Brown Wins Her First College Game.

Brown won the first game of the series with Holy Cross, yesterday afternoon, at Worcester, by bunching her hits, aided by errors of Holy Cross at critical times.

For Holy Cross, Sockalexis did by far the best work, both in the field and at the bat. He made two beautiful catches of hard drives in deep centre field, and out of five times at bat cracked out three pretty doubles.

Moroney did excellent work in the box, with the exception of the seventh inning, and also did effective stick work.

For Brown, Robinson put up a fine game in the field, with three put outs and two beautiful throws to his credit. In the ninth inning, after a well-placed three-base hit, he scored the winning run on a single by Lauder.

Rodman played a star game at first, accepting fourteen chances without an error. Summersgill led at the bat by finding Moroney for three clean singles.

Brown was the first to score. Phillips got his base on balls, went to second on a sacrifice by Fultz, and scored on Robinson's hit.

In the second inning Holy Cross tied the score. Powers led off with a hit, went to second on McTigue's sacrifice, stole third, and crossed the plate on a passed ball.

There was no more scoring until the seventh inning, when Holy Cross, by bunching five hits, netted five runs. N. J. Fox got his base on balls and took second on Lavin's single. Curley got to first on an error by Phillips, letting Fox and Lavin score, and Curley took second on the play. Maroney lined out a single and brought in Curley. Sockalexis followed with a double, scoring Maroney, and scored himself on Lang's error.

In Brown's half of the inning four more runs were added to her score. Lang got his base on balls and went to second on Summersgill's single. Phillips was presented with first, filling the bases. Fultz came to the bat and brought in Lang and Summersgill by a pretty double, sending Phillips to third. "Robby" flied out to centre and Phillips scored. Lauder followed with a hit, Fultz crossing the plate.

In the eighth, Rodman reached first safely, went to third on the short stop's error and scored on Summersgill's hit. Score 6 to 6.

Holy Cross failed to score in their half of the ninth. Robinson was first

at bat for Brown, and cracked out a beautiful three-bagger. Lauder stepped up to the bat with a determination to win out the game. He waited for a good ball, and when it came met it squarely and put it out of the reach of the Holy Cross fielders, and the game was won for Brown.

A Setback for Harvard Athletics.

The Harvard Corporation has announced that all the grand-stands on Holmes Field must be removed by July 1st. It means to drive athletics to Soldiers Field as soon as possible.

The students think that this decision is merely a scheme to crush out the athletic spirit, for it will be impossible to get suitable grounds for baseball and track athletics on Soldiers Field for some games. If games are held on Holmes Field without any grand-stands the attendance will necessarily be small as well as the receipts. The result will be that the training table will be discontinued, and that base ball will receive a serious setback.

The Crimson H.

The Harvard Athletic Committee has decided to restrict the granting of the privilege of wearing the "H" to members of the various athletic teams. There is a feeling that the "H" has been worn too generally by the students and that consequently the honor of wearing it has been lessened. There has also been suggested a plan of dis-

SPRING MEET.

Class Championship Games to be Held April 29.

The date for the spring meet of the Athletic Association has been set for April 29th. At that time the class championship in track athletics will be decided; the class winning the most points securing the championship banner for one year. This banner has to be one two successive years by the same class before it becomes their property. Last year the class of '97 provee victors in the spring meet, and if it wins this year the banner will belong to the Juniors for good.

The events will be the same as at the Intercollegiate meet which is to be held in Worcester, May 23d, with the exception that there will be no bicycle race at the Brown meet. The list of events will be as follows:

100 yards dash, 200 yards dash, 440 yards run, half-mile run, one-mile run, two-mile run, 120 yards high hurdle race, 220 yards low hurdle race, one-mile walk, running high jump, running high jump, running broad jump, pole vault, putting 16-pound shot and throwing the hammer. In each event first place will count five points, second place three and third place one.

There will be no class relay races at this meet, as the entire purpose of the games is to give the men practice for the meet at Worcester, and to find out the relative abilities of the candidates in the different events.

It will be an inspiration to the members of the team to know that it has been decided to send a team to the Harvard Handicap games, which are to be held on Holmes Field, at Cambridge, May 9th.

Intercollegiate Athletic Association Games.

At the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America, which was held in New York, recently, it was voted to hold the annual spring field day May 30th. The place for holding this meet has not yet been decided upon, but was left to a sub-committee to settle.

The bicycle races in connection with this meet will be held the Wednesday before, on the Manhattan Beach track. Harry Cornish, of the New Manhattan Club of New York, was appointed manager of these games, and all the minor arrangements will be left to him.

at these games if the members of the team show good enough form to warrant sending them. A. D. Call, of Brown, attended this meeting as Secretary of the association.

Important to Race Meet Promoters.

Race meet promoters and managers of school and college track teams will please note the following:

Every year, about this time, the various colleges and schools begin to develop racing men to represent them at the intercollegiate and interscholastic outdoor games. It is customary to run off one or more trials to pick out a team. Racing throughout the United States is governed by the L. A. W. and the L. A. W. requires that every track race be sanctioned. A man competing in an unsanctioned event is liable to suspension.

Now, your men in particular may not care whether they are suspended or not, but they are sure to find somebody at the final meet from some other college who DOES care and will not allow them to ride, if under suspension. The trouble occurs every year, when, by a little caution, it can be prevented.

Remember that every race on a track, be it one event or more, must be sanctioned. If you are to have any trials send for sanction every time. For open races a fee is charged; but no fee is required for closed club or school events; but in all cases send for sanction and save your men from suspension, which in one or more cases last year affected the standing of the school in points won at the championship meeting.

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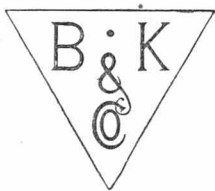
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THE BROWN DAY BOOK.
