YALE AGAIN.

Brown Wins Second Game and Series from the Blue.

The Sons of Eli Barely Escaped a Whitewash on Lincoln Field.

Brown again distinguished herself by adding one more victory to her unbroken list of successes, and taking the second straight game from the Blue. Brown had great reason for celebrating, Saturday night, for this is the first series she has won from Yale in three years.

It was as fine a game as one would wish to see, barring one accident. Keator got entangled in the batting cage in an attempt to capture Robinson's long fly to right, which resulted in a home run. Though Brown made four errors, none of them were costly. They were always followed up by sharp playing, so that Yale was unable to take advantage of them. Yale's two errors were at a critical point, though not losing the game allowed, Brown to score one run.

Brady pitched a great game. Nothing but circles went up on Yale's score for seven innings, for they couldn't hit the ball. But two straight hits was all they could get off Brady, and two bases on balls. It looked as though they would have a goose egg to take home with them. But Yale determination to win never gives out until the last man is out in the ninth inning. Captain Quimby would do all he could to save his team from a whitewash. He stepped to the plate and lined out a two-bagger. This inspired his men and a batting streak followed. Greenway got another two-bagger, and Quimby scored. Letton duplicated Greenway's double, but the next man flied out, so that Yale could do no more scoring in that inning. In the last inning Bartlett flied out to Lauder. Trudeau struck out; DeSaulles got to first on a hit, but was forced out at second, and the game was won for Brown.

Brown started off with a rush and won the game in the first inning. Phillips pushed out the first ball pitched for

a two bagger. Fultz flied out to Greenway. Then Robinson stepped to the plate, amidst deafening cheers, and landed the ball out in the right for a home run. Lauder followed with another pretty double over the left field fence. Such merciless hammering unstrung Trudeau's nerves so that he lost control. The next two batters were hit by pitched balls, forcing Lauder to third and filling the bases. All that was wanted now was a hit to give Brown a good lead. This Dunne supplied, bringing in Lauder and Sedgewick. In the next inning Phillips opened up on Trudeau the same as he did in the first inning, lining out another two bagger. Robinson found Trudeau for another hit, and Phillips scored. Score, 5 to 0. Brown did not score again until the sixth inning, when Rodman, after getting his base on balls, reached home on two bad errors. Brown now had the game well in hand and did not need to score again.

Rhode Island Gymnastic League in Session.

A meeting of the Rhode Island Gymnastic League was held at No. 1 Sayles Hall, Saturday afternoon. The exercises consisted of the reading of papers on the different phases of physical culture and a discussion of military drill in the public schools.

President Tarbell of the league called the meeting to order a few minutes after 2 o'clock, and introduced as the first speaker, Mr. William L. Coop, who read "A Brief History of Physical Training." Mr. Coop stated that the first historical trace of physical training was found among the Chinese, long before the Christian era. He then traced its development through the Greeks and Romans, and later in the new movement among the Swedes, the Germans, and here in America.

Miss Ellen Le Garde next discussed "What Constitutes an Ideal Teacher of Gymnastics," and her paper was discussed by Miss Edith L. Hill.

Fred E. Parker, director of the Lyman Gymnasium, was the next speaker, on "A Systematic Physical Training." He urged the need of culture of the body as well as of the mind. He spoke of the difficulties that beset physical culture in colleges, paying special attention to the fact that it was liable to become a drudgery, and to conflicts of time. The great need, he said, was systematic training from the primary schools up. He ended with a sketch of the methods in use at Brown; of the class work, and of the training of the various teams.

Dr. D. A. Sargent, of Harvard, next spoke of "Military Drill." He treated the subject in opposition to its introduction into the public schools. He was followed by Frank A. Cook, who spoke in favor of military drill. Hon. T. W. Bicknell and other speakers continued the discussion.

Celebrated with Cannons.

As soon as the great game was finished the pent-up enthusiasm of the students was let forth in good earnest. Headed by the Brass Band, they marched around the field and then to the front campus, where the cannon were stationed. After a few lively cheers, Captain Murray jumped upon one of the guns and cried: "With your

help I am going to make a noise." Mayor McGuinness kindly brought four horses up the hill to drag the heavy cannon, and also gave the boys permission to take the guns down to the Cove to fire them off as long as they cared to.

The procession of nearly 400 students started on the front campus, headed by the guns and a huge standard, bearing this inscription: "Brown, 6; Yale, 1! Rah, Rah, Brown, Brown, Brown." Down Waterman street the long line hopped and skipped to Market Square, and thence by the Railroad Station to the bridge by the Cove. The artillerymen stationed the guns the other side of this bridge, and soon the salutes to Brown and her noble team went off in quick succession amid the cheers of the college boys near by. Gradually the firing ceased and the procession moved back to the college grounds to wait for the evening celebration.

Brown Night at the Opera.

Of course, the centre of enthusiasm in the evening was the Opera House, where an immense crowd greeted the last presentation of "Florida Water." A large number of students were in the upper gallery, and before the curtain rose amused the audience by cheering Brown, Captain Fultz and every member of his victorious team. The members of the nine sat in the lower box, and their appearance was a signal for renewed cheers and applause. The presentation of the play was by far the best of the week, and numerous songs and jokes appropriate to the victory kept the audience in a continued state of excitement.

After the second act, Corliss, ex-'95, who wrote the music for the play, and the authors, Whiting, '98, Arnold, '98, and Slade, '98, were called before the curtain and each made a short speech. Then Crosby, '95, who took the part of Ponce de Leon, presented Mr. Gilbert, who has coached the chorus, with a beautiful silver loving cup on behalf of the members of the troupe, and the trainer responded in good taste. Parker, '96, presented a beautiful bunch of roses to Capt. Fultz, and an immense bunch, tied with Brown ribbons, to the team as a whole. This was greeted with renewed cheering, and it was nearly five minutes before the players could proceed. When the curtain fell for the last time Brown cheers were heard from all quarters of the house, and with a few more outside, the celebration of Brown's winning the series from Yale was over and the close of "Florida Water's" successful run.

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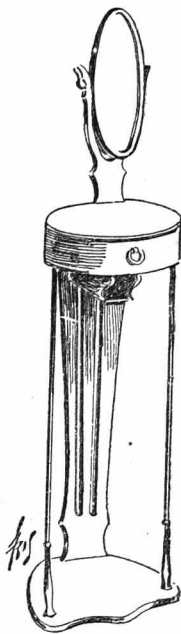
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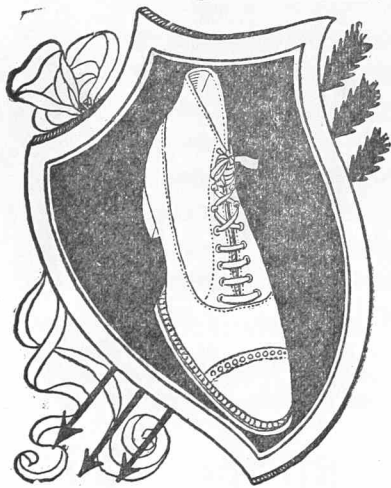
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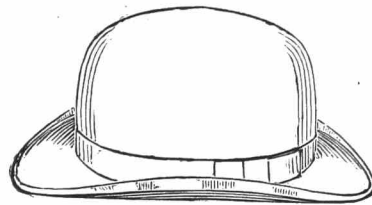
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College Slang.
