'VARSITY AT MEDFORD.

Brown Five Play Return Game with Tufts To-night.-Close Contest Expected.

The 'Varsity basketball team will play its return game with Tufts this evening in the Goddard Gymnasium at Medford. Nine men, including Manager Muir, will be taken on the trip: Captain McKay, McLyman, Scholze, Adams, Snell, Sullivan, Von der Leith, and Winslow. The team will leave for Boston at 4:07, and will take dinner at the Essex Hotel. The team will probably make the return trip on the 11:25 from Boston.

The game to-night promises to be as hard-fought as the game last Wednesday night in the Lyman Gymnasium. The 'Varsity has excellent chances of winning to-night, though the score should be close. Since last week's game, Brown has been defeated by Williams, and the Tufts team has also been defeated in the meantime by the Wesleyan five by a score of 42 to 9.

The Brown team has been practicing steadily since the Williams game, and should be in good trim to-night.

Prof. Randall Tells '12 Men of the Place of Engineering in College Course.

At the first Junior smoker of the year, held in the Union Smoking Room last night, Prof. Randall spoke on "The Engineering and the Academic Man." A large number of men were present, and the interesting talk and the following social time made the smoker a distinct success.

Prof. Randall traced the development of engineering as a study, and mentioned the fact that those pursuing this work had been looked down upon by those studying the classics. The demand for skilled men for engineering work became so great that technical schools were established. The standards of admission to engineering schools have been lower than those for academic schools, but the requirements are gradually becoming the same. The tendency is appearing for the engineering student to take a general course first and later to specialize in engineering subjects.

Conservation Commission.

At a recent meeting of the State Conservation Commission. held in the rooms of the Department of Geology in Sayles Hall, Professor Charles W. Brown, who is superintendent of the Nat-Island, made a report of progress Providence and Kent Counties. These maps, on a scale of five inches to the mile, show by colors almost at a glance the character of the utilization of all the land and its possibilities for practical use. Professor Brown states that these are the first land classification maps issued by any state. Besides the bulletin which, as a study in Economic Geography will contain the results of this classification of the land resources of the state, another bulletin will show the water resources. A third will be on the game birds of the state. This is being prepared mainly by I. R. Sheldon '10, and will deal to a large extent with the shore






