"HOMERIC LIFE."

Excellent Lecture by Prof. Seymour Last Evening.

A good sized audience assembled in Sayles Hall last evening to hear the able address on "Homeric Life," by Prof. Thomas Seymour of Yale.

President Andrews presided, and in a few words introduced the speaker, whose lecture, briefly, was as follows: "The world of Homer was not wide, it embraced territory only from modern Asia Minor to the neighborhood of Italy or Spain. His world was surrounded by the sea or kingdoms of the god Neptune, and although small, it seemed like a great territory to the minds of Homer's time. How the sun got from west to east was then unknown. Time was divided into periods called days, and also months, but no names of distinction were given them. The gods of Homeric time were conceived as having human form, nature and passions, but as being far more powerful than men. They could be injured and suffer pain as men, but were more able to avenge their injuries. Zeus was the king of the gods, and in his halls the deities were wont to assemble, their homes being on Mt. Olympus. Hades was the name of a person rather than of a kingdom, as considered in later times, who was the keeper of the dead. Exhortations to the sea gods were made with the arms outstretched toward the sea, those to the gods of the lower world, by sitting on, and beating with the fists, the ground. The "Ten Commandments" were unknown to the Greeks. The Government in Homeric time was a monarchy. The king was known as the "Shepherd of his people," but although the Government had no definite restriction, he was expected to regard public opinion. Funerals were celebrated with boxing, wrestling, foot races and other games."

Prof. Harkness was then called upon to express his feelings concerning the lecture. This he did in a few well-chosen words, in concluding which he moved a vote of thanks to Prof. Seymour for his "able, learned and interesting lecture." The motion was carried unanimously.

Baseball.

Practice in the baseball cage is going on as usual, the squad having been cut down to about 20 men, including those of last year's team. The men are all doing excellent work, and most of them are showing up in fine form. There are several among the new men who are demonstrating the fact that they know how to play ball and will prove to be valuable additions to the team.

Casey, '99, is suffering from a broken finger. The injury was received Wednesday, while practicing in the cage. It will probably interfere with his work on the squad for several weeks.

If the weather continues to be pleasant Capt. Fultz will have his men out on Lincoln Field for practice this afternoon.

The full schedule of games has not been arranged as yet. As the management does not desire to have the schedule published in its incomplete form, the HERALD is not able to give it yet. However, there are to be about 28 games played, and 22 have thus far been arranged. As usual, there will be four games with Harvard, three with University of Pennsylvania, and three with Yale. The management has not been able to arrange a game with Princeton, but expects to with Cornell.

A lecture will be delivered on Monday evening, March 2, 1896, at 8 p. m., room No. 6, U. H., by Rev. F. B. Cunz, Instructor in German. Subject, "German Universities and German Student Life." The lecture will be delivered in German, and is principally intended for the students in the Germanic Department; but should other gentlemen desire it, a date may be fixed later on for its delivery in English. The '96 Liber.

At present there is every prospect that this year's Liber will surpass all previous editions of the annual publication. In the first place, provided the money is paid, the book will be ready for distribution on April 1st. The final matter went in some time ago, and the greater part of the proof has already been read. The caste proof is being received daily, and by the middle of March the book will go to the binders, thus assuring its completion on or before April 1st.

The editors of the Liber Board have worked very hard and earnestly to place the standard of this year's book above that of the last few years, and it is only fair that the college should show its appreciating of their conscientious labors by paying promptly all bills which are due for the several organizations.

The cover of the book will be made up of two cloths which are duplicates of those used on the cover of the Brown Song Book. The literary part will be five times as great as formerly, and in regard to the grinds, it may be interesting to many to know that this year the faculty will be spared.

The illustrations will form one of the most attractive features of the publication. All the line drawings which have for some time been used for the different clubs and organizations will, this year, be replaced by new drawings. This has caused considerable extra expense, but the Board did not feel that the old ones were distinct enough. The photographs of the Senior class will cover five pages, and besides the usual pictures of all the different college organizations, their will be full-sized photographs of "Jumbo," the college caterer; Charles P. Nott, captain of last year's football team, and of the eight '96 members of the football team. Besides these the following buildings will also be represented: Slater, Manning, University, Hope, Wilson, Rhode Island, Sayles, Ladd Observatory, Library, Gymnasium, the President's house and the Chemical Laboratory.

As the number of the books which have been ordered is limited, all non-fraternity men who desire copies are strongly urged and advised to hand their orders to the business manager as soon as possible.

Honor System at Williams.

The students of Williams College recently voted to adopt the honor system in examinations. The system is nearly the same as that which was presented at a mass meeting at that college last fall.

There was but little opposition to the proposed system, and it was carried by a vote of over two-thirds of the student body. Following are some of the features of the system as adopted: The usual pledge must be signed to examination papers. During examination each student will have perfect freedom of action, and proctors will be dispensed with. All cases of fraud will be dealt with by a committee consisting of ten members, chosen at special class election. The members of this committee will consist of four seniors, three juniors, two sophomores and one freshman. The person charged with cheating has the choice of a private or public trial. It is optional with the student whether or not he report any attempt to cheat which he may see.

The Suspended Juniors.

President Andrews has made his response to the Junior Class Committee relative to the petition passed by the class concerning the suspension of the seven members, asking for a mitigation of the punishment.

The text of the answer will not be made public until the Juniors meet, probably Monday. It is understood, however, that Dr. Andrews expresses himself as willing to consider the cases of the suspended men, provided they express a wish to return to the University, and are willing to sign a pledge to refrain from all dishonest work.

Dr. Anderson Addresses the Freshman Prayer Meeting.

The usual weekly prayer meeting of the Freshman class was held yesterday afternoon in 24 U. H. Dr. Anderson, of the Central Baptist Church of Providence, addressed the students. The room was well filled, and an extremely interesting and helpful talk was enjoyed by those present.

Dr. Anderson spoke of the tendencies of college students concerning religious matters. He exhorted them to put themselves in such positions that they would have some regular Christian work to do. He said that all should use their influence for Christ, and get into touch with the outside world. President Andrews will speak to the class next Friday.

IN the widespread discussion as to the advisability of shortening a college course to three years, numerous argu-

ments have been brought up on both sides, but one of the best thoughts in this connection is advanced in a recent issue of the Philadelphia Press, where the idea is expressed that men should obtain their college education two years earlier. This is not to be accomplished, however, by taking a year from the collegiate course, but by taking advantage of the time given to early study and improving it. It is acknowledged that the year's spent on elementary education are wasted to a great extent. Herein lies the remedy which would insure an early graduation from college and a consequent early start in life's work. By a careful oversight of early education, and a realization of the importance of a thorough education in youth, much time can be saved to the great advantage of every student.

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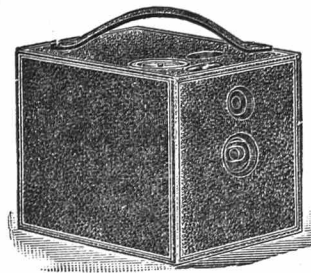
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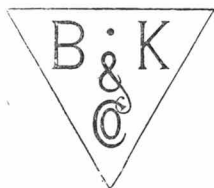
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THE BROWN DAY BOOK.

Arrangements have been made for a joint concert of the Musical Clubs of Tufts and Brown. The concert will probably be at Boston, March 14.

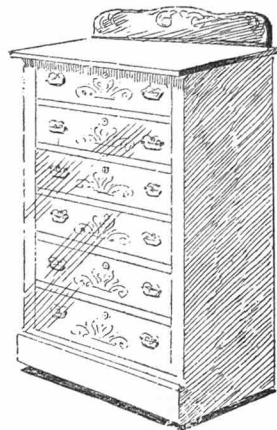
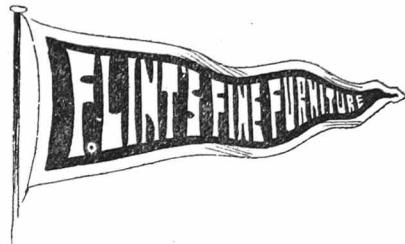
Manager Call of the Athletic team went to New York last evening to attend the annual meeting of the Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Eighteen colleges have entered the University of Pennsylvania relay race meet.



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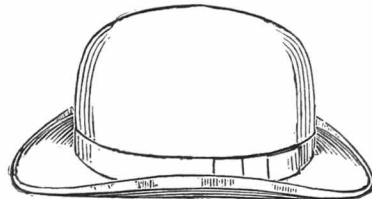
