UNIVERSITY TEAM DOWNS R. I. STATE IN SLOW CONTEST

Visitors Score First in Third
Period by Intercepting
of Forward Pass.

SCORE IS 14 TO 6

University Eleven Plays Spotty
Football; Still Lacking
In Scoring Punch.

In defeating the Rhode Island State College eleven, 14-6, Saturday, the University team once again showed that it can make close contests out of the most one-sided games. Although Coach McLaughry's charges had a decided edge in first downs, 15-5, they had to be satisfied with a one touchdown superiority.

For a while Saturday afternoon it looked as though the University team was to be a victim of circumstances for the second week running. The visitors were the first to score as a result of an intercepted pass in the third period and the way the home eleven was playing, it was doubtful whether the lead would be wiped out. Throughout the first half, the University team had been outplaying the downstaters, but could not deliver the scoring punch. Three times in the first half Captain Edwards and his mates were within scoring range of the R. I. goal line, but each time were repulsed inside the 20 line mark.

R. I. Quarterback Scores

The same flat pass that spelled disaster at Springfield was responsible for Rhode Island's only score, when Kearns, the R. I. quarterback, snared a pass from Fogarty on his own 45-yard line and had a clear field in front of him to race 55 yards to a touchdown. Immediately after the following kickoff, the University team aroused itself and instituted a march down the field from its own 37-yard line that culminated in a touchdown, Gurll going over the last line on a triple pass, Marshall to Edwards to Gurll. The end runs of Edwards and the criss cross of Marshall to Gurll were the home team's two best yard gainers on this series of plays that led to the first University score. Gurll put his team in the lead with a dropkick that just cleared the bar. Along towards the end of the quarter the University team was constantly threatening to score again, and although it once got as near as the 3-yard mark, it failed to develop enough power to get it over the last chalk line. Link Fogarty was forced to leave the game during this drive because of injuries and Joe Mahood took his place for the rest of the encounter.

Edwards Makes Final Tally

Captain Edwards accounted for the final tally when he went through tackle in the final period for 32 yards and a touchdown. Gurll, Marshall and Mahood were the carriers who advanced the ball to the 32-yard stripe by means of straight football plays. Gurll was again successful with his dropkick for the point after touchdown. Following the score,

Athletic Council Not to Run Special Train

Univ. Football Squad to Leave
Friday A. M.; Band Offers
Special Rates.

No provision to take care of those undergraduates wishing to travel by train to Princeton for the game Saturday has been made by the University Athletic Council it was learned yesterday. Special cars, which will be attached to a through train have been chartered for the team, substitutes and coaches only.

The University football delegation of 45 men will leave Providence early Friday morning and will arrive in Princeton that evening in time for a practice workout on the turf in the Palmer Stadium. The squad will dine with the Princeton team through the courtesy of the Princeton Athletic Association and will then depart to a secluded spot where it will remain until game time Saturday.

Those undergraduates able to leave Providence Thursday night can accompany the band on its trip to New York at special reduced rates. L. L. Oster 1930, is in charge of the enroute service of the organization and all those desiring information concerning the special offer should see him.

DEBATING UNION WILL MEET SEVEN TEAMS THIS YEAR

Victoria College of New Zealand
and Vassar Scheduled in
Feature Debates.

LEAGUE STARTS DEC. 7

Tryouts for Regular and Fresh-
man Debating Teams Will be
Held October 15, 16.

Six league debates and a special meet with a foreign college was announced yesterday by John F. Aiso 1931, President of the Debating Union. Three members of the team that last year won the Intercollegiate League Championship are again available.

The feature debate will be held with Victoria College of New Zealand in this city on December 11. The meet is to be sponsored by the British Empire Club of Providence, and will in all probability be a no-decision affair. On March 22 the team debates Vassar College in the first debate ever held between the two institutions in spite of the fact that Vassar has been a member of the League for the past year.

Future Opponents Score Victories

COLGATE IMPRESSIVE

Princeton, Dartmouth, Syracuse
and Yale Also Make Good
Showing Saturday.

All but one of the University's football team's future opponents scored victories in their games Saturday and even the loser looked strong in defeat. The opponents to come not only came out on the long end of the scores, but did so in comparatively easy fashion, Norwich alone being held to a low score.

Despite its defeat at the hands of Wisconsin, Colgate probably put on the best exhibition of football of any of the Bruins' future opponents. After leading for a good portion of the contest, Colgate fell a prey to the Wisconsin forward passing attack and succumbed by a 13-6 tally.

Yale showed its critics that it was through with playing conservative football and to drive the point home rolled up 89 points against the University of Vermont. Scouts at the encounter at least learned that the Elis know how to score touchdowns and that the backs know in which direction to run with the ball. Yale will be subject to its first test of the season Saturday when it faces Georgia in the South.

Amherst pulled a surprise by holding the Princeton eleven to a 7-0 score. A favorite to win

Immediately upon their arrival in New York City Friday, the band will go to the Horace Mann preparatory school at Fieldston, N. Y., where a concert consisting of University songs and other appropriate selections will be rendered. At the conclusion of the program the band will leave by bus for Newark, New Jersey.

Friday evening the band will give a concert and dance at the Westside High School in Newark. This concert is being held under the auspices of the Northern New Jersey Brown Club, and it is ex-

son in Touch Football.

Two games this afternoon will open the intramural touch football season. At Thayer Field at 4 p. m. teams representing Delta Phi and Phi Kappa Sigma will engage in one contest on one gridiron while on the adjoining field Beta Theta Pi and Zeta Psi will make battle.

Following these games there will be a schedule of over 80 contests in a cleverly planned round-robin tournament, leading to the finals and to points which will be of weighty importance in the selection of the winner of the Lampher Cup.

President Lowell of Harvard to
Speak at Inauguration of
Dr. Barbour.

COL. JUDAH PRESIDES

Former Ambassador to Cuba Will
Introduce President of
Yale at Dinner.

John D. Rockefeller, Jr., of New York, will speak for the University alumni at the gathering of graduates and former students of Brown to meet Dr. Clarence A. Barbour, the new President, to be held in Sayles Hall Wednesday evening, October 16, it was announced yesterday by Theodore Francis Green, chairman of the inauguration committee.

Mr. Rockefeller is a graduate in the class of 1897. His last public appearance at Brown was on Commencement Day, 1927, on which occasion, as presiding officer at the alumni exercises, he showed the wide difference that exists between the actual cost of educating a student and the tuition charge and declared that under present conditions the student "might properly be expected to pay for the benefits he receives." His statement became the subject of editorial and other comment throughout the United States.

Pres. Lowell to Speak

Announcement was also made by Mr. Green that President A. Lawrence Lowell of Harvard and President Livingston Farrand of Cornell would be the speakers for the visiting colleges at the exercises of inauguration at the First Baptist Meeting House, Friday, Oct. 18, at which Dr. Barbour will make the principal address. Mr. Green will preside and others on the program will be Chancellor Arnold B. Chace of the University, Rt. Rev. Bishop James DeWolf Perry of the Episcopal diocese of Rhode Island and Rev. Arthur W. Cleaves, pastor of the church.

Col. Judah Presiding Officer

At the inaugural dinner Friday evening Col. Noble B. Judah, former Ambassador to Cuba and a member of the University Board of Trustees, as presiding officer will introduce President James Rowland Angell of Yale, Dr. Alfred E. Stearns, headmaster of Phillips Andover Academy, Professor Theodore Collier, head of the Department of History at the University, Governor Norman S. Case of Rhode Island, and President Barbour.

President Angell's presence will recall the fact that his father, James Burrill Angell, for many years president of the University of Michigan, was a graduate of the University in the class of 1849, once assistant librarian and for eight years professor of modern languages and literature. President Angell, the younger, received an honorary degree from the University in 1923.

President Lowell of Harvard, as a speaker at the inauguration exercise proper, will carry on the tradition of having the head of the country's oldest college always present at the induction of

THE DINING ROOM AGAIN

The clatter of dishes and the long lines extending far across the Union reminds us daily that the dining room question is still an unsolved problem. We trust it will not be such when we return to the campus as an alumnus ten years hence.

Last year there was some agitation over the inappropriateness of the University Cafeteria being located in the Union, but it did little good. This season we have little hope of anything of a more progressive nature being accomplished, but we are decidedly in favor of more anti-propaganda. There can not be too much discussion of the matter that ranks first in importance for the betterment of the undergraduates' social surroundings.

For fear of being misunderstood, let us say that we have no fault to find with the management of the Cafeteria and Grill. As a matter of fact, we consider the control of the two dining halls to be in very efficient hands. In producing as high a grade of food and service as they do under such unfavorable circumstances, the directors of the dining room give ample proof that the management is in the proper hands. Our complaint has to do with the very idea of the Union having to house the two dining rooms. The size of the University may have made such doubling up expedient at one time, but certainly the same excuse can not be offered today. It is sometimes said that there is no money with which to work improvements. Well then, launch a drive to raise sufficient money to build a commons. Without some definite improvement in the dining room situation we see little hope for the eradication of one of the most pronounced faults in the University social scheme.

THE BASEBALL COACH

Announcement that John P. Kelleher has been signed to man-

age the University baseball squad for one year should appease those critics of the 1929 team who clamored for a change in the managerial reins. We wish the coach success in restoring to the University the diamond prestige it has boasted until but recent years.

Coach Kelleher will assume his new duties in the spring with but one year's coaching experience, but with a playing record extending over several years. Having played every position on a ball club but one, the new mentor is well adapted to developing a college team. In past years it has been particularly noticeable that the University nines have been woefully weak in some departments of the game while brilliant in others. Such deficiencies have been explained on the ground that the coaching department was not well versed in the various phases of the game. Such alibis can no longer be offered and we earnestly hope that the new coach will be successful in moulding a team needing excuses of no order.

CAMPUS COMMENT

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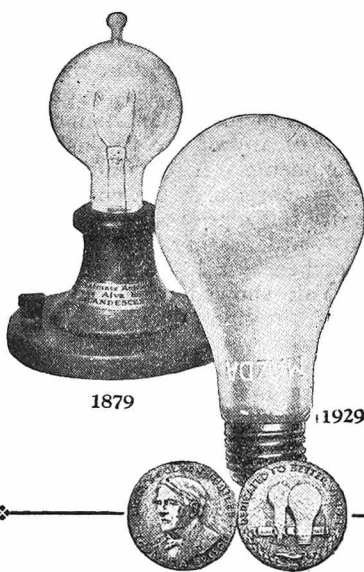

WHILE Yale and Princeton were battling to a tie at Hoboken, New Jersey, a small group of scientists, directed by Thomas A. Edison, was busy at Menlo Park, only a few miles away. On October 21, their work resulted in the first practical incandescent lamp.

Few realized what fifty years would mean to both electric lighting and football. The handful who watched Yale and Princeton then has grown to tens of thousands to-day. And the lamp that glowed for forty hours in Edison's little laboratory made possible to-day's billions of candle power of electric light. In honor of the pioneer achievement, and of lighting progress, the nation this year observes Light's Golden Jubilee.

Much of this progress in lighting has been the achievement of college-trained men employed by General Electric.

R. I. unleashed several lateral passes that advanced the ball to midfield where the home team had the ball when the game ended.

Briefs

Rhode Island continued to follow the precedent last year by scoring against the Big Brown team. Seems as though this was a break for McLaughry because the team snapped out of its listlessness and showed the fight of which they are capable.

The team appears to be no better than its mascot. Not until Bruno II was urged along by his trainer did he score his first touchdown on the home field.

The usual spiritless cheering was again evident with the Freshmen and the cheer leaders doing most of it. Not until we suddenly trailed the down-state team was there any signs of life shown by the remainder of the stands. The annual campaign for better cheers with better cheering should begin soon.

Hapgood took the position Fogarty was at last week, acting as linesman. Should he return to the squad ready for action against Princeton, part of that weak spot in the line may be plugged up.

Rhode Island is again using its short kicks. Will they ever be successful?

Rotelli made the first first down and also the first long run of 37 yards. A speedier back probably would have made a touchdown. As it was, the team was penalized twice and lost the ball on downs.

Three times during the first half, the team lacked the punch to put the ball across within 15 yards from the goal. Too much poor passing and not enough variety in attack seemed to be the reason.

When Rhode Island scored its touchdown it was the first time in the gridiron history of Brown-Rhode Island contests that Kingston team gained a lead over a University team.

Johnson is out to regain his first string end position which he lost last week. Blocking a kick

and recovering a fumble should help his cause. Gurll also demonstrated his superiority at quarterback in the way he handled the team and also by making some long runs off tackle.

The team was afforded lots of practice against the lateral pass attack. It was not until it had been used to good advantage four or five times, however, that the play was broken up.

In substituting for Fogarty, Mahood showed up well for an inexperienced collegiate back. The team won the game without Fogarty, but against such teams as Yale, Princeton and Dartmouth we need a passer and another punter besides Edwards.

Yale 89, Vermont 0 sounds bad, but Yale is too weeks away and was playing against a badly battered team. Princeton 7, Amherst 0 sounds better with the Princeton game next week.

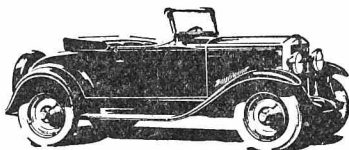
FUTURE OPPONENTS SCORE VICTORIES

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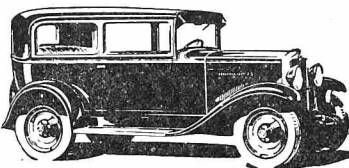
