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1933 BASKETBALL TEAM DEFEATS BRIDGEWATER NORMAL SCHOOL, 27-19

IS SECOND VICTORY

**Yearlings Display Poor Passing
Combination Except in
Second Quarter.**

Though outscored in three of the four periods of the game, the 1933 quintet turned in its second victory of the season, defeating the Bridgewater Normal School team by the score of 27-19 last night at the University Gymnasium. Displaying a poor brand of passwork throughout most of the contest, the yearlings developed a smooth working combination long enough in the second period to score a sufficient number of points to obtain a commanding lead which was never headed.

After holding the Bridgewater men to a lead of 5-4 in the initial period, the Freshman five ran up a total of 12 points in the second quarter to their opponents' 1, giving them a 16-6 advantage at the end of the half. Nikola, playing center, was high scorer with nine points for the 1933 team, while Welch, playing forward, led the visitors with seven.

The concert opened with an organ selection, "Rhapsodie on Breton Noels," Camille Saint-Saens. A series of carols followed: "Dost Thou Remember," an old French melody; "On Christmas Night," and "When Christ Was Born," old English folk-songs; "While By My Sheep," an old German air; "Come All Ye Shepherds," a Bohemian melody; "O'er Her Child," an old Breton carol; and "Infant So Gentle," an old German folk-song.

Professor Ware then played three organ solos: "The Christmas Pipes of County Clare," Harvey Gaul; "In Dulci Jubilo," J. S. Bach; and "Fantasie on Old Christmas Carols," William Faulkes.

The choir took up the program again with a second series of carols: "Lo, How a Rose," Praetorius; "The Holly and the Ivy," old French carol; "Come Dear Brother," Franconian folk-song; "Good Neighbors All," "Nos Calan," a Welsh carol; "The Virgin Stills the Crying," Garrit Smith, and "Silent Night," Franz Gruher.

The entertainment was concluded by an organ solo, "Christmas," Gaston Dethier, and the hymn "Adeste Fideles."

CHASE TO GIVE WOODS LECTURE JANUARY 10

**Distinguished Economist Will
Speak on Subject of Men
and Machines.**

Stuart Chase, the distinguished economist and writer, will give the second lecture of the Marshall Woods series in Sayles Hall on January 10, 1930. His subject will be "A Billian Wild Horses," a discussion of men and machines.

Mr. Chase is internationally known as an economist who has attacked boldly one of the outstanding problems of present-day life, that of the relationships of man with the machines he has created. He is not content with the loose generalizations of that school of philosophers which holds that man has been enslaved by his machines, neither does he join with the prosperity chorus that sees Utopia just around the corner. He makes a genuine attempt to balance the gains and losses of the Power Age.

"Men and Machines," his book on the subject, has drawn favorable comment from such newspapers and periodicals as the New York "Herald-Tribune," the New York "World," the "Atlantic Monthly," and the "Outlook."

Where are new jobs to be found for the workers that the machine has supplanted? Why is it harder for the man over 40 to hold his job? These are questions with which Mr. Chase seeks to deal intelligently.

DEBATING TEAM HOLDS TRIALS FOR NEXT TILT

**Princeton and Williams to be
First Intercollegiate
League Opponents.**

Preparations by the University debating team for the first of the intercollegiate triangular debates will continue tonight with a trial debate in Room L of the Union at 7:30. The opponents to be met are Princeton and Williams on the question: "Resolved, That the existing political alignment in the United States has outlived its period of usefulness." The debate will take place on January 17, the University affirmative team meeting Princeton here and the negative team going to Williams.

Last year, when the University won the Eastern championship, Princeton was the only opponent to gain a decision over it. Two of the men who debated last year are available again, H. O. Werner, Jr. 1930, and J. F. Aiso 1931. Another member of last year's squad, Daniel Jacobs 1931, is also contending for a position on the team.

Other candidates are R. P. Braeden 1931, D. R. Brown 1931, and several members of last year's Freshman team, J. B. Rae, who was on the team against New Zealand with Aiso and Werner, A. P. Cusick, R. E. Johnson and I. A. Beck.
