Summary by States.

In the summary of students by states as given in the new Catalogue, Rhode Island shows the largest increase in number of students by a gain of 73 over last year. Massachusetts ranks second with a gain of 27, making a total increase from these two states of 100.

The names of the ten states sending the largest numbers of students with the number from each are as follows:

Seven hundred and thirty-four students, or 85 per cent. come from the New England States. More than half of all the students at the college are Rhode Islanders; and Rhode Island and Massachusetts together send nearly three-fourths of the whole number. However, other States are well represented. Students from twenty-three different States, against twenty-one last year, are at the college. Foreign countries send six against seven last year.

Honor System at Williams.

There was a meeting of Williams' students recently, at which the committee chosen to draw up a constitution for an honor system made its report. The committee presented a system patterned after those of Cornell and Princeton. The plan gives complete freedom to student in examinations, but requires every student to certify in writing that he has neither given nor received assistance. All charges of fraud would be referred to a committee of ten, four Seniors, three Juniors, two Sophomores and one Freshman—this committee to have sole decision in cases of reported fraud, and to recommend extent of punishment to faculty for final action.

A meeting of the Senior class was held Saturday, at 1.30 p. m., with President Gamwell in the chair. The President stated that the Liber Board had agreed to bear the expense of inserting cuts of the different college buildings if the Seniors would publish the pictures of the class. Annuals from several colleges where this plan is now in operation were exhibited. After some discussion a motion was made and unanimously carried to insert the pictures in the Liber, the whole matter to be left in the charge of a committee which the President should appoint later.

Yale's Literary Interests.

As a result of the course in Modern Novels, given at Yale by Dr. Phelps, a great interest in literature has been awakened. As a result of this interest two reading clubs have been formed in the Sophomore class, which promise to become very popular. They are called the "Rudyard Kipling Club" and the "Robert Louis Stevenson Club." Their object is to make a study of the works and lives not only of the men for whom they are called, but also of authors generally, and to further an interest in literature in general. This course in Modern Novels, has proven the most popular in the University, there being over two hundred and fifty men in the class.

If this is true, as pertaining to Harvard men it is true pertaining to all college men. But the question is this: Is Mr. Roosevelt's position the right one?

THE following editorial, from the Young Men's Era, on the social idea of education, will be read with interest: Prof. Graham Taylor, in his addresses at the opening of the winter classes of several associations, has emphasized the necessity of the social idea of education. There never was a time when men felt so much their responsibility for the welfare of their fellows as they do to-day. The new spirit of altruism, is in the air. Men are coming to see that whatever talents they may possess are held in trust for the good of those not so favorably situated as themselves. This is a great advance on old ideas and ideals, and this broader spirit is

making itself felt in the educational movements of the time fully as much as in any other direction. To seek an education for the sake of the increased power and influence it will give is a noble ambition. To desire education for the greater good one may do by it is nobler still. There are problems awaiting the educated young men of this country. In no other country in the world is there such a heterogeneous population as in these United States. We have a citizenship, especially in the larger cities, which is a strange amalgam of the good and bad of all nations on the face of the earth. Many of these people come to us without any knowledge of our language or sympathy with our institutions. These widely different and apparently antagonistic elements have to be assimilated and absorbed by the body politic. They must be taught the English language, they must be brought to understand American institutions and forms of government—in a word, they must be prepared for the duties of intelligent citizens. It is surprising to find how eager some of the European peoples are to learn what we have to teach them. The evening schools in our cities are largely attended by German and Scandinavian young men, bent upon acquiring as thorough a knowledge as possible of the English language. Among those not favored with many educational advantages in their younger days there is an increasing thirst for knowledge. Advantage should be taken of this by the men of better education who come in contact with them to encourage and direct these aspirations upward.

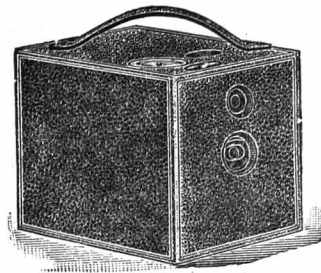
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THE BROWN DAY BOOK.

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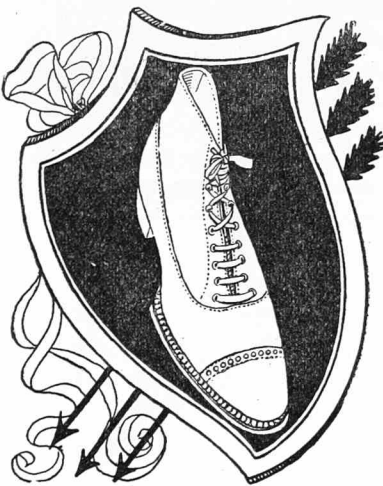
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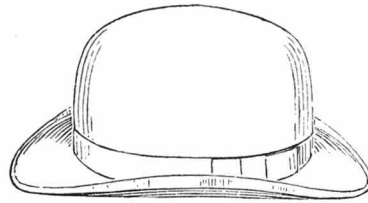
