And every time I ride the T, I think about all the people who learn about condom use from AIDS Action's MBTA posters.

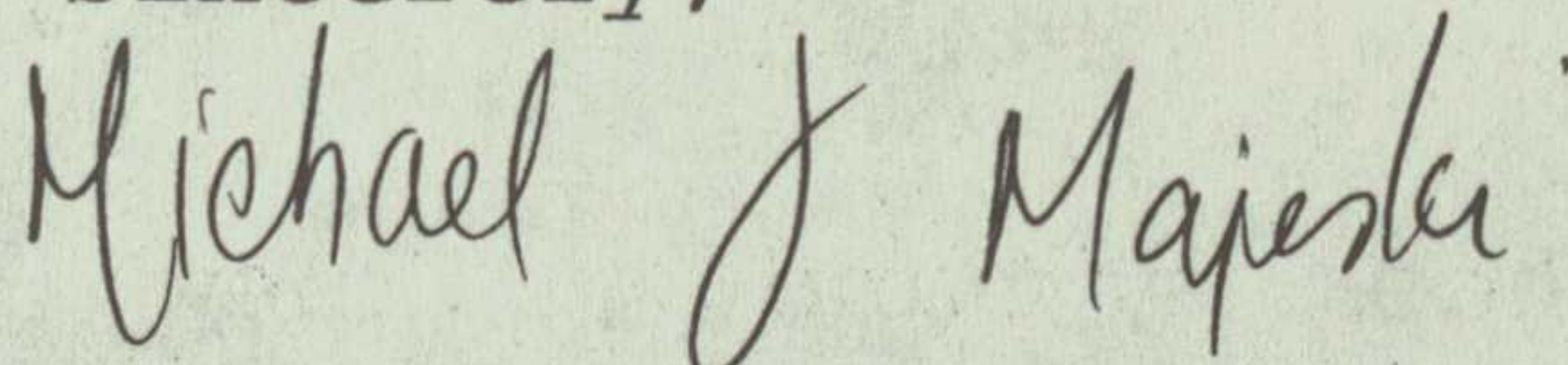
You can see that the number of people who will continue to benefit from AIDS Action's powerful education and prevention efforts is virtually infinite -- if we can keep up this critical work.
