The annual banquet of the Brown chapter of Zeta Psi was held at the Narragansett Hotel, Thursday evening. Representatives from Colby and Tufts were present. J. A. Yale and Harvard have played seven games since 1883, when the present system of scoring was inaugurated. The scores have been as follows:

No games were played in 1885 and 1888, and it will thus be seen that Yale has won six times and Harvard once.

At a meeting of the class of '95, yesterday, the subject of Judges for the Sophomore prize declamation contest was discussed. A committee composed of Swift, Vaughan and Dunham was appointed to bring before the class a list of names from which two are to be chosen.

The well known architect of this city, Alpheus C. Morse, has contributed 101 specimens of South American woods, all named, labeled and cured, to the Botanical Museum. Professor Bailey said that there is only one other set in this country, that being the property of the United States government, and was in the Smithsonian Museum at Washington. When the government lost their list they sent to Mr. Morse for a duplicate list. Mr. Morse was the architect of the R. I. Hospital and Sayles Memorial Hall.

Princeton Glee Club.

The Princeton Glee Club has arranged a Western trip for the Christmas holidays.

This will be the first trip of the Princeton boys to the Western cities since 1888.

December 21, Louisville; 22, Indianapolis; 23, Chicago; 24, Milwaukee; 26, St. Paul; 27, Minneapolis; 29, Omaha; 30, Kansas City; 31, St. Louis; January 2, Columbus; 3, Pittsburg.

A place for the reception and convention of college men will be reserved on the World's Fair grounds. It will be under the auspices of Chicago University.

Wesleyan has received \$75,000 for a new gymnasium.

The Olio, the Amherst College annual, will appear before Christmas.

Yale college has had only twelve presidents since its foundation in 1701.

The College of the City of New York has organized a dramatic society.

A special train of sleepers will run from Chicago to the Yale-Harvard game.

The New York Sun, Tribune and Times have 111 college men on their staff.

Ex-President Garfield's son is president of the Republican Club at Williams.

Six men of the Yale Varsity were prepared at Andover and three at St. Paul's.

The Mask and Wig Club of the U. of P. have applied to the state for a charter.

Williams, Columbia and Dartmouth have dispensed with commencement exercises.

Steinitz, the champion of the world, will review the intercollegiate chess tournament.

William W. Astor has promised \$1,000,000 to found a negro university in Oklahoma.

An examination in gymnastics is one of the requirements for a degree at Johns Hopkins.

The Crescents have won the championship of the American Foot Ball Union for four years.

Owing to much dissatisfaction shown by the undergraduates at Princeton, the foot ball team has discontinued its practice in secret.

Foot Ball Notes.

The sum total of scores made by Yale, Harvard and Princeton up to the time of playing the big games last year were as follows: Yale 461, opponents 0; Harvard 522, opponents 14; Princeton 388, opponents 0. Up to date this fall the records show: Yale 447, opponents 0; Harvard 365, opponents 36; Princeton 345, opponents 6.

Harvard is said to feel much encouraged over the result of the Yale-U. of P. game.

One man in 5,000 in England takes a college course; one in 615 in Scotland; one in 213 in Germany; one in 2,000 in the United States.

Black of Princeton has been engaged to coach the Dartmouth team for the remainder of the year.

Wellesley students will hereafter have a Senior Day, which will take the place of class day of other colleges.

The Chandler Scientific School has been united with Dartmouth and henceforth will be one of the regular departments.

Fourteen students have been expelled from the Mississippi Agricultural and Mechanical College on the discovery by President Stephen D. Lee that they were members of a secret organization.

A Dartmouth press club was organized last week. The charter members consist of the editors of the college papers. Correspondents for leading papers will be elected later. The club has voted to hold a banquet in the winter.

The proprietor of one of the drug stores in Worcester, on complaint of Principal D. W. Abercrombie of Worcester Academy, has been fined \$100 and sentenced to three months in the house of correction for selling liquor to minors.

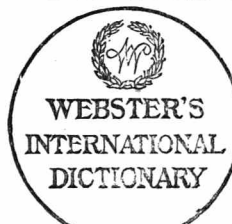
