

SEVEN-POINT PROGRAM FOR IMPROVING COMMUNICATION WITHIN THE INTERNATIONAL REVOLUTIONARY UNION MOVEMENT

- 1) Exchange of publications via air mail to speed up the flow of information.
- 2) Exchange of information concerning what languages each organization can understand and/or work with, including Esperanto.
- 3) Try to conduct communications in both English and Spanish, using other languages when possible or necessary.
- 4) Exchange of addresses of revolutionary unions, rank and file labor groups, and workers' solidarity groups with a brief outline of their size, industrial concentration, international affiliations, and political orientation.
- 5) Establishment of an emergency communications network, including the names and telephone numbers of persons to contact in the different organizations, and the setting up of a telephone chain or "tree".
- 6) Each organization should publish a newsletter, in English and Spanish, for distribution internationally which would contain information about ongoing workers' struggles in their region.
- 7) That another international conference be held within 4 years to follow up on the work of the Haymarket International Labor Conference. This conference should be hosted by another revolutionary union.

Aproved May 4, 1986 by the delegates to Haymarket International Labor Conference: Industrial Workers of the World, Swedish Workers Central Organization, Workers Solidarity Movement (Japan), Solidarnosc Information Bureau (London, England), and French Anarchist Federation. (Note: adoption by the delegates does not commit their organizations to any course of action. Formal adoption of the program by the respective organizations is encouraged.)

STATEMENT ADOPTED BY THE HAYMARKET INTERNATIONAL LABOR CONFERENCE CHICAGO, MAY 4, 1986

This year workers all over the world commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Haymarket Affair. In 1886, like today, revolutionary workers were attacked by the state and the bosses because of their intention to build a society without starvation, exploitation, oppression and inequality.

The organizations in attendance at the final session of the Haymarket International Labor Conference would like to make everyone aware of the fact that we, revolutionary unionists, are still here, still alive. The revolutionary workers' movement is not dead.
