Sophomores 18, P. H. S. 13.

The Sophomore and Providence High School teams played a very close game of baseball yesterday afternoon, at Adelaide Park, and the former won by a score of 18 to 13. There were very few brilliant plays made during the entire game, both teams showing a great lack of practice. However, considering that it was the first game of the season for both teams, and that the weather was a trifle cold for good ball playing, yesterday's game was not a bad one.

The best work for Brown was done by Talcott and Barrows; for Providence, Forbes and Paine played well. One double play was made by '98, in which Graves, Barrows and Hunter took part.

The game: In the first inning Brown scored three runs on two hits, a stolen base and two men hit by pitched balls. In the same inning the High School also scored; three errors, a base on balls, a wild pitch and a passed ball resulted in four runs. Score—'98 3, P. H. S., 4.

In the second inning Brown made three runs, while their opponents failed to score. Brown's runs were made on four hits, two bases on balls and a passed ball, making the score 6 to 4.

In the third inning Brown did not score, but Providence added two to their number, tying the score.

The fourth inning resulted in three runs for the college men, but none for their opponents.

In the next inning both sides scored. Brown made four runs on four hits and an error; Providence scored five runs.

In the last inning '98 increased her lead. Brown made five runs on three hits, two errors and a stolen base, while the High School scored two runs on two bases on balls and a hit.

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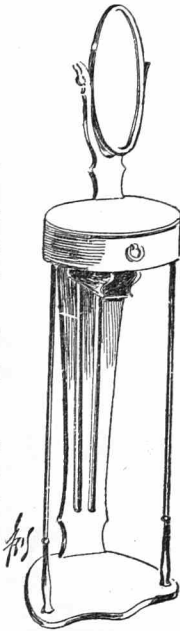
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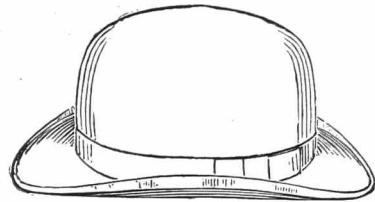
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THE COLLEGE WORLD.

Cambridge won the annual games with Oxford.

Carter, Yale, '94, will pitch for the Columbia Law School nine this season.

One-fourth the whole number of students at the University of Berlin are Americans.

The Harvard - Columbia - Cornell - Pennsylvania Freshman regatta will be rowed on June 24, two days previous to the university race.

The students of the Law Department at Pennsylvania have begun the publication of a paper called the American Law Register and Review.

Yale has bought the College Street Church in New Haven. The property will be used for the musical department and will probably be remodelled.

Athletics at Yale are said to have

cost \$54,000 last year. Of this amount \$10,000 was given by undergraduates, the remainder being derived from football and baseball games.

The regents of the University of California have adopted plans for the buildings of the newly affiliated colleges in San Francisco. There will be five separate departments—Law, Medicine, Dentistry, Pharmacy and the Veterinary College. The total cost will be \$250,000, and the University is expected to develop immensely under the new auspices.

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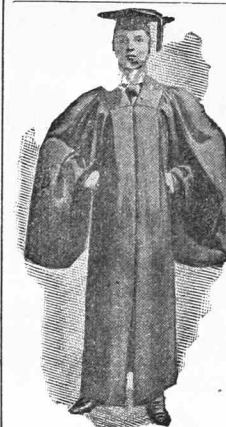
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
