N. E. INTERCOLLEGIATE WRESTLING CROWN WON BY UNIVERSITY MATMEN

**Three Individual Titles Won
by Cornsweet Brothers and
Wentworth.**

FRESHMEN PLACE LAST

**Cardon Loses 115-lb. Title by a
Fall to Stella of Tufts in
Overtime Period.**

By amassing a total of 24 points the undefeated University wrestling team won the New England intercollegiate wrestling title at Hemingway Gymnasium, Harvard, last Saturday night. Tufts captured second place with a score of 20 points, while Harvard, M. I. T. and Williams completed the list of entrants with totals of 17, 8, and 6 points, respectively.

Besides capturing the team championships, the Bruin matmen also carried off three individual crowns, Harry Cornsweet, Al Cornsweet and Cy Wentworth all winning their respective matches. The only defeats suffered by the University wrestlers

PROF. JACOBS ADDRESSES TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION

FAUNCE OPENS MEETING

**Problems of Secondary School
Education Discussed by
Supt. Reed.**

President W. H. P. Faunce opened the twenty-seventh annual meeting of the Brown University Teachers' Association Saturday afternoon. Professor Walter B. Jacobs, of the Department of Education and Director of the Extension Courses of the University, concluded the morning session with a talk on "Are we born so; or made so?" The meeting took place in Alumni Hall of Brown University.

Carroll R. Reed, Superintendent of Schools of Bridgeport, Conn., gave the main address at the session, outlining the problems of secondary school education. The New England Association of Chemistry Teachers and the Barnard Club were guests of the association.

Mr. Reed, who was Superintendent of Schools in East Providence at one time, discussed the numerous problems that have arisen with the increased number of children attending high school. He said the present tendency toward universal education on a secondary level has brought us face to face with the problem of time once again.

"This problem must be faced," he declared, "and the period of general education cut down or

**Professor Emeritus James Dealey

Professor Dealey's reputation as a speaker on social and political topics seems to have preceded him, as he reports that in the next two weeks he expects to give addresses at three colleges in the State.

SCORE TIED AT HALF

**900 Spectators at Contest.—Bob
Brown Stars for Losers
in Fast Game.**

Playing one of their best games of the season before 900 spectators in the Brown Gymnasium Saturday night, the University quintet met defeat at the hands of a fast Rhode Island State basketball team by a 29 to 21 score. Bob Brown, center for the University quintet, was the sensation of the game, gathering 14 of his team's points.

The score at the half stood 13-13 after the University center had caged 10 points. In the second period, however, the visitors kept the Brown star covered closely and the University offensive attack collapsed.

During the first period the Rhode Island State combination was unable to penetrate the University

CONCLUDE NOVICE MAT CHAMPIONSHIPS TODAY

**Contests Begin at 4:30 in Brown
Gymnasium.—Seven Final
Bouts Scheduled.**

Concluding the novice wrestling championships, seven final contests and one semi-final event will be staged at the Brown Gymnasium to-day beginning at 4:30. The contests, originally scheduled for last Friday, were postponed because of the absence of the wrestling coach.

There were no entries in the 115-pound class. In the 125-pound bout H. Shapiro 1930, will meet R. H. Stafford 1932. V. A. McKivern 1931, and O. E. Sawyer 1932, will meet in the 135-pound class.

In the 145-pound bout A. A. DiMartino 1929, will wrestle the winner of the semi-final bout between W. L. Robison 1932, and R. A. Green 1931. In the 155-pound class J. S. Anderson 1931, and L. H. Bakst 1931, will wrestle. J. C. White 1932, will face A. G. Rotelly 1932, in the 165-pound event; T. Giddings 1929, and R. S. Ahlman 1931, will meet in the 175-pound bout, and in the unlimited class C. H. Kretschman 1931, and E. T. Sedely 1931, will wrestle.

The novice wrestling contest has met with unexpected success, and the enthusiasm of both the participants and spectators has been marked. Many entrants have competed in all classes.

GAIN IN REGISTRATION IN EXTENSION COURSES

144 INCREASE REPORTED

**Total 1929 Registration of
1,257, as Compared to
1,113 Last Year.**

A preliminary report of the University extension series shows that 1,257 students and auditors are registered in the courses now being offered. This compares with a total of 1,113 who took the courses given in the February, 1928, series.

Professor Walter Ballou Jacobs, Director of the University Extension, has a class of 164 in his course on every-day psychology. Professor E. C. Kirkland, conducting a course on early American history and using the Yale films to illustrate his lectures, has fifty-six in his class, and George W. Potter 1921, editor of the Providence Tribune.

1932 QUINTET LOSES LAST GAME OF SEASON

**R. I. State Five Scores Six Points
in Overtime Period to Win
Game 29 to 27.**

In an exciting overtime game played at the Brown Gymnasium Saturday night, the 1932 basketball team lost its last game of the season to the Rhode Island State Freshmen by a score of 29-27. The visiting first-year men led at half-time 14-9, but the University Freshmen came up to tie the score at 19-19 by the end of the third period.

At the close of an exciting fourth period, in which the play was varied and sensational, the score was again tied, this time at 23-23. Freeman, Brown left forward, put his team into the lead early in the overtime period, but Wales of Rhode Island equalled the score, and his team-mate, Crandall, then added three more points. Wales scored another point less than a minute from the end of the period, while Freeman

**Natators Capture Every First
Place in Which They
Participate.**

**Brown Swimmers Break Three
N. E. Records in Relays and
440-yard Swim.**

Boston, Mass., March 17.—Capturing first place in every event in which it participated, the University swimming team scored an overwhelming victory in the New England Intercollegiate Championships held here yesterday afternoon. Coach Barry's men amassed 49 points to lead M. I. T. runner-up with 23 points, by a wide margin.

Three New England Intercollegiate pool records were established in the course of the afternoon by the Brown swimmers in winning the 300-yard medley relay and the 440-yard free style, and Bud Henry in the 440-yard

RECOGNITION

With the Intercollegiate Swimming Association meet next Friday and Saturday as the final meet of the season, the University swimmers are concluding one of the most successful years in the history of the University. By winning seven of the nine first places in the New England Intercollegiate, the team under the successful direction of Coach Barry stamped itself as easily the best of the teams entered.

During the past season, the University swimmers have met Dartmouth, Yale, Pennsylvania and C. C. N. Y., all members of the Intercollegiate league, defeating the latter two teams easily, and losing to Dartmouth by the scant margin of two points. In the final standing of the league, which was won by the crack Yale squad Friday, Dartmouth gained fourth place, followed by Navy, Princeton, Pennsylvania, C. C. N. Y. and Columbia. Yale, Rutgers and Syracuse were the only teams to attain a higher standing than the team which was able to score only a two-point victory over the University team at a time in the season when the team was just beginning to round into form.

Not only this season, but also in former years, has the University team met and defeated members of this Intercollegiate league. With a team which is constantly being developed and bettered by able coaching, we would suggest that the University Officials make application to enter this league and give the team the recognition which it rightly deserves and at the same time increase the reputation which Brown already has for its successful swimming team.

came in the 115 and 135-lb. classes where Cardon and Anderton, who had worked their way into the finals, were defeated by Stella of Tufts and Lisle of Williams, respectively.

In the 115-lb. class Cardon of Brown met defeat at the hands of Stella of Tufts after wrestling for 2 minutes and 52 seconds in the second of two overtime periods. Cardon, who was the defending champion, seemed to have the better of the contest in the regular bout, but in the overtimes the Tufts wrestler forced the issue, and secured a fall with only 1 min. 3 sec. to go.

Again, in the 135-lb. class, Anderton of the Bruins was defeated by Lisle of Williams by a decision. The bout was listless, as Anderton found it difficult to get near the lanky Williams grappler to secure a hold and consequently had to rely on defensive tactics. Lisle finally won with a time advantage of 3 minutes 38 seconds.

Wrestling in his last intercollegiate bout, Al Cornsweet defeated Robinson of Harvard to take the championship of the 155-lb. class. After tumbling his man at the very start of the bout, Cornsweet worked hard for a fall, but was frustrated by the elusiveness of the Harvard grappler. However, he had an easy time, finally winning the contest by a referee's decision with a time advantage of 9 minutes 55 seconds.

In the 165-lb. class Wentworth of the Bruins threw Kaufman of Harvard after 2 minutes of strenuous wrestling in the second four-minute period. Wentworth had the better of the first period, being on top all but the last minute, when his opponent slipped from his grasp. In the second period Wentworth quickly secured a fore-arm and headlock hold, and pinned his man to the mat. This bout was exciting all the way through, and was only overshadowed by the unlimited match between Harry Cornsweet and Warner of Harvard.

In the best bout of the evening Captain Harry Cornsweet of Brown defeated Warner of the Crimson with the scant time advantage of 1 minute 54 seconds. At the beginning of the first period in the unlimited division, Cornsweet tumbled his man and immediately started to work for a fall. Warner, however, proved too elusive and wriggled his way free.

Taking the bottom in the second 4-minute, Cornsweet lost no time in getting to his feet, and during the remainder of the contest both wrestled cautiously, neither taking any chances. However, due to his time advantage won in the first period, Captain Cornsweet was ultimately awarded the bout by a referee's decision.

In the finals of the Freshman wrestling championships, Tietz of Brown was the only man to come through, as he defeated Estok of Tufts by a referee's decision for the heavyweight crown.

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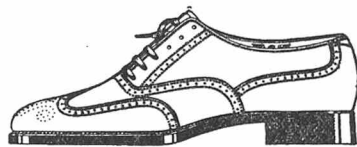
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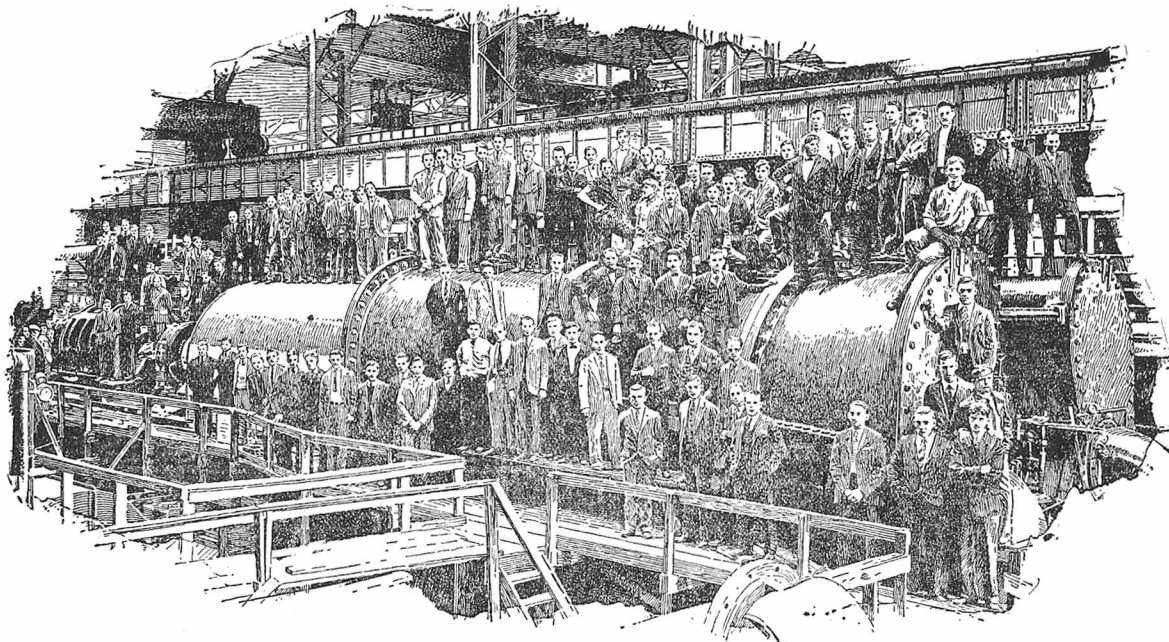

Hurwitz and Ackroyd starred for the victors, while Bob Brown was the sole threat for the University quintet. Snyder, who has been high-point scorer in the previous contests, could not find the hoop.

R. K. LYONS 1899, DEAD

One of the most prominent chemical engineers in the country, Robert K. Lyons 1899, died yesterday at the Jane Brown Hospital, where he had undergone an operation. Mr. Lyons was in his fifty-fourth year.

A direct descendant of Edward Howell of Southampton, England, the first English settler in eastern Long Island, the late manager of the Apponaug Company was born Feb. 17, 1876, the son of Frank and Clara Howell Lyons, at West Hampton Beach, L. I.

Mr. Lyons was a member of many social and technical organizations. He was a member of the Theta Delta Chi fraternity at the University, the To Kalon Club of Pawtucket, the Wannamoisett Country Club, the British Empire Club, the Players, the Colorists' Club, the American Chemical Society, and the American Society of Textile Chemists and Colorists. He was also Third Vice-President of the Providence Engineering Society.

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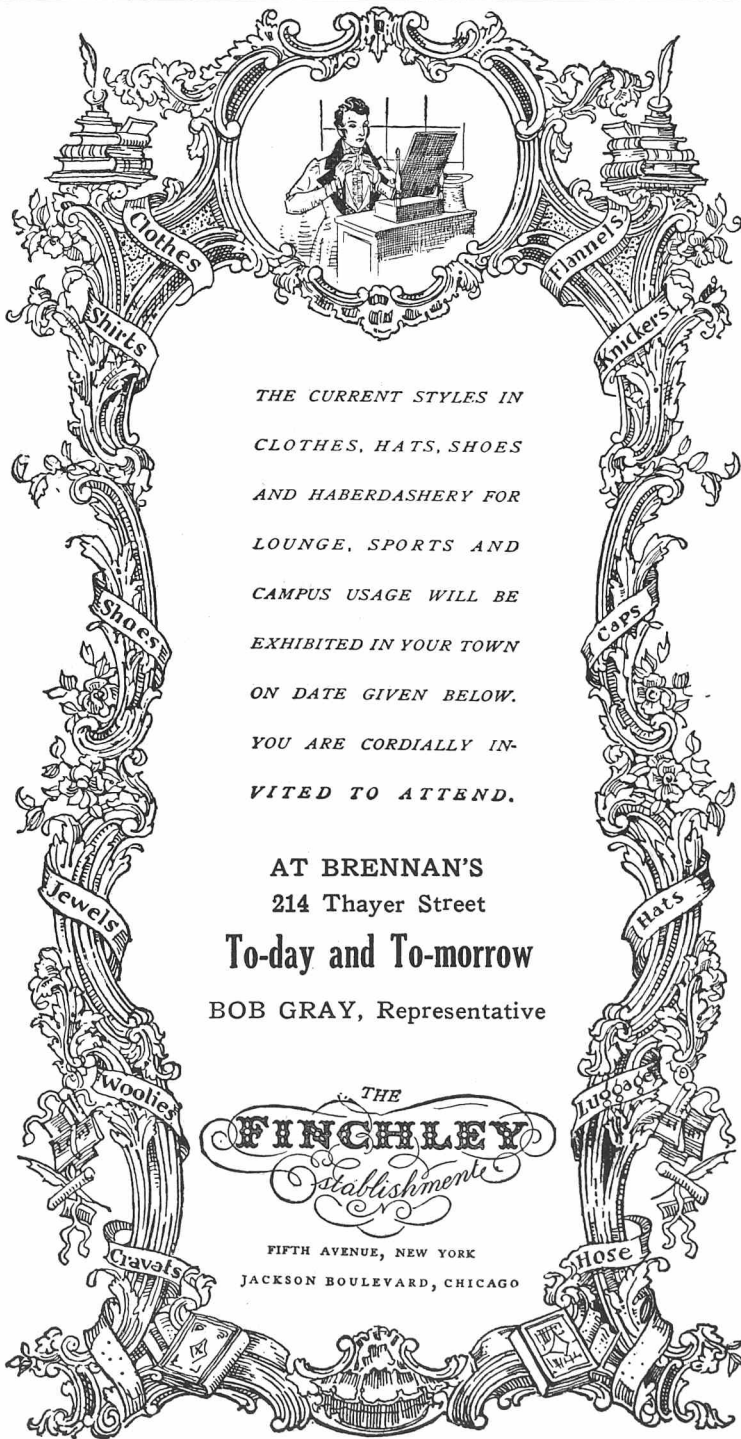
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UNIVERSITY SWIMMERS WIN INTERCOLLEGIATES

swim. The trio of Ed Sittler in the backstroke, Doug Borden doing the breaststroke, and Norm Arnold in the remaining 100-yard free style, cut the old record by 3 3-5 seconds to set a new record of 3 minutes 24 2-5 seconds. In the 440, Bud Henry took an early lead, but at the 150-yard mark fell behind Jarosh, M. I. T., whom he trailed by a full body length for the next eight laps. On the last sixty yards Henry spurred, and passed his engineer opponent on the last 40 to win by 3-4 of a body length.

The 50-yard dash final was an all-Brown event, the Bruins taking the first three places. Hall gained an advantage at the half-way mark, to lead at the finish by more than a yard. Precky Bearce sprang somewhat of a surprise by taking second place from Captain Clyde Barrows, who placed third.

A well executed front one-and-one-half with a half twist gained Freddy Brace the decision in the dives. The University diver did well in several of the required dives and maintained his margin of superiority in the optionals. His point total was 80.2. Hawk-inson, the other University entrant, failed to place despite a number of good plunges.

Norm Arnold won the 150-yard backstroke event handily from his team-mate, Ed Sittler. Arnold led all the way, to turn in the time of 1 minute 48 3-5 seconds—one-fifth of a second more than the N. E. Intercollegiate record. Sittler, by means of a fast finish, nosed out Luey of M. I. T. by inches for second place.

Ray Hall scored his second individual win of the meet in the 100-yard dash, which he negotiated in 56 3-5 seconds. The four finalists were about even at the midway mark, but Hall drew away on the last 50 yards to win in easy fashion. Captain Clyde Barrows and Torchio of M. I. T. finished almost in a dead heat, but the judges awarded the victory to the former.

The 200-yard relay proved a walk-away for the University quartet, which won in the fair time of 1 minute 42 seconds. Precky Bearce, leading off, picked up a few feet on the field after a slow start. Arnold held his own, and Hall increased his team's advantage to a good three yards. Captain Barrows took it easy, maintaining the lead, and finishing yards ahead of his opponent. The relay marked the final intercollegiate race for both Captain Barrows and Bearce.

Summary of the meet:
