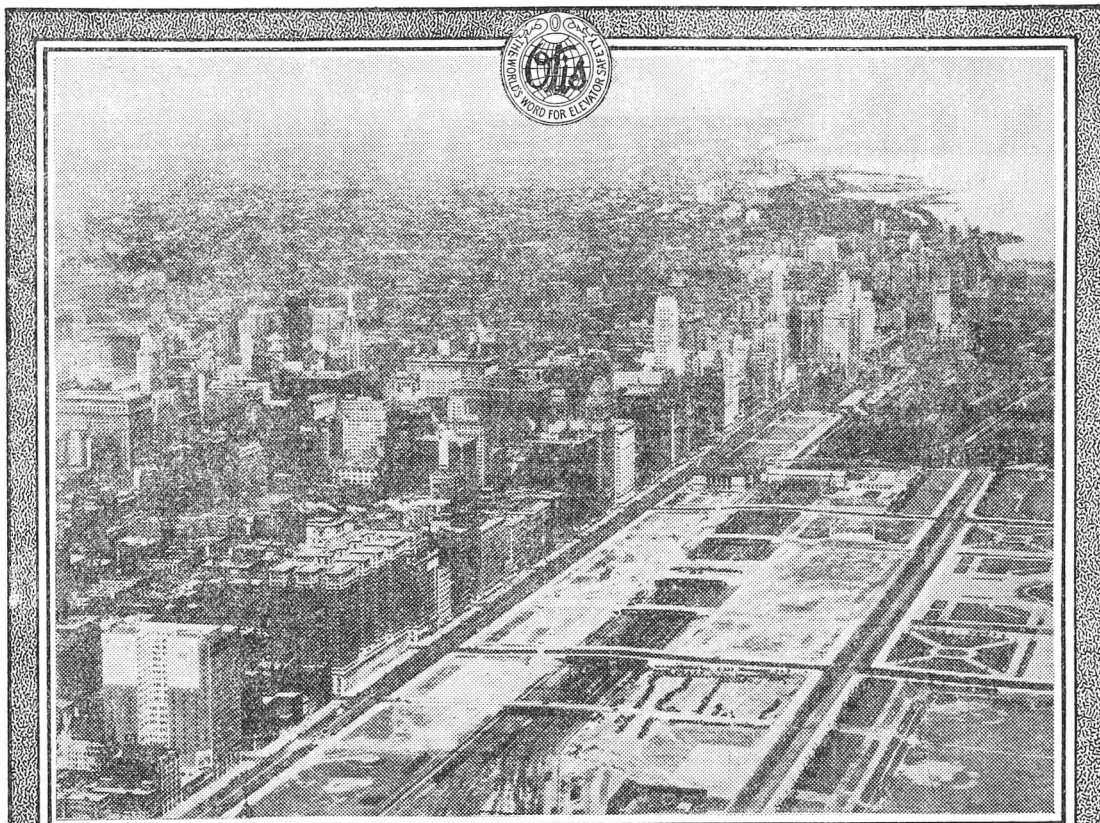
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They've finally gone and done it, and the announcement is out that a fumble may not be advanced by the defensive side after recovery. The news was released to the press yesterday, at the conclusion of the meeting of the rules committee.

How Sammy White must have turned over in his grave yesterday if he has yet achieved that position—when the news came to him that such a change had been made. For the benefit of those who don't study their American history, Mr. White was the gentleman on the Princeton football team of some autumns past, who defeated Harvard and Yale on successive Saturdays by scooping up loose pigskins and racing the length of the field for the winning touchdowns.

One by one, the rules committee has been lopping off some of the most exciting features of the game. The drop-kick is one of the more lamentable losses, but this new ruling, extending the one made last year about picking up loose balls, removes a big thrill from the game. In time, I suppose, they'll eliminate the forward pass.

They're trying to fiddle with pro hockey now, yet I can't see much cause for damage. Hockey, in its present form, is enough to panic plenty of thousands, and everybody who owns a team is making money, yet they all have suggestions for more scoring.

But the real beauty of hockey is the closeness of the game. Just as soon as you get more scoring, the stronger teams will run up a lot of goals and the games will be over as soon as the first period is ended. As hockey is now, the poorer team has an excellent chance to get a one-goal lead and hold it.

For me, the real thrill in hockey is when my team has a single-goal lead, and the opposing team is bearing down in the last five or ten minutes, throwing its entire forces up the ice. There are more heart-throbs in a situation like that than in any other. But they'll be missing when hockey becomes a sport with baseball scores.

Raspberries for Harvard

In his article, "Harvard: Fair and cooler," in the latest Saturday Evening Post, Mr. Kenneth L. Roberts bites the hand that fed him, apologetically but severely. His caricature of the Harvard he saw and the Harvard men who tried to interpret Harvard for him is a diabolically clever masterpiece. He takes a couple of thousand words to prove that Harvard men are ego-centric asses trying to appear indifferent when they are not, starving in Harvard Square hash-houses, and lying prostrate in idolatrous worship of the Great God Final Club. He takes a concluding paragraph to show that Harvard men are studious and passable. The result is a highly spiced article of sure-fire appeal to a public which wants its college atmosphere belching fire and brimstone.

There will be no cries of outrage on the part of undergraduates in the ears of Mr. Roberts nor attempts to out Herod Herod on the part of the men whose "semi-idiotic obtuseness" he lampoons. The "extra-thick coats of indifference," which he says are a "lot of hooley," will at least protect his victims from the shower of garbage loosed by his glorification of the exception in place of the rule. The only men who will even feel embarrassed are those whom he pictures at luncheon in a prominent undergradu-

ate club—he suggests the "Soup Club"—under such names as "Shock-Haired" and "Serious-Face." They will wonder if they really said what he says they said.

If Mr. Roberts is right, there are a great many things wrong with Harvard. The traditional atmosphere is a fake, the college is over-infested with a queer specimen called a "dean," Harvard men are enthusiastically indifferent and "run screaming" when attempts are made to penetrate this false cloak of self-consciousness, the names of all clubs are asinine, the college is run by temperamental Student Council Reports, graduate school students are social pariahs because they have lost "the true Harvard bloom," and, most significant of all, the "cozy collegetts" (Mr. Roberts' nomenclature for the units of the House plan) constitute an artificial attempt to eradicate snobbery,—and ad infinitum.

In the last analysis, Mr. Roberts himself frees the Harvard man from paying any serious attention to his lurid pronunciamento, in which a few good points are so mingled with the numerous bad ones as to show the author was not in a position to distinguish between them. He points out that Harvard men are immune from the literature and motion pictures which take the American undergraduate for their subject. It is all for the best even though the medium is the genial and appreciative Mr. Roberts.

In the entire meet the Springfield team was able to win only two events. Littlefield of the home team was victor in the 440-yard event, while his team-mate, Brown, turned in the second first place for his team when he won the medley swim.

University Hockey

With four straight wins to its credit, the University hockey team meets the Holy Cross sextet to-night at 8 o'clock on the Arena ice. Coach Dubuc's players, having compiled an impressive record of six victories in nine engagements to date, are looking forward to registering another win to-night.

As at the University, hockey is a newcomer on the Holy Cross winter sport schedule, this being but the second year in which the Worcester College has boasted of an ice team. During its short existence, however, the sport has "taken hold" with the Jesuits and now ranks a close second to basketball as the most popular winter sport. This year's team was handicapped early in the season by the lack of suitable practice condition, with the result that it was late in getting started on its schedule. Only two games have been played to date, both being dropped by close margins. Boston University, which also has scored a win over the University puck-chasers, and Boston College are the two teams to have taken the measure of the Crusaders.

To-night's visitors will be greatly hampered by the loss of Dick Harrel, who not only is the outstanding man on the squad, but its coach as well. Harrel has given up hockey for this season in order to devote his time to baseball. Captain Paul Kelcher, at left wing, is reported to be an excellent stick handler and the possessor of a terrific shot, while his forward mates, Edward Keleher and John O'Shea, are potent members of the team's attack. The defense positions have been filled by different players in each game, which would indicate that it is in that department that the Worcester team is weakest.

Coach Dubuc will rely on the same combination that was so successful against Pennsylvania a week ago to turn back the Crusaders to-night. Crins, Ahern and Mayo will be one forward trio, with Moulton, Crane and Perrine the second. Captain Lingham and

Perrine will be in the defense posts when the game begins, and when Perrine is shifted to the attack, Walls will take his place. Van Wickie will be stationed in the cage as he has been for every contest this year. Neilson and Snow are the two reserves that may get into the fray to-night.

University Track

In the last dual meet before the I. C. A. A. A. A. meet in New York, the University will oppose the Boston University track men at the New Gymnasium this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. This is the second dual meet of the season, the first being with Worcester Polytechnic Institute last Saturday.

Coach Powers' men are expected to have much stiffer competition to-day than they encountered last week with Worcester. The same men who competed in the first meet will be used to-day. Captain J. S. Collier 1929, joint holder of the world's record in the indoor 60-yard high hurdles, will run the 45-yard hurdles this afternoon along with W. H. Carney 1929.

G. F. Troy and K. T. White, both of the class of 1931, will run in the 40-yard dash. Both men were consistent point winners for last year's Freshman team. Troy especially has been showing up well in intercollegiate competition.

In the 600-yard run, W. F. Huse 1931, W. R. Gill 1931, and F. C. Aldrich 1930, will compete. Huse, one of the stars of the 1931 team, was the winner of the "Doc" Caples 880-yard run last year. Gill ran on the cross country last fall in addition to being a member of the 1931 team.

T. Shotten, Jr. 1930, J. R. Perley 1931, and Aldrich will represent the University in the 1000-yard run. Both Shotten and Perley were on the cross country

team. Shotten will also run in the mile event with S. DiIoria 1931, also a member of the cross country squad.

Harry Cornsweet 1929, Louis Farber 1929 and D. D. Demarest 1931, will throw the shot for the University. The first two men are veterans of two years, while Demarest was a member of the 1931 squad.

In the high jump, C. T. Russell 1930, G. E. Clifford 1931, and M. B. MacCatherine 1931, will compete. Russell was runner-up in the New England Intercollegiate last spring. The other two men were members of last year's Freshman team.

In the two-lap relay, the last event of the meet, Troy, Hood, White and Collier will run in that order.
