

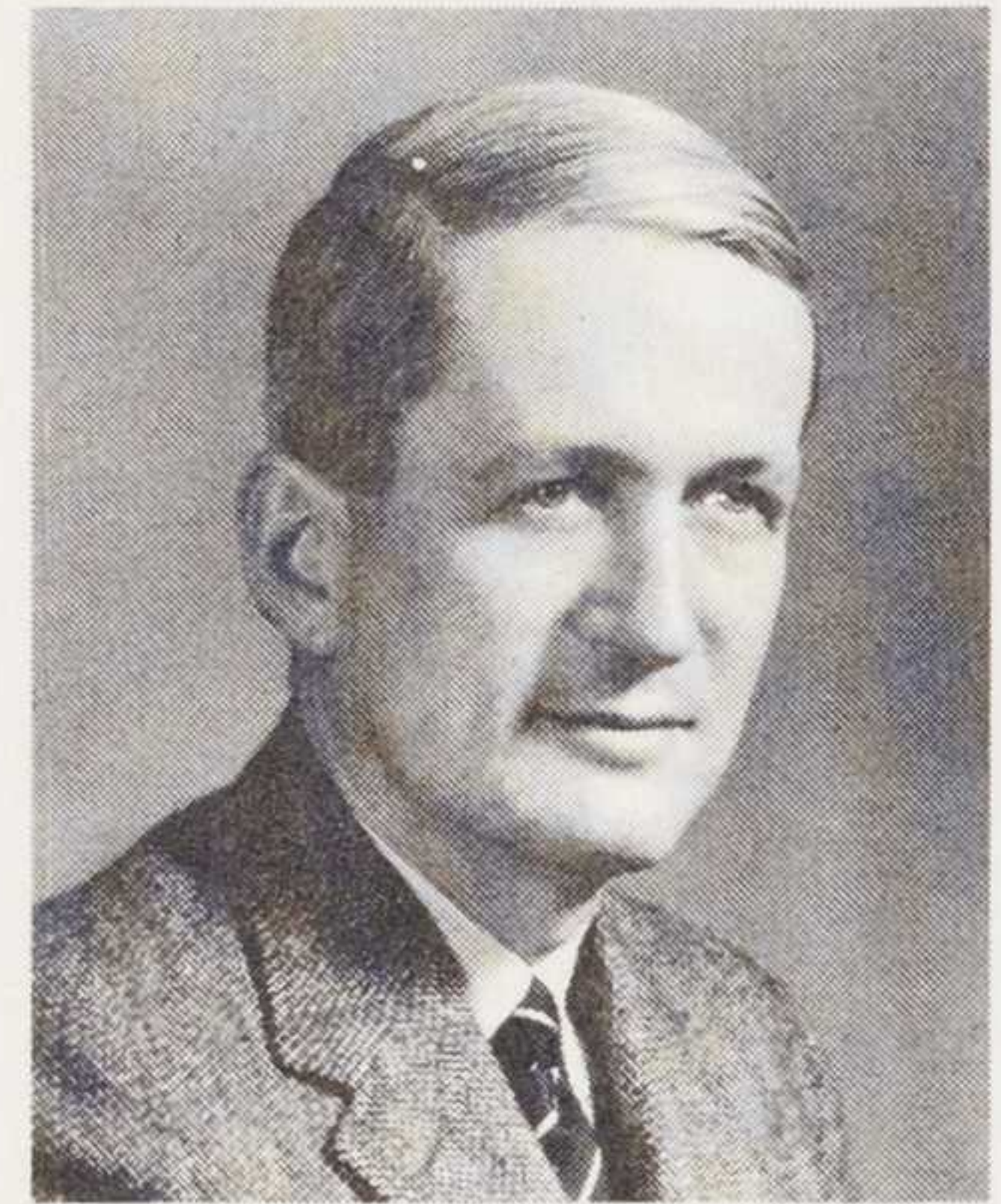

Theologians, Physicist Will Lecture in April

In addition to the outstanding speakers scheduled for campus appearances during the April 9-10 foreign affairs conference (see special insert, pages 3-4), three leaders in the fields of science and religion will address the student body in convocations and chapel later in the month. Dr. Ramsey

The Reverend Howard Schomer, president of the Chicago Theological Seminary, who will give the Good Friday Chapel talk; The Reverend Malcolm R. Sutherland, president of Meadville Theological School of Lombard College, April 21; and Visiting Scientist Norman F. Ramsey, Professor of Physics, Harvard University, April 28-29.

Dr. Schomer has served churches in this country and abroad. The American Congregational Christian churches sent him to Europe in 1946 to co-ordinate their relief and reconstruction activities in Western Europe, and to teach in the war-born International Christian College Cevenol of Le Chambon-Sur Lignon, France. The next nine years he devoted to the teaching of history

Spanish Students Register For Summer, Fall Study In Valencia and Madrid

The highly successful trial "Hispanic Studies in Spain, 1964," has received faculty endorsement and will be continued during 1965. It will be known as "The Fall Term in Madrid Program," established as a branch of the Spanish division of the Department of Foreign Languages. LFC students may also register for the summer session at the University of Valencia in conjunction with the University of San Francisco's Summer Session Abroad Program.

During 1964, 18 LFC students attended the summer session, while 22 participated in the University of Madrid program.

Spanish studies director, George L. Speros, commented that students in his 1964 group have shown remarkable advancement in proficiency, reflected in superior grades during the past winter term on campus. "They are fluent and prepared now to go into any field of endeavor of Spanish literature and morphology."

During over seven years of study at the graduate level at the University of Madrid and Middlebury Summer Sessions, Speros made contacts with the best minds in Spain and was able to engage a highly selective faculty for the new LFC study abroad program. As an example of the high caliber

Folk Singer Alumnus Win Stracke Returns For April 23 Program

One of Chicagoland's best known folk singers and guitarists, Win Stracke '31, will return to the campus on Friday evening, April 23, to present a public folk concert in support of the LFC tutorial program.

Stracke, a regular performer on the television shows *Stud's Place* and *Hawkins Falls* for many years, has headed the Old Town School of Folk Music in Chicago since 1957.

The Lake Forest College tutorial program will devote the spring term to a series of field trips and entertaining educational events. Student tutors will take their young friends from the Waukegan schools, and from Firman, Benton and Booth settlement houses in Chicago, on trips to places like the Museum of Natural History (see picture at left), the Museum of Science and Industry and the Children's Museum of the Art Institute. These have proved to be of great interest to the children during the past year's trial trips.

Plans include bringing the young tutees to the campus for various events which might be of interest to them, such as Forester Day in May, which was such a hit with those who were invited last year.

The change in procedure from regular tutoring sessions was necessitated because of the prospect of a six-weeks' lull in tutoring between the time of the LFC spring vacation, the Waukegan vacation period and the resumption of tutoring schedules. Realizing that the long absence would break the continuity of the relationship between tutor and tutee, the program directors decided to concentrate on field trip activities which would give a lift to the "spring fever" doldrums experienced by both the college students and their young friends.

The folk concert will be sponsored by the LFC tutorial program, under the direction of co-chairmen Charles E. Williams '66 (New Haven, Conn.) and Jane Fernald '66 (Darien, Conn.).
