Statement from International Peace Groups

As leaders of the international peace movement, we condemn all acts of terrorism by any nation or grouping. We are stunned by the massive U.S. bombing of Libya, itself an act of terrorism taking many innocent lives. Reagan's action was in violation of international law. The answer to terrorism is through the United Nations and through dealing with the unresolved political issues, not by unilateral military measures. The voices of reason around the world must be heard if dangerous elements in Washington are to be restrained.

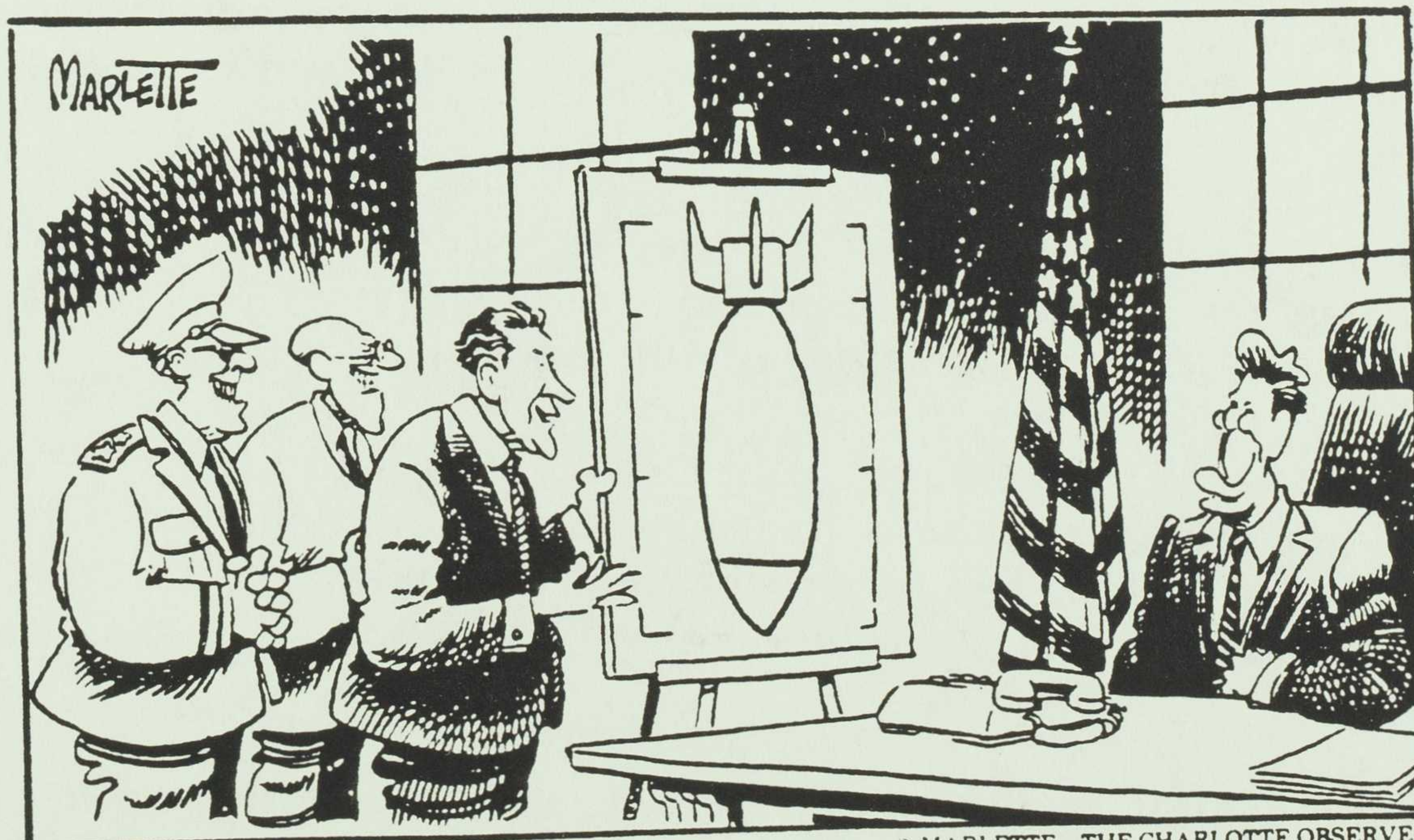
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Just following orders
