ATHLETIC EXHIBITION.

BROWN WON FROM M. I. T.

Ninety-eight Carried Off the Other Prizes.

It was all one grand success and eclipses any of the efforts of former years. Ninety eight covered herself with glory and is to be congratulated. All the participants did finely, and the whole affair went along so smoothly and with such vim that everybody voted it the greatest meet in the history of Brown.

It takes more than a blizzard to keep Providence people away from one of the annual athletic exhibitions of Brown University. Nearly every seat was sold, and everyone who had bought one was there to occupy it. Infantry Hall was a scene of animation at 8 o'clock when the Symphony Orchestra struck up "The Carmen March." The great hall was decorated with Brown flags and banners. In the rear of the stage was a raised gallery, where was the start for the team races. The central part of the main floor was reserved for the squad drills and the other exercises.

The Symphony added very much to the enjoyment of the evening. It rendered four selections, and played during the races.

The ushers were Messrs. Gamwell, Whipple, Edwards, Mabie, Robinson, Denison, Barrows, Moore, Gaskill and George.

The great relay race between Brown and M. I. T. was the last event of the evening, but first in interest. Tech. men were cheered as well as Brown before the start. O'Brien and Grovenor began the battle, the former leading slightly in a close race. Gunn gained a dozen feet, when E. T. Hull took the lead, outgeneraling a speedy Tech. man who tried to pass him at the corners. His brother did even better than "Eddie," and finished easily, with ten yards to spare, amid the greatest shouting and cheering Infantry Hall has ever heard.

Next to the great race between Brown and Technology, the class relay teams were the most exciting events on the program. As was feared by many, the raised platforms in the four corners caused a bad accident, when Kent, '99, fell headlong while running a plucky race.

The first of the class team races was

between '96 and '98, which was exciting and well run, though '98 had rather an easy thing of it. The two captains, Fuller, '98, and McComber, led off at a rattling pace. At the end of the third lap, Fuller was slightly in the lead. Gammons, '98, held the lead well. Fultz, '98, the third relay, ran a beautiful race, keeping up a steady, even gait to the end of his race. Taft maintained the lead, and brought in '98 an easy winner. The time was 2m. 26 2-5s.

The second class race was between '97 and '98. Capt. Stockwell, '99, was unable to run because of a sprained knee. At the crack of the pistol, Capt. Shead, '97, and Kent led off. On the second lap, Kent fell, and Shead was half a lap ahead before the '99 man was under way again. Sutcliffe lost ground against Miller, but Hull and Howe, by splendid running made up much of the big gap between the runners. But for the accident, the race would have been close and very exciting.

The special work of fencing and single sticks won applause. The latter was very popular with the audience, who applauded greatly as the heavy blows rained over the opponents' heads and shoulders.

In the exhibition on the parallel bars some pretty work was done, Marvel, Bullard, Hunter and Keough carrying off the honors.

The dumb bell drill by '98 was executed with precision and great care, while the Freshmen received great applause for their pretty work with the Indian clubs. The Seniors' fencing drill was popular with the audience, as was '97 in their exercise with single sticks.

The Silent Manual drill, in which 17 Freshmen participated, showed considerable training and practice.

In the tumbling, Lancey and Bullard were the favorites. They did some difficult feats and were roundly applauded.

The wrestling was a source of much amusement to all. Phinney and Nott won in their bouts, while the match between Pevear and Jones resulted in a draw.

The relay race between the Friends School and the Providence High was won by the former. Time—2m. 37 2-5s.

The winners of the preliminary heats between '98 and '97 caused almost as much cheering as the M. I. T.-Brown race, which followed. Gammons, '98,

Slight Blaze in Maxcy.

The new fire alarm box, No. 319, in University Hall, was used for the first time at 6.40 Wednesday evening. The alarm was rung in by one of the college workmen, who had discovered a fire in Maxey Hall. A few minutes later Hose No. 6 crossed the campus, entering the gate from George street. The fire was on the west side of Maxcy Hall, and on the second floor. The door to the building being locked, entrance was effected through the window of one of the recitation rooms. The first and second floors were full of smoke, which came from room 205, occupied by Totten and Rhodes. The latter had not returned from supper and the room had to be broken into. The fire was found to be in the closet. The wind had blown a curtain over a lighted gas jet, and it had ignited with some clothes in the closet. Hall, '99, gained entrance to the room before the firemen arrived, and with the assistance of other students and the foreman, the blaze was extinguished. Great credit is due to the department for their prompt work, for had the fire gained much headway the gale which was blowing would have caused a bad blaze. No water from the hydrant on the campus was used, only the chemicals being required, and beyond the breaking of a door and window, and the wrecking of a closet, no great damage was done.

An effort will be made to have a short trip, and the assistant manager is now busy making final arrangements.

THE last meeting of the Philosophical Club was notable for the fact that the ablest and most exhaustive paper which has thus far been read before the club was then delivered. Reference is made to the effort of Mr. Tower, which was in criticism of some articles by Prof. Royce. The thoroughness, comprehensiveness, and closeness of metaphysical thought by which this paper was characterized were remarkable. The distinguished author of the matter under discussion was himself present, and it is pleasant to note that in his public remarks he passed very commendatory judgment on the criticism to which he had listened. It has come to our knowledge that in private conversation he made the statement that Mr. Tower's was the ablest criticism of "Self-consciousness, Social Consciousness, and Nature" which he had either read or heard, and that he advised its publication, after which, if he finds himself in sufficient disagreement with it, he promises to give it an adequate reply. This is a gratifying compliment to Mr. Tower and to the Philosophical Club. It is also pleasing to know that Prof. Royce felt himself in good measure repaid for taking the time and trouble to attend the last meeting of the club.

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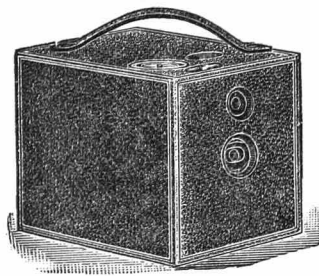
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THE BROWN DAY BOOK.

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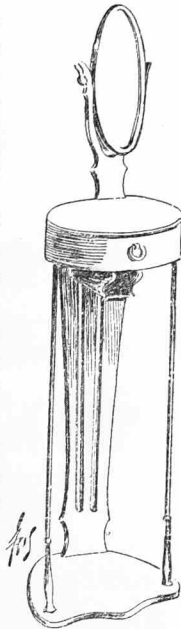
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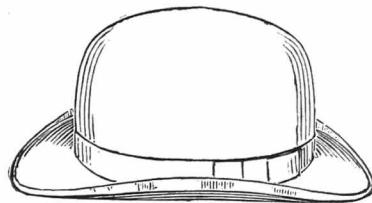
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THE COLLEGE WORLD.
