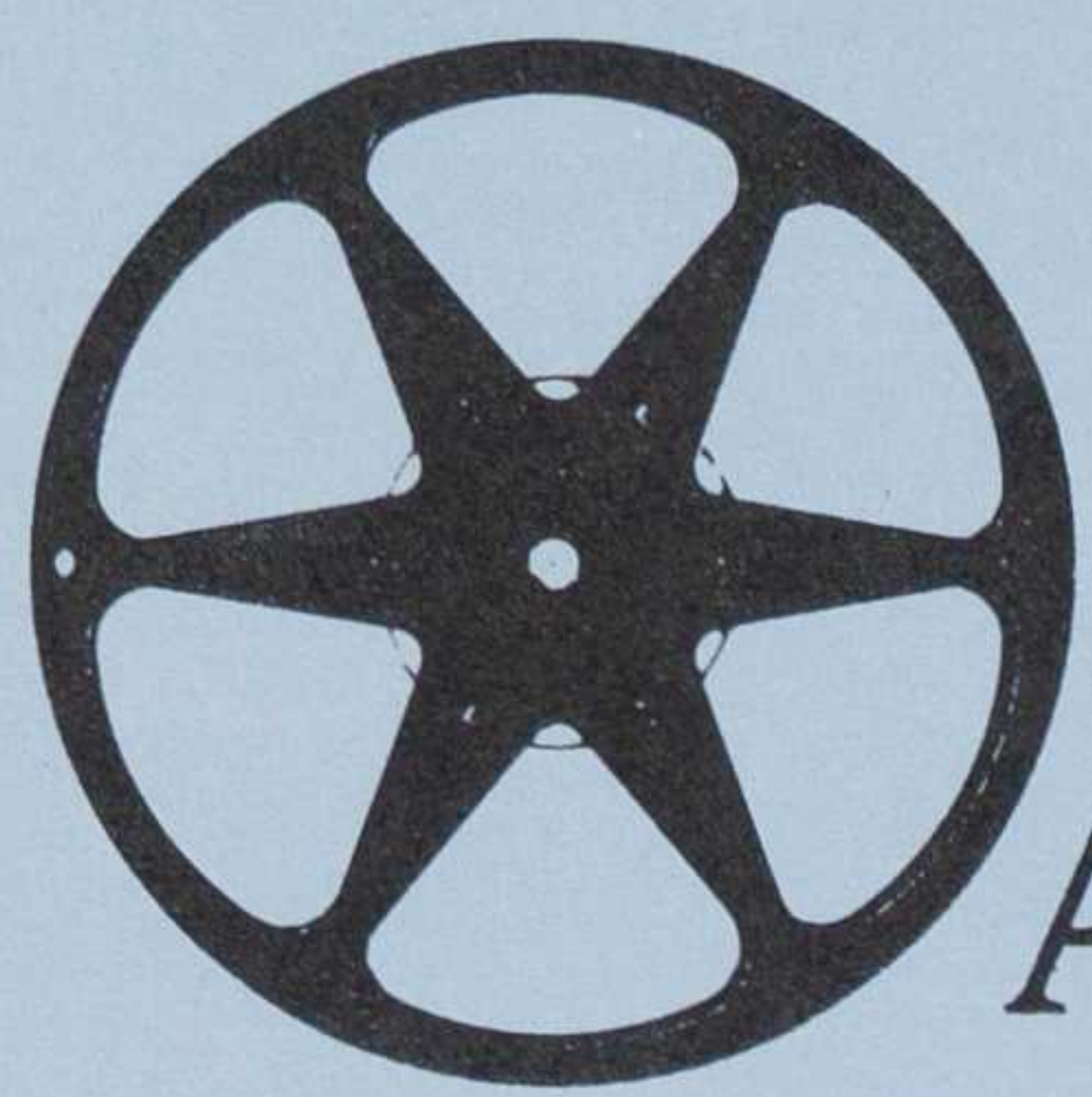

Grappling with the Last Epidemic: The Medical Response to Nuclear War (1981, 30 mins, 140 slides, MCA) A comprehensive analysis of the medical effects of nuclear war, including a review of the rudiments of nuclear physics; clinical syndromes resulting from a nuclear explosion—trauma, burns, radiation sickness; impact of a nuclear explosion on an urban area; and an account of a surviving Hiroshima physician. Developed at Brown University \$60

M.A.D. (Mutual Assured Destruction): The Psychology of Nuclear Armament (1982, 17 mins, 87 slides, AH) The arms race: thinking which has perpetuated it, its psychological effects on the average citizen, and misleading language used by arms experts. With Drs. Joanna Macy, Robert Jay Lifton, and Jerome Frank. Developed at Brown University. \$50

Nuclear War Graphics Package (130 slides, S) A collection of slides on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, nuclear tests, nuclear weapons, the arms race, and proliferation. Primary focus on nuclear weaponry. \$20

Consequences of Nuclear War Graphics Package (180 slides, S) Effects of nuclear weapons on people, evolution of nuclear arsenals, medical response to nuclear war, civil defense, consequences of the arms race. Primary focus on medical consequences. \$25

A Question of Survival (1982, 30 mins, A) Physicians and academics discuss the medical and economic effects of nuclear war and the arms race at PSR's 1981 symposium in Seattle.

Race to Oblivion (1982, 49 mins, A) PSR's Los Angeles symposium and an interview with Hiroshima survivor Shigeo Sasamori, R.N.

Guide to Armageddon (1982, 25 mins, AS) This visually powerful BBC film depicts the results of an atomic blast over London and demonstrates the ineffectiveness of various shelters.

Hiroshima-Nagasaki, August 1945 (1970, 16 mins, b&w, AMS) Grim footage made by Japanese camera crews during the first week after the atomic bombings.

Wars Without Winners II (1982, 28 mins, AH) This film includes interviews with U.S. and Soviet experts and ordinary citizens on nuclear war and the arms race; Adm. Rickover's congressional testimony; and a discussion between U.S. and Soviet physicians aired on Soviet and U.S. television.

How Much Is Enough? Decision Making in the Nuclear Age (1982, 60 mins, AC) A PBS documentary tracing, through interviews with high officials, the "arbitrary and . . . deeply political" decisions on weapons systems.

The Day After Trinity: J. Robert Oppenheimer and the Atomic Bomb (1980, 88 mins, ACH) Through Oppenheimer's life, this film traces the development of the bomb, the McCarthy era, and nuclear proliferation.

Gods of Metal (1982, 27 mins, R) A Christian perspective on the arms race, showing economic and social effects in the U.S. and the Third World, as well as Catholic groups and individuals taking action against the arms build-up.

Prophecy (1982, 40 mins, A) and **The Lost Generation** (1982, 20 mins, A) Two films by Japan's Hiroshima/Nagasaki Publishing Committee. Footage recently purchased from the U.S. government shows the fate of these cities and their residents.

In the Nuclear Shadow: What Can the Children Tell Us? (1983, 28 mins, AH) Through interviews, children express doubts about personal and planetary survival. Also included are excerpts from speeches by Drs. John Mack and Robert Jay Lifton.

The War Game (1966, 49 mins, b&w, A) A dramatic portrayal in newsreel style of the grim effects of a nuclear attack on Britain.

Paul Jacobs and the Nuclear Gang (1979, 60 mins, A) A documentary on the health effects of atomic tests in Utah and Nevada.
