BROWN, 22; NEWTON A. A. O.

McCarthy's Phenominal Run the Feature of the Game.

Saturday afternoon the 'Varsity foot ball team lined up for its first game of the season against the Newton Athletic Association team, and won easily by the score of 22—0.

For the first game the 'Varsity showed up in very fine form indeed, keeping the ball in the Newton territory during the entire game, except for a few minutes, when it was lost on a fumble, but immediately regained on a forced kick.

The game was spirited from start to finish, and the five hundred spectators were kept in such a state of excitement that they did not feel the cold. Several times during the game the umpire was obliged to give penalties for interference and off-side play, the Newton men interfering with Brown's centre very markedly during the greater part of the second half.

In the first half the Brown line held very strongly, but seemed to weaken toward the last, as several times a kick was stopped and a runner downed in his tracks.

The teams appeared on the field at about 3 o'clock, and were put through some light practicing, learning signals and passing and falling on the ball.

After considerable discussion it was finally agreed to play under Yale-Princeton rules.

At 3.30 sharp the two teams lined up against each other, with the home team in possession of the east goal. Brown also had the kick-off. The story of the game is as follows:

On the kick-off Sears received the kick and carried the ball back to the centre of the field, and after two attempts to break through Brown's line with no gain, Newton was forced to kick, and punted outside, Dennison falling on the ball. On the line-up again, fifteen yards in, McCarthy punted and put the ball on side, Matteson catching the punt. Newton, however, got it immediately on a fumble, but were unable to advance it the necessary five yards, and Brown again had the ball. Robinson

advanced it five yards, McCarthy went through the centre for four more. Thayer gained five yards, and Robinson repeated it. Newton braced up a little here and checked their advances for three downs, when Watson was sent around the end for a clear gain of ten yards. The ball was now within seven yards of the goal, and on the next play Thayer carried it across the line, making the first touch-down. Matteson kicked the goal. Score, 6—0. Time, 7m.

The next kick-off was caught by Capt. Nott, who advanced it thirty yards before being thrown. McCarthy again punted, the ball going outside the foul line. Newton had the ball fifteen yards inside and failed to gain five yards, the ball going to Brown on four downs.

At this stage of the game considerable fumbling was indulged in, Brown loosing first to Newton and Newton loosing to Brown, Nott falling on the ball. Watson made a slight gain and Thayer was again rushed for eight yards, followed by a gain of five yards by Robinson. Nott and Robinson gained through the tackle, when the ball was lost to Newton on a fumble, and Wales attempted to punt, but Nott broke through the line and stopped the kick and also the ball. Watson was pushed through the left tackle for a good gain, and Robinson was pushed over the line through the opposite tackle for the second touch-down. Matteson kicked the goal, making the score 12—0.

Newton kicks off. Watson caught the ball and passed it to McCarthy, who punted. Newton had the ball and Sears advanced it six yards for them around right end, when time was called, leaving the ball near the centre of the field. Score, 12—0.

After a few minutes intermission the teams again lined up against each other. Several changes were made in the line-up of the Newton team for the second half, and Casey and Colby took the places of Emory and Watson at tackle and half back, respectively, on the home team.

On the kick-off, McCarthy advanced the pig-skin seven yards, and afterwards punted down the field. Newton could not advance the ball and were obliged to kick, Dennison catching the punt and falling forward with it, nearly five yards after being tackled. McCarthy attempted to punt, but a Newton man broke

through the line and blocked the kick, Brown, however, retained the ball. After several good gains the signal was given for a criss-cross, and Robinson advanced the ball thirty-five yards on the play. Brown was given five yards for off-side. McCarthy was pushed through the line for seven yards and Colby followed it up with twelve more, after which Robinson made a run of eleven yards and scored the third touch-down. Matteson failed at the goal. Score, 16—0.

After the next kick-off the ball advanced very little in either direction and Wales punted, McCarthy catching the ball on the fifteen-yard line, and running almost the entire length of the field, made the last touch-down of the game. This was by far the most brilliant play of the day, and about the best exhibition of foot ball ever seen on Lincoln Field. Nearly every Brown man was in the interference, Nott and Robinson doing especially good blocking, and when McCarthy crossed the line every Brown man but one was ahead of all the Newton players going down the field. Matteson kicked the goal, making the score 22—0, which remained final. After the next kick-off the ball was advanced steadily to within twelve yards of the goal, when time was called.

This game showed that Brown would have a team this year equal if not superior to last year's and will be ready for her big games, which begin this week.

For the home team, Nott, Thayer, McCarthy, Robinson and Matteson played the best game, each showing his old-time foot ball style.

THE final decision of the committee for the selection of the Glee Club of '95-'96 was given out late Friday afternoon. The committee wish it understood that they have found it an exceedingly hard task to perform, in order that justice might be done to all; and only after a series of vocal trials and subsequent preliminary club rehearsals have they been able to decide on a combination which, in their judgment, represents the best talent of the candidates. Of the middle parts—i. e. the second tenors and baritones—is this difficulty especially true, for almost repeatedly have men, who at the first trials were very favorably considered by the committee, been finally replaced by others, who, either through timidity or some equally good cause, seemed to lack the requisite qualities. Again, while the committee have tried in their selection to follow the policy enlisted in the resolutions, recently adopted

by the club of '94-'95, the purport of which has already been made public in the HERALD, in one or two instances one of two or more candidates of undoubted equal ability has been given the preference because he could be used on more than one club. This new policy will, as proved by the committee of this year, be of inestimable value, at least, in the selection of the club, when competition is close, as it has been this year. The prospects for good clubs have never been brighter than they are at present, and it is almost an assured fact that great credit will be reflected this year upon the musical organizations and the University.

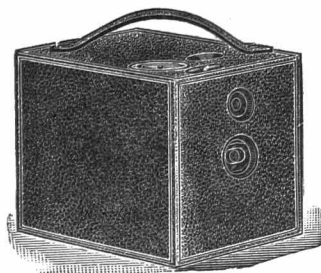
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The Senior Class held its first meeting of the year Saturday afternoon and discussed the preliminary business of the class.

A set of resolutions were presented in regard to the annual election of officers, reading as follows:

WHEREAS, It is for the interests of the class of '96 that the election of the senior officers be accomplished in a fair and democratic manner, be it

RESOLVED, That as honorable members of said class we, the undersigned, do hereby pledge our sacred honor to refrain from entering into combinations of any sort, and to carry out the election in a fair and unbiased manner; be it further

RESOLVED, That a committee of seven be appointed by the President to canvass each man of the class and

obtain his signature to these resolutions.

The subject was widely discussed and met with unanimous approval, and the resolutions were adopted.

The matters of the abolition of the Commencement orations and of Senior examinations were discussed and left in the hands of committees:
